In accordance with Board Policy 9324, Board Minutes, all Regular School Board Meetings will be audio recorded.

### II. INSTRUCTIONS FOR PRESENTATIONS TO THE BOARD BY PARENTS AND CITIZENS PRESENT AT THIS MEETING

We are pleased you can be with us at this meeting, and we hope you will return often. Your visit assures us of continuing community interest in our schools.

The members of the Board of Trustees of this District are locally elected state officials, who serve four-year terms of office, and who are responsible for the educational program of our community from grades kindergarten through twelve. They are required to conduct programs of the schools in accordance with the State of California Constitution, the State Education Code, and other laws relating to schools enacted by the Legislature, and policies and procedures which this Board adopts.

The Board is a policy-making body whose actions are guided by the school district's Mission and Goals. Administration of the District is delegated to a professional administrative staff headed by the Superintendent.

The agenda and its extensive background material are studied by each member of the Board for at least two days preceding the meeting. Board Members can call the administrative staff for clarification on any item, and many of the items on the agenda were discussed by the Board during previous meetings. These procedures enable the Board to act more effectively on agenda items than would otherwise be possible.

### WHAT TO DO IF YOU WISH TO ADDRESS THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

ITEMS ON THE AGENDA. Any person may address the Board concerning any item on the agenda and may, at the discretion of the Board, be granted three (3) minutes to make a presentation to the Board at the time a specific item is under discussion. However, the time assigned for individual presentations could be fewer than three (3) minutes depending upon the total number of speakers who wish to address a specific agenda topic. Prior to the opening of the meeting, a Request to Address the Board card (located in the foyer) should be completed and submitted to the Secretary of the Board. The total time devoted to presentations to the Board shall not exceed twenty (20) minutes, unless additional time is granted by the Board. All presentations shall be heard by the Board prior to the formal discussion of the agenda topic under consideration. Once an agenda item has been opened for public comment, no additional "Request to Address the Board of Trustees" cards shall be accepted for that topic.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS (Non-Agenda Items). Citizens may address the Board on any item not appearing on the agenda. Individual presentations are limited to three (3) minutes per individual, with twenty (20) minutes in total being devoted for this purpose, but could be less if there are a large number of Oral Communication speakers. Legally, the Board may not take action on items raised by speakers under Oral Communications. However, at its discretion, the Board may refer items to the administration for follow-up or place topics on a future Board agenda.

PUBLIC HEARINGS. Anytime the Board schedules a separate public hearing on any given topic, it shall not hear speakers on that topic before the public hearing, except as to the scheduling of the hearing, nor shall it hear speakers after the hearing, except as to changes in the policy or recommended actions which are directed at the time of the hearing.

CLOSED SESSION. In accordance with Education Code Section 35146 and Government Code Section 54957, the Board may recess to Closed Session to discuss personnel matters which they consider inadvisable to take up in a public meeting.

### **REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION**

In order to help ensure participation in the meeting of disabled individuals, appropriate disability-related accommodations or modifications shall be provided by the Board, upon request, in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Persons with a disability who require a disability-related accommodation or modification, including auxiliary aids and services in order to participate in a Board meeting, shall contact the Superintendent or designee in writing by noon on the Friday before the scheduled meeting. Such notification shall provide school district personnel time to make reasonable arrangements to assure accessibility to the meeting.

Chief Communications Officer Julie Hatchel introduced Enzo Scognamiglio and Linda Special Wright from the CUSD Foundation who presented a check to the district in the amount of \$97,322.19. President Addonizio requested a motion to recess to the Public Hearing called for in Agenda Item 30. It was moved by Trustee Bryson, seconded by Trustee Lopez-Maddox, and carried unanimously to recess to the Public Hearing. President Addonizio announced the Public Hearing open at 7:37 p.m. and read the following statement:

This Public Hearing is called pursuant to Education Code section 33050(a) to consider whether the district shall seek a waiver of several Education Code sections to avoid the expense of a special election if the Orange County Committee on School District Organization approves the pending Petition to change the District's election methodology to by-trustee area elections.

Currently, Board Members are required to reside in the trustee area they represent, but are elected by the registered voters of the entire district. The Petition requests that the election methodology be changed so that members of the Board are elected by the registered voters of the area in which they reside.

