In accordance with Board Policy 9324, Board Minutes, all Regular School Board Meetings will be audio recorded.

II. INSTRUCTIONS FOR PRESENTATIONS TO THE BOARD BY PARENTS AND CITIZENS PRESENT AT THIS MEETING

We are pleased you can be with us at this meeting, and we hope you will return often. Your visit assures us of continuing community interest in our schools.

The members of the Board of Trustees of this District are locally elected state officials, who serve four-year terms of office, and who are responsible for the educational program of our community from grades kindergarten through twelve. They are required to conduct programs of the schools in accordance with the State of California Constitution, the State Education Code, and other laws relating to schools enacted by the Legislature, and policies and procedures which this Board adopts.

The Board is a policy-making body whose actions are guided by the school district's Mission and Goals. Administration of the District is delegated to a professional administrative staff headed by the Superintendent.

The agenda and its extensive background material are studied by each member of the Board for at least two days preceding the meeting. Board Members can call the administrative staff for clarification on any item, and many of the items on the agenda were discussed by the Board during previous meetings. These procedures enable the Board to act more effectively on agenda items than would otherwise be possible.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU WISH TO ADDRESS THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

ITEMS ON THE AGENDA. Any person may address the Board concerning any item on the agenda and may, at the discretion of the Board, be granted three (3) minutes to make a presentation to the Board at the time a specific item is under discussion. However, the time assigned for individual presentations could be fewer than three (3) minutes depending upon the total number of speakers who wish to address a specific agenda topic. Prior to the opening of the meeting, a Request to Address the Board card (located in the foyer) should be completed and submitted to the Secretary of the Board. The total time devoted to presentations to the Board shall not exceed twenty (20) minutes, unless additional time is granted by the Board. All presentations shall be heard by the Board prior to the formal discussion of the agenda topic under consideration. Once an agenda item has been opened for public comment, no additional "Request to Address the Board of Trustees" cards shall be accepted for that topic.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS (Non-Agenda Items). Citizens may address the Board on any item not appearing on the agenda. Individual presentations are limited to three (3) minutes per individual, with twenty (20) minutes in total being devoted for this purpose, but could be less if there are a large number of Oral Communication speakers. Legally, the Board may not take action on items raised by speakers under Oral Communications. However, at its discretion, the Board may refer items to the administration for follow-up or place topics on a future Board agenda.

PUBLIC HEARINGS. Anytime the Board schedules a separate public hearing on any given topic, it shall not hear speakers on that topic before the public hearing, except as to the scheduling of the hearing, nor shall it hear speakers after the hearing, except as to changes in the policy or recommended actions which are directed at the time of the hearing.

CLOSED SESSION. In accordance with Education Code Section 35146 and Government Code Section 54957, the Board may recess to Closed Session to discuss personnel matters which they consider inadvisable to take up in a public meeting.

REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION

In order to help ensure participation in the meeting of disabled individuals, appropriate disability-related accommodations or modifications shall be provided by the Board, upon request, in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Persons with a disability who require a disability-related accommodation or modification, including auxiliary aids and services in order to participate in a Board meeting, shall contact the Superintendent or designee in writing by noon on the Friday before the scheduled meeting. Such notification shall provide school district personnel time to make reasonable arrangements to assure accessibility to the meeting.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Capistrano Unified School District annually awards merit grants to the Classified Employees of the Year and Teachers of the Year. These awards are made possible under Board Policy 4156.2, 4256.2 and 4356.2 - Awards to Employees, Exhibit A. The 2007-08 merit award recipients are also attached for Trustees' information, Exhibit B.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This item seeks board consideration to suspend merit awards to classified and teaching employees at least through June 2010. With the current dire economic situation, suspension of this policy will yield some savings to the general fund. Suspension of managerial stipends went into effect in 2007. This action would bring into alignment the suspension of merit pay for all employee groups.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Suspension of this policy for the 2008-2009 and 2009-2010 schools years would result in a savings of approximately \$60,000 to the general fund.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended the Board of Trustees suspend Board Policy BP 4156.2, 4256.2 and 4356.2 – Awards to Employees for the 2008-2009 and 2009-2010 school years, Exhibit A.

AWARDS TO EMPLOYEES

The Governing Board recognizes the significant contributions which employees can make to improving "Excellence in Education" in the District. This includes improving the quality of programs and services provided students by certificated and classified personnel.

By establishing "Awards to Employees" the Board expresses its strong commitment to a staff recognition program. A program whereby employees can be recognized for their significant contributions to the District. In turn, the quality of educational opportunities and experiences for students will be enhanced.

Purpose of Awards

Awards may be made by the Board to current District employees who:

- Propose procedures or ideas which thereafter are adopted and effectuated by the Board, and 1. which result in eliminating or reducing District expenditures or improving operations; or
- 2. Perform special acts or special services in the public interest; or
- 3. By their superior accomplishments, make exceptional contributions to the efficiency, economy or other improvement in operations of the District.

Consideration of Awards

The Board shall consider recommendations from the Superintendent for awards.

Nominations for Awards

The following procedures shall be followed regarding the nomination or recommendation of any employee for an Award:

- 1. Residents living within the District or any employee may nominate a currently employed District employee for an Award;
- 2. Nominations may be made by completing a nomination form which will recommend to the Superintendent the name of any individual to receive an Award;
- 3. Nominations will be reviewed and recommendations made to the Superintendent of any individual to receive an Award:
- Accompanying each recommendation for an Award shall be a specified amount of money, 4. from a minimum of \$200 to maximum of \$15,000;

AWARDS TO EMPLOYEES (continued)

- 5. The Superintendent shall make the final recommendations to the Board for an Award to any employee.
- 6. In accordance with IRS regulations, the dollar amount of the Award will be reported on the employee's W-2.

School Board Approval

The Superintendent shall submit each Award recommendation to the Board who shall make all final decisions concerning Awards to employees under this policy. Awards to employees shall be by adoption of a Resolution stating:

- 1. The name of the employee
- 2 The purpose of the Award; and
- 3. The dollar amount of the Award.

An annual budget appropriation shall be established to provide funds to pay costs associated with the District's "Awards to Employees" program.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Every three years Capistrano Unified School District is required to adopt a three-year Expulsion Plan that is submitted to the Orange County Department of Education. The last plan for CUSD was adopted by the Trustees on February 13, 2006.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This requested board action is required by law. CUSD staff has met with Orange County districts and the Department of Education to develop/update the district's three year Expulsion Plan (Exhibit A). The proposed update of the three year Expulsion Plan is very similar in nature to the prior version.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There is no financial implication to this agenda item.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the attached three year Expulsion Plan, Exhibit A, for submission to the Orange County Department of Education as required by law.

PLAN FOR PROVIDING EDUCATIONAL SERVICES TO ALL EXPELLED STUDENTS IN ORANGE COUNTY

General Provisions

A student whose behavior has resulted in an expulsion is provided a rehabilitation plan which ensures placement in an educational program. All educational alternatives provided by Orange County school districts are not available to all expelled students. Type of offense, location of offense, grade level of the student and nature of the students individualized needs all have the potential to restrict the educational alternative available to the student during the period of expulsion. Students expelled for any of the offenses listed in subdivision (a) or (c) of Section 48915 of the California Education Code shall not be permitted to enroll in any district-operated program during the period of expulsion unless it is a community day school (E.C. 48915.2).

All expelled students shall be referred to an educational placement that is 1) not situated at a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at any elementary school, and 2) not housed at the school site attended by the student at the time of the offense (E.C. 48915). In addition to the requirements stated above, such factors as district size, district level alternatives, county level alternatives, and district philosophy can influence the decisions by a district board of education regarding what educational alternatives are appropriate for the students who are expelled.

School District Educational Alternatives for Expelled Students

The governing board of each school district will determine which educational alternatives are appropriate and available. Educational alternatives throughout Orange County for students recommended for expulsion include, but are not limited to the following options:

- 1. Expulsion, suspended order, with placement on the same school campus (E.C. 48917 (a).
- 2. Expulsion, suspended order, with placement on a different school campus within the district (E.C.48917(a).
- 3. Expulsion with referral to a district community day school program, if available (E.C. 48660).
- 4. Expulsion with subsequent transfer to another district.
- 5. Expulsion with referral to the Orange County Department of Education, Alternative, Community and Correctional Education Schools and Services (ACCESS) (E.C. 1981 I.)

Actual referral to a district community day school or county community school is made by the school district governing board with recommendations from the district expulsion hearing panel, or by another established district referral process as required by statute.

Special Circumstances for Expelled Students Addressing Gaps

Previously identified gaps have been addressed and considerable improvement has been made through a collaboration process between the twenty eight Orange County School Districts and the Orange County Department of Education. The twenty eight School Districts in Orange County and the Orange County Department of Education have committed themselves to an on-going process to resolve the remaining identified gaps.

Special Education Students

Students with identified exceptional needs shall be referred to the county program pursuant to the Individualized Education Program (IEP) or 504 process as outlined in Ed. Code 48915.5. School districts must take into consideration the contents of the student's IEP when making placement recommendations. Any change in placement requires the school district to convene an IEP meeting. The IEP team identifies a special education program and related services appropriate for the student. Placement options may include district, or county operated program.

- If the district refers the expelled student to the Orange County Department of Education, the district shall convene an IEP meeting prior to the referral, to jointly identify an appropriate special education program and related services. A representative from the Orange County Department of Education shall participate in the IEP meeting. The district or Orange County Superintendent, as identified in the SELPA Plan, will provide special education services to these students.
- When the Individualized Education Program cannot be implemented within the Orange County Department of Education, the district of residence is responsible for providing Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) within the continuum of program options identified in their SELPA plan.

Expelled Students Who Commit Subsequent Violation(s)

The placement of expelled students who commit subsequent expellable violations will be placed in one of the following options:

- If the student commits a subsequent violation of Education Code 48900, the student may be referred to another district alternative program or to the Orange County Department of Education.
- If the expelled student commits another violation of the Education Code while enrolled in OCDE, the student will be placed at another community school site within the Principal Administrative Region (PAR) or transferred to another region operated by the Orange County Department of Education, in accordance with Board Policy.

Expelled Students Who Fail District Community Day School

An expelled student who fails his/her placement in a district community day school program may be placed in one of the following options:

- Other existing district educational alternatives.
- Orange County Department of Education, Alternative, Community and Correctional Education Schools and Services or the Division of Special Education Services.

County Office Options

The Orange County Department of Education is committed to providing a spectrum of educational options for students expelled from Orange County school districts. Our mission is to care for, teach, and inspire all ACCESS students to discover their potential, develop their character, and maximize their learning so they may become successful contributors to society. Educational options are provided through the Division of Alternative Education, known as Alternative, Community, and Correctional Education Schools and Services (ACCESS), and the Division of Special Education Services.

The policy of each individual school district affects how the Orange County Department of Education will meet the needs of that particular school district. Some districts use the Orange County Department of Education programs as educational options for those students expelled under Education Code 48900.

The Orange County Department of Education provides an interim alternative educational setting while school districts search for permanent placements for students (not excluding county options). In addition to programs operated by the Division of Special Education Services, The Division of Alternative Education provides options for expelled youth at over 100 sites contained within 7 regions located throughout the county. Regional options may include:

- Classroom instruction serving grades 7-12, delivered daily for 240-270 minutes are aligned with the State Frameworks/Standards.
- Contracted study programs for students who elect, with parent/teacher approval, not to participate in daily classroom instructional programs. These contracted study programs (Independent Study) require students to complete a minimum of 20 hours per week of educational product.
- Middle school regional programs serving grades 5-8, delivered daily for 240-270 minutes are aligned with the State Frameworks/Standards.
- Alternative Academies serving grades 3-5, are an option in regions that have sufficient number of referred students to sustain a regional program.

- Alternative school program for homeless children and youth, grades K-8, located in Orange.
- Parent directed home instruction through, CHOOSE, the Community Home Education Program and Pacific Coast High School.
- After school programming exists at 13 community school sites in ACCESS.

Referral Process to the Orange County Department of Education Alternative Community Correctional Education School and Services (ACCESS)

The school district of residence maintains the responsibility for developing a rehabilitation plan for expelled students, referring students to an appropriate educational setting. Expelled students who complete their rehabilitation plan obligations are reviewed by the district for possible return to district of residence programs. Expelled students who fail to meet the terms and conditions of the district rehabilitation plan may be referred to an appropriate educational setting within another district alternative program, district community day school program, or the Orange County Department of Education.

An Individual Learning Plan (ILP) will be developed for expelled students referred to the Orange County Department of Education, Alternative, Community and Correctional Education Schools and Services (ACCESS). Part of this plan includes a goal of returning the student to the school district of residence at completion of the district expulsion.

Referrals to the county operated alternative, community school programs may be made directly to the ACCESS Regional Offices listed below. Referrals to programs operated by the Division of Special Education Services, (students with low incident disabilities and emotional disturbances) shall be made to the Director of Special Schools, Jim Gerard, at (714) 966-4133.

SUMMARY OF GAPS IN EDUCATION SERVICES TO EXPELLED STUDENTS & STRATEGIES FOR FILLING THOSE GAPS

GAP 1

Expelled Students in Grades K-4

Students in grades K-4 who are expelled do not have the same educational options available as do expelled youth in grades 5-12. The separation of students in these grades does not apply to community day school. The number of community day schools in the county is limited.

Strategies for Addressing this GAP

- Implement a pilot program that may include one of the following. A mid-county or one north county or one south county class for primary students.
- Explore regional numbers of students, and engage in open dialogue w/more participation between ACCESS and the Districts as to their needs regarding younger student placement
- Have a more clear communication between ACCESS and the Districts.
- Discuss options for establishing an alternative program.

GAP 2

Special Education

This gap continues due to limited county run options for emotionally disturbed and developmentally delayed students. In addition, there is a limit to RSP space for students in the ACCESS program. The county office is committed to expanded program options for students with exceptional needs that have been expelled from District programs. As identified through communication with District-Special Education Directors, programs for emotionally disturbed and dual diagnosis (Emotionally Disturbed and Developmentally Delayed) students have been developed. In addition, the Division of Alternative Education (ACCESS) is continuously improving services for the lower ability, special education student to participate in community day school settings. When appropriate special education services can not be accommodated through existing county office alternatives, the District of Residence will continue to facilitate placement to meet the needs of individual students through district and non-public agency/school placements.

- Promote increased collaboration between ACCESS and CUSD Special Education and Child Welfare and Attendance departments
- Support increased RSP and other Special Education services for expelled students and others referred to ACCESS.
- Include Special Education staff in discussing Special Education and Emotionally Disturbed options.
- Support increase of County emotionally disturbed programs to assist districts to carry out individual student plans.

SUMMARY OF GAPS IN EDUCATION SERVICES TO EXPELLED STUDENTS & STRATEGIES FOR FILLING THOSE GAPS

GAP 3

Rehabilitation

This GAP continues due to the fact that some students do not complete their rehabilitation contracts.

Strategies for Addressing the GAP

- Students will be advised that CUSD will require that students continue in ACCESS or other alternative programs until their rehabilitation plan is completed.
- ACCESS will implement a SARB process.
- CUSD will promote increased communication between the districts and ACCESS regarding the status of students who are returning to the district.

GAP 4

Mental Health

There is a countrywide concern over how to utilize Orange County Health Care Agency-Mental Health Services for expelled students during the summer months.

Strategies for Addressing this Gap

- Invite Mental Health staff to County CWA meetings to strategize solutions
- Increase communication with Mental Health services and districts.

The District has received a Stop Notice from a subcontractor who performed work or supplied materials at San Clemente High School. The Stop Notice filed by California Door Specialists, is in the amount of \$9,550.

Civil Code Section 3196 provides that the District may, at its discretion, permit the general contractor to file a release bond in an amount equal to 125 percent of the claim stated in the Stop Notice to secure release of the withheld money.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item requests Board approval to accept from the general contractor on the San Clemente High School Auxiliary Gym Project, G.C. Builders, Inc., a release bond in the amount equal to 125% of the total costs of the Stop Notice filed by the subcontractor.

AUCTION FIVE TRANSIT BUSES

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

As one component of the 2007/2008 budget cuts, the district reduced home-to-school transportation from 62 bus routes to 18. This has left the district with a surplus of transit buses. Transportation has been approached by two different private schools and one private individual to lease and/or purchase buses. Upon consultation with the Orange County Department of Education legal counsel, we were advised not to lease buses to private entities.

The five buses chosen for surplus are technically "mothballed," not energy efficient, and no longer viable options to be used in the district's fleet of buses.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item presents for Board consideration approval to surplus five transit buses and advertise them for auction. Staff is proposing to auction off five buses to determine proper pricing and to maintain district flexibility in levels of service to the community. These are older buses currently not needed for the district's transportation program and not anticipated to be needed in the future. Attached please find a listing of the proposed surplus buses, Exhibit A.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

It is recommended that these buses be advertised for a minimum bid of \$8,000 each. As the marketability of these buses is not clear, this is a way to test the waters in terms of selling some of our buses. Potentially these buses will bring a minimum revenue of \$40,000 to \$50,000 to the district's general fund which could be used for vehicle replacement.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that the Board of Trustees approve declaring five transit buses surplus, and authorize them to be advertised on the e surplus website for auction.

As a result of the Williams Settlement, Education Code Section 35186 mandates that school districts establish policies and procedures to resolve deficiencies related to instructional materials, facilities conditions posing a threat to student/staff health or safety, and teacher vacancies or misassignments.

The law also requires that districts report any deficiencies or the absence of deficiencies to the Board of Trustees at a regularly scheduled public meeting. In addition, this information needs to be shared with the Orange County Superintendent of Schools.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item presents for review the Williams report from the second quarter of the 2008-09 school year. These reports are received and monitored by Executive Director, Risk Management/Compliance, Jeffrey Bristow. In the past quarter, the district has not received any Williams complaints concerning its instructional materials, teacher qualifications, facilities, or CAHSEE services, Exhibit A.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

With no Williams Complaints received there are no financial implications in the Board's acceptance of this report.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that the Board accept this report as an informational item. No formal action is necessary at this time.

SUBJECT: AUTHORIZATION OF COACHES TO PROVIDE P.E. CREDIT

SECOND SEMESTER

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Districts may assign a teacher with a credential in a subject other than physical education to coach a competitive sport and award P.E. credit to students in that class. State law requires that such teachers be full-time employees of the school district, complete a minimum of 20 hours of first aid instruction, have training on the harmful effects of steroid use, and be approved by the governing board.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

The purpose of this agenda item is to request approval by the Board of Trustees for teachers who are credentialed in subjects other than physical education to provide P.E. credit to students in that respective sport.

It has been determined that all teachers who do not hold a P.E. credential, but are assigned coaching activities for which such credit is given, are full-time employees of the school district and have completed a minimum of 20 hours of first aid instruction. Additionally, these coaches have attended or are in the process of attending a training program based on the Victory With Honor curriculum, which includes discussion on the dangerous effects of steroids. Therefore, it is now appropriate for the Board of Trustees to approve those teachers so assigned, Exhibit A.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

All coaching stipends are provided for in the 2008-09 budget.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended the Board of Trustees authorize the appropriate teachers to coach a competitive sport for one period per day and provide P.E. credit to the students enrolled in the class, Exhibit A.

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

California State University, Fullerton has requested that CUSD host academic interns who are enrolled in the university's Department of Child and Adolescent Studies. These academic interns would serve as volunteers in CUSD classrooms to observe learning activities. Site administrators have the option of hosting university intern candidates if there is an interest on the part of staff.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item presents for Board approval an Academic Intern Agreement with California State University, Fullerton. Academic interns serving as volunteers would submit to fingerprinting requirements and TB clearance.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There is no financial impact to district funds in hosting academic interns in schools.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended the Board of Trustees approve this Academic Intern Agreement to extend the field-based support of developing teachers, Exhibit A.

California State University, Fullerton Learning Activity Placement Agreement

This agreement ("Agreement") entered into this 21" day of January 2009, between the Trustees of the California State University on behalf of California State University, Fullerton ("University") and Capistrano Unified School District ("Learning Activity Site").

In consideration of the mutual promises and conditions set forth below, the University and Learning Activity Site ("parties") agree as follows:

I. PRIORITIES

A. Meaningful Learning Experience

- 1. The Learning Activity Site will provide the University's students with a student-focused learning experience that also meets the stated needs of the Learning Activity Site.
- 2. The Learning Activity Site understands and acknowledges that any learning activity opportunity selected by a student must relate to that student's academic field of study and/or professional field where that academic knowledge may be utilized.
- 3. The Learning Activity Site and the University are committed to allowing students to select the learning activity and Learning Activity Site that best meets their individual academic needs and goals. The University will include these objectives in the written description or "Learning Plan" developed for its students.
- 4. The Learning Activity Site and the University will meet as necessary to facilitate a mutually beneficial experience for all involved, or at the request of any of the parties involved.
- 5. Prior to the start of a learning activity, the Learning Activity Site will provide University students with an accurate and complete written description of the student's tasks and responsibilities. The Learning Activity Site will also provide the resources necessary for students to complete these duties in a timely and efficient manner.
- 6. The University will work closely with the Learning Activity Site to meet the expectations and priorities of the Learning Activity Site.
- 7. The University will ensure that its students will:
 - a. Participate in all relevant training the Learning Activity Site requires.
 - b. Exhibit professional, ethical and appropriate behavior while engaged in this learning activity.
 - c. Endeavor to fulfill all assigned tasks and responsibilities in a timely and efficient manner.

B. Safe and Productive Learning Environment

- 1. To achieve its desire to provide a safe and productive environment for the University's students, the Learning Activity Site will:
 - a. Give students a complete tour of the Learning Activity Site.
 - b. Inform students of all relevant safety policies and emergency procedures.

- c. Discuss with students the reasonably foreseeable risks associated with the Learning Activity Site and the tasks and responsibilities the students have been assigned.
- d. Determine if a student must be fingerprinted. If fingerprinting is necessary, the Learning Activity Site will obtain the fingerprints, request criminal background clearance form the appropriate agency (ies), and maintain the confidentiality of any results as required by federal or state law.
- e. Unless, the position requires students to drive as part of their assigned tasks and responsibilities, students shall *not* be required or permitted to transport clients or staff in any vehicle.
- f. Determine if a student must have a Tuberculosis (TB) Test. If TB testing is required, the Learning Activity Site will arrange for a TB Test and maintain the confidentiality of any results as required by federal or state law.
- g. Notify the University's Office of Risk Management (714-278-4937) as soon as is reasonably possible of any injury or illness to a student participating in a learning activity offered by the Learning Activity Site.
- 2. The Learning Activity Site may dismiss a student if the student violates its standards, mission or goals. The Learning Activity Site will document its rationale for terminating a student and provide the University with a copy of the rationale upon request.
- 3. The University will ensure that its students will:
 - a. Abide by the Learning Activity Site's rules and standards of conduct while on site and working with the Learning Activity Site's clients and staff.
 - b. Ensure that their actions with clients are safe, positive, productive and ethical.
 - c. Maintain the confidentiality of the Learning Activity Site's proprietary information, records and information concerning its clients.