If the County Committee approves the change in election methodology as sought in the Petition, the County Committee's approval would constitute an order of election, and would require that the proposed change in election methodology be submitted to the voters not later than the next succeeding election for members of the Governing Board. The next election for Governing Board members is November 2010, however, the Petitioners are seeking a special election in June 2010.

If the special election is held on the same date as the June 2010 statewide election the cost would be in the range of \$496,000 according to the Registrar of Voter's office. If the election is held in conjunction with the Board's regular election in November of 2010, the cost would only be in the range of \$8,500 according to the Registrar's office.

The expense of a June 2010 special election can be avoided by obtaining a waiver of certain Education Code sections from the State Board of Education prior to final action by the County Committee calling for an election.

**Public Hearing: Election Waiver** Request Agenda Item 30

Presentation

Oral

Education Code section 33050 authorizes the Governing Board to seek a waiver of all or part of any section of the Education Code, except for certain sections not relevant to this issue. Education Code sections 33050 and 33051 require certain procedures before the waiver will be approved by the State Board of Education. These procedures include:

- 1. A public hearing on the waiver request. This is the purpose of tonight's hearing.
- 2. Notice to the exclusive representatives of district employees and solicitation of their positions regarding the waiver. The district's exclusive representatives have received notice and their positions have been sought according to this requirement.

To avoid the expense of an election resulting from the County Committee's possible approval of the Petition, it is necessary to seek the waiver of at least portions of Education Code sections 5019, all of Section 5020, portions of Section 5021 and 5030. The proposed waiver application is part of the agenda, and appears on pages 345 to 352.

The County Committee has scheduled a Public Hearing on the Petition for September 30, 2009. If the waiver request is approved and is successful, the savings to the district will be substantial. If implementation of new or revised trustee areas can be delayed until the district's regular 2012 election, following receipt of the results of the 2010 census, additional savings can be recognized.

The Board will now hear public comment on the issue of the waiver request.

- History/Social Science
- Health
- Mathematics
- Science
- Science laboratory equipment for Grades 9-12, inclusive, as appropriate
- World Languages

### SUBJECT: HIGH SCHOOL CLASS RANKINGS

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

On February 11, 2008, the Board of Trustees approved a change in class ranking for the class of 2012. The approval was for a system of quintile ranking. We have since learned that quintile ranking is not available through AERIES, our student data system. Instead, AERIES provides either total ranking or decile ranking.

### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Class rankings can create an inaccurate picture of a student's achievement and promote inappropriate competition among students and parents. Rankings may not only distract from the core value of learning, but also serve as a point of possible discrimination for some CUSD students in the college admissions process. An example would be a student with a 3.9 GPA who may rank 125th in the class and not receive strong consideration by selective and highly selective colleges. High school principals agree that a decile rankings system would better meet the academic needs of our students. After much discussion, they agreed the most appropriate transition would be to implement decile rankings with the Class of 2012. The Scholar of Scholars Award would remain in place and would be determined at each site per existing Board policy.

### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no fiscal implications to this agenda item.

### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is respectfully requested that Board President Ellen Addonizio recognize Gail Richards, Interim Assistant Superintendent, Secondary Education, to respond to Trustee questions on this agenda item. It is respectfully recommended that the Board approve elimination of high school class rankings beginning with the Class of 2012 and institute decile rankings in its place.

SUBJECT: MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN SAN CLEMENTE HIGH SCHOOL AND WESTED FOR THE QUANTUM CHEMISTRY TUTORS STUDY

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

WestEd is seeking the assistance of qualified chemistry teachers to study the effectiveness of Quantum Chemistry Tutors. The purpose of the study is to test the efficacy of the Quantum Chemistry Tutors, a suite of computer-based cognitive tutors that are designed to provide individual tutoring to high school students in twelve chemistry topics. These tutors represent comprehensive content for a full-year high school chemistry course. The study will include online training for 90 high school teachers across all participating districts and data collection on various measures for both teachers and students. The study will utilize a group-randomized design to examine how the use of the Quantum Chemistry Tutors affects student achievement in science. These twelve artificial intelligence web-based chemistry tutors, designed to assist students with high school chemistry, have been piloted with promising results and are now ready for field testing in California schools. San Clemente High School teacher, Autumn Chapman, has been selected to pilot a survey and web-based tutorial site sponsored by WestEd.

### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

This board item requests Board approval of a Memorandum of Understanding between Capistrano Unified School District and WestEd, Exhibit A.

### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

This program is funded by a grant from the Institute of Education Sciences. The stipends are funded from a grant; therefore, there would be no impact on the District's general fund.

### **STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS**

It is respectfully recommended that the Board approve the Memorandum of Understanding, Exhibit A, between Capistrano Unified and WestEd for the 2009-2010 and 2010-2011 school years.

### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN Capistrano USD AND WestEd FOR the Quantum Chemistry Tutors Study

### 1. Purpose

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) outlines the agreement between WestEd and the Governing board of the Capistrano USD (hereinafter "the district") to conduct the study of the Quantum Chemistry Tutors (hereinafter "the study").

The study is funded by the US Department of Education's Institute of Education Sciences (IES) and will take place over the course of the 2009-10 and 2010-11 school years. The purpose of the study is to test the efficacy of the Quantum Chemistry Tutors, a suite of computer-based cognitive tutors that is designed to provide individual tutoring to high school students in twelve chemistry topics. These tutors represent comprehensive content for a full-year high school chemistry course. The study will include online training for 90 high school teachers across all participating districts and data collection on various measures for both teachers and students. The study will utilize a group-randomized design to examine how the use of the Quantum Chemistry Tutors affects student achievement in science.

This MOU sets forth the agreement between the district and WestEd regarding the district's role in the study. This is a non-financial agreement.

### 2. Terms of the MOU

This MOU is effective on the date of execution by the designated representative. This MOU expires February 28, 2012.

Any of the parties to this MOU may terminate this MOU without cause provided that written notice is given at least 45-60 days in advance.

This MOU may be amended by the mutual written consent of all parties.

### 3. Confidentiality

WestEd and its contractors agree to preserve the anonymity and confidentiality of all data involved in the study.

Provide online training and access to the Quantum Chemistry Tutors to the teachers in the treatment group free of cost during the two-year study. Training and access to the Tutors (for one year) will be provided to the control teachers after the study is completed.

Provide a stipend totaling \$1,100 to the teachers in the control group over the course of the two-year study, and provide a stipend totaling \$1,800 to the teachers in the treatment group over the course of the two-year study.

Facilitate the recruitment of teachers for the purposes of the study; teachers will be recruited only if they have at least two full years of teaching experience, are credentialed to teach chemistry, and are assigned to one or more non-AP general chemistry classes. Students will need to have access (in school or off campus) to the Internet and to computers that meet the Quantum Chemistry Tutors requirements.

Provide WestEd researchers with California State Chemistry Standardized Test scores—for all students in both the treatment and the control group.

Provide WestEd researchers with the most recent data on student prior performance on state tests in mathematics and reading—for all students in both the treatment and the control group.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

As part of the 2009-10 State Budget Act, funding was continued for districts that chose to participate in Class Size Reduction (CSR) in the primary grades. This funding was placed into the Tier III category for state program funding, and the utilization of the funding is flexible. In order to access State funds for the program, Districts must file an application with the California Department of Education (CDE) and the CUSD Board of Trustees must certify by resolution that it will comply with the State rules and regulations established for the program.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATION**

This agenda item pertains to approval of Resolution No. 0910-31, certifying that the Board of Trustees will follow the rules and regulations established by the California Department of Education in the Class Size Reduction Program as listed in the resolution (Exhibit A).

Attached as Exhibit B is the Class Size Reduction Program Application. Upon approval of the resolution and application by the Board of Trustees, the Superintendent will execute the application, which will be transmitted to the California Department of Education prior to October 26, 2009.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

As noted in the application, the incentive funding for the Class Size Reduction Operations Program will generate approximately \$8.6 million in revenue. The State adjusts the funding to the actual participating enrollment in June 2010.

#### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is respectfully recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt Resolution No. 0910-31 certifying District participation in the Class Size Reduction Program and certifying their intent to comply with all rules and regulations established by the California Department of Education.

It is further recommended that the Board authorize the Superintendent to sign the Class Size Reduction Application form and transmit the form to the California Department of Education prior to October 26, 2009.