II. STRUCTURE AND SUPPORT OF STUDENT LEARNING AT THE LEARNING ACTIVITY SITE

- A. Site Supervision. Prior to the start of the learning activity, the Learning Activity Site will inform the student who will be responsible for their supervision and safety while on site. The supervisor will meet with the student as necessary to facilitate the student's learning experience and professional development, provide support, and review progress on assignments and activities. The supervisor will communicate as necessary twice per within the semester with the University staff or faculty member who assigned the learning activity. If the supervisor is absent, the Learning Activity Site will identify an alternate supervisor.
- B. Training and Orientation. The Learning Activity Site will provide students with specific training needed prior to their working with clients or providing service. The Learning Activity Site will provide students with an orientation, which should include an introduction to staff, a description of the characteristics of the Learning Activity Site's operations and clients, and information detailing where students are to check-in and how students should log their time.
- C. Work Space. Students will have an appropriate space at the Learning Activity Site in which to conduct their assigned work. The Learning Activity Site will provide access and training for any and all equipment necessary for students to fulfill their service role.
- D. Evaluation. The Learning Activity Site supervisor will fill out survey(s) regarding the quality of the service performance of the student if requested by the University.

- E. Position Description. The Learning Activity Site will develop a position description for each learning activity opportunity. Unless approved by the University, clerical or non-professional tasks may consist of no more than 20% of the student's total responsibilities.
- F. Student Selection. The Learning Activity Site is responsible for recruiting the most appropriate students for their learning activity opportunities.
- G. Training and Reflection. The University will provide an orientation for student(s) regarding the responsibilities set forth in Section 1 and will provide opportunities for students to reflect upon their experience working at the Learning Activity Site.

III. TERM

This Agreement will become effective upon execution and continue until terminated by either party after giving the other party 30 days advance written notice of the intention to terminate; however, any such termination by the Learning Activity Site will not be effective against any student who at the date of mailing of said notice by the Learning Activity Site was participating in said program until such Student has completed the program as mutually agreed upon.

IV. GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. Indemnification

- 1. The University agrees to defend all claims of loss, and indemnify and hold harmless the Learning Activity Site and its officers, agents and employees from any and all liability for personal injury, damages, wrongful death or other losses and costs, including but not limited to reasonable attorney fees and defense costs, arising out of the negligent acts or omissions or willful misconduct of the University or its employees, officers, or volunteers in the performance of this Agreement.
- 2. The Learning Activity Site agrees to defend all claims of loss, and indemnify, and hold harmless the State of California, the Trustees of the California State University, California State University, Fullerton and their officers, agents, volunteers and employees from any and all liability for personal injury, damages, wrongful death or other losses and costs, including but not limited to reasonable attorney fees and defense costs, arising out of the negligent acts or omissions or willful misconduct of the Learning Activity Site or its employees, agents or volunteers in the performance of this Agreement.

B. Insurance

1. The Learning Activity Site will maintain General Liability Insurance, comprehensive or commercial form, with at least a \$1,000,000 minimum limit for each occurrence and at least a minimum limit of \$2,000,000 General Aggregate; Workers' Compensation Insurance at statutory minimum levels: Employer's Liability Insurance with at least a \$1,000,000 minimum limit for each occurrence; and Automobile Liability Insurance with at least a \$1,000,000 minimum limit for each occurrence. This insurance must be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best rating of no less than A:VII. The Learning Activity Site will provide evidence of insurance upon request.

- 2. The University has elected to be self-insured for its General Liability and Workers' Compensation exposures through an annual appropriation from the General Fund, as consistent with California Government Code Section 810.2.
- C. Independent Status. The parties, in the performance of this Agreement, will act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees or agents of the other.
- **D.** Status of Students. Students participating in a learning activity are not officers, employees, agents or volunteers of the University.
- E. Governing Law. This Agreement will be construed in accordance with, and its performance governed by, the laws of the State of California.
- **F.** Assignment. Without written consent of the University, the Learning Activity Site may not assign this Agreement.
- G. Alteration and Integration. This Agreement may not be altered unless both parties agree in writing. No. oral understanding or agreement not incorporated in this Agreement is binding on either party.
- H. Endorsement. Nothing contained in this Agreement may be construed as conferring on either party any right to use the other party's name(s) as an endorsement of a product/service or to advertise, promote or otherwise market any product or service without the prior written consent of the other party. Moreover, nothing in this Agreement may be construed as endorsement of any commercial product or service by the University, its officers or employees.
- I. Survival. Upon termination of this Agreement for any reason, the terms, provisions, representations and warranties contained in this agreement survive expiration or earlier termination of this agreement.
- J. Severability. The parties agree that if any provision of this Agreement is held to be unconscionable or invalid under any applicable statute or rule of law, that provision will be omitted from this Agreement. However, the balance of the Agreement will remain in full force and effect.
- K. Fair Labor Standards Act and Displacement of Organization Employees. Students participating in a learning activity may not perform services that would displace or replace regular employees of the Learning Activity Site.
- L. Nondiscrimination. During the performance of this Agreement, the parties and their subcontractors may not deny the benefits of this Agreement to any person on the basis of religion, color, ethnic group identification, sex, age, physical or mental disability, nor may they discriminate unlawfully against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, age (over 40) or sex. The parties will insure that the evaluation and treatment of students are free of such discrimination.
- M. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior agreements, arrangements, and understandings with respect thereto. No representation, promise, inducement, or statement of intention has been made by any party that is not embodied herein, and no party is bound by or liable for any alleged representation, promise, inducement, or statement not set forth herein.

This discussion will be conducted in anticipation of the Board making decisions regarding mid-year cuts as soon as they are quantified and approved by the state as well as direction in compiling the 2009/10 budget. Staff will be seeking direction from the Board regarding potential cuts and reductions both in the current as well as next fiscal year.

Second Interims

Since May 2008, County Office Chief Business Officials have been working with various statewide agencies to craft common messages and advice to school districts on assumptions for budget and interim reports. In an effort to solve a \$41.7 Billion deficit, the Governor's January proposal has significant budget reductions to education in the current and next fiscal year. Although the Governor's January proposal is the beginning of a long process culminating in a final budget adopted by the Legislature, and despite significant disparities between the Governor's January proposal and prior proposals from the Legislature, the Governor's proposal is the only written proposal available and thus our advice is based on this proposal.

CCSESA BASC DISTRICT FISCAL OVERSIGHT COMMON MESSAGE TALKING POINTS

2008-09 Second Interims January 26, 2009

BACKGROUND

In May 2008, BASC (CCSESA's County Office CBO subcommittee) initiated the practice of developing common talking points for county offices to use as we prepare to advise districts on assumptions for budget and interim reports. This update reflects the Governor's 2009-10 Budget Proposal. In an effort to solve a \$41.7 billion deficit, this proposal has significant provisions that impact both the current 2008-09 fiscal year as well as the 2009-10 budget year. For K-12 education, this translates into cuts of approximately \$6.3 billion. The Governor's proposal reflects the beginning of a long process culminating in a final budget adopted by the Legislature and signed by the Governor. Currently, there is little consensus between the Governor and the Legislature relative to what actions will be necessary to balance the Budget. There may be many changes prior to a signed budget. We will update this message as major events occur. At present, the Governor's Budget proposal is the only written proposal available and thus our advice is based on this proposal.

We recognize that review and approval of budgets and interim reports requires analysis that involves many factors, including the State Board of Education's adopted Criteria and Standards and the FCMAT Predictors of School Agencies Needing Intervention. While recognizing and acknowledging the unique individual school district circumstances that will influence budget and financial review, we strongly recommend that the following guidelines be used by school districts as they develop their 2008-09 Second Interim Reports including multi-year projections for 2009-10 and 2010-11, as well as their 2009-10 Budget.

REVENUE LIMIT, SPECIAL EDUCATION AND CATEGORICAL PROGRAM COLAS

These are extraordinary times for school finance given the state budget structural deficit, the weak economy, the instability of financial markets, the increase in unemployment, a history of unfunded or partially funded cost of living adjustments (COLAs) in prior years, and other factors such as past and potential future mid-year cuts to funding. In recognition of these pressures on school funding, we recommend that school districts use the School Services of California (SSC) Financial Projection Dartboard in development of their 2008-09 Second Interim Report, their multi-year

projections and their 2009-10 Budget for both the revenue limits and categorical programs. The SSC dartboard has footnoted and addressed any differences in recommended COLAs for special education or categorical funds.

CATEGORICAL PROGRAM FLEXIBILITY

The Governor's Proposal makes mid-year cuts to the revenue limit and provides flexibility to help lessen the impact of those cuts. This approach differs from that of the stated approach by the Legislature. The Legislature would apply reductions to specific programs and not allow the same level of flexibility as the Governor. There will be significant debate over flexibility provisions prior to any agreement. It is difficult to project with any accuracy those flexibility provisions that will survive the debate. We are concerned about the flexibility proposals initiated by the Governor and would caution school districts about the inclusion of many of those in the 2008-09 Second Interim Report and the 2009-10 Budget. Our office has significant concerns about utilizing the Governor's proposed flexibility, especially in the areas of Class Size Reduction (CSR), Economic Impact Aid (EIA), Adult Education, Regional Occupational Programs (ROP), and Special Education. If districts elect to utilize the flexibility proposals, they must provide an alternate set of assumptions detailing the additional expenditure reductions that would be implemented if categorical program flexibility does not materialize. We believe that a more prudent approach would be to build the Second Interim projections assuming the most conservative scenario which could be no flexibility, or targeted cuts to the categorical programs as proposed by the Legislature in SBX1 4. District boards could consider adopting a list showing program restorations that would be made if any proposed flexibility option is approved.

It is more likely that the suspension of the Deferred Maintenance match requirement and the reduction of the Routine Restricted Maintenance Account (RRMA) set-aside requirement from 3% to 1% will survive. However, these are only for two years and would need to be restored in the third year.

It is our understanding that programs generated by initiatives and legal settlements such as After School Education and Safety (ASES), Quality Education Investment Act (QEIA), Valenzuela, and Williams will not be included in any final flexibility provisions.

RESERVE FOR ECONOMIC UNCERTAINTIES

In the Governor's Proposal, the minimum required levels for the reserve for economic uncertainties would be reduced by half. This would be effective for two years and would have to be restored in 2010-11. We would caution school districts on taking advantage of this reduction. We believe that the current percentages established in the Criteria and Standards for reserves are the BARE minimum. In these times of great economic and budgetary uncertainty, school districts need reserves that are greater than the minimum. Of particular concern is the use of one time reserve dollars for ongoing expenditures, as this may only compound financial problems when districts must both support the expenditures from ongoing revenues and restore one-time funds utilized from reserves.

BUDGET REDUCTIONS

School districts must be proactive and develop alternative expenditure reduction plans to meet the amount of flexibility options that have been incorporated in their 2008-09 Second Interim Report and their 2009-10 Budget. If school districts elect to utilize the flexibility proposals, they must provide an alternate set of assumptions detailing the additional expenditure reductions that would be implemented if categorical program flexibility does not materialize.

In light of the additional reductions included in the Governor's January Proposal, districts are required to submit detailed Board approved budget reduction plans for fiscal years 2008-09 and 2009-10. Board recognition of the total dollar amount of budget reductions for fiscal year 2010-11 will be sufficient.

NEGOTIATIONS

It is unlikely that any statutory deadlines will be extended. Therefore, school districts must adhere to the current deadlines and provide the necessary statutory employment notices that provide them with the most flexibility to deal with the final results of the Governor/ Legislative debates. Once those statutory dates have passed, the school district is limited in its options for expenditure reductions needed to meet the requirements of the final signed State budget. Programs and staff can always be re-instated once the final budget is enacted.

For the current and future years, school districts may want to consider delaying settlement of negotiations until after the 2009-10 Budget is adopted so that we know what the funding will be and the level of flexibility options available. We recognize that each school district's situation is unique; however, it is recommended that long term commitments not be made at this time. School districts may need to re-open contract language to implement some of the flexibility options. If considering a

multi-year contract, school districts need to be very flexible and have appropriate contingency language, such as basing compensation increases on "funded COLA" or "effective COLA". Also recognize that there may be different COLAs and deficits for revenue limits versus categorical programs and this should be considered during negotiations.

The Governor is proposing rescinding the .68% COLA for 2008-09. If a negotiated agreement called for increasing the salary schedule by a funded COLA, it is suggested that you delay implementation of any increase until the final funded COLA is determined. In the event that the salary schedule has already been increased, you may want to review alternate plans with your legal counsel.

CASH MANAGEMENT

Increased emphasis must be put on cash flow analysis and monitoring, and the impact of reduced or late apportionments for this year and possibly future years. We must be proactive, not reactive. AB 1781 (Budget Act) defers apportionment payments from February to April 2009, impacting cash flow. The Governor's current proposal would defer the April apportionment to July. These could become permanent deferrals implemented to address the State's fiscal crisis. School districts should closely monitor their cash flow and be prepared to review options for borrowing.

In the section "RESERVE FOR ECONOMIC UNCERTAINTIES", the importance of appropriate reserves was discussed. The cash management challenges make it even more imperative that we consider reserve levels greater than the minimums required under the Criteria and Standards. The reserves may be especially critical now to meet cash flow needs that guarantee our ability to provide adequate cash to meet payrolls and other obligations.

SUMMARY

These are very extraordinary economic times and it is difficult to gauge the future. It is important that school districts be proactive through developing contingency plans that allow the most flexibility possible. We recommend and strongly encourage districts to use these guidelines in the development of 2008-09 Second Interim Reports and associated multi-year projections as well as the development of the 2009-10 Budget.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Capistrano Unified School District receives the majority of its operational funding from the State of California, by way of apportionments from the State's General Fund. For the last several years, the Capistrano Unified School District has experienced declining and deficited funding from the State of California. This reduced funding, in contrast with increases in district enrollment, has required the district to make ongoing cuts totaling over \$28 million during the period of 2006-2009. Additionally, CUSD has also recently identified over \$19 million in additional proposed cuts in order to satisfy AB 1200, which mandates districts must prove financial solvency for the current fiscal year plus two future years. This agenda item was brought to the Board on January 12, 2009, but was continued to the February 9, 2009, Board meeting.

CURRENT CONSIDERATION

This agenda item pertains to the Board discussion, consideration, and approval of a resolution outlining the Board's opposition to the approval of a State budget which further weakens the District's ability to deliver quality public education. Resolution No. 0809-48 is attached as Exhibit A.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no direct financial implications related to the adoption of this resolution.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is requested that Board President Addonizio recognize resolution sponsor, Trustee Maddox, who will introduce this item.

Following appropriate discussion, it is recommended that the Board approve and adopt Resolution No. 0809-48, Exhibit A. It is also respectfully requested that upon approval, the Board provide to district administration direction regarding an appropriate method for dissemination of this resolution, and any additional steps which may be necessary.

SUBJECT: SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN CUSD AND WHISPERING HILLS, LLC FOR FINAL LAND PURCHASE PAYMENT AND LOT LINE ADJUSTMENTS FOR SAN JUAN HILLS HIGH SCHOOL

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On January 12, 2009, staff presented to the Board of Trustees (as an information/discussion item) the proposed "Settlement and Mutual Release Agreement" between Capistrano Unified School District (CUSD) and Whispering Hills LLC (WHLLC). The proposed agreement serves two purposes: 1) establishes terms to make the final land purchase payment – through the issuance of bonds from Community Facilities District No. 2005-1 Whispering Hills (the "CFD"), and 2) resolves the property line adjustments around the campus of San Juan Hills High School (SJHHS). The Settlement and Mutual Release Agreement is now being brought back to the Board of Trustees for discussion/action.

In 2003, CUSD and WHLLC executed a "Purchase and Sale Agreement" to buy the real property for the future SJHHS. The total purchase price of the 50-acre parcel was \$51.035 million. To date, all but \$6 million has been paid to the seller. Pursuant to the agreement, the final payment for the site was payable solely from proceeds of bonds of the CFD. However, delays in development of the land within the CFD have resulted in delays of a CFD bond issuance. Given that WHLLC is now proceeding with the sale of the land located within the CFD to developers with significant home building experience and funding sources, the District is now in a position to issue the first series of CFD bonds. Regarding the property line adjustments, several refinements to the school plan have occurred over time since the purchase of the property through the construction of the high school. These refinements included alignment modifications to perimeter roads and parking areas, as well as adjustments to the perimeter fence/field areas. Now, with most of the construction complete, the District and the developer are in the position to finalize the property boundaries. It is important to note that included with the proposed property line changes is the District's acquisition of the hillside area on the north side of the stadium that has been planned for construction of home bleachers.

CUSD representatives have, over the past months, met several times with representatives of the developers to negotiate a settlement of all matters in dispute including the terms of the final land purchase payment, and completing the necessary lot line adjustments. With the assistance of legal counsels representing the District and the developer, staff believes the proposed agreement provides a fair and equitable method to complete the transactions.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item was first brought to the Board on January 12, 2009 for information/discussion. Since that time, additional information (i.e., questions/issues/concerns) from the public and the Board has been received with comments submitted to the Board under separate cover. Staff is now bringing back the "Settlement and Mutual Release Agreement" item to the Board of Trustees for discussion/action. Upon Board approval, the next steps will include sending out a Request for Proposals for a MAI appraiser with community facilities district appraisal expertise. The Board would then be asked to engage an appraiser and direct further due diligence investigation of the creditworthiness of a first Series CFD Bond issuance. This due diligence would include an update to the market absorption study, an appraisal of the land within the CFD, review of necessary land purchase, development and financing documentation, proceedings to reduce the maximum special tax rates of the CFD to a level which results in an estimated effective tax rate, including all overlapping property taxes and assessments and the proposed CFD taxes, of 2% (consistent with CUSD CFD policies), analysis of the amended CFD taxing capacity and proper disclosure of information material to bond investors.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

This agenda item does not impact the District's General Fund. Revenues generated through capital facilities accounts including Mello-Roos funds, Measure A funds, developer fees, and the State's School Facility Program Funds were/are used to acquire school property, pay consultant fees, as well as to construct and modernize school facilities.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully requested that the Board President recognize Mr. Ron Lebs, Deputy Superintendent, Business and Support Services, and Mr. Bob Whalen of Stradling, Yocca, Carlson & Rauth – the Districts' legal counsel who will be available to discuss the agreement and address any questions. Additionally, representatives with the developer will also be available to address issues from their perspective.

After discussion, it is respectfully requested that Trustees approve the settlement agreement between CUSD and Whispering Hills, LLC for final land purchase payment and lot line adjustments for San Juan Hills High School, Exhibit A.

INFORMATION/ DISCUSSION

SETTLEMENT AND MUTUAL RELEASE AGREEMENT

THIS SETTLEMENT AND MUTUAL RELEASE ("Agreement") dated for reference
purposes only, 2008 is by and among the Capistrano Unified School District (the
"District"), Whispering Hills LLC ("WHLLC"), a California limited liability company, and
Rancho San Juan Development, LLC ("RSJLLC" or "Developer"), a California limited liability
company collectively referred to hereafter as the "Parties".

FACTUAL RECITALS

- A. On April 28, 2003, WHLLC as seller, and the District as purchaser, entered into a Purchase and Sale Agreement and Escrow Instructions ("Purchase Agreement") for the purchase and sale of a 50.3 acre site for construction of the San Juan Hills High School (the "Site").
- B. Pursuant to the Purchase Agreement, the purchase price for the Site was \$51,035,000 and payable as follows: (i) \$21,500,000 deposit into escrow; (ii) \$17,535,000 promissory note from District to WHLLC; (iii) \$6,000,000 promissory note from District to WHLLC; and (iv) \$6,000,000 promissory note from District to WHLLC (referred to as that certain "WHCFD Note"). Escrow closed on April 30, 2003 and the District has paid all but \$6,000,000 of the purchase price, as evidenced by the WHCFD Note.
- C. Further to the Purchase Agreement, on July 1, 2005, the District, WHLLC and the City of San Juan Capistrano ("City") entered into a Joint Community Facilities Agreement ("JCF Agreement") concerning the proposed formation of the District's Community Facilities District No. 2005-1 ("CFD") located adjacent to the Site (the "CFD Property"). The JCF Agreement contains recitals indicating that WHLLC, as developer of the CFD Property, has obtained the necessary development approvals to construct approximately 155 residential units on the CFD Property (the "Project"). The JCF Agreement further recites that the CFD will be used to finance the acquisition, financing and construction of required infrastructure related to the Project, including School Facilities and City Facilities as such terms are defined in the JCF Agreement.
- D. On July 1, 2005, WHLLC and the District also entered into an Impact Mitigation Agreement Related to the CFD ("Mitigation Agreement"). The recitals provide that WHLLC proposes to construct the Project, that the Project will generate additional students in grades kindergarten through twelfth ("Project Students") and that additional school facilities will be needed to adequately house Project Students. The purpose of the Mitigation Agreement is to provide for the formation of the CFD in order to fund School Facilities through the levy of special taxes and issuance of bonds of the CFD in satisfaction of WHLLC's obligation to pay impact fees.
- E. Disputes have arisen between the parties regarding payment of the final Site purchase price balance pursuant to the WHCFD Note and other matters (the "Disputes").
- F. Recently, District has become aware that WHLLC desires to transfer the CFD Property to RSJLLC for the purpose of developing, constructing, marketing and selling residential lots and/or homes. RSJLLC expects to build the Project in phases, with the first phase involving the development, marketing and sale of 70 homes ("Phase I Homes").

- Representatives of the District, WHLLC and RSJLLC have met over the last several months in an effort to resolve the Dispute.
- Without any admissions of any type or nature concerning the Dispute, the Parties H. hereby desire to resolve the Dispute and to settle and compromise the Dispute upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth solely in order to avoid the risk, expense and uncertainty of litigation and to allow RSJLLC to acquire and develop the Project.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and promises herein contained and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

Effective Date of Agreement. The Parties hereby confirm and agree that this 1. Agreement is effective and binding on the Parties upon the first day (the "Effective Date") on which each of the following conditions has occurred (collectively, the "Necessary Conditions"): (i) this Agreement has been approved and ratified by the Board of Trustees of District; (ii) a duly authorized representative of the District has executed this Agreement; (iii) duly authorized representatives of WHLLC and RSJLLC have each executed this Agreement; (iv) RSJLLC has acquired all rights, title and interest in the CFD Property from WHLLC, including all development rights and entitlements necessary for the development of the Project as evidenced in a binding and enforceable purchase and/or joint venture contract; (v) the Parties have amended the Mitigation Agreement as necessary to harmonize the terms and conditions in the Mitigation Agreement with those in this Agreement; (vi) the proceedings to modify the CFD have successfully been completed as described in, and in accordance with, Section 2.1 below; and (vii) the Phase I CFD Bonds (defined below) have been issued and sold in accordance with Section 3 below. Within a reasonable time after the Effective Date, the Parties shall execute a certificate certifying the Effective Date. If each of the Necessary Conditions has not occurred by October 15, 2009, this Agreement shall be null and void unless the Parties agree to extend the date by which the Necessary Conditions must be satisfied. If the only Necessary Condition that has not been met by October 15, 2009 is the issuance of the Phase 1 CFD Bonds because bond market conditions prevented such issuance, both parties hereby agree to an automatic ninety-day extension of such date to January 15, 2010. The Parties agree that the limitation periods for instituting any action against one another relating to any matters that are the subject of this Agreement shall be tolled for the period of time commencing with the date of this Agreement and terminating on the date that is ninety (90) days following the date on which this Agreement becomes null and void pursuant to this Section 1.

2. Reduction In and Levy of CFD Special Tax.

The District shall complete proceedings to reduce the CFD special tax 2.1 rates to an amount equal to 2% (may be lower for the custom lots proposed for the Project) of the current estimated sales prices of the homes within the CFD by March 30, 2009. The reduced special tax rates shall escalate by 2% per year, commencing July 1, 2010.