WHEREAS, Education Code sections 52120, et. seq., established the Class Size Reduction Program for the purpose of allowing school districts that maintain any kindergarten or any of grades 1 through 3 to apply to the Superintendent of Public Instruction for an apportionment to implement a class size reduction program; and

WHEREAS, Education Code section 52122 requires an application for operational funding for the 2009-10 school year to be submitted by a school district to the Superintendent of Public Instruction; and

WHEREAS, the Capistrano Unified School District wishes to participate in the Class Size Reduction Program and to obtain operational funding for the program; and

WHEREAS, the Capistrano Unified School District has submitted or will submit forthwith to the Superintendent of Public Instruction by October 26, 2009, an application for operational funds pursuant to the Class Size Reduction Program contained in Education Code sections 52120, et.seq.; and

WHEREAS, this Governing Board has reviewed the District's 2009-10 Class Size Reduction Program K-3 Application Form (Rev. 7/09); and

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED, ORDERED AND DECLARED that the Governing Board of the Capistrano Unified School District hereby certifies that the following statements are true and accurate:

- 1. The number of classes listed on the application under either Option One or Option Two in each eligible grade level are identified.
- 2. The pupil counts listed in column 3 ("Number of enrolled pupils") on the application do not include special education pupils enrolled in special day classes full time, pupils enrolled in independent study, or charter school pupils enrolled in a home-study program for the full regular school day. Pupil counts listed in column 3 are not greater than enrollment as of October of the previous calendar year.
  - 3. A certificated teacher has been/will be hired by this District and is providing/will provide direct instructional services to each class participating in the Class Size Reduction Program. It is the intent of this District that each such certificated teacher will provide direct instructional services to each pupil enrolled in the separate class to which the teacher is assigned.
  - 4. As part of its Class Size Reduction Program, this District has implemented a staff development program for any teacher who participates in the Class Size Reduction Program and provides direct instructional services for reduced-size classes in this program as specified in certification #3. Appropriate training to maximize the educational advantages of class size reduction will be provided to such teachers. This training shall include, but not be limited to, methods for providing each of the following: (1) individualized instruction, (2) effective teaching, including classroom management in smaller classes, (3) identifying and responding to pupil needs, and (4) opportunities to build on the individual strengths of pupils.

- 5. This District will collect and maintain data required by the Superintendent of Public Instruction for evaluation of the Class Size Reduction Program. - 6. Priority for reducing class size is/will be according to the following order at each school site:
  - a. If only one grade level, the grade level will be 1<sup>st</sup> grade.
  - b. If only two grade levels, the grade levels will be  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  grades.
  - c. If three to four grade levels, the grade levels will be 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> and then any combination of kindergarten and/or 3<sup>rd</sup> grade.

# **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

In accordance with Education Code Section 45117, classified employees may be laid off due to a bona fide reduction, elimination of a service being performed, or lack of funds, Exhibit A. The process considers length of service (e.g., seniority) and any other higher classifications, with no skipping permitted for special expertise.

Classified employees must be given a forty-five (45) day notice prior to the effective date of any layoff. Individuals laid off shall be eligible for reemployment rights for a period of 39 months pursuant to Education Code Section 45298, Exhibit B.

In May 2009, Resolution 0809-53 eliminated classified positions to address general fund and categorical reductions. After the Board approved the 2009/10 budget on June 24, 2009, sites have continued to experience additional funding shortfalls. In an effort to maximize material and human resources, sites have had to relook at funding personnel.

Three sites have had to eliminate personnel (School Clerk I) from their site budgets for the 2009/10 school year.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

This agenda item proposes for Board consideration the reduction or discontinuance of particular kinds of service/program as identified in Resolution No. 0910-32, Exhibit C.

# **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

### **CALIFORNIA EDUCATION CODE**

# 45117. Notice of Layoff Due to Expiration of Specially Funded Program or Bona Fide Reduction or Elimination of Service

(a) When, as a result of the expiration of a specially funded program, classified positions must be eliminated at the end of any school year, and classified employees will be subject to layoff for lack of funds, the employees to be laid off at the end of the school year shall be given written notice on or before April 29 informing them of their layoff effective at the end of the school year and of their displacement rights, if any, and reemployment rights. However, if the termination date of any specially funded program is other than June 30, the notice shall be given not less than 45 days prior to the effective date of their layoff.

(b) When, as a result of a bona fide reduction or elimination of the service being performed by any department, classified employees shall be subject to layoff for lack of work, affected employees shall be given notice of layoff not less than 45 days prior to the effective date of layoff, and informed of their displacement rights, if any, and reemployment rights.