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- 2.2 Special taxes shall be levied on assessor's parcels for which a building permit has been issued for residential construction ("Developed Property") at 100% of the assigned special tax rates prior to the issuance of all CFD Bonds (as defined below).
- 2.3 All special taxes collected from Developed Property in excess of debt service and administrative expenses ("Surplus Special Taxes") shall be applied to fund the unpaid portion, if any, of the \$6,000,000 WHCFD Note and \$6,855,900 of City Facilities, in the priority determined by RSJLLC. Subsequent to the funding of both above-referenced amounts in full, any Surplus Special Taxes shall be applied as determined by the District in its sole discretion.

3. <u>Issuance of CFD Bonds</u>.

- 3.1 Series of bonds shall be issued by the CFD ("Bonds") within a reasonable time following satisfaction of the following conditions precedent, provided that no Bonds shall be issued if any owner, other than an individual owner, of CFD Property is then delinquent in payment of special taxes or ad valorem taxes. The financing terms described below apply solely to the first series of Bonds issued that are sized based upon the expected Developed Property special tax revenues from the Phase I Homes (the "Phase I CFD Bonds"), unless subsequent series are specifically indicated.
- (i) The District shall reasonably determine that the Phase I CFD Bonds are marketable based upon then existing economic, credit market, housing market and CFD development circumstances.
- (ii) The value-to-lien ratio shall be based on a CDIAC standard appraisal of all taxable property in the CFD in the aggregate of 5:1 or greater; with no secondary value to lien requirement for "Undeveloped Property" (i.e. assessor's parcels for which no building permit for residential construction has been issued) for the Phase I CFD Bonds. Value-to-lien requirements for Undeveloped Property for subsequent series of Bonds shall be determined by the District, in reasonable sole discretion, based upon development status and other factors existing at the time of issuance of any subsequent series of Bonds.
 - (iii) The District shall receive an update to the market absorption study.
- (iv) A binding and enforceable purchase and sales or joint venture contract for the development of the Phase I Homes shall be in place with either RSJLLC or another merchant builder and such builder shall demonstrate a contract is in place for home construction financing for the Phase I Homes. Such contracts shall be reviewed by disclosure counsel for the District, described in the official statement for the bonds and such description shall be affirmed by an opinion of developer counsel.
- (v) Capitalized interest on the Phase I CFD Bonds shall be funded for two years, provided that, at the request of RSJLLC, District will consider whether the aggregate of all security enhancement in place for the Phase I CFD Bonds and other factors warrant a lesser period, but not less than 18 months, of capitalized interest.
- (vi) All owners of CFD Property that are not end users must provide a cash deposit or letter of credit ("Security") meeting the criteria below until 75% of the annual 11/24/08 9130.2

special tax levy is levied on CFD Property owned by end-users. The Security shall be in an amount equal to the owner's expected special tax payments based on current ownership and debt service on the Bonds for the two years immediately following the expenditure of all capitalized interest and subject to the following conditions:

- (a) the Security shall be provided (1) by a bank reasonably acceptable to the District and (2) prior to the issuance and sale of the Bonds;
- (b) the Security shall be reduced as the owner conveys property by the amount equal to two years expected special taxes for the conveyed property (i.e., for the two years of debt service on the Bonds covered by the Security);
- (c) the Security shall be released when 75% of the annual special tax levy is levied on property owned by end-users; and
- (d) the Security may be drawn on in the event, and in the amount of, the owner's special tax payment delinquency.
- (vii) The Phase I CFD Bonds shall be issued subject to normal underwriting criteria, and sized at the lesser amount derived from application of the following tests: (a) 5:1 value-to-lien ratio and (b) 110% debt service plus priority administration coverage from Special Taxes projected to be levied annually on lots which are subject to a purchase and sale contract or joint venture agreement as described above and for which all requisite home construction financing is obtained.
- 3.2 It is the intent of the Parties that the Bonds should be sold in a public offering in \$5,000 increments barring any unexpected material negative changes in the market or the development which would necessitate that the Bonds be sold through a limited offering.

4. Allocation of CFD Proceeds between School Facilities and City Facilities.

The first \$12,855,900 in combined Surplus Special Taxes and net proceeds of the Bonds (collectively, "CFD Proceeds") shall be available for repayment of the WHCFD Note and funding City Facilities in the order determined by RSJLLC, as described below. In light of the fact that District has agreed that RSJLLC may, in its exclusive discretion, elect to apply the first \$6,000,000 of CFD Proceeds to the payment in full of the WHCFD Note, RSJLLC agrees that, in the event RSJLLC chooses to use any of the first \$6,000,000 of CFD Proceeds for purposes other than paying down the WHCFD Note, RSJLLC, and all other real parties in interest of the WHCFD Note, waive any right, claim or interest for payment of any unpaid portion of the WHCFD Note and shall be estopped from suing the District or the CFD for failure to pay any unpaid portion of the WHCFD Note and shall hold the District harmless for any shortfall in CFD Proceeds to pay the WHCFD Note in the future, provided that the District has applied and continues to apply CFD Proceeds as provided herein and shall not fail to issue subsequent series of Bonds when the underwriting criteria are satisfied in order to avoid repayment of the remaining portion of the WHCFD Note and funding of City Facilities. If RSJLLC elects to use the first \$6,000,000 of CFD Proceeds for purposes other than paying down the WHCFD Note, the unpaid portion of the WHCFD Note shall remain due and payable from the first \$12,855,900 in CFD Proceeds.

- 4.2 The first \$6 million in CFD Proceeds made available for School Facilities shall be applied to pay the \$6 million WHCFD Note. After the WHCFD Note is paid in full and \$6,855,900 has been provided to fund City Facilities, the next \$855,900 of CFD Proceeds shall be disbursed for School Facilities.
- 4.3 Funding repayment of the WHCFD Note shall be considered funding of School Facilities. After \$13,711,800 in CFD Proceeds has been funded for City Facilities and School Facilities, the next \$4,880,200 in CFD Proceeds shall be available for School Facilities and City Facilities on a 50/50 basis. All remaining CFD Proceeds shall be available for School Facilities.
- 4.4 District agrees that, notwithstanding any provisions of the JCF Agreement to the contrary, RSJLLC may be reimbursed from CFD Proceeds allocated for City Facilities pursuant to the preceding paragraphs for prior payments of CFD-eligible City fees with respect to property in the CFD.

5. Certificate of Compliance Requirements.

- 5.1 Prior to the issuance of the Phase I CFD Bonds, cash deposits or a letter of credit in the amount of then-applicable level two fees of the District shall be required prior to issuance of certificates of compliance from the District. Such cash deposits shall be returned to the payer, or the letter of credit shall be returned to the provider, upon issuance of the Phase I Bonds.
- 5.2 After issuance of the Phase I CFD Bonds, no cash deposits or other payments or security shall be required prior to the issuance of certificates of compliance.

6. **Dissolution of CFD**.

6.1 Prior to the issuance of the Phase 1 CFD Bonds, RSJLLC may by written notice to the District request that the District dissolve the CFD and record a notice of dissolution with respect to the CFD Property and CFD special tax lien in accordance with Government Code Section 53338.5. Upon District's recordation of the notice of dissolution, the Necessary Conditions specified in Section 2(vi) and (vii) above shall be deemed satisfied and neither the CFD nor the District shall have any further obligation with respect to the repayment of the WHCFD Note or funding of City Facilities. Following the recordation of the notice of dissolution, RSJLLC shall be required to pay the applicable statutory school fees of the District as a condition of the District's issuance of a certificate of compliance for each residential dwelling unit. If RSJLLC has previously provided a letter of credit in lieu of cash deposit's pursuant to Section 5.1 above, RSJLLC shall pay the statutory school fees secured by such letter of credit within five (5) days following District's recordation of the notice of dissolution.

7. Real Property Transfers.

- 7.1 Within five (5) business days following the Effective Date, RSJLLC shall open escrow with Fidelity National Title Company ("Escrow Agent").
- 7.2 Following the Effective Date, RSJLLC agrees to transfer to District, without compensation, Parcel A and Parcel B (collectively the "Additional Properties") as

identified in Exhibit "A", attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. Such transfers shall be subject to the following conditions:

- 7.2.1. Title to each of the Additional Properties shall be conveyed by RSJLLC to District at the Close of Escrow in fee simple by grant deed, free and clear of any and all liens, claims, encumbrances, mortgages, deeds of trust, and security interests (including the lien of real estate taxes) but subject to all the "Permitted Exceptions" (as defined below).
- 7.2.2. With respect to Parcel B, RSJLLC's obligation to transfer the property to District is subject to the District receiving all governmental approvals for the acquisition of Parcel B, including but not limited to requirements imposed by the California Department of Education. District agrees to diligently pursue all such governmental approvals. If the approvals have not been obtained, or if District has not otherwise accepted fee title by October 15, 2009, or such later date approved in writing by RSJLLC, the District's right to acquire Parcel B under the terms and conditions in this Agreement shall terminate and the District shall immediately remove all improvements it has made to Parcel B. RSJLLC shall then be permitted to use Parcel B for any purpose.
- 7.2.3. The term "Permitted Exceptions", shall mean: (a) all existing building, zoning and other city, state, county or federal laws, codes and regulations affecting the Property; and (b) any existing general utility easements serving the Property, provided such existing utility easements permit District's intended use.
- 7.3 Until such time as District either acquires the Additional Properties, or District's rights to the acquire the Additional Properties are terminated under the terms of this Agreement, District is granted a revocable license for the exclusive right to use the Additional Properties ("License"), subject to the following conditions:
- 7.3.1. District agrees to hold harmless and indemnify RSJLLC against any claims or expenses arising out of, or related to, such License.
- 7.3.2. The License shall be revoked if the Phase I CFD Bonds are not issued by October 15, 2009.
- 7.3.3. District shall name RSJLLC and all fee owners of the Additional Properties as additional insureds with respect to all District insurance policies or self-insurance programs.
- 7.4 In addition to all other covenants of RSJLLC, RSJLLC hereby covenants and agrees with District that prior to revocation or termination of the License, RSJLLC shall not, without the prior written approval of District: (a) make or permit to be made any material changes or alterations to any part of the Additional Properties; (b) enter into any agreement affecting any part of the Additional Properties; (c) permit any liens, mortgages, deeds of trust, or other encumbrances not currently of record to be placed against, or to affect any part of the Additional Properties or title to the Additional Properties.
- 7.5 District agrees to quitclaim to RSJLLC without compensation, "Easement R" as described in Final Map No. 6634.

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- Escrow") shall be held at the offices of Escrow Agent. The parties shall cooperate in executing and delivering any escrow instructions that may be prepared from time to time to consummate this transaction; provided, however, in the event of any inconsistency between the provisions and conditions of this Agreement and any such escrow instructions, the provisions and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail. The Close of Escrow shall occur on or before sixty (60) calendar days following the Effective Date. Prior to the Close of Escrow, District shall deliver to Escrow Agent a quitclaim deed in recordable form. RSJLLC shall deliver to Escrow Agent, in a form and substance satisfactory to District, the following:
- 7.6.1. Recordable grant deeds conveying each of the Additional Properties to District in fee simple.
- 7.6.2. Any and all other documents, instruments, and agreements necessary or appropriate in the reasonable opinion of District to transfer and convey the Additional Properties and all interest therein to District in accordance with this Agreement and as may be required by the title insurer. Such other documents, instruments and agreements shall be furnished to RSJLLC ten (10) days prior to Close of Escrow.
- 7.6.3. RSJLLC shall pay the cost of preparing the grant deeds and the premium for a standard coverage CLTA owner's policy of title insurance to be issued to District for this transaction. District and RSJLLC shall pay escrow fees for this transaction.
- 7.7 District and RSJLLC also agree to, within five (5) days of the Effective Date, swap, without compensation to either Party, the lands described in the attached Exhibit "A" hereto, with the District taking ownership of the lands highlighted in blue and RSJLLC taking ownership of the lands highlighted in orange.
- Resource Mitigation. From and after the Effective Date, RSJLLC unconditionally accepts and assumes all rights, duties and obligations of District under the Project's Section 404 permit. RSJLLC agrees to submit all documents to federal and state regulatory agencies, including but not limited to the U. S. Army Corp of Engineers evidencing RSJLLC's assumption of such obligations and District's release from such obligations. RSJLLC represents and warrants it will complete all requirements under Permit 404.
- 9. <u>Amended Mitigation Agreement</u>. The Parties shall negotiate in good faith to amend the Mitigation Agreement as necessary to render the Mitigation Agreement consistent with the terms and conditions in this Agreement.

10. Mutual Release.

10.1 In consideration of the terms and conditions in this Agreement, the District, WHLLC, and RSJLLC, for themselves and their respective members, partners, affiliates, parents, subsidiaries, partnerships, trusts, officers, directors, executors, administrators, trustees, beneficiaries, shareholders, attorneys, consultants, employees, contractors, predecessors, successors and assigns (individually, each a "Released Party" and, collectively, the "Releasing Parties") hereby release, acquit and forever discharge each other, and each of their respective past, present and future members, partners, affiliates, parents, subsidiaries, partnerships, trusts,

officers, directors, executors, administrators, trustees, beneficiaries, shareholders, attorneys, consultants, employees, contractors, predecessors, successors and assigns (collectively, the "Released Parties") from any and all damage, loss, claims, demands, liabilities, obligations, actions and causes of action whatsoever that any of the Releasing Parties might now have or claim to have against any of the Released Parties, whether presently known or unknown, and of every nature and extent whatsoever on account of or in any way concerning, arising out of, relating to or founded upon (i) the payment of the balance of the Purchase Price in the amount of \$6 million as evidenced in the WHCFD Note (ii) the issuance of CFD bonds, (iii) District's right title or interest in the Additional Properties; (iv) District's obligations with respect to Permit 404 for the Project provided, however, that this release shall not be effective until the Effective Date, and that nothing in this release shall release the Released Parties from any of their respective obligations under this Agreement.

- 10.2 It is the express intention of the Parties that the foregoing Mutual Release shall be effective so as to bar all actions, causes of actions, obligations, costs, expenses, attorney's fees, damages, losses, claims, liabilities and demands of whatsoever character, nature and kind, known or unknown, suspected or unsuspected, that relate to the matters released herein. This Agreement may be plead as a full and complete defense to, and may be used as a basis for injunctive relief against, any action, suit or other proceeding which may be instituted, prosecuted or attempted in breach of this Agreement.
- 10.3 Each of the Releasing Parties represent, warrant and covenant with and for the benefit of each of the Released Parties that they intend for this release to be a full and final accord and satisfaction and release of each and every claim or cause of action described in the immediately preceding paragraph. In further consideration of this intention, Releasing Parties waive the benefit of the provisions of California Civil Code Section 1542, which provides:

A GENERAL RELEASE DOES NOT EXTEND TO CLAIMS WHICH THE CREDITOR DOES NOT KNOW OR SUSPECT TO EXIST IN HIS FAVOR AT THE TIME OF EXECUTING THE RELEASE, WHICH IF KNOWN BY HIM, MUST HAVE MATERIALLY AFFECTED HIS SETTLEMENT WITH THE DEBTOR.

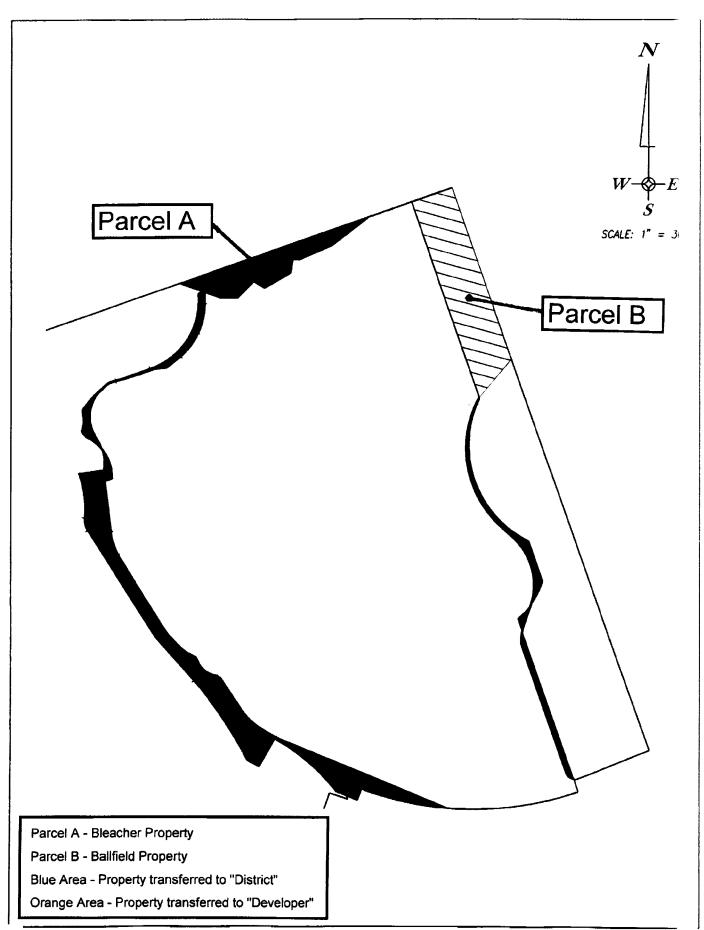
- 11. <u>Mutual Indemnification</u>. Each party hereto respectively agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, protect and defend each and every Released Party and against any and all claims, demands, claims for relief, causes of actions, debts, loss and liability, whether direct, contingent or consequential an no matter how arising, in any way relating to or arising from the party's construction or development activities relating to the Site and CFD Property.
- 12. <u>Compromise of Claims</u>. It is expressly understood, acknowledged and agreed that settlement under this Agreement is the compromise of disputed claims, causes of action, injuries, losses, damages, or rights arising out of the dispute or controversy described herein; and therefore is not intended, nor to be construed, as an admission of liability or responsibility on the part of each party herein released as set forth above.

- Indemnification. The undersigned hereto each represents and warrants to the other party that there has been no transfer, assignment, alienation or gift of all or part of the claims, causes of action, injuries, losses, damages, or rights arising out of the claim, dispute or controversy described herein, and that each respectively holds all of the right, title and interest thereto. Each party hereto respectively agrees to hold harmless, indemnify, protect and defend each and every of the Released Parties and/or entity from and against any and all claims, demands, claims for relief, causes of action, debts, loss and liability, whether direct, contingent or consequential and no matter how arising, in any way relating to any claim arising or alleged to be arising from an assignment or other alienation of any right in or to any claim, demand, claim for relief, cause of action, debt, loss or liability encompassed in this Agreement. The obligations of each party hereunder include but are not limited to all costs and expenses, including attorneys' fees, related to any actions, suits or judgments incident to any of the foregoing.
- 14. <u>Exclusive Remedy</u>. By executing this Agreement, the parties agree that the rights and remedies provided in this Agreement shall be the sole and exclusive rights and remedies surviving as between them relating to the facts and matters encompassed by this Agreement.
- 15. <u>Modification</u>. This Agreement shall not be altered, amended, changed, waived, terminated or otherwise modified in any respect or particular, and no consent or approval required pursuant to this Agreement shall be effective, unless the same shall be in writing and signed by or on behalf of the party to be charged.
- 16. <u>Successors</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and to their respective heirs, executors, administrators, successors and permitted assigns.
- 17. Entire Agreement. All prior statements, understandings, representations and agreements between the parties, oral or written, are superseded by and merged in this Agreement, which alone fully and completely expresses the agreement between them in connection with this transaction and which is entered into after full investigation, neither party relying upon any statement, understanding, representation or agreement made by the other or any other person not embodied in this Agreement.
- 18. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts.. When each party has signed and delivered at least one counterpart to the other party to this Agreement, each counterpart shall be deemed an original and, taken together, shall constitute one and the same Agreement, which shall be binding and effective on all Parties.
- 19. <u>Headings</u>. The headings of the paragraphs of this Agreement are inserted solely for convenience of reference and are not a part of and are not intended to govern, limit or aid in the construction of any terms or provision hereof.
- 20. <u>No Waiver</u>. Failure or delay on the part of the Parties to enforce any right, power, or privilege under this Agreement shall not be deemed to constitute a waiver of such right, power, or privilege, or of any other right, power, or privilege.

- 21. <u>Severability of Provisions</u>. If any provision of this Agreement, or application thereof, shall be held to be invalid, the invalidity shall not affect the other provisions, or application thereof, of the Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provisions or applications; and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.
- 22. **Provisions Equally Construed**. This Agreement was drafted by the mutual enterprise of the Parties and shall not be construed in favor of or against any party, but shall be construed equally as to both parties.
- 23. <u>Choice of Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted according to the domestic laws of the State of California without reference to principles of conflicts of laws. In the event of breach of this Agreement, the Parties consent to personal jurisdiction in the Superior Court of the State of California and to have all rulings, orders, and judgments rendered therein to be binding upon and enforceable against them.
- 24. <u>Cost of Suit</u>. In the event that any action shall be instituted by either of the parties hereto for the enforcement of any of its rights or remedies in and under this Agreement, or any facts based upon or involving same, the prevailing party, whether in court or by way of out-of-court settlement, shall be entitled to recover from the nonprevailing party or parties such prevailing party's attorney's fees, court costs, consultant and expert witness fees, and/or other expenses relating to such controversy including attorney's fees, court costs and/or expenses on appeal, if any.
- 25. <u>Consultation with Counsel</u>. The undersigned hereto declare and represent that each has had the opportunity to consult with legal counsel of their own choosing concerning the advisability of entering into this Agreement; that they have read and understood the contents of this Agreement; and that they sign the same of their own free will. Each party's attorney has reviewed this Agreement and has approved this Agreement as to form and substance.
- 26. <u>Warranty of Authority</u>. Each of the signatories to this Agreement warrants and represents that it is competent and authorized to enter into this Agreement on behalf of the party for which he or she purports to sign.
- 27. <u>District Board of Trustees Approval</u>. The terms and conditions contained in this Agreement are subject to approval of and ratification by the Board of Trustees of the District, in its sole and absolute discretion, which shall be evidenced by the execution of this Agreement by the Superintendent of the District.
- 28. <u>Dispute Resolution and Mediation</u>. The Parties agree that differences of opinion regarding the obligations of the Parties under this Agreement shall be discussed as soon as practically possible following awareness of a conflict. Before commencing any legal action, the Parties shall attempt early resolution of conflicts through mediation administered through the rules and procedures of the American Arbitration Association. Any Parties' failure to participate in mediation prior to commencing any legal action shall preclude such party from recovering attorneys' fees and costs in such legal action notwithstanding that such party may be the prevailing party in such litigation.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On December 8, 2008, Capistrano Unified School District (CUSD) staff brought to the Board of Trustees an agenda item asking for approval to retain a consulting firm to manage existing and future cell tower facilities throughout the District. The Board was presented with a recommendation to appoint CityScape Consultants, Inc. to manage our existing and potential future cell tower facilities and agreements. After some discussion of the item, Trustees asked staff to bring back the item in January 2009 to allow for more time to study the qualifications and fee structures of both firms. At the January 12, 2009 Board Meeting, this item was again continued to the February 9, 2009 meeting.

As described in the December Board item, for nearly 25 years, CUSD has had a variety of cell tower agreements on a few of our school campuses. Because of the newness of the technology and these unfamiliar types of lease agreements, compensation packages were not necessarily negotiated to the best interest of the District. Moreover, as the demand for more cell tower facilities grew over time, cell tower companies have continued to approach the District to request additional features such as generators, and in some cases claiming it was their right to expand their facilities under the existing agreements. Attached is Exhibit A which lists the current agreements in place with the various cell companies. Because of the increasing demand, District staff sought management firms that may help in not only identifying opportunities to increase the revenues from our existing lease agreements, but also to manage future revenue generating opportunities.

Although it is not possible at this time to anticipate the amount of increased revenues from better management of existing and any potential future cell towers, staff wanted to note the recent experience from the City of Palm Coast, Florida which underwent a similar cell tower management process. In 2001, Palm Coast had one cell tower carrier with revenues totaling \$24,000 per year. Today, the City's revenues are nearly \$300,000 per year from nine carriers. Not only was there a significant increase in funds, but the amount of growth as well as the cell tower designs (disguised as either flagpoles or trees) were controlled by the City.

In the summer of 2008, two firms responded to the District's "Request for Qualifications." They were "CityScape Consultants, Inc." and "ATS Communications." District staff reviewed both submittals, held subsequent "in-person" interviews with company representatives, and contacted

the listed references of both firms to gain their perspectives on job performance. In fact, two to three meetings were held with both firms, along with numerous phone conversations and follow-up submittals of written materials. After comparing the two firms, staff believes that CityScape Consultants, Inc. would be the best firm to address the needs of CUSD. Factors leading to this conclusion included lower commission percentages, years and type of related experience, responses from reference checks, and no potential conflicts of interest (i.e., no other current agreements with competing agencies). In response to questions from the Trustees at the December 8, 2008 Board Meeting, Exhibit B was prepared to provide a summary comparison of the two firms. Also, provided previously under separate cover, are the qualifications submittals from ATS Communications, and CityScape Consultants, Inc.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item pertains to the appointment of CityScape Consultants, Inc. to provide cell tower facilities management services for existing cell tower leases and potential future agreements for CUSD. Below are the anticipated services and procedure that CityScape would follow in managing existing and potential future cell tower agreements.

- 1) Review/documentation of current agreements.
- 2) Provide recommendations for changes/extensions to existing agreements.
- 3) Upon Board approval, negotiate improvements to current agreements.
- 4) Identify current and projected cell tower needs within District/region.
- 5) Hold public workshops/forums to address cell tower issues/concerns.
- 6) Prepare a Wireless Facility Master Plan for the District.

It is important to note that any changes or extensions to existing agreements, or the preparation of any new agreements will require approval from the Board of Trustees.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The staff recommendation in this agenda item, if approved, will have a positive impact on the District's General Fund from increased revenues from potentially restructured existing cell tower agreements and/or future cell tower facilities agreements. Compensation paid to CityScape Consultants, Inc. for managing cell tower facilities will only be through commissions based on any generated additional revenues. The District will not incur any upfront costs.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully requested that the Board President recognize Mr. Ron Lebs, Deputy Superintendent, Business and Support Services, who will introduce this item and be available to answer any questions from the Board of Trustees. After appropriate discussion and consideration, it is respectfully requested that the Board of Trustees appoint CityScape Consultants, Inc. to provide cell tower facilities management services for existing cell tower leases and potential future agreements for CUSD.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004 (IDEA) continues to recognize the importance of preparing students with disabilities for employment and self-sufficiency in the community through Transition activities. IDEA also placed more unfunded requirements on school districts to provide effective and responsive services to these students.

Beginning in 1992, CUSD staff has developed several grant-funded programs such as the Transition Partnership Project (TPP), Workability I, and the Bridges to Work Social Security Administration grants/contracts that help to address the federal requirements. Demands for services have increased with student numbers and Transition requirements. Transition activities must be addressed in the Individual Education Plan (IEP) of each student in Special Education ages 16-22 and best practice dictates addressing the services beginning age 14. Employment and self-sufficiency skills support student independence in the community, while helping to reduce the unemployment rate of 65% for adults with disabilities.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

Partnership With Industry (PWI) is an Office of Special Education Rehabilitation Services (OSERS) federal grant that has been awarded to Irvine Unified School District in collaboration with Capistrano Unified School District and Saddleback Valley Unified School District. The grant has been issued for a five year period.

Specifically, the funding provides for case management staff, employment training, job placement, and job coaching. These services are to be conducted collaboratively by all three districts serving a total of 120 youth.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The District will receive, on a monthly reimbursement basis from Irvine Unified School District, a total of approximately \$75,271 per year in additional funding during the five year grant cycle.

This AGREEMENT is hereby entered into this 1st day of October, 2008, by and between the Irvine Unified School District, 5050 Barranca Parkway, Irvine, California 92604, hereinafter referred to as IUSD, and Capistrano Unified School District, 33122 Valle Road, San Juan Capistrano California, 92675 hereinafter referred to as CUSD. IUSD and CUSD shall be collectively referred to as the Parties.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Irvine Unified School District along with Saddleback Valley
Unified School District and Capistrano Unified School District formed a
Consortium to implement the Projects With Industry program, hereinafter
referred to as PWI, and

WHEREAS, IUSD was awarded PWI funds, from the U. S. Department of Education, to support and facilitate employment preparation, job placement and career advancement for individuals with disabilities to ensure economically self-sufficient and responsible citizens; and

WHEREAS, THE U. S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION has awarded a grant to the Parties from those proposals submitted, and IUSD has agreed to administer this grant on behalf of THE U. S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION for the operation of PWI; and

WHEREAS, the CUSD is specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required, and is agreeable to the rendering of such services according to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1.0 TERM. The term of this AGREEMENT shall be for a period commencing on October 1, 2008 and terminate on September 30, 2009, subject to termination as set forth in this AGREEMENT. CUSD shall be obligated to perform such duties as would normally extend beyond this term including, but not limited to, obligations with respect to indemnification, audits, reporting, and accounting.

2.0 SCOPE OF WORK. IUSD hereby engages CUSD as an independent contractor to perform the following described work, and CUSD hereby agrees to perform said work upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth. Specifically, CUSD shall perform services for the Projects With Industry Program, hereinafter referred to as PWI, as stated in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

3.0 <u>BUDGET</u>. CUSD shall be paid in accordance with the following budget: \$75,726. Contract funds shall only be used for the purpose(s) described in Exhibit "A". Expenditures must also be in accordance with an approved budget, Exhibit "B", attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, as approved by IUSD. CUSD'S budget may be modified only with the prior written approval of IUSD. Expenses charged to this AGREEMENT shall not be incurred prior to the effective date of this AGREEMENT or subsequent to the end of the term of this AGREEMENT, unless written permission is granted by IUSD.

4.0 <u>ALLOCATION OF FUNDS</u>. IUSD agrees to allocate funding to the following districts for operation of a PROGRAM:

Saddleback Valley Unified School District \$ 75,726
Capistrano Unified School District \$ 75,726

5.0 COMPENSATION.

thousand seven hundred twenty-six dollars (\$75,726) or actual costs, whichever is less for services satisfactorily rendered pursuant to this AGREEMENT, provided CUSD'S costs are reimbursable pursuant to County, State and Federal statutes and regulations and under all applicable terms of the State of California. Payment shall be made monthly, upon completion and acceptance of services and receipt of an itemized invoice from CUSD in duplicate. Payment shall be mailed to: Capistrano Unified School District, 33122 Valle Road, San Juan Capistrano, California, 92675, or at such other place as CUSD may designate in writing.

A. IUSD agrees to pay CUSD a total sum not to exceed Seventy-five

- B. CUSD'S billings shall be on a form supplied by IUSD (Exhibit C) and provide such information as is required by IUSD. Payments to CUSD shall be released by IUSD no later than thirty (30) days after receipt of a correctly completed billing form.
- C. All billings to IUSD shall be accompanied by source documentation including, but not limited to payroll ledgers, time sheets, invoices, receipts, receiving records and records of services provided.
- D. IUSD may withhold or delay any payment should CUSD fail to comply with any of the provisions set forth in this AGREEMENT.
- E. CUSD shall not claim reimbursement for services provided beyond the expiration and/or termination of this AGREEMENT, except as may otherwise be provided under this AGREEMENT.
- F. The obligation of IUSD under this AGREEMENT is contingent upon the availability of funds furnished by the U.S. Department of Education. In the event such funding is terminated or reduced, this AGREEMENT may be

terminated, and IUSD'S fiscal obligations hereunder shall be limited to a pro-rated amount of funding actually received by the IUSD under the grant. IUSD shall provide CUSD written notification of such termination. Notice shall be deemed given when received by CUSD or not later than three (3) days after the day of mailing, whichever is sooner. 6.0 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. CUSD, in the performance of this AGREEMENT, shall be and act as an independent contractor. A. CUSD hereby agrees to defend all claims of loss, and indemnify and hold harmless IUSD, the Orange County Board of Education, and its officers, agents, and employees, and the U. S. Department of Education from any and all liability and claims of liability for bodily injury, personal injury, sickness, disease, or death of any person or persons, or damage to any property, real, personal, tangible or intangible, arising out of the negligent acts or omissions of CUSD, its Governing Board, officers, agents or

employees, or the negligent condition of the property used, in the performance of this AGREEMENT.

B. IUSD hereby agrees to defend all claims of loss, and indemnify and hold harmless CUSD, its Governing Board, officers, agents, and employees, the U. S. Department of Education from any and all liability and claims of liability for bodily injury, personal injury, sickness, disease, or death of any person or persons, or damage to any property, real, personal, tangible or intangible, arising out of the negligent acts or omissions of IUSD, its officers, agents or employees in the performance of this AGREEMENT. 8.0 INSURANCE. CUSD shall, at CUSD'S sole cost and expense, take out prior to commencing the services, and maintain in force and effect, from the commencement of services until expiration of this AGREEMENT, a policy or policies of insurance covering CUSD'S services and furnish to IUSD a certificate of insurance evidencing all coverages and endorsements required hereunder. Such insurance shall be with an insurance company admitted and licensed by the Insurance Commissioner of the State of California to transact such insurance in the State of California. 13.0 SUPPLANTING GOVERNMENT FUNDING. CUSD shall not supplant any Federal,

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Approximately seven years ago, the California Department of Education entered into a Settlement and Release Agreement with school districts, county offices, and SELPAs related to a Mandated Cost Claim and lawsuit filed by the Riverside County Office of Education. The settlement was related to special education requirements in California that go beyond what is required in federal law (IDEA) and stemmed from a 1994 lawsuit.

During the last twelve months, the California School Boards Association's Education Legal Alliance began negotiating a settlement of the Mandated Cost Claims for the Hughes Bill requirements. The Behavioral Intervention Plan (Hughes Bill) Mandated Cost Claim Settlement resolves the test claim CSM-4464 initiated by San Diego Unified School District, Butte COE, and San Joaquin COE, and the related Sacramento Superior Court case No. 03CS01432, regarding reimbursement for costs associated with behavioral intervention plans mandated by statute. If approved, it ends a fourteen-year dispute with the State of California regarding funding for state behavior intervention plan requirements that are in excess of federal law.

CURRENT CONSIDERATION

This agenda item presents for Board approval of Resolution #0809-45, Exhibit A. Local Education Authorities (LEAs), including Capistrano Unified School District are asked to consider approval of this settlement. In the proposed resolution the Board:

- (1) approves the settlement, which will bring CUSD approximately \$14.85 per 2007-08 ADA annually for the six year period beginning 2011-12 through 2016-17; the CUSD SELPA approximately \$8.85 per ADA per December 2007 special education pupil count in 2009-10; and approximately \$10.92 per ADA for the CUSD SELPA as part of the AB 602 funding formula, beginning in 2009-10, and increasing by COLA and ADA growth in subsequent years;
- (2) agrees to waive its ability to file future mandated cost claims on the Hughes Bill statute and regulations as currently worded, Exhibit B;

(3) directs the District's authorized representative to sign the Waiver, Exhibit C to implement this action.

The Notice to LEAs provides a summary of the settlement, Exhibit D. The approval process mandates that 85% of all LEAs in California sign a waiver document. By signing this waiver, the District acknowledges that the LEA forever gives up its right to file any mandated cost claim regarding the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, and/or to pursue any filed claim regarding the statute and regulations, and/or to benefit from such a claim. The wavier must be signed and submitted by February 28, 2009.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The settlement provides for the following funding:

\$510 million payable to school districts as general fund reimbursement, in \$85 million installments over 6 years, from 2011-12 through 2016-17, based on 2007-08 ADA.

• This is estimated to increase funding to the CUSD general fund by \$736,532.85 per year for the duration of the agreement.

\$10 million payable to SELPAs and County Offices of Education as general fund reimbursement in 2009-10:

• This is estimated to be a one-time disbursement to the CUSD general fund of \$41,497.72.

\$65 million added in 2009-10 as a permanent increase to the AB 602 special education funding base. Commencing in 2010-11, this amount will be subject to COLA and growth to the extent it is added to AB 602 generally.

• This amounts to an increase of AB 602 funding for CUSD by \$10.92 per ADA, (estimated to be approximately \$546,431.32 for the first year of the agreement), with adjustments in future years according to COLA and ADA.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that Board President Ellen Addonizio recognize Assistant Superintendent Eamonn O'Donovan who will introduce this item and be available to respond to Trustee questions.

Following Board discussion, it is respectfully recommended that the Board approve and enter into a Wavier Agreement by authorizing the signing of Resolution No. 0809-45, Exhibit A and Wavier, Exhibit C to fulfill the terms of the Settlement and Release Agreement for the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost ("Settlement").

DISCUSSION/ ACTION

GOVERNING BOARD OF THE <u>Capistrano Unified</u> <u>DISTRICT</u> [COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION OR SPECIAL EDUCATION LOCAL PLAN AREA (as appropriate)]

APPROVAL OF BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTION PLANS [HUGHES BILL] MANDATED COST CLAIM SETTLEMENT AND AGREEMENT TO WAIVE FUTURE CLAIMS

WHEREAS, the Commission on State Mandates ("the Commission"), in a test claim known as the Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim, has determined that, since 1993, there are unfunded state mandates exceeding the federal requirements in the following seven (7) components of the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations (California Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052): special education local plan area ("SELPA") plan requirements, development and implementation of behavioral intervention plans, functional analysis assessments, modifications and contingent behavioral intervention plans, development and implementation of emergency interventions, prohibited behavioral intervention plans, and due process hearings;

WHEREAS, these state mandates remain required components of the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations;

WHEREAS, final claiming instructions for the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim were never adopted by the Commission due to various disputes that arose with the State;

WHEREAS, the State's Department of Finance disputes that any of the identified Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim mandates qualify for state reimbursement because it contends they are required by federal law, and therefore the State has filed a lawsuit with the Sacramento Superior Court, case No. 03CS01432, to contest the Commission's decision in the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim;

WHEREAS, the Test Claimants believe that the identified mandates require new programs and increased levels of service in excess of federal law, and are therefore unfunded state mandates, and therefore the Test Claimants oppose the court action filed by the State challenging the Commission's decision;

WHEREAS, this litigation could thwart resolution of these matters for a number of years;

WHEREAS, to avoid the cost and uncertainty of further litigation, to alleviate the uncertainty regarding the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations funding, and to expedite the resolution of this long-pending mandate claim, the State and the Test Claimants ("Parties") have determined to compromise and settle the claims set forth in the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim;

WHEREAS, the Parties have negotiated a settlement agreement ("Agreement"), which provides \$520 million as general fund reimbursement for past costs associated with the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, allocated as follows:

- \$510 million to school districts based on 2007-08 P-2 average daily attendance ("ADA") (about \$14.85 per ADA annually for six years, beginning in 2011-12, or for a lesser period at the State's discretion should the State choose to accelerate payment of such reimbursement);
- \$1.5 million to county offices of education in 2009-10 based on December 2007 county special education pupil count, about \$35.06 per pupil, with no county office of education receiving less than \$5,000;
- \$6 million to SELPAs in 2009-10 based on December 2007 special education pupil count, about \$8.85 per pupil, with no SELPA receiving less than \$10,000; and
- \$2.5 million in 2009-10 for administrative costs incurred in pursuing the Claim;

WHEREAS, the settlement further provides \$65 million as a permanent increase to the AB 602 funding base for special education programs and services beginning in 2009-10, resulting in each SELPA's funding rate increasing by about \$10.92 per ADA, with this amount increasing by the cost of living adjustment and ADA growth in subsequent years;

WHEREAS, by approving this settlement the <u>Capistrano Unified</u> School District [COE or SELPA (as appropriate)] will receive approximately \$4,419,197.10[total] in discretionary funding for retroactive reimbursement, \$736,532.85 [amount of installment] over six-years in equal installments [districts only], unless the State, in its discretion, accelerates payment of such reimbursement;

WHEREAS, the <u>Capistrano Unified</u> School District [COE or SELPA (as appropriate)], in exchange for the foregoing financial settlement, must waive its right to file any further mandate claims arising from the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, or to benefit from any new Hughes Bill Statue and Regulations claims filed, unless the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations change;

WHEREAS, if for some reason the settlement process is not completed, the Waiver will not take effect;

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the Capistrano Unified School District [COE or SELPA (as appropriate)] has reviewed the Notice to LEAs Re: Pending Settlement of the Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim and the required Waiver; and

WHEREAS, the District [COE or SELPA (as appropriate)] administrative staff, having reviewed the terms of the pending settlement, recommends that the Governing Board approve the

SETTLEMENT AND RELEASE AGREEMENT BEHAVIORAL INTERVENTION PLANS [HUGHES BILL] MANDATED COST CLAIM

This settlement and release agreement ("Agreement") is entered into this ______ day of 2008 by and between the State of California ("the STATE") on the one hand, and San Diego Unified School District, Butte County Office of Education, and San Joaquin County Office of Education (collectively "CLAIMANTS") on the other, who, in consideration of the promises made herein, agree as follows:

I. Nature and Status of the Dispute

Effective January 1, 1991, Education Code section 56523 was added to the Education Code. That section required the development and adoption of regulations governing positive behavioral interventions for special education students by the State Board of Education ("the SBE"). In 1993, the SBE promulgated California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052 to implement Education Code section 56523. The Education Code section and its implementing regulations are referred to cumulatively as "the Hughes Bill."

The Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim was initiated on September 28, 1994, when San Diego Unified School District, Butte County Office of Education, and San Joaquin County Office of Education filed test claim CSM-4464 with the Commission on State Mandates ("the Commission"). The Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim asked the STATE to reimburse local educational agencies ("LEAs"), including school districts, county offices of education, special education local plan areas ("SELPAs"), and joint agencies composed of such organizations for the costs of implementing the Hughes Bill.

On September 28, 2000, the Commission adopted a Statement of Decision on CSM-4464 finding that the Hughes Bill imposed a reimbursable state mandate on school districts by requiring the following seven activities: SELPA plan requirements, development and implementation of behavioral intervention plans, functional analysis assessments, modifications and contingent behavioral intervention plans, development and implementation of emergency interventions, prohibited behavioral intervention plans, and due process hearings. The settlement of the Special Education Mandated Cost Claim in 2000-2001 explicitly omitted the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim (Ed. Code § 56836.156(g)).

Subsequently CLAIMANTS proposed parameters and guidelines for the CSM-4464 claiming process but various disputes arose with the STATE and a final draft was never adopted by the Commission. The parties attempted settlement without success and the matter reached a stalemate.

On September 26, 2003, the STATE's Department of Finance filed a Petition for Administrative Mandamus in the Sacramento Superior Court challenging the Commission's decision in CSM-4464. It named the Commission as Respondent, and CLAIMANTS as Real Parties in Interest (Department of Finance v. Commission on State Mandates, Sacramento Superior Court Case No. 03CS01432). The Petition maintained that the Hughes Bill was not a reimbursable state mandate because 1) it was required by federal law, 2) it merely implemented federal requirements, and

3) it did not exceed those requirements. The matter is still pending. CLAIMANTS have filed no responsive pleadings as yet.

On October 4, 2007, the Deputy Attorney General representing the STATE's Department of Finance in the above case wrote to CLAIMANTS stating that pending reforms in the mandate process could present a timely opportunity to continue negotiations. The Deputy Attorney General noted that the mandate reform legislation, AB 1222, included the option of the joint development of a reasonable reimbursement methodology and cost estimate. The Deputy Attorney General suggested a meeting if CLAIMANTS were interested in resolving the matter and noted that, absent successful settlement, she planned to schedule a hearing in Sacramento Superior Court in April 2008. In response, CLAIMANTS contacted the Deputy Attorney General and the parties began meeting to work on a mutually agreeable resolution.

A chief task in the settlement process was developing a statewide cost estimate for the claim. Ultimately CLAIMANTS completed surveys of more than 20 SELPAs representing more than 10% of public school students statewide. The STATE's Department of Finance staff reviewed copies of all survey returns and verified that the cumulative cost totals accurately reflected the SELPA data.

In May 2008, the Sacramento Superior Court notified the STATE that it must bring its case to trial by September 26, 2008, or be subject to dismissal under the state law which requires all matters to be brought to trial within five years ("the five-year rule"). Ultimately, the parties filed a stipulation with the court agreeing to extend the five-year period to March 27, 2009, in the hopes that agreement could be reached.

The STATE's Department of Finance continues to dispute the Commission's decision in CSM-4464 that the Hughes Bill is a reimbursable mandate. CLAIMANTS believe the Commission's decision was correct and that the Hughes Bill imposes requirements on school districts that are not mandated by federal law.

To avoid the costs and uncertainty of further litigation, to alleviate the uncertainty regarding the Hughes Bill funding, and to expedite the resolution of this long-pending mandate claim in the spirit of AB 1222, the parties have determined to compromise and settle the claims raised in Sacramento Superior Court Case No. 03CS01432 and the underlying administrative decision of the Commission on State Mandates in CSM-4464 on the terms and conditions set forth below.