(c) (1) A classified employee may not be laid off if a short-term employee is retained to render a service that the classified employee is qualified to render. This subdivision does not create a 45-day layoff notice requirement for any individual hired as a short-term employee, as defined in Section 45103, for a period not exceeding 45 days.

(2) This subdivision does not apply to the retention of a shortterm employee, as defined in Section 45103, who is hired for a period not exceeding 45 days after which the short-term service may not be extended or renewed.

(d) This section does not preclude the governing board of a school district from implementing either of the following actions without providing the notice required by subdivision (a) or (b):

(1) A layoff for a lack of funds in the event of an actual and existing financial inability to pay the salaries of classified employees.

(2) A layoff for a lack of work resulting from causes not foreseeable or preventable by the governing board.

(e) This section shall apply to districts that have adopted the merit system in the same manner and effect as if it were a part of Article 6 (commencing with Section 45240).

## **CALIFORNIA EDUCATION CODE**

# 45298. Reemployment and Promotional Examination Preference of Persons Laid Off; Voluntary Demotions or Reductions in Time

Persons laid off because of lack of work or lack of funds are eligible to reemployment for a period of 39 months and shall be reemployed in preference to new applicants. In addition, such persons laid off have the right to participate in promotional examinations within the district during the period of 39 months.

Employees who take voluntary demotions or voluntary reductions in assigned time in lieu of layoff or to remain in their present positions rather than be reclassified or reassigned, shall be granted the same rights as persons laid off and shall retain eligibility to be considered for reemployment for an additional period of up to 24 months; provided, that the same tests of fitness under which they qualified for appointment to the class shall still apply. The personnel commission shall make the determination of the specific period eligibility for reemployment on a class-by-class basis.

Employees who take voluntary demotions or voluntary reductions in assigned time in lieu of layoff shall be, at the option of the employee, returned to a position in their former class or to positions with increased assigned time as vacancies become available, and without limitation of time, but if there is a valid reemployment list they shall be ranked on that list in accordance with their proper seniority.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Districts may assign a teacher with a credential in a subject other than physical education to coach a competitive sport and award P.E. credit to students in that class. State law requires that such teachers be full-time employees of the school district, complete a minimum of 20 hours of first aid instruction, have training on the harmful effects of steroid use, and be approved by the governing board.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

The purpose of this agenda item is to request approval by the Board of Trustees for teachers who are credentialed in subjects other than physical education to provide P.E. credit to students in that respective sport.

It has been determined that all teachers who do not hold a P.E. credential, but are assigned coaching activities for which such credit is given, are full-time employees of the school district and have completed CPR and first aid instruction. Additionally, these coaches have attended or are in the process of attending a training program based on the Victory With Honor curriculum, which includes discussion on the dangerous effects of steroids. Therefore, it is now appropriate for the Board of Trustees to approve those teachers so assigned, Exhibit A.

### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Coaching stipends are provided for in the 2009-10 budget.

## **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is respectfully recommended the Board of Trustees authorize the appropriate teachers to coach a competitive sport for one period per day and provide P.E. credit to the students enrolled in the class, Exhibit A.

# AGREEMENT FOR CLINICAL PRACTICUM AND/OR INTERNSHIP/EXTERNSHIP EDUCATION

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into by and between the Arizona Board of Regents for and on behalf of Northern Arizona University, College of Health and Human Services located in Flagstaff, Arizona, hereinafter referred to as the "PROGRAM", and Capistrano Unified School District, hereinafter referred to as the "FACILITY", located in SAN JUAN CAPISTRANO, CA, for the purpose of providing clinical practicum and/or internship/externship education to university students. This agreement shall be effective 9/14/2009 through 9/13/2014 and may be automatically renewed until terminated.

It is agreed by the aforesaid parties to be of mutual interest and advantage for selected students, hereinafter referred to as "STUDENT/S", of the PROGRAM to be provided quality clinical practicum and/or internship/externship education experiences at the FACILITY. A clinical practicum and/or internship/externship education experience is defined as any assigned clinical, internship, externship, or educational experience that is part of a PROGRAM prescribed curriculum.