II. Actions to Resolve Dispute

- A. The mutual obligations and duties of the parties set forth herein are contingent upon all of the following events occurring:
 - 1. On or before February 28, 2009, no less than 85% of all K-12 school districts, county offices of education, and SELPAs shall sign the Waiver, attached hereto as Exhibit A. In addition, the school districts and county offices signing Exhibit A must have served student populations accounting

- for no less than 92% of the second principal apportionment (P-2) average daily attendance in the 2007-08 fiscal year.
- 2. The parties shall seek a superior court ruling that the settlement is final and binding on all LEAs, assuming implementing legislation is enacted. In the absence of such a ruling, the parties shall seek an alternative, mutually agreeable final and formal resolution of the dispute.
- 3. Prior to or concurrent with the enactment of the Budget Act for the 2009-10 fiscal year, legislation is enacted that contains provisions identical to or substantially similar to the language contained in Exhibit B. It is the intent of the parties that, on or before January 10, 2009, the Legislature shall be requested to enact such legislation on an urgency basis. Any modifications to the proposed legislation shall be made only with agreement of all the signatories to this settlement document.
 - a. The proposed legislation shall appropriate the amount of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) payable upon enactment and allocated in accord with Section II.B. of this Agreement.
 - b. The proposed legislation shall require additional funding of five-hundred and ten million dollars (\$510,000,000) in total payable over a six-year period, or lesser period at the STATE's discretion, commencing July 1, 2011, and allocated in accord with Section II.B. of this Agreement.
 - c. The proposed legislation shall include statutory language to revise the existing special education funding model established by Assembly Bill 602 (Chapter 854, Statutes of 1997) to provide an ongoing increase of sixty-five million dollars (\$65,000,000) annually to special education programs. The proposed legislation shall appropriate the first year of funding.
 - d. The combination of the above appropriations is to be considered in full satisfaction of, and is in lieu of, any reimbursable mandate claims that would have been filed as a result of CSM-4464. By providing this funding for CSM-4464, the STATE in no way concedes the existence of an unfunded reimbursable mandate for that claim.
- B. For the purposes of this settlement only, to resolve any and all retrospective mandated cost claims from 1993-94 to 2008-09 arising from CSM-4464 and the Statement of Decision adopted by the Commission on State Mandates on September 28, 2000, the STATE agrees that:

- 1. Upon enactment of legislation prior to or concurrent with the 2009-10 Budget Act, payment in the amount of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) will be allocated to LEAs as follows:
 - a. One million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000) shall be allocated to county offices of education on an equal per-pupil basis. The amount of each agency's allocation shall be determined by dividing one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000) by the total statewide county special education pupil count only, as reported by county offices of education as of December 2007. The allotment for each county office of education shall be the per-pupil amount times the county's special education pupil count reported as of December 2007. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction ("the Superintendent") shall adjust the computations in such a manner as to ensure that the allotment to each county office of education is at least five thousand dollars (\$5,000).
 - b. Six million dollars (\$6,000,000) shall be allocated to SELPAs that existed for the 2007-08 fiscal year. The amount of each agency's allocation shall be determined by dividing six million dollars (\$6,000,000) by the total statewide special education pupil count as of December 2007. The allotment for each agency shall be the statewide per-pupil amount times the SELPA's special education pupil count reported as of December 2007. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction ("the Superintendent") shall adjust the computations in such a manner as to ensure that the allotment to each SELPA is at least ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).
 - c. Two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000) shall be paid to San Joaquin County Office of Education.
- 2. In accord with legislation enacted prior to or concurrent with the 2009-10 Budget Act, the State will pay an additional five hundred and ten million dollars (\$510,000,000) to school districts. This amount shall be allocated in installment payments of eighty-five million dollars (\$85,000,000) commencing July 1, 2011, and annually thereafter for a period of six years unless the STATE in its discretion enlarges the installment amount from time to time, thereby discharging the obligation in advance of the six year period. These payments shall be allocated to school districts on a perpupil basis as follows:
 - a. The appropriation shall be divided by the total average daily attendance, excluding attendance for regional occupation centers and programs, adult education, and programs operated by the county superintendents of schools, for all pupils in kindergarten through grade twelve in all school districts as used by the Superintendent for the second principal apportionment for the

2007-08 fiscal year. Each school district shall receive an allocation equal to the per-pupil amount times the district's reported average daily attendance for the second principal apportionment for the 2007-08 fiscal year, excluding attendance for regional occupation centers and programs, adult education, and programs operated by the county superintendents of schools. The amount allocated to each school district shall be the same in all subsequent fiscal years as it is in the first fiscal year unless the State enlarges the appropriation as specified in II.B.2. above.

- b. In any fiscal year after 2011-12 in which the provisions of paragraph (b)(3) of Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution are operative, the annual appropriation shall not be required to be made. If an appropriation is not made for a specific fiscal year or years, it shall instead be made in the fiscal year or years immediately succeeding the final payment pursuant to Section II.B.2 of this Agreement.
- C. To effectuate a stay of the five-year rule and to seek court approval of the settlement which makes it final and binding on LEAs, the parties agree to the following:
 - 1. Within ten court days after execution of this Agreement, CLAIMANTS will file a response to the Petition for Administrative Mandamus, Sacramento Superior Court Case No. 03CS01432. Concurrently or as soon thereafter as the parties deem appropriate, the STATE and CLAIMANTS shall jointly stipulate to a stay of the five-year rule, and shall file such stipulation with the court. The stipulation shall provide for and ask the court to order the following:
 - a. A stay of the five-year rule for the purposes of this settlement, with the understanding that the five-year rule shall be in effect within ninety (90) days if the settlement terms cannot be effectuated.
 - b. Notice of the stay and of the settlement terms to all LEAs.
 - c. A court hearing, if necessary, to consider any objections to the settlement made by LEAs or other parties of standing.
 - d. Entry of judgment that the settlement is the final resolution of CSM-4464 assuming implementing legislation is enacted, and that after appropriate consideration of objections, if any, it is final and binding on all LEAs.

- D. In the absence of any entry of judgment as specified in Section II.C.1.d. of this Agreement, the parties shall seek an alternative mutually agreeable final and formal resolution of the dispute.
- E. If the events listed in Section II.A. as preconditions to the parties' obligations do not take place, the STATE or the CLAIMANTS may request the Superior Court to lift the stay issued pursuant to Section II.C.1.a., above, and to order that the five-year rule shall take effect in ninety (90) days.

III. Known Claims

With respect to section 56523 of the California Education Code and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052 as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008, ("the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations"), CLAIMANTS hereby knowingly and voluntarily waive the rights set forth under article XIIIB. section 6. of the California Constitution, sections 17500 through 17630 of the California Government Code, and sections 1181 through 1189.11 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations. By signing this Agreement, CLAIMANTS hereby acknowledge that CLAIMANTS forever relinquish their right to file any mandated cost claim regarding the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, and further forever relinquish their right to receive any benefit(s) from any claim(s) so filed. CLAIMANTS may file mandated cost claims concerning such statutes and regulations only to the extent that state or federal statutes or regulations are amended or added or changed in any other way after July 1, 2008. CLAIMANTS further acknowledge and concede that the amount that is required to be appropriated for the purpose of satisfying the STATE's minimum funding obligation to school districts pursuant to article XVI, section 8, of the California Constitution shall not be required to be increased, to any extent, by payment of the amounts set forth in Sections II.B.1 and II.B.2 of this agreement.

IV. Unknown Claims

A. CLAIMANTS expressly waive the application of California Civil Code section 1542 regarding mandated cost claims based on Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052 as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008.

- B. CLAIMANTS certify that they have read the following provisions of California Civil Code section 1542:
 - "A general release does not extend to claims which the creditor does not know or suspect to exist in his favor at the time of executing the release, which if known by him must have materially affected his settlement with the debtor."
- C. CLAIMANTS understand and acknowledge that the significance and consequence of the waiver of California Civil Code section 1542 is that:
 - 1. They may have additional claims arising or occurring up to the date of this Agreement of which they are not now aware;
 - 2. They may not make a further demand for any such claims;
 - 3. They may not receive any benefit(s) from any such claims; and
 - 4. They extend their waiver to include now unknown or later discovered claims.

V. Advice of Attorney

CLAIMANTS warrant and represent that they have been advised to seek legal advice from the attorney of their choice regarding the risks, complications, and costs of the Agreement. CLAIMANTS acknowledge and represent either that they relied upon legal advice from their attorney in executing this Agreement or that they chose not to rely upon legal advice from their attorney in executing this Agreement. They further acknowledge and represent that, in executing this Agreement, they have not relied on any inducements, promises, or representations other than those stated in this Agreement.

VI. Conditions of Execution

Each party acknowledges and warrants that the party's execution of this Agreement is free and voluntary.

VII. Execution of Other Documents

Each party to this Agreement shall cooperate fully in the execution of any and all other documents and the completion of any additional actions that may be necessary or appropriate to give full force and effect to the terms and intent of this Agreement.

VIII. Nonadmission

Nothing contained in the Agreement constitutes an admission or concession, by any party, as to any matter of fact or law at issue in Sacramento Superior Court Case No. 03CS01432 and/or CSM-4464, and no party hereto shall deem or construe this Agreement, or any part thereof, to be any such admission or concession. Further, nothing in this Agreement may be deemed or construed to be, by any entity or person not a party hereto, as against any party hereto, or any agency thereof, any admission or concession as to any matter of fact or law at issue in Sacramento Superior Court Case No. 03CS01432 and/or CSM-4464.

IX. Entire Agreement

This Agreement and Exhibits A and B attached hereto contain the entire Agreement between the parties. A breach of any portion of this Agreement shall be considered a breach of the whole Agreement.

X. Effective Date

This Agreement shall be effective immediately upon execution by the parties. This Agreement has retroactive effect to the extent specified herein.

XII. Governing Law

This Agreement is entered into, and shall be construed and interpreted, in accordance with the laws of the State of California and the United States.

XIII. Counterparts

This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, such that signatures appear on separate pages. A copy or original of this document with all signature pages appended together shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement.

A. Known Claims

With respect to section 56523 of the California Education Code and the California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and section 3052 as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008, (collectively "the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations"), LEA hereby knowingly and voluntarily waives the rights set forth under article XIIIB, section 6, of the California Constitution, sections 17500 through 17630 of the California Government Code, and sections 1181 through 1189.11 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations. By signing this Waiver, LEA hereby acknowledges that LEA forever gives up its right to file any mandated cost claim regarding the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations, and/or to pursue any filed claim regarding that statute and regulations, and/or to benefit from such a claim, including any claim regarding the following programs and services:

- 1. Special education local plan area plan requirements pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivision (c), and 3052, subdivision (j), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;
- 2. Development and implementation of behavioral intervention plans pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), and (f), and 3052, subdivisions (a), (c), (d), (e), and (f), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;
- 3. Functional analysis assessments pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivisions (d) and (f), and 3052, subdivisions (b), (c), and (f), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;
- 4. Modifications and contingent behavioral intervention plans pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, section 3052, subdivisions (g) and (h), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;
- 5. Development and implementation of emergency interventions pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivisions (c) and (d), and 3052, subdivision (i), as these sections read on July 1, 2008;

- 6. Prohibited behavioral intervention plans pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, sections 3001, subdivision (d), and 3052, subdivision (l), as these sections read on July 1, 2008; and
- 7. Due process hearings pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 2, section 3052, subdivision (m), as this section read on July 1, 2008.

LEA further acknowledges and concedes that the amount that is required to be appropriated for the purpose of satisfying the STATE's minimum funding obligation to LEAs pursuant to article XVI, section 8, of the California Constitution shall not be required to be increased, to any extent, by payment of the retrospective amounts described in Paragraph II.B. of the Agreement, and by signing this Waiver LEA forever gives up its right to contend otherwise.

B. <u>Unknown Claims</u>

- 1. LEA expressly waives the application of California Civil Code section 1542 regarding mandated cost claims under California Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052 as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008.
- 2. LEA certifies that it has read the following provisions of California Civil Code Section 1542:

"A general release does not extend to claims which the creditor does not know or suspect to exist in his favor at the time of executing the release, which if known by him must have materially affected his settlement with the debtor."

- 3. LEA understands that it is agreeing that California Civil Code section 1542 does not apply to this Waiver. LEA understands and acknowledges that the significance and consequence of this waiver of California Civil Code section 1542 is:
 - a. LEA may have additional claims arising or occurring up to the date of this Waiver of which it is not now aware;
 - b. LEA may not make a further demand for any such claims;
 - c. LEA may not receive any benefit(s) from any such claims that may be filed by other claimants; and
 - d. LEA extends its waiver to include now unknown and/or later discovered claims.

C. Exemptions

LEA signs this Waiver with the understanding that it does not prohibit LEAs from filing mandated cost claims to the extent that the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations are amended or added or changed in any way after July 1, 2008.

D. Advice of Attorney

LEA warrants and represents that it has reviewed and understands the Notice to LEAs Re: Pending Settlement of the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim ("the Notice") and this Waiver, and that it has been advised to seek legal advice from the attorney of its choice regarding the Notice and this Waiver. LEA acknowledges and represents either that it relied upon legal advice from its attorney in executing this Waiver or that it chose not to rely upon legal advice from its attorney in executing this Waiver. LEA further acknowledges and represents that, in executing this Waiver, it has not relied on any inducements, promises, or representations other than those stated in the Notice and Waiver.

E. Contingency of Waiver

LEA understands that this Waiver is binding only if the preconditions to the full implementation of the Settlement Agreement are satisfied. Those preconditions are set out in Section C of the Notice and Section II.A. of the Agreement, and are, in brief: (1) at least 85% of all LEAs sign this Waiver, including school districts and county offices of education who served student populations accounting for 92% of the P-2 2007-08 ADA; (2) the parties seek a superior court ruling that the settlement is final and binding on all LEAs; and (3) legislation is enacted appropriating the necessary funding and placing ongoing funding in statute.

NOTICE TO LEAS

Re: Pending Settlement of the Behavioral Intervention Plans [Hughes Bill] Mandated Cost Claim

This Notice is intended to inform all local educational agencies ("LEAs") in California about their rights regarding the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Test Claim, claim CSM-4464, initiated September 28, 1994 by San Diego Unified School District, Butte County Office of Education, and San Joaquin County Office of Education ("Claimants"), and the subsequent Sacramento Superior Court case, case No. 03CS01432, regarding this same test claim ("the Claim"). For purposes of this Notice, LEAs include all school districts, county offices of education, special education local plan areas ("SELPAs"), and joint agencies composed of such organizations in the State of California. The Claim has significant fiscal implications for LEAs. For this reason, LEAs are advised to review this Notice and the attached Waiver with legal counsel before deciding whether to sign the Waiver.

In reviewing this Notice, please be aware of the following items:

- 1. This Notice and the attached Waiver apply only to the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim and claims arising from California Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052, as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008, (collectively "the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations").
- 2. This Notice and the attached Waiver do not affect any rights any LEAs may have to file test claims with the Commission on State Mandates ("the Commission") on any mandates created as a result of changes to state or federal statutes or regulations that occur after July 1, 2008.

A. What is the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim?

The Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim is a fourteen-year effort by local school districts, county offices of education, and SELPAs to obtain reimbursement for costs associated with behavioral intervention plans required by the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations under state law.

The California Constitution requires that whenever the Legislature mandates a new program or a higher level of service, the State must provide funds to reimburse local government for the actual costs of implementation, with certain exceptions. State law requires that the State shall reimburse each local agency for all unfunded costs mandated by the State. The Commission has the authority to hear and decide tests claims that local agencies file as a result of new laws passed by the Legislature and signed into law by the Governor. The legal framework and authority for the mandated claims reimbursement process is found at article XIIIB, section 6, of the California Constitution, sections 17500 through 17630 of the California Government Code, and sections 1181 through 1189.11 of title 2 of the California Code of Regulations.

The Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim was initiated in 1994 when San Diego Unified School District, Butte County Office of Education, and San Joaquin County Office of Education filed test claim CSM-4464 asking the State to reimburse LEAs for the unfunded costs associated with behavioral intervention plans, as required by state law under the Hughes Bill

Statute and Regulations. Under the Commission's rules, test claims are treated like class actions, and therefore the Claim is applicable to all LEAs statewide.

B. What is the Outcome of the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim?

On September 28, 2000, after years of filings and hearings, the Commission adopted a Statement of Decision regarding CSM-4464 finding that the Hughes Bill Statute and Regulations imposed a reimburseable state mandate on school districts by requiring the following seven activities in excess of federal law: SELPA plan requirements, development and implementation of behavioral intervention plans, functional analysis assessments, modifications and contingent behavioral intervention plans, development and implementation of emergency interventions, prohibited behavioral intervention plans, and due process hearings. The settlement of the Special Education Mandated Cost Claim in 2000-01 explicitly omitted the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim. (Ed. Code § 56836.156(g).)

Subsequently, Claimants proposed parameters and guidelines for the CSM-4464 claiming process, but various disputes arose with the State and a final draft of the claiming parameters and guidelines was never adopted by the Commission. The parties attempted to settle without success and the matter reached a stalemate.

On September 26, 2003, the State's Department of Finance filed a lawsuit in the Sacramento Superior Court (Department of Finance v. Commission on State Mandates, Case No. 03CS01432) challenging the Commission's decision in CSM-4464. The State and the Claimants ("Parties") agreed to delay the proceedings before the Court in order to attempt to negotiate a settlement. The initial settlement negotiations were unsuccessful.

On October 4, 2007, pending reforms in the mandate process prompted the Parties to continue negotiations. The Parties began meeting to work on a mutually agreeable resolution.

A chief task in the settlement process was developing a statewide cost estimate for the claim. Claimants surveyed more than 20 SELPAs representing more than 10% of the public school students statewide. The State's Department of Finance staff reviewed copies of all survey returns and verified that the cumulative cost totals accurately reflected the SELPA data.

In May 2008, the Sacramento Superior Court notified the State that it must bring its case to trial by September 26, 2008, or be subject to dismissal under the state law which requires all matters to be brought to trial within five years. The Parties filed a stipulation with the Sacramento Superior Court agreeing to extend the five-year period pending this resolution.

C. What is the Outcome of the Settlement Negotiations?

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The State and Claimants have negotiated a settlement agreement ("Agreement") which is contingent upon the following three events occurring:

On or before February 28, 2009, no less than 85% of all K-12 school districts, county
offices of education (COEs), and SELPAs shall sign the Waiver, attached hereto as Exhibit
A. In addition, the school districts and county offices of education signing Exhibit A must
have served student populations accounting for no less than 92% of the second principal
apportionment ("P-2") average daily attendance ("ADA") in the 2007-08 fiscal year.

- 2. The parties shall seek a superior court ruling that the settlement is final and binding on all LEAs, assuming implementing legislation is enacted. In the absence of such a ruling, the parties shall seek an alternative, mutually agreeable final and formal resolution of the dispute.
- 3. Legislation must be enacted appropriating the following funds for the settlement:
 - a. \$65 million as a permanent increase to the AB 602 base, commencing 2009-10, subject to COLA and ADA growth in subsequent years.
 - b. \$510 million retroactive payment in total for general fund use payable to school districts in \$85 million installments over six years, commencing 2011-12 and ending 2016-17, all payments to be based on 2007-08 P-2 ADA. The State may enlarge these installments, discharging the obligation more quickly if it so decides. These payments may be suspended in a year in which Test 3 of Proposition 98 is operative. If the payment is suspended in any year or years, it must be made in the year or years immediately following the designated six-year period or lesser period if the State has discharged its obligation prior to the end of the six years.
 - c. \$10 million lump sum retroactive payment for general fund use payable in 2009-10, divided as follows:
 - \$1.5 million to COEs based on December, 2007 county special education pupil count, with no county office of education receiving less than \$5000;
 - \$6.0 million to SELPAs based on December, 2007 special education pupil count, with no SELPA receiving less than \$10,000; and
 - \$2.5 million to San Joaquin County Office of Education for administrative costs incurred in pursuing the Claim.

By separate agreement among the Claimants, the \$2.5 million allocation to the San Joaquin County Office of Education will be used to pay for the administrative costs incurred to pursue the Claim from 1994 to the present.

The Parties intend that the legislation will be requested in early 2009 and enacted on an urgency basis prior to or concurrent with the Budget Act for the 2009-10 fiscal year. It is possible that non-substantive changes to the proposed legislation described above may occur with the consent of the parties.

D. What Rights Are Waived by LEAs Who Elect to Sign the Waiver?

Under article XIIIB, section 6, of the California Constitution, sections 17500 through 17630 of the California Government Code, and sections 1181 through 1189.11 of title 2 of the California Code of Regulations, LEAs have the right to file mandated cost claims with the Commission on State Mandates. Further, under section 1542 of the Civil Code, a waiver does not extend to unknown claims. However, LEAs who sign this Waiver agree to give up certain of these rights as follows:

1. **Known Claims**: LEAs electing to sign the attached Waiver agree to waive their right to file or to otherwise pursue reimbursement claims for the mandated programs and services contained in the Behavioral Intervention Plans Mandated Cost Claim or any other known claim arising from California Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and

3052, as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008. Further, LEAs signing the Waiver acknowledge that the amount needed to satisfy the State's minimum funding obligation under Proposition 98 shall not be increased by the retrospective payments required by the settlement and forever give up their right to contend otherwise.

- 2. **Unknown Claims**: LEAs electing to sign the attached Waiver also agree to waive their right to pursue any unknown mandated cost claim arising from California Education Code section 56523 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 3001, subdivisions (c), (d), (e), (f), and (aa), and 3052, as those sections read on or before July 1, 2008.
- 3. **Exemptions**: The Waiver does not prohibit LEAs from filing mandated cost claims to the extent that state or federal statutes or regulations are amended or added or changed in any way after July 1, 2008.

Of course, unless the three events take place which are set out in Section C above, the Waiver is not binding.

E. Where is More Detailed Information on the Settlement Available?

With the mailing of this notice all LEAs have been sent a copy of the Settlement and Release Agreement in this matter and a copy of the Proposed Draft Legislation. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

During the 2003-2007 school years, Capistrano Unified School District made several adjustments to the traditional school calendar. Intended to provide maximum time for students to prepare for high-stakes tests and enhance District revenue, the changes included a pre-Labor Day start date, additional fall, winter, and spring recess days, and a three to five day Thanksgiving recess.

In November 2006, a Calendar Task Force was convened to review previous school calendars and make recommendations for the 2007/08 and 2008/09 calendars. The Task Force was composed of 20 members representing all of the school district's major constituent groups, including the Capistrano Unified Council of PTSA's, Capistrano Unified Education Association, California School Employee Association—Chapter 224, Teamsters, principals, and support staff from the Personnel and Budget Departments. The Task Force conducted two lengthy meetings in November and December 2006 to share input and reach consensus on a recommended calendar. Input from all stakeholder groups indicated a strong desire to move the first day of school back to a date after Labor Day and to minimize the number of single recess days throughout the year. Student and teacher attendance data from previous years supported the creation of a calendar which incorporated these changes.

After considering the educational implications of the major calendar issues and studying the input received from stakeholders, the committee concluded that the following tenets should be adopted in future school calendars:

- The calendar should support the educational purpose of the school district.
- Student holidays, aside from legal holidays, should be minimized and placed strategically in order to optimize learning.
- To the extent possible, the calendar should follow a consistent pattern from year to year so that teachers can plan for instruction and families can make long-range plans.
- To the extent possible, the calendar should retain some of the features which produced the higher district revenue realized during the three-year pilot as a result of increased ADA.

In April 2008, the Board of Trustees adopted a calendar for the 2009/10 academic year which was consistent with these factors. The Calendar Task Force reconvened in December 2008 to design a proposed calendar for the 2010/11 academic year which also held true to these tenants.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This Board item presents for Board consideration a proposed school calendar for the 2010/11 school year (Exhibit A).

The recommended calendar maintains consistency with the 2007/08 and 2008/09 calendars. Specifically:

- Students return to school the Tuesday after Labor Day.
- The only scheduled fall recess day other than those expressly dictated under Education Code 79020 is the Friday following Veterans Day.
- Schools will be closed for a five-day Thanksgiving holiday break.
- Spring Break is scheduled the second week/first full week in April.
- The final student day is a Thursday.

The committee considered returning to a two or three-day Thanksgiving Recess, but that would have moved graduation to a Monday or Tuesday. The committee felt this was not a good option.

The committee realizes that creating a calendar which meets every individual's and group's needs and preference is a challenging task. The committee recommended the calendar in Exhibit A based on instructional needs, fiscal realities, the stated preferences of the majority of parents and employees polled, as well as a desire to maintain a consistent pattern of breaks so that our parents and employees can plan personal and family time.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Adoption of this calendar will sustain the savings by increasing the first week attendance and reducing high student and teacher absenteeism immediately following a mandatory mid-week Veterans Day, as well as preceding the Thanksgiving holiday, thus enhancing the general fund through increased revenue via the state's ADA funding model.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully requested Board President Ellen Addonizio recognize Deputy Superintendent Suzette Lovely. Ms. Lovely, in turn, will recognize Executive Director Michelle Wrenn Benham, who will introduce this item and answer any questions Trustees may have. After appropriate discussion, it is recommended the Board approve the proposed school calendar for 2010/11 (Exhibit A).

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On December 10, 2001 the Board took action to approve participation in the Metropolitan Benefits Association (MEBA) for the purpose of purchasing medical benefits, Exhibit A. The collective bargaining agreements for all employee groups were modified to recognize participation in MEBA. MEBA is a joint trust. By design, labor and management have an equal voice on the MEBA Board in the selection of benefit providers, plan offerings, wellness programs, etc.

MEBA also takes advantage of the "pooling" principle, whereby employers join forces to create a group of employees larger than any single member district. This affords the opportunity to gain discounts. Except for large districts like Los Angeles, San Diego, and Long Beach many other California districts join non-profit trusts, joint powers authorities or insurance purchasers such as the California Public Employee Retirement System (CalPERS) to gain purchasing power. Regardless of how insurance is acquired, health and welfare benefits must be negotiated under California's collective bargaining laws.

By approving membership in MEBA, the district and its respective bargaining units agreed to the terms set forth in the participation agreement, Exhibit B. Section 8 of the agreement spells out the procedures for a district to leave the trust. If CUSD and its bargaining units decide through negotiations to leave the trust, notice must be given no less than 90 days before the start of the plan year which begins January 1. Therefore, the district and its employee groups have until September 2009 to determine if they will remain in MEBA.

In the event a change is ratified by the Board and employee organizations, a "Request for Proposal" (RFP) would be developed to go out to market and invite interested competitors to respond.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

The purpose of this item is to clarify the participation agreement and requirements of MEBA and answer any further questions Trustees might have about the plan.

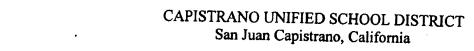
FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Health Benefits Committee, consisting of representative membership from CSEA, CUEA, Teamsters, and the District, has agreed to participate in the Metropolitan Employees Benefits Association (MEBA) trust for health benefits. This change in carriers is due in part to the unavailability of Mission Hospital through Health Net and the rising costs of health benefits.

MEBA began operations in January 1994 as a member of a statewide coalition of school trusts. At present, there are four participating school districts—Brea Olinda Unified School District, Buena Park School District, Fullerton Joint Union High School District, and Fullerton School District. Their current enrollment is approximately 3,100 employees and 4,600 family members. Currently there are eight management, four CSEA, and four CTA members on the MEBA Board. CUSD will hold two management and two labor positions on the MEBA Board. The MEBA Board sets guidelines for participation by districts, selects a menu of plans/designs to be offered, selects vendors to insure plans and evaluates claim experience. All plans are fully insured. The Health Benefits Committee believes that participation in the MEBA trust will offer better buying power, thereby lowering premium costs. All bargaining units have signed MEBA participation agreements. These agreements are provided to Trustees under separate cover as Exhibit A.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item presents for Board consideration ratification of the District's participation in the Metropolitan Employees Benefits Association Trust, effective January 1, 2002.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Participation in the MEBA Trust will not cause any additional impact to the budget.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that the Board approve ratification of Capistrano Unified School District's participation in the Metropolitan Employees Benefits Association Trust, effective January 1, 2002.

METROPOLITAN EMPLOYEES BENEFITS ASSOCIATION (MEBA)

PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT

(Collective Bargaining Unit)

This PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), is entered into by and between the Metropolitan Employees Benefits Association ("MEBA"), a tax exempt voluntary employee benefits trust under Internal Revenue Code, Section 501 (c)(9), and the <u>Capistrano Unified School District</u> ("District"), and the <u>Capistrano Unified Chapter 224 California School Employees Association</u> ("Union").

RECITALS

- A. WHEREAS, several school districts and several public school employee unions have established the MEBA for the purpose of providing health and welfare benefits, as defined in Sections 3543.2 and 53200 of the California Government Code, for the employees of Capistrano Unified School District and their dependents; and
- B. WHEREAS, the District and the Union have entered or will enter into a collective bargaining agreement which provides for participation in MEBA for the provision of health and welfare benefits for employees represented by the Union; and
- C. WHEREAS, the MEBA wishes to enter into an agreement with the District and the Union to provide health and welfare benefits while maintaining strict neutrality in any current or future collective bargaining negotiations between the District and the Union.

AGREEMENT

In consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. Term. The term of this Agreement shall begin January 1, 2002, and shall continue in effect until terminated pursuant to Section 8 of this Agreement.
- 2. Incorporation of Agreement establishing the MEBA. The parties agree to be bound by the terms contained in the document entitled "Agreement Establishing the Metropolitan Employees' Benefits Association" ("MEBA Agreement"), incorporated herein by this reference.
- Collective Bargaining Agreement.
 - a. As a condition of participation in the MEBA, the District and the Union will modify the collective bargaining agreement between them to comport with the provisions of the MEBA Agreement and this Agreement and, in the absence of such modification, hereby agree that the specific provisions of the MEBA

- Agreement and this Agreement shall supersede any terms of the collective bargaining agreement which conflicts with either Agreement.
- b. This Agreement shall not take effect until the District and the Union provide the MEBA with a copy of the current collective bargaining agreement and the provisions of the agreement providing for participation in the MEBA are approved by MEBA. The District and the Union shall immediately provide the MEBA with copies of any changes in the collective bargaining agreement relative to participation in the MEBA.

4. Plan Changes and Waiver of Duty to Bargain for Plan Changes.

- a. The MEBA reserves the right to amend or modify any of the benefits plans. If contributions and reserves of the MEBA are not adequate in the judgment of the Directors of the MEBA to provide benefits, pay administration expenses, and maintain reasonable reserves, the Directors may amend of modify any of the benefit plans provided that such action shall not e taken until after the District and the Union are provided at least forty-five (45) days advance written notice of such changes.
- b. The District and the Union agree to waive during their participation in the MEBA any right to bargain under Government Code section 3540 et seq., concerning the benefit plans, the insurers, or the claim administration for existing health and welfare benefits, but do not waive as a result of this Agreement the right to bargain concerning the contribution rate to the MEBA, the termination of participation in the MEBA, or benefits not purchased through the MEBA.

5. Selection of Benefit Plans and Election Forms.

- a. A MEBA-approved benefits plan shall be selected in accordance with the terms of the collective bargaining agreement between the District and the Union and incorporated into this Agreement as if fully set forth here, shall be submitted to the MEBA prior to the effective date of this Agreement.
- b. The choices specified in the Election Form may be changed by delivering to the MEBA an executed, amended Election Form. All changes will become effective the first day of the second calendar month following receipt by the MEBA, unless the MEBA is able to implement any changes earlier or unless the first day of a later month is specified in the amended Election Form.
- c. If the collective bargaining agreement between the District and the Union requires employees to pay a portion of the contribution, the District is solely responsible for the collection of the employee contributions. The District is responsible for the payment to the insurance carrier of the full contribution for each employee receiving benefits under one of the plans specified in the Election Form.

- d. The District and the Union will be notified in writing of applicable rates and benefits and eligibility rule changes at least forty-five (45) days prior to their effective date.
- e. The parties agree to the Eligibility Rules of the MEBA.

6. Contribution and Reports.

- a. The District shall prepare and submit to the MEBA monthly or tenthly by such date as the MEBA prescribes a current list on a form to be supplied by the MEBA, of all current employees who are covered under each Plan annotated to add newly enrolling employees and to delete employees who are no longer eligible.
- b. Contributions for employees covered pursuant to each respective Plan shall be paid by the District on a monthly or tenthly basis in the amount per employee specified for each employee included on the monthly list referred to in Section 6(a).
- c. Contributions to the MEBA or on behalf of the MEBA are due on the first day of the month and shall be considered delinquent if not received by the 21st day of the month in which the contributions were first due, or if postmarked later than the 20th day of the month in which the contributions were first due. Liquidated damages and interest shall be charged to delinquent contributions in accordance with the MEBA Agreement.

7. Distribution of Materials.

- a. The District agrees to distribute to employees enrollment forms, benefit descriptions, benefit certificates, provider directories, claim forms, and other forms or documents usually supplied in connection with the enrollment process.
- b. The District will be responsible for administering COBRA continuation benefits for employees and eligible dependents. The District shall notify MEBA of termination, reduction in hours or death of any employee as required by law.

8. Termination.

a. The District and the Union may terminate their participation in the MEBA as of the date of the expiration of the collective bargaining agreement providing for participation in this MEBA by providing written notice to the MEBA not less than sixty (60) calendar days prior to the end of the plan year. If such date is not coincident with the District's plan year, written notice of termination from the District and Union shall be provided no less than ninety (90) calendar days before the end of the plan year.

- b. The MEBA may terminate this Agreement if the District or the Union fails to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement, or at any time the District fails or refuses to make all payments required hereunder, within twenty (20) days after service of a written notice from the MEBA demanding payment.
- c. Following termination of this Agreement, the MEBA shall be responsible for payment of eligible claims of covered individuals incurred on or before the termination date only in accordance with the terms and specification of the MEBA Agreement and of each applicable Plan.
- d. The parties acknowledge that after termination of participation, neither the employees and/or employee representatives nor the District shall retain any right or interest in the MEBA Fund or any of its assets and shall not be entitled to any share of the reserves maintained by the MEBA Fund upon their withdrawal from participation.
- 9. Waiver of Claims. The District and the Union hereby waive any claim against the Trustees, agents or employees of the MEBA for any loss, cost or expenses, including attorneys' fees, alleged to arise from or relate to the Trustees', agents' or employees' good faith discharge of responsibilities under the MEBA Agreement of this Agreement.
- 10. Arbitration. The parties agree that any controversy or claim arising out of or relating to the interpretation or application of this Agreement, or any breach thereof, including any claim that this Agreement is, in whole or in part, invalid, illegal or otherwise voidable or void, shall be submitted to arbitration in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association and judgment upon the award may be entered in any court with jurisdiction.
- 11. Severability. If any provision of this Agreement or application thereof is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Agreement which can be given effect with the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.
- 12. **Notice.** Any written notice required by or pertaining to this Agreement shall be sent to the noticed party by prepaid first class mail or telegram, at the address listed below:

PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT

(Non-Union Employees)

This PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), is entered into by and between the Metropolitan Employees Benefits Association ("MEBA"), a tax exempt voluntary employee benefits trust under internal Revenue code, Section 501(c) (9), and the Capistrano Unified School District ("District").

RECITALS

- A. WHEREAS, several school districts and several public school employee unions have established the MEBA for the purpose of providing health and welfare benefits, as defined in Sections 3543.2 and 53200 of the California Government Code, for the employees of such districts and their dependents; and
- B. WHEREAS, the MEBA wishes to enter into an agreement with the District to provide health and welfare benefits to employees and others associated with the District who are not subject to a collective bargaining agreements.

AGREEMENT

In consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. **Term.** The term of the Agreement shall begin January 1, 2002, and shall continue in effect until terminated pursuant to Section 7 of this Agreement.
- 2. Incorporation of Agreement Establishing MEBA. The parties agree to be bound by the terms contained in the document entitled "Trust Agreement Establishing the Metropolitan Employees Benefits Association and Trust" ("MEBA Agreement"), incorporated herein by this reference.
- 3. Plan Changes. The MEBA reserves the right to amend or modify and of the benefits plans. If contributions and reserves of the MEBA are not adequate in the judgment of the Trustees of the MEBA to provide benefits, pay administration expenses, and maintain reasonable reserves, the Trustees may amend or modify any of the benefit plans provided that such action shall not be taken until after the District is provided at least forty-five (45) days advance written notice of such changes.
- 4. Selection of Benefit Plans and Election Forms.
 - a. One or more MEBA-approved benefits plans shall be selected by the District on the Benefit Plan Election Form ("Election form"), attached as **Exhibit A** and incorporated into this Agreement as if fully set forth here. The District shall



- submit such Election Form to the MEBA prior to the effective date of this Agreement.
- The choices specified in the Election Form may be changed by delivering to the b. MEBA an executed, amended Election Form. All changes will become effective the first day of the second calendar month following receipt by the MEBA, unless the MEBA is able to implement any changes earlier or unless the first day of a later month specified in the amended Election Form.
- If the employees are required to pay a portion of the contributions, the District is c. solely responsible for the collection of the employee contributions. The District is responsible for payment to the MEBA of the full contribution for each employee receiving benefits under one of the plans specified in the Election Form.
- d. The District will be notified in writing of applicable rates and benefit and eligibility rules changes at least forty-five (45) days prior to their effective date.
- The parties agree to the Eligibility Rules of the MEBA which are attached hereto e. as Exhibit B and are incorporated into this Agreement as if fully set forth herein.

5. Contributions and Reports

- The District shall prepare and submit to the MEBA and/or the benefit providers a. monthly or tenthly by such date as the MEBA and/or the insurance providers prescribe a current list on a form to be supplied by the MEBA and/or the insurance providers, of all current employees who are covered under each Plan annotated to add newly enrolling employees and to delete employees who are no longer eligible.
- b. Contributions for employees covered pursuant to each respective Plan shall be paid by the District on a monthly or tenthly basis in the amount per employee specified for each employee included on the monthly list referred to in Section 5(a).
- c. Contributions to the MEBA or on behalf of the MEBA are due on the first day of the month and shall be considered delinquent if not received by the 21st day of the month in which the contributions were first due, or if postmarked later than the 20th day of the month in which the contributions were first due. Liquidated damages and interest shall be charged to delinquent contributions in accordance with the MEBA Agreement.

6. Distribution of Materials

The District agrees to distribute to employees' enrollment forms, benefit descriptions, claim forms, and other forms or documents usually supplied in connection with the enrollment process.

b. The District will be responsible for administering COBRA continuation benefits for employees and eligible dependents. The District shall notify MEBA of termination, reduction in hours or death of any employee as required by law.

7. Termination

- a. The District may terminate its participation in the MEBA by providing written notice to the MEBA not less than sixty (60) calendar days prior to the end of the plan year. Such termination may not occur earlier than twelve (12) calendar months following the date specified in Section 1 of this Agreement.
- b. The MEBA may terminate this Agreement if the District fails to fulfill its obligation under this Agreement, or at any time the District fails or refuses to make all payments required hereunder, within twenty (20) days after service of a written notice from the MEBA demanding payment.
- c. Following termination of this Agreement, the MEBA shall be responsible for payment of eligible claims of covered individuals incurred on or before the termination date only in accordance with the terms and specifications of the MEBA Agreement and of each applicable Plan.
- d. The parties acknowledge that after termination of participation neither the employees nor the District shall retain any right or interest in the MEBA fund or any of its assets and shall not be entitled to any share of the reserves maintained by the MEBA Fund upon their withdrawal from participation.
- 8. Waiver of Claims. The District hereby waives any claim against the Trustees, agents or employees of the MEBA for any loss, cost or expenses, including attorneys' fees, alleged to arise from or relate to the Trustees', agents', or employees' food faith discharge of responsibilities under the MEBA Agreement or this Agreement
- 9. Arbitration. The parties agree that any controversy or claim arising out of or relating to the interpretation or application of this Agreement, or any breach thereof, including any claim that this Agreement is, in whole or in part, invalid, illegal or otherwise voidable or void, shall be submitted to arbitration in accordance with the Rules of the American Arbitration Association and judgment upon the award may be entered in any court with jurisdiction.
- 10. Severability. If any provision of this Agreement or application thereof is held invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Agreement which can be given effect with the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.

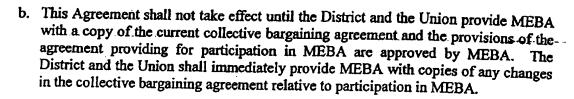

	a. As a condition of participation in MEBA, the District and the Union will modify the collective bargaining agreement between them to comport with the provisions of the MEBA Agreement and this Agreement and, in the absence of such modification, hereby agree that the specific provisions of the MEBA Agreement and this Agreement shall supersede any terms of the collective bargaining agreement which conflicts with either Agreement.

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4. Plan Changes and Waiver of Duty to Bargain for Plan Changes.

- a. MEBA reserves the right to amend or modify any of the benefits plans. If contributions and reserves of MEBA are not adequate in the judgment of the Trustees of MEBA to provide benefits, pay administration expenses, and maintain reasonable reserves, the Trustees may amend or modify any of the benefit plans provided that such action shall not be taken until after the District and the Union are provided at least forty-five (45) days advance written notice of such changes.
- b. The District and the Union agree to waive during their participation in MEBA any right to bargain under Government Code section 3540 et seq., concerning the benefit Plan(s), the insurers, or the claim administration for existing health and welfare benefits, but do not waive as a result of this Agreement the right to bargain concerning the selection of Plan(s), the employee contribution, the termination of participation in MEBA, or benefits not purchased through MEBA.

Selection of MEBA Plan(s) and Election Forms.

- a. MEBA approved Plan(s) shall be selected by the District and the Union, in accordance with the terms of their collective bargaining agreement, and is set forth in the signed Benefit Plan Election Form (the "Election Form") attached and marked as Exhibit A and made a part of this Agreement by this reference.
- b. A MEBA approved medical Plan must be selected on the Election Form.
- c. The choice(s) specified in the Election Form may be changed with 60 days notice prior to January 1 of each plan year to accommodate District and Union desires to move between established MEBA plan designs. Any other proposed changes to member plan participation shall only be considered following receipt by the Board of a written request from a member group to amend its Election Form. Any such change and requests for change must be delivered in a writing executed by the District and Union. The Board may approve or deny the request to amend the Election Form after review of factors that may impact the MEBA Trust and its membership.
- d. If the collective bargaining agreement between the District and the Union requires employees to pay a portion of the contributions, the District is solely responsible for the collection of the employee contributions. The District is responsible for the payment to MEBA of the full contribution for each employee receiving benefits under one of the plans specified in the Election Form.

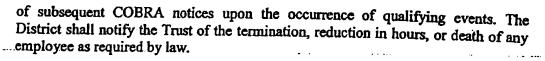
- e. The District and Union will be notified in writing of applicable rates and benefits and eligibility rules changes at least 45 days prior to their effective date.
- f. The parties agree to the Participation and Eligibility Requirements of MEBA which are attached and marked as Exhibit B and are incorporated into this Agreement as if fully set forth here.
- g. If the District and Union select the California Public Employers-Employees Trust Fund Group ("CPEETFG") dental plan from the Election Form, identified as the Delta Dental Plan, the parties acknowledge that MEBA merely agrees as a courtesy to forward payments collected from the District in accordance with this CPEETFG program and that MEBA does not provide this benefit and is not liable for any benefits provided under the dental plan.

6. Contribution and Reports

- a. The District shall prepare and submit to MEBA monthly or tenthly, by such date as MEBA prescribes, a current list on a form to be supplied by MEBA, of all current employees who are covered under each Plan annotated to add newly enrolling employees and to delete employees who are no longer eligible.
- b. Contributions for employees covered pursuant to each respective Plan shall be paid by the District, to MEBA, on a monthly or tenthly basis in the amount per employee specified for each employee included on the monthly list referred to in Section 6(a).
- c. Contributions to MEBA or on behalf of MEBA are due on the first day of the month and shall be considered delinquent if not received by the 21st day of the month in which the contributions were first due, or if postmarked later than the 20th day of the month in which the contributions were first due. Coverage by the Trust on the first day of the month under the MEBA Plans is contingent upon payment of those contributions which are due in the same month. Without limiting any rights of MEBA under the MEBA Agreement, liquidated damages and interest may be charged to delinquent contributions in accordance with the MEBA Agreement.

7. Distribution of Materials.

- a. The District agrees to distribute to employees enrollment forms, benefit descriptions, benefit certificates, provider directories, claim forms, and other forms of documents usually supplied by the insurance carriers in connection with the enrollment process.
- b. The District understands and agrees that it will assume complete responsibility for administering COBRA continuation benefits for employees and eligible dependents in accordance with the requirements of Public Health Service Act §2202, 42 U.S.C. §300bb et seq., and will indemnify and hold harmless the Trust with regard to same. These duties include, but are not limited to, the provision of an initial COBRA notice to each Participant and his or her spouse and eligible dependents, and the provision



8. Termination.

- a. Consistent with the collective bargaining agreement, the District and/or the Union may terminate their participation in MEBA as of the end of a plan year provided they give written notice, appropriately executed, to MEBA not less than 90 calendar days prior to the end of the same plan year.
- b. MEBA may terminate this Agreement if the District or the Union fails to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement, or at any time the District fails or refuses to make all payments required hereunder, within twenty (20) days after service of a written notice from MEBA demanding payment.
- c. In the event this Agreement terminates, MEBA is only responsible for providing coverage under the applicable MEBA plans through the termination date, provided all contributions are received when due. In no event is MEBA responsible for coverage of any employee after the end of the plan year for which notice in accordance with subsections 8(a) or (b) was given.
- d. The parties acknowledge that after termination of participation, neither the employees and/or employee representatives nor the District retain any right or interest in MEBA and are not entitled to any share of the reserves maintained by MEBA upon their withdrawal from participation.
- 9. Waiver of Claims. STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Following Trustee review of the changes to this resolution, it is respectfully requested that the Board adopt Resolution No. 0809-46, Exhibit A, reaffirming the statement regarding the general powers and responsibilities of the Board.

DISCUSSION/ ACTION

RESOLUTION NO. 0809-46 ROLE OF THE BOARD: POWERS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

WHEREAS, AS A SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER, I understand and accept as my primary responsibility the goal of providing the opportunity for each student to develop his/her unique abilities to the highest possible level. This goal is sought within the legal and financial framework imposed upon school districts by state and federal legislation. Whenever possible, the welfare of students, therefore, shall be given first priority in any action taken as a Board member; and

WHEREAS, I believe attainment of the goal of assisting each student to develop to his/her highest potential is directly related to the degree of local freedom for decision-making, my second responsibility is to support actively, among other initiatives, state and federal legislation which preserves and promotes local control. In turn, this will better enable my decisions as a Board member to reflect the desire of local school constituents with regard to public education, in general, and specifically within CUSD; and

WHEREAS, I realize I am a member of a policy-making board which speaks as a body and, as such, I have limited authority outside official meetings of the Board. Dear Superintendent Carter:

The Division of the State Architect (DSA) requests that you inform your governing board members that they may be held personally liable for the failure of educational buildings not certified by DSA. Please have your staff contact DSA to determine which, if any, buildings are not currently certified.

Project certification is evidenced by a letter DSA issues certifying that the building project has been completed in accordance with requirements as to the safety of design and construction pursuant to Education Code §§ 17280-17316 and 81130-81147 (The Field Act).

California Education Code §§ 17315 and 81147 provide that when an educational building is constructed in accordance with approved plans and specifications, and all the proper documents have been filed, and all fees have been paid, then the building will be granted certification that it complies with the requirements of the Field Act.

Project certification is important because it provides a method of documenting that all efforts have been made to ensure the safety of educational building construction. Additionally, failure to obtain project certification can result in some serious and negative consequences: DSA will be unable to approve future proposed construction affecting or utilizing the uncertified construction and, more importantly, governing board members may be held personally liable for projects until certified. The California Education Code (§§ 17371 and 81177) shields members of a school or community college district governing board from personal liability for injury to persons or damages to property resulting from the failure of a educational building as long as the requirements of the Field Act are met (i.e., the building is certified).

In an effort to aid school and community college districts in closing all projects with certification, DSA has prepared and published on our website a project certification guide. The guide can be found at:

This guide explains methods to determine the certification status of your facilities, outlines the certification process, suggests potential resolutions to circumstances preventing certification, and provides DSA contact information. To further assist school and community college districts, DSA has developed a presentation covering the information contained in the guideline. If you cannot send a representative to one of these presentations, contact your local DSA Office about scheduling a presentation.

SERRA HIGH SCHOOL

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

This item was originally brought to the Board of Trustees on January 12, 2009 and continued to February 9, 2007.

In 1997, Capistrano Unified School District (CUSD) recorded grant deeds with the Orange County Treasurer-Tax Collectors Office involving Serra High School in San Juan Capistrano and adjacent properties as part of a 1997 executed amendment to the Redevelopment Agency Agreement (RDA) with the City of San Juan Capistrano. The affected properties included the entire block bounded by the streets of Camino Capistrano to the west, La Zanja to the north, El Camino Real to the east and Acjachema to the south (Exhibit A). In the recorded grant deed, the legal description mistakenly describes the metes and bounds of an old parcel map – "Parcel Map 80-853", and therefore, the new division of the property between CUSD and the City (as intended in the 1997 amendment) was not recorded properly. According to County records, CUSD owns the entire block minus the existing Library property (Parcel 2) in the southeast corner of the block.

Since 1997, the City has made numerous improvements to facilities on what was to be their property (i.e., tennis and basketball courts, and play fields) on the southwest corner of the block. Moreover, the City constructed a new "Head Start" pre-school facility on their intended property – just north of the Library. Also, the City is now exploring the possible expansion of the Library to the west, encroaching on their intended property. Discussions with City staff reveal the need to survey and record the property to establish the proper subdivision boundaries as intended in the amended RDA. Exhibit B illustrates the old parcel map, and the approximate location of the necessary subdivision line – creating a Parcel A to the City and Parcel B to CUSD. Parcel A (City) should include the play courts and fields, the existing "Head Start" facility, and Parcel B (CUSD) should include all Serra High School facilities and the "Stonefield" grass area to the north. It is important to note that "Stonefield" is currently used by the City under a lease agreement.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item briefly describes the issues on the mistaken recording of the grant deed, and seeks authorization to partner with the City of San Juan Capistrano in cost sharing to survey and record the property subdivision, as intended in the 1997 amendment of the RDA. A cost estimate of

\$2,200 to complete the work was received by the City on January 7, 2009. If approved by the Board of Trustees, CUSD would participate in half of this cost to properly record the subdivision of property with the County.

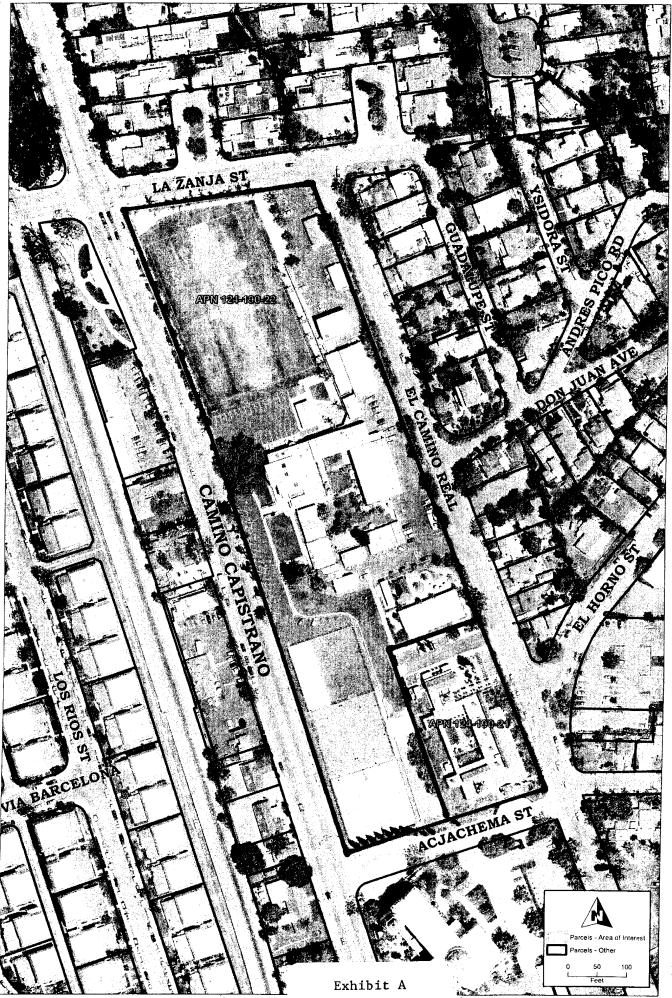
FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

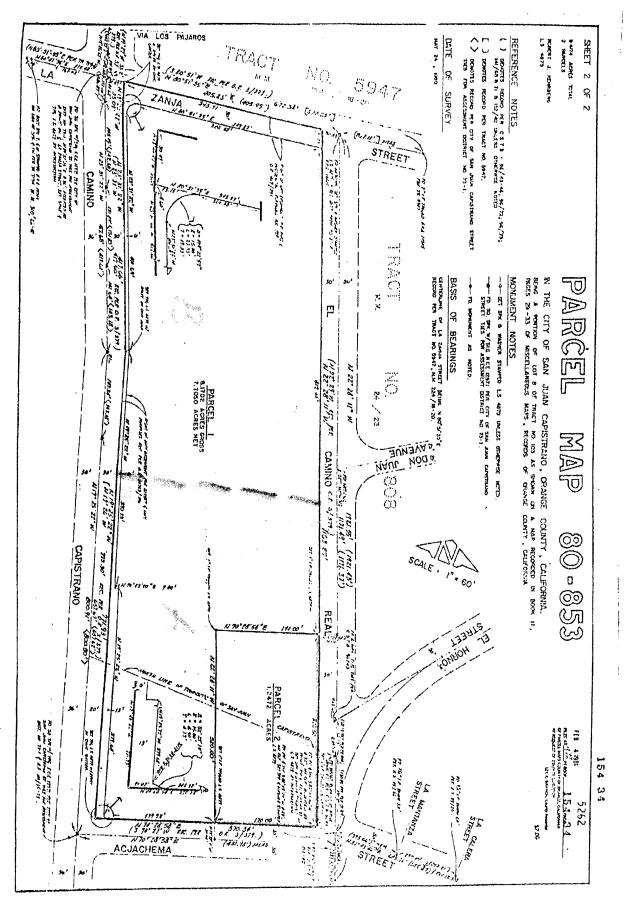

SUBJECT: FIRST READING: BOARD POLICY 4351—MANAGEMENT

COMPENSATION

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In an effort to promote the professional growth and development of our leaders, the Board of Trustees and Superintendent have allotted a reimbursement of up to \$500 per management employee to apply toward membership in professional and institutional organizations. While we believe ongoing professional learning is vital to the academic growth and success of the District, we recognize the need to identify areas to cut during this time of fiscal uncertainty. As a result, District staff will make efforts to incorporate professional growth through in-house management trainings.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This board item requests approval of proposed revisions to the "Professional Association Dues" portion of Board Policy 4351—Management Compensation (Exhibit A) which will suspend reimbursements for professional and institutional organizations for the 2009-2010 school year.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

It is estimated that if the proposed revisions are approved, the District will save approximately \$20,000 during the 2009-2010 school year.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that the Board of Trustees waive a second reading and approve the revisions to BP 4351—Management Compensation (Exhibit A).

DISCUSSION/ ACTION

MANAGEMENT COMPENSATION

Placement on Salary Schedule - Promotions/Reassignments

Management and confidential personnel who are promoted to a position at a higher range shall have their salary adjusted in the following manner: they shall be placed on the step in the higher range which would provide a pay increase of at least five percent, but not to exceed Step 5.

Management and confidential personnel who are reclassified or upgraded to a position at a higher range shall retain step placement given such step placement will not provide an increase beyond five percent. If the employee is on a longevity step in his/her current management/confidential position, upon such change, he/she shall move back in steps in the new range as outlined above. If the newly assigned step is Step 5, the administrator shall be placed on the first longevity step effective July 1 of the next fiscal year. If the newly assigned step is lower than Step 5, the administrator shall move to the first longevity step on July 1 of the next fiscal year after attaining Step 5. Employees who are moved from Step 20 to a lower step shall not have to serve a year at Step 15. Such employee is eligible to move from Step 10 to Step 20 as appropriate. However, notwithstanding everything just described, the Superintendent may exercise discretion to authorize a variation in step placement.

Managers returning to the classroom or classified service shall be placed on the appropriate longevity step as permitted in applicable Education Code provisions and collective bargaining agreements.

Y-Rating

Management and confidential personnel who are assigned to a position with a lower salary level shall be placed, if possible, on a range and step which represents no change or minimal change in salary. The Board of Trustees may approve a "Y" rating of such employee's salary which is to be reviewed and reapproved annually. A Y-rated salary shall not increase during the continuous regular service until the current salary range meets or exceeds the new salary of the employee. The Y-rating of an employee's salary does not affect longevity credit.

Placement on Salary Schedule - New Hires or Current Employees New to a Management/Confidential Position

Although it would normally be expected that new managerial employees be placed on Step 1 in the designated salary range, the Superintendent is authorized to place newly appointed or promoted managerial employees at a step higher than Step 1, including placement up to Step 5. The Superintendent may authorize salary placement higher than Step 5 upon Board approval.

MANAGEMENT COMPENSATION (continued)

Regular Step Advance

Advancement to the next higher step within a classification shall be effective July 1 of each fiscal year until Step 5 has been attained. Once Step 5 has been attained, the longevity provisions of this policy shall apply.

Longevity Credit

An appointee to a management classification between July 1 and December 31 shall receive a full year of longevity credit. Appointees to management positions from January 1 to June 30 shall not have the year of appointment count toward longevity credit unless extenuating circumstances exist as determined by the Superintendent. The appropriate longevity increases shall be effective at the beginning of the administrator's 10th, 15th and 20th years of service in a management or confidential position. Longevity steps 15 and 20 are subject to annual review and approval of the Superintendent for certificated managers.

Subject to the Superintendent's discretion, an administrator may receive credit for up to six years of out-of-district administrative/management experience toward longevity.

Service Clubs and Community Organizations

It is to the benefit of the educational programs of Capistrano Unified School District for the Board of Trustees to have its district leaders involved in service clubs and community organizations. However, any costs associated with participation in these service clubs or community organizations will be incurred at the employee's expense.

Professional Association Dues

The Board of Trustees and Superintendent consider professional development of their management personnel to be of the highest a high priority. Pursuant to that philosophy, the Board of Trustees grants to the Superintendent the authority to designate individuals, as official representatives of the school district, to obtain membership in select state, national and international professional organizations relevant to the operations of the school district.

Some professional associations offer institutional membership. In such cases, the Superintendent will identify who will serve as the school district's official representative(s).

Recognizing that professional development is important for all administrators, the Board of Trustees encourages the members of its management staff to join and participate in professional organizations, and, therefore, authorizes reimbursement of up to \$500 per employee per year, to be used for membership in one or more professional organizations. All such memberships are subject to the approval of the Superintendent/Designee.

MANAGEMENT COMPENSATION (continued)

Advanced Degree Incentive

Certificated and classified managers are eligible to receive the annual stipend as approved by the Board of Trustees for earned doctorate degrees. Classified managers are eligible to receive the annual stipends for an earned Master's degree as approved by the Board of Trustees.

Salary Underpayment/Overpayment Recovery Plan

In order to ensure proper range and step placement for employees, cooperation is required between the employee and the Payroll and Personnel Departments. Employees are requested to review their salary placement at least annually.

Should the employee believe that he/she has been improperly placed (i.e., not receiving the correct salary), the employee should immediately bring this to the attention of the Personnel and Payroll Departments. Should the district discover a salary error, the employee will be notified in writing at the earliest possible time after the error is noticed. A placement error that results in an incorrect payment to the employee will be corrected after the district has received appropriate verification(s) from the employee and/or respective agency/or previous employer. The statute of limitations for salary underpayments and overpayments is three years.

Underpayments

Should an incorrect salary placement result in an underpayment to the employee (less than they should be receiving), a supplemental amount due to the employee shall be included in the employee's next regularly scheduled paycheck following appropriate verification.

Overpayments

Should an incorrect salary placement result in an overpayment to the employee, as it is considered a gift of public funds, the employee shall be responsible for the full repayment of any amount in excess of his/her appropriate salary and/or other compensation. The employee shall be responsible for arranging a payment plan with the Payroll Department. The full amount must be repaid during a period not to exceed the time frame in which the overpayment occurred. Overpayments may be repaid by personal check, cash, or through payroll deduction. Any exceptions to the time period would require approval of the Superintendent or designee.

In the event the district and the employee are unable to agree on a repayment plan which is acceptable, the employee shall be notified that legal action may then be taken by the district in order to collect the overpayment amount.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL: BOARD POLICY 6141.5, ADVANCED PLACEMENT

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Advanced Placement courses are in place at all of our comprehensive high schools and provide college-level curriculum to motivated students. GAMUT recommends a Board policy to address key components of this program, including scope, preparation, support systems, staff development, and College Board authorization. CUSD currently does not have a policy on this program.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

The purpose of this item is to bring forward Board Policy 6141.5, Advanced Placement, Exhibit A, for a first reading. A list of the 42 existing Advanced Placement courses is attached for Trustee review, Exhibit B.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications to this policy.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully requested that Board President Ellen Addonizio recognize Carolyn Williams, Assistant Superintendent, Secondary Education, who will present this item. At the conclusion of this discussion, it is recommended the Board approve a first reading of Board Policy 6141.5, Advanced Placement.

Instruction BP 6141.5

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

To encourage students to challenge themselves academically and to enable students to be more competitive when applying for admission to postsecondary institutions, the Governing Board shall provide opportunities for college-level coursework that will prepare interested high school students to pass Advanced Placement (AP) examinations.

The Superintendent or designee shall recommend subject areas for AP courses at each school based on student interest and the availability of qualified certificated staff, instructional materials, and other resources.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's educational program provides opportunities for students to acquire the skills necessary to successfully undertake AP coursework. To the extent possible, the Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with feeder middle schools in developing and implementing an appropriate preparation program.

The Superintendent or designee shall make efforts to encourage students to participate in AP courses and to take end-of-course AP exams by creating support systems for AP students, such as resource centers and programs to recognize student accomplishments. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall explore partnerships with colleges and universities to help encourage students to pursue postsecondary education.

To increase the capacity of district schools to offer these courses, the Superintendent or designee shall provide staff development and support to AP teachers. Such professional development may include, but not be limited to, opportunities for teachers to obtain course-specific information, as well as information on instructional methods and data-driven decisions; mentoring for prospective AP teachers; and opportunities for staff within the district to share course syllabi and practices.

The Board desires that every district AP course receive authorization to use the AP designation by the College Board. To that end, the Superintendent or designee shall coordinate the process for submitting courses for approval as part of the AP course audit.

REQUIREMENTS

Board Policy 6146.1 updates high school graduation requirements for all students, including comprehensive, continuation, and adult schools. This policy also describes other options to earn high school credit.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This item requests approval of proposed revisions to Board Policy 6146.1, High School Graduation Requirements, Exhibit A. Proposed additions to the board policy appear in bold; deletions are struck through.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications to this agenda item.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended the Board approve revised Board Policy 6146.1, High School Graduation Requirements, Exhibit A.

The state of California has established high school graduation requirements for all students. The state's prescribed course of study for students in Grades 9-12 to receive a diploma is listed in the table below (Education Code 51225.3). The Governing Board of the District has adopted graduation requirements for all students which exceed the requirements of the state of California. (Note: 10 credits equal 1 full-year course, and 5 credits equal 1 semester course.)

The Governing Board authorizes the granting of a high school diploma to any pupil who has completed the prescribed course of study for any of the following schools: (1) traditional high school, (2) continuation high school, and/or (3) adult school.

1. Requirements for Graduation/Traditional High School

^{*} Such other coursework as the governing board of the school district may, by rule, specify.

General Conditions

- a. High school graduation is conditional upon the successful completion of the required course of study totaling a minimum of 220 semester units of work.
- b. To receive a high school diploma from the Capistrano Unified School District, in addition to 1(a), students must pass the California High School Exit Examination.
- c. To receive a high school diploma from CUSD, students must maintain a satisfactory program of continued education and attend a total of eight semesters in Grades 9-12, unless application for early graduation is filed one semester in advance.

A traditional high school program includes successful completion of the following credits (recommended grade level in parentheses):

5 of Reading Skills Development (9) - students who score at or above grade level on the approved district reading assessment achieve a RIT score of 228 on the CORE Level Test in reading are exempt from the graduation requirement to take a course in reading during Grade 9. Students with a 219 RIT score are required to complete a full year reading course to become successful in high school content course work.

40 of English

30 of Social Science, including:

10 World History (10)

Electives needed to complete a total of 220 semester units.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish regulations under which the District may grant credits toward graduation for college courses and private instruction attended by District students.

The Superintendent or his designee may grant physical education credit for independent study programs. Specifically, only individual sports with national competitive rankings are eligible for consideration under this provision.

The Superintendent or designee may grant physical education credit for participation in District interscholastic athletic programs when a student has been exempted from physical

education classes because of this participation and when such participation entails a comparable amount of time and physical activity.

Students using interscholastic athletics participation to fulfill physical education requirements may be graded on this participation, provided that a teacher credentialed to teach physical education supervises this participation and assigns the grade.

2. Transfers

To participate in a graduation ceremony and receive a diploma from a CUSD comprehensive high school, a student must be enrolled prior to the first day of the spring semester. These students must successfully complete 25 CUSD credits. Students who transfer in the fall semester of their senior year must successfully complete 50 CUSD credits.

a. Reciprocity on Graduation Requirements

Students in Grades 9-12 transferring to this District from schools outside of California must meet CUSD's graduation requirements, including CAHSEE, in order to receive a high school diploma.

- b. Transfer credits are accepted from accredited institutions only.
- c. Courses from the transferring district which are designated as honors courses will not receive honors credit if there is not a corresponding CUSD course of the same title with the same description.
- d. Courses designated as Advanced Placement from accredited transferring districts will receive additional weighted credit, which will be computed using the following numerical value: A = 5, B = 4, C = 3, D = 1, and F = 0.
- 3. Requirements for Graduation/Continuation School
 - a. General Conditions

The Governing Board shall grant a diploma of continuation high school graduation to any pupil upon completion of the prescribed course of study including satisfactory completion of a minimum of 190 semester credits of classroom instruction and supervised learning.

- b. Basic Requirements
 - (1) The specific subject requirements for a continuation high school diploma are identical to those required of the traditional high school. In addition to

the specific subject requirements, electives are needed to complete a total of 190 semester credits.

- (2) Students wishing to receive a continuation high school diploma must successfully complete a minimum of five credits at the continuation high school. In the event of extenuating circumstances, the Superintendent or designee, may waive this requirement.
- (3) Requirements for Graduation/Adult School

a. General Conditions

The Governing Board shall grant a diploma of adult high school graduation to any pupil upon completion of the prescribed course of study, including satisfactory completion of a minimum of 190 semester credits of classroom instruction and supervised learning.

b. Basic Requirements

- (1) The specific subject requirements for an adult high school diploma are identical to those required of the traditional high school with the exception of physical education courses. Such courses are not required for adult school graduation. In addition to the specific subject requirements, electives are needed to complete a total of 190 semester credits.
- (2) Students wishing to receive an adult school diploma must successfully complete a minimum of five credits at that adult school. In the event of extenuating circumstances, the Superintendent or designee may waive this requirement.

4. SATISFACTORY HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT MAY BE EARNED THROUGH OTHER AVENUES:

a. Juvenile Court School

The District shall accept for credit any coursework satisfactorily completed by students while detained in a juvenile court school or county or state-operated detention institution. District students who successfully complete District graduation requirements while so detained shall receive a diploma from the school they last attended.

b. Private Instruction/Internet Learning

At their discretion, the Superintendent or designee may grant credit toward high school graduation for private instruction or Internet Learning, provided that:

- (1) The instruction entails fields and subjects included in the school's courses of study and curricula.
- (2) The student demonstrates his/her capabilities at the beginning and at the end of the period of private instruction or Internet learning by examinations given under the school's supervision, thereby showing that the student has made progress in learning satisfactory to the school.
- (3) The Deputy Superintendent, Education, or designee has approved the curriculum and final evaluation instrument used in the private instruction or created by the Internet service provider.
- (4) Credit earned online while the student attends District schools in Grades 9-12 is solely intended for remedial work to make up a grade of "F."
- (5) Credit earned at a private high school while the student attends District schools in Grades 9-12 is limited to a maximum of 10 credits **annually** and may only be granted if the District's summer school does not offer the course.

c. Foreign Language Instruction

The District shall accept for credit foreign language courses successfully completed in a private school or via the Internet, provided that all of the following conditions are met:

- (1) The student or parent/guardian applies in writing for the credit, specifies the private school attended or the pre-approved Internet provider, the amount and level of credit requested, and submits written evidence from the private school showing the student successfully completed the course.
- (2) The number of credits sought equals at least one semester's work.
- (3) The Deputy Superintendent, Education, or designee determines that the student's achievement is equivalent to that expected of a student of comparable ability taking the same or similar instruction in a District school.

Students desiring credit in a world language course or courses through private study or via the Internet may do so if the target language is not offered at the student's home school.

d. College Courses

- (1) The individual may complete his/her high school education by attending an accredited college.
- the Concurrent College Studies Program. Under the auspices of the program, a student may enroll in one Saddleback College course per semester. Courses under this program receive high school credit as well as college credit. College courses may not be taken if the course is offered at the student's home campus. Graduation requirements, with the exception of electives, may not be taken under this program.
- (3) College courses will be equated to high school credits on the following basis: each semester unit of college credit is equal to three and one-third high school credits.
- (4) The student receives the same letter grade for the high school credit as is granted by the college. No additional grade point will be added if a student earns an "A" or "B" grade.

5. High School Equivalency/CHSPE

The Governing Board desires that every student have the opportunity to earn a high school diploma through successful completion of class work and Board-approved competency tests.

The Governing Board, however, recognizes that the California Legislature has provided two alternatives to the high school diploma: the General Educational Development Certificate for individuals 18 or older, and the California High School Competency Certificate for persons 16 or older or who have been in the tenth grade for a year or who are currently enrolled in the final semester of tenth grade. These certificates may be granted by the California Department of Education (CDE) to individuals who pass performance tests established by the Department.

The principal of each school maintaining tenth, eleventh, and/or twelfth grades shall distribute to each student in those grades an announcement explaining the California High School Proficiency Examination as provided under Education Code 48412. When announcements from the CDE or its contractor are received, this information shall be distributed early enough to enable interested students to register for the test.

Any person 16 or older or who has been in the tenth grade for a year or who is currently enrolled in the final semester of tenth grade may apply to have his/her proficiency in basic skills verified by examination according to criteria established by the CDE.

Any person 18 or older may take the General Educational Development Test (GED) given by the CDE in order to receive the High School Equivalency Certificate.

6. California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE)

- a. The Superintendent or designee shall provide notification to the parent or guardian of the pupil that each pupil completing the 12th grade will be required to successfully pass the California High School Exit Examination.
- b. Each pupil shall take the CAHSEE commencing in March of the tenth grade and may take it each time the District offers the CAHSEE until all sections of the examination have been passed.
- c. The Superintendent or designee shall provide remedial instruction for any student who does not demonstrate adequate progress toward passing the CAHSEE or fails to pass any section of the CAHSEE. This instruction may be provided before, during, or after school, during weekend sessions, or in summer school, and shall continue until the student has passed the CAHSEE or ceases to be enrolled in the district. Participation in remedial summer school instruction is required before a pupil may enroll in any enrichment component offered in summer school.

7. Graduation Ceremonies

- a. The Governing Board does not permit nor recognize any graduation ceremony for CUSD students other than the ceremonies attached to graduation from high school (Grade 12); continuation school (Grade 12); or Adult/Community Education (Grade 12).
- b. Students may participate in the graduation ceremony if:
 - (1) They qualify for a diploma by earning 220 credits, meeting all graduation requirements, and passing the CAHSEE, or
 - They qualify for a Certificate of Achievement by earning 220 credits and meeting all graduation requirements except for passing the CAHSEE. Students must complete intervention classes and attempt to pass the CAHSEE after 10th grade unless otherwise indicated by an IEP.

APPROVAL: BOARD POLICY 6171, TITLE 1 PROGRAMS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

As part of the preparation for the CDE Categorical Program Monitoring in June 2008, CUSD staff updated board policies to ensure compliance with current regulations.

Board Policy 6171, Title 1 Programs, required extensive revision, since the last time this policy was updated was prior to the passage of the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) law. A completely new board policy was created, based on GAMUT samples and consultation with CDE staff. When the revised Board Policy was presented to the Curricula Committee in May 27, 2008, trustees suggested changes which have been incorporated into the revised policy presented as Exhibit A.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item presents the revised Board Policy 6171, Title 1 Programs, Exhibit A. A copy of the original Board Policy is provided for Trustee reference, Exhibit B.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications to this item.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended the Board approve revised Board Policy 6171, Title 1 Programs, Exhibit A.

Instruction BP 6171(a)

Title I Programs

In order to improve the academic achievement of students from economically disadvantaged families, the district shall use federal Title I funds to provide supplementary services that reinforce the core curriculum and assist students in attaining proficiency on state academic standards and assessments.

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(cf. 6162.5 - Student Assessment)
(cf. 6162.52 - High School Exit Examination)
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The Superintendent or designee shall provide technical assistance and support to any school participating in the Title I program, including consultation in the development and implementation of school plans and activities. (20 USC 6312)

The district and each school receiving Title I funds shall develop a written parent involvement policy in accordance with 20 USC 6318.

Local Educational Agency Plan

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with teachers, principals, administrators, other appropriate school personnel, and parents/guardians of participating students in the development, periodic review, and, as necessary, the revision of a local educational agency (LEA) plan. The plan and any revisions shall be submitted to the Governing Board for approval.

The plan shall address the components specified in 20 USC 6312, which describe the assessments, strategies, and services the district will use to help low-achieving students meet challenging academic standards.

The initial plan shall be submitted to the California Department of Education (CDE) and approved by the State Board of Education. Subsequent revisions of the plan shall be kept on file in the district.

Comparability of Services

State and local funds used in schools receiving Title I funds shall provide services that, taken as a whole, are at least comparable to services in schools that are not receiving Title I funds or, if all district schools are receiving Title I funds, that are substantially comparable in each school. Comparability may be determined on a school-by-school basis or by grade span.

Title 1 Programs BP 6171(b)

To demonstrate comparability of services among district schools:

1. The Board shall adopt and implement a the districtwide salary schedule as approved by the bargaining unit.

- 2. The ratio of students to teachers, administrators, and other staff at each Title I school shall not exceed 110 percent of the average ratio across non-Title I schools.
- 3. Salary expenditures at each Title I school shall be no less than 90 percent of the average salary expenditure across non-Title I schools.
- 4. All district schools shall be provided with the same level of base funding per student for curriculum and instructional materials. <u>Title I schools shall receive the same level of base funding as non-Title I schools for curriculum and instructional materials.</u>
- 5. The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records of the quantity and quality of instructional materials and equipment at each school.

In determining comparability, the district shall not include staff salary differentials for years of employment. The district also may exclude unpredictable changes in student enrollment or personnel assignments that occur after the beginning of the school year, state and local funds expended for language instruction educational programs, state and local funds expended for the excess costs of providing services to disabled students, and supplemental state or local funds expended in any school attendance area or school for programs that specifically meet the intent and purposes of Title I. (20 USC 6321)

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall measure comparability in accordance with the above criteria and maintain records documenting the district's compliance. If any instances of noncomparability are identified, the Superintendent or designee shall promptly implement adjustments as needed to ensure comparability.

Program Evaluation

The Board shall use state assessment results and other available measures or indicators to annually determine whether each participating school is making adequate yearly progress toward ensuring that all students meet the state's proficient level of achievement on state assessments.

TITLE I PROGRAMS

The Title I program provides federal funds to schools that serve a high percentage of economically disadvantaged students in need of additional academic services. These schools provide students with supplementary programs and materials designed to instruct them in the District's core curriculum and improve their achievement in basic and advanced skills. The District shall provide these services, including remediation in reading, language and/or mathematics, on the basis of individual student needs identified annually and assessed with objective educational criteria.

When evaluating the effectiveness of Title I programs, staff shall assess individual student achievements and determine whether these students' improved performance has continued over a period of more than 12 months. Services shall be modified for students who do not make substantial progress.

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(cf. 6190 - Evaluation of the Instructional Program)
(cf. 6191 - Criteria for Evaluation of Consolidated Programs)
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The parents/guardians of children enrolled in Title I programs shall be involved in planning, designing and implementing these programs in a systematic, ongoing, informed, and timely fashion. They shall have regular opportunities to make recommendations on the educational needs of their children and on ways in which they can help their children benefit from the programs. All such recommendations shall receive timely responses.

Through consultation with parents/guardians, the District shall annually assess the effectiveness of parental involvement programs and determine what action, if any, needs to be taken to increase parental participation.

Comparability in Instruction

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures which ensure that the District provides all District schools with the same level of base funding per student for staff services, curriculum materials, and instructional supplies. At the beginning of each school year, the ratio of students to teachers and auxiliary staff shall vary as little as possible from school to school. The Superintendent or designee shall maintain annual records to document this ratio and to indicate the quantity and quality of books and equipment at each school.

FROM AND BY STUDENTS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Board Policy 1321 outlines guidelines for solicitations at school sites on behalf of charitable organizations and on behalf of the school.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item requests Board approval of revisions to Board Policy 1321, Solicitations of Funds From and by Students, to clarify that teachers may not request donations of any kind that count as credit towards student grades. The proposed amendment to the board policy appears in bold (Exhibit A.)

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no fiscal implications to this agenda item.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended the Board approve revised Board Policy 1321, Solicitations of Funds From and by Students, Exhibit A.

SOLICITATION OF FUNDS FROM AND BY STUDENTS

Solicitations on Behalf of Charitable Organizations

The Governing Board recognizes that participation in fund-raising for nonprofit, nonpartisan charitable organizations can help students develop a sense of social responsibility.

When approved in advance by the Board, funds may be solicited or materials distributed for those nonprofit, nonpartisan organizations that are properly chartered or licensed by state or federal law. (Education Code 51520)

Solicitations on Behalf of the School

With the approval of the Superintendent or designee, official school-related organizations may organize fund-raising events involving students.

(cf. 1230 - Other School-Connected Organizations)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that parents/guardians are informed of the purpose of all fund-raisers benefiting the school or school groups. After the fund-raiser is held, parents/guardians shall be told how much money was raised and how it was spent.

All Solicitations

Whether solicitations are made on behalf of the school or on behalf of another charitable organization, the Board particularly desires that no students shall be made to feel uncomfortable or pressured to provide funds. Staff is expected to emphasize the fact that donations are always voluntary. No students shall be barred from an activity because they did not participate in fund-raising. Teachers may not solicit donations of materials or supplies from students for credit towards their grades.

FIRST READING: NEW BOARD PÓLICY 4010 –

EMPLOYEE/STUDENT NON-FRATERNIZATION

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

At the request of Trustee Winsten, staff investigated the possibility of adding a non-fraternization policy to its current personnel policies. After studying similar policies in other school districts and consulting with OCDE legal counsel, a non-fraternization policy was drafted, Exhibit A.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item presents for consideration a new policy governing employee/student non-fraternization. **Board Policy 4010 Employee/Student Non-Fraternization** establishes safeguards to ensure all employees conduct themselves in a professional manner and refrain from any type of sexual or romantic relationship with students, Exhibit A.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications associated with adopting this new policy.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that Board President, recognize Deputy Superintendent, Personnel Services, Suzette Lovely to introduce Board Policy 4010 Employee/Student Non-Fraternization, Exhibit A. Any recommended changes will be brought back for final approval at the March 9, 2009 Board meeting.

EMPLOYEE/STUDENT NON-FRATERNIZATION

The relationship between the school employee and the student shall be one of professional cooperation and respect. All employees, whether certificated or classified, have a responsibility to

conduct themselves in a manner that will maintain an atmosphere that is conducive to learning.

It is the policy of the Board of Education to prohibit any type of sexual or romantic relationship, sexual contact, dating or courting between a school employee and an enrolled student. This includes internet chat rooms, social network services, text messages, cell phones, and all other forms of

electronic communication. This prohibition applies to students of the same or opposite sex as the school employee. It also applies regardless if the student or school employee initiated the conduct

and whether or not the student welcomes the conduct and/or reciprocates the attention.

The District shall promptly investigate allegations of prohibited staff/student relationships. In doing so, the District shall utilize the same investigation procedures followed for complaints of sexual

harassment outlined in BP 4119.11.

Any employee who is found to have violated this policy will be subject to disciplinary action up to

and including termination.

There may be circumstances that do not involve dating or courting, but are nevertheless unprofessional. Those cases will have to be judged on the totality of the circumstances under the

causes for discipline set forth in the Education Code and collective bargaining agreements.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On December 8, 2008, the Board of Trustees authorized advertising for Request for Qualifications/Proposal No. 1-0809 – Third Party Administration Services (TPA) for Capistrano Unified School District's 403(b) Plan for the administration of the District's tax deferred annuity/custodial 403(b) plan. A Request for Qualifications/Proposal (RFQ/P) was designed and the Scope of Work and rating system was developed to meet the specific requirements of the District. This RFQ/P and the District's contract to be executed by the awarded TPA are located at CUSD's website at http://www.capousd.org/purchasing/bidsrfpsawards.htm. The RFQ/P was properly advertised, and the District received two proposals; Envoy Plan Services and SchoolsFirst Federal Credit Union. These proposals are available for review in the Purchasing Department.

The contract in this RFQ/P consists of an initial one year term with two additional annual renewals at the option of the Board of Trustees.

The Evaluation Committee reviewed the proposals and ranked them according to criteria established in the RFQ/P (located on page nine of the document). The Summary Score Sheet as shown in Exhibit A summarizes the average scores submitted by each Committee Member. Terry Fluent, Director, Purchasing, who was not a member of the Evaluation Committee, checked references and evaluated costs.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On February 9, 1998, the Board of Trustees adopted guidelines of Senate Bill 1693, legislation requiring school districts to justify and report the need and reasonableness of any collection and spending of developer fees for new school facilities. In compliance with government code sections 66006 and 66001, findings on the type and amounts of fees are to be published in Annual and Five-Year Reports, as long as the District continues to use developer fees as a funding mechanism for new school facility projects. Also, pursuant to the statutory requirements, the District published a "Notice of the Public Meeting," and made the reports available to the public fifteen days prior to the District's Board meeting.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item pertains to the adoption of Resolution No. 0809-47 indicating District compliance with Government Code Sections 66006 and 66001.

Exhibit A is Resolution No. 0809-47 prepared by District legal counsel, indicating compliance with Government Code Sections 66006 and 66001 relating to reporting developer fees.

Exhibit B is the Annual and Five-Year Reports for Fiscal Year 2007-2008.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The preparation of the Annual and Five-Year Reports does not have a financial impact on the District's General Fund. All costs associated with the reports were funded from the District's Developer Fee Account.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully requested that the Board of Trustees approve Resolution No. 0809-47 relating to the Annual and Five-Year Reports of developer fees received in Fiscal Year 2007-2008.

RESOLUTION NO. 0809-47

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT RELATING TO INFORMATION MADE AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC IN THE FORM OF A STATUTORY SCHOOL FACILITY FEES INCLUDING ALTERNATIVE SCHOOL FACILITY FEES ("REPORTABLE FEES") REPORT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2007-2008 ("REPORTABLE FEES REPORT"), AND FINDINGS THEREON

WHEREAS, the Capistrano Unified School District ("District") has received and expended statutory and/or alternative school facilities fees ("Reportable Fees") in connection with school facilities ("School Facilities") of the District for new development, and these funds have been deposited in a separate capital facilities account as provided by Government Code Section 66006(a); and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Government Code Section 66006(a), the District has established and maintained a separate capital facilities account and maintained such separate capital facilities accounts in a manner to avoid any commingling of the Reportable Fees with other revenues and funds of the District, except for temporary investments, and has expended those Reportable Fees collected for the sole purpose for which they were collected; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 66006(b)(1) provides that the District shall make available to the public within one hundred eighty (180) days after the last day of each fiscal year a written report; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 66001(d) provides that for the fifth fiscal year following the first deposit into the account, and every five years thereafter, the District shall make findings with respect to the capital facilities account fund that remain unexpended; and

WHEREAS, when findings are required by Government Code Section 66001(d), they shall be made in connection with the information required by Government Code Section 66006; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 66006(b)(2) requires that the governing body of the District review the information made available to the public at a regularly scheduled public meeting and any other relevant information including, but not limited to, that certain Reportable Fees Report prepared by the District entitled, "Annual and Five Year Reports" not less than fifteen (15) days after this Reportable Fees Report is made available to the public.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That the Board does hereby find and determine that the foregoing recitals and determinations are true and correct.

Section 2. That pursuant to Government Code Sections 66001(d) and 66006(b)(1) and (2), the District has made available to the public the requisite information and proposed findings concerning the collection and expenditure of Reportable Fees related to School Facilities for new development within the District.

Section 3. That the Board of the District at a public meeting has reviewed the following information pursuant to Government Code Section 66006(b)(1), as is required by Government Code Section 66006(b)(2), including:

- (A) A brief description of the type of Reportable Fees in the account;
- (B) The amount of the Reportable Fees;
- (C) The beginning and ending balance of the account;
- (D) The amount of Reportable Fees collected and the interest earned;
- (E) An identification of each Project on which Reportable Fees were expended and the amount of the expenditures on each Project, including the total percentage of the cost of the Project that was funded with Reportable Fees;
- (F) An identification of an approximate date by which the construction of the Project will commence if the District determines that sufficient funds have been collected to complete financing on an incomplete Project, as identified in Section 66001(a)(2), and the Project remains incomplete;
- (G) A description of each interfund transfer or loan made from the account, including the Project on which the transferred or loaned Reportable Fees will be expended, and, in the case of an interfund loan, the date on which the loan will be repaid, and the rate of interest that the account will receive on the loan; and
- (H) The amount of refunds made pursuant to Section 66001(e) and any allocations pursuant to Section 66001(f).

Section 4. That the Board of the District at a public meeting has reviewed the proposed findings, as required by Government Code Section 66001(d), including:

- (1) Identification of the purpose to which the Reportable Fees are to be put;
- (2) Demonstration of a reasonable relationship between the Reportable Fees and the purpose for which they are charged;
- (3) Identification of all sources and amounts of funding anticipated to complete financing of Projects of the District; and
- (4) Designation of the approximate dates on which the funding referred to in paragraph (3) is expected to be deposited into the appropriate account.

Section 5. That the Board of the District hereby determines that all Reportable Fees, collections and expenditures have been received, deposited, invested and expended in compliance with the relevant sections of the Government Code and all other applicable laws for the fiscal year 2007-2008.

Section 6. That the Board of the District hereby determines that no refunds and allocations of Reportable Fees, as required by Government Code Section 66001, are deemed payable at this time.

Section 7. That the Board of the District hereby determines that the District is in compliance with Government Code Section 66000, et seq., relative to receipt, deposit, investment, expenditure or refund of Reportable Fees received and expended relative to School Facilities for new development for the fiscal year 2007-2008.

I. Introduction

Sections 66001 and 66006 of the Government Code provide that the Capistrano Unified School District ("School District") shall make available to the public certain information and adopt described findings relative to statutory school fees ("Statutory School Fees") collected pursuant to Sections 17620 et seq. of the Education Code and Sections 65995 et seq. of the Government Code, Senate Bill 201 fees ("SB 201 Fees") also collected pursuant to Section 65970 et seq. of the Government Code, and Alternative School Facility Fees ("Alternative Fees") collected pursuant to Sections 65995.5 and 65995.7 of the Government Code (collectively, "Reportable Fees"). II. Annual Report

The Reportable Fees of the School District for fiscal year 2007/2008 consist of Statutory School Fees and Alternative Fees.

B. Amount of the Reportable Fees

The Statutory School Fee amount for fiscal year 2007/2008 for the period between July 1, 2007, and May 8, 2008, was \$2.63 per square foot of assessable space for residential development constructed within the School District and \$0.42 per square foot of covered and enclosed space for commercial/industrial development constructed within the School District. For the period between May 9, 2008, and June 30, 2008, the Statutory School Fee amount was \$2.97 per square foot of assessable space for residential development constructed within the School District and \$0.47 per square foot of covered and enclosed space for commercial/industrial development constructed within the School District. The Alternative No. 2 Fee amount for the period of July 1, 2007 to June 16, 2008, was \$4.99 per square foot of assessable space for residential development in the School District meeting the criteria established by Senate Bill ("SB") 50, while the Alternative No. 2 Fee amount for the period of June 17, 2008 through June 30, 2008, was \$3.55 per square foot of available space for residential development in the School District meeting the criteria established by SB 50.

The residential Statutory School Fee amount of \$2.63 per square foot was adopted by the Board of Trustees ("Board") of the School District on March 13, 2006, by Resolution No. 0506-60 based on the report "Residential Development School Fee Justification Study" of the School District dated March 3, 2006, while the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fee amount of \$0.42 per square foot was adopted by the Board of the School District on March 13, 2006, by Resolution No. 0506-60 based on the report "Commercial/Industrial Development School Fee Justification Study" of the School District dated March 3, 2006. The residential Statutory School Fee amount of \$2.97 per square foot was adopted by the Board of Trustees ("Board") of the School District on March 10, 2008, by Resolution No. 0708-39 based on the report "Residential Development School Fee Justification Study" of the School District dated February 28, 2008, while the commercial/industrial Statutory School Fee amount of \$0.47 per square foot was adopted by the Board of the School District on March 10, 2008, by Resolution No. 0708-39 based on the report February 28, 2008.

The Alternative No. 2 Fee amount for the period July 1, 2007 through June 16, 2008, was adopted by the Board on June 25, 2007, by Resolution No. 0607-82 based on the report "School Facilities Needs Analysis for Consideration of Alternative School Facility Fees (Sections 65995.5 and 65995.7 of the Government Code)" dated May 23, 2007, and the Alternative No. 2 Fee amount for the period of June 17, 2008 through June 30, 2008, was adopted by the School District Board on June 16, 2008, by Resolution No. 0708-59 based on the report "School Facilities Needs Analysis for Consideration of Alternative School Facility Fee (Sections 65995.5 and 65995.7 of the Government

Code)" dated May 16, 2008. The Statutory School Fee and Alternative No. 2 Fee amounts only partially mitigate the impacts to the School District caused by new residential and commercial/industrial development.

C. <u>Beginning and Ending Balance of Account and Sub-Account(s)</u>:

Specifically, the Reportable Fees will be used for the construction and/or acquisition of additional School Facilities, remodeling existing School Facilities to add additional classrooms and technology, as well as acquiring and installing additional portable classrooms to accommodate Project Students.

B. <u>Demonstration of a Reasonable Relationship Between the Reportable Fees and the Purposes for which they are Charged</u>

There is a roughly proportional, reasonable relationship between the new development upon which the Reportable Fees are charged and the need for additional School Facilities by reason of the fact that additional students will be generated by additional development within the School District and the School District does not have student capacity in its existing School Facilities to accommodate these new students. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

To date, construction of San Juan Hills High School has been phased based upon necessary priorities including classrooms, administration buildings, associated infrastructure, and sports and recreational facilities to serve the students for the 2008/09 school year. Two story modular classrooms located in the middle of the campus were an original component to the high school plan as approved and funded by the state in 2002/03.

The contract to construct sitework and infrastructure for installation of 2-story modular buildings was awarded to HCH Constructors-Managers, Inc., under DSA Application No. 04-107867.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

This agenda item seeks Board approval of Change Order No. 2A for HCH's portion of DSA application 04-107867, Exhibit A. This change order includes changes to delete four trees; repair lateral line damaged during excavation; relocate storm drain tie-in and irrigation control wires; and add extra support on the utility enclosure due to the addition of fire sprinkler risers. All changes resulted in an increase to the original contract of \$13,560.91.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

At the June 17, 2008 Facilities Sub-Committee Meeting, staff presented potential improvement projects at San Clemente Schools. At Vista del Mar School, there were two projects identified to provide a safe uninterrupted flow of vehicles entering/exiting the school parking lot and significantly reduce roadway congestion. The City of San Clemente has completed the off-site traffic improvements and the on-site improvements are the responsibility of the District. The existing parking and drop-off conditions pose a student safety concern, in order for students to reach the sidewalk at Calle Portofino, they have to cross in front of car traffic at the only entrance to the parking lot, which also results in traffic delays.

CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS

The purpose of this agenda item is to provide Trustees with the opportunity to continue the discussion and provide direction to staff regarding adding a new pedestrian path around the parking lot. A copy of the project scope of work and estimate of costs is provided by WLC Architects, Inc. as Exhibit A.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The District's costs for the improvements as shown in Exhibit A would be approximately \$53,600 and may be funded through Community Facilities District 90-2 Talega.

1. Existing Conditions:

- a. The existing parking and drop-off pose a student safety concern. In order for students to reach the sidewalk at Calle Portofino, they have to cross in front of car traffic at the only entry to the parking.
- b. The student crossing at the school parking entry also causes major traffic delays.

2. Scope of Work:

- a. Provide a limited topographic survey to determine exact site conditions and to determine drainage changes if necessary. (DSA will require review of the existing grades in the path of travel).
- b. Demolish and relocate existing parking island to accommodate a new concrete sidewalk.

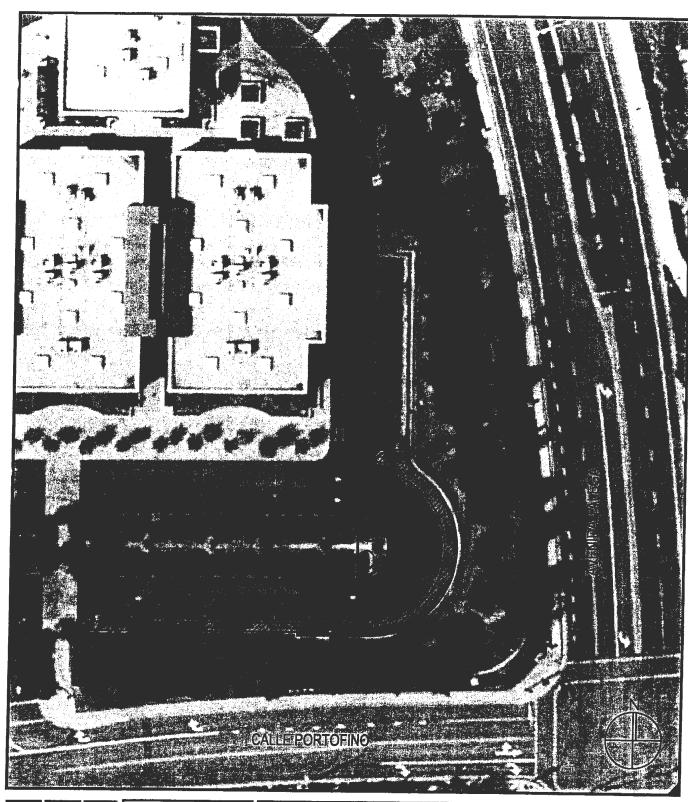