# I. MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. PROGRAM and FACILITY shall each designate a Clinical Education Coordinator to be the liaison representative to each other for implementation of this agreement and agree to notify the other within 14 days of any change in their designated representative.
- B. The FACILITY agrees to accept STUDENTS selected by the PROGRAM for clinical practicum and/or internship/externship experiences. The nature and timeframe of the experiences shall be individually arranged and approved by the Clinical Education Coordinators for the FACILITY and the PROGRAM.
- C. The number of STUDENTS assigned to the FACILITY and the dates of rotation shall be mutually agreed upon, and shall be subject to the availability of the FACILITY'S personnel for teaching and supervision.
- D. FACILITY has determined that it is a Covered Entity under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) of 1996. STUDENTS shall function as part of the FACILITY'S "workforce" as defined in 45 CFR §160.103 and shall be subject to the HIPAA policies and procedures of the FACILITY. FACILITY shall be responsible for providing the assigned STUDENTS with the appropriate training in

their HIPAA policies and procedures. PROGRAM shall insure that the assigned STUDENTS are familiar with HIPAA prior to their assignment to the FACILITY.

- E. Except as set forth in paragraph D above, no provision of this Agreement shall be deemed to constitute PROGRAM, or any agent or employee of PROGRAM, as an agent or employee of FACILITY. Neither PROGRAM nor FACILITY personnel shall, by virtue of this Agreement, is entitled or eligible by reason of the contractual relationship hereby created to participate in any benefits or privileges given or extended by either party to its employees. The PROGRAM and FACILITY do not consider the STUDENT an employee of the FACILITY for liability or Workers' Compensation purposes, but a student in the clinical practicum and/or internship/externship education phase of the STUDENT'S professional development.
- F. Program and Facility agree to comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local laws, including those prohibiting discrimination.
- G. The policies, rules, and regulations of the FACILITY shall be applicable to the STUDENTS. FACILITY shall inform STUDENTS of their policies, rules, and regulations at the initiation of the clinical practicum and/or internship/externship. PROGRAM shall inform its STUDENTS of their responsibility to comply with the law as well the policies, rules, and regulations of FACILITY, including those regarding the confidentiality of protected health information or other confidential information pertaining to client and patient records.
- H. Neither the FACILITY nor PROGRAM shall use the name of the other party or its employees in any publicity or advertising material without prior written approval by a duly authorized representative of the other party.

# II. **PROGRAM RESPONSIBILITIES**

The PROGRAM shall:

- A. Give FACILITY at least thirty (30) days notice of a STUDENT assignment unless this notice is specifically waived by the FACILITY by agreeing to this at less than 30 days.
- B. Reserve the right to revoke any assignment prior to the STUDENT'S entry into the clinical practicum and/or internship/externship program of the FACILITY.
- C. Forward to the FACILITY a summary of the STUDENT'S training and experience which shall include at least information on the STUDENT'S general education and good academic standing.

- D. Contact or visit the FACILITY for the purpose of monitoring student progress and performance and facilitating information exchange between the PROGRAM, FACILITY, and STUDENTS.
- E. Reserve the right to withdraw any STUDENT from assigned clinical practicum and/or internship/externship rotation at the FACILITY when, in the PROGRAM'S judgment, the clinical practicum and/or internship/externship experiences do not meet the needs of the STUDENT.
- F. Assure personal professional liability insurance coverage by the STUDENT and/or the Risk Management Division, Arizona Department of Administration, for each STUDENT assigned to the FACILITY. Upon request, a certificate of insurance will be furnished to the FACILITY indicating effective coverage and liability limits.
- G. Provide FACILITY with a statement of expectations and objectives of curricular and clinical education, upon request.
- H. Insure that STUDENTS review and understand their responsibilities under this Agreement as outlined in Appendix A.

# III. FACILITY RESPONSIBILITIES

The FACILITY shall:

- A. Provide clinical practicum and/or internship/externship experiences as stated in the objectives of the PROGRAM and FACILITY, and supervision appropriate to the academic and clinical level of the assigned STUDENT.
- B. Provide appropriate orientation and information regarding the policies, rules and regulations of the FACILITY to incoming STUDENTS.
- C. Make available the physical facilities and other equipment necessary to support the clinical practicum and/or internship/externship experiences.
- D. For facilities with multiple sites, provide appropriate orientation material to aid STUDENTS and PROGRAM in selecting a specific site, including a statement of the objectives of each of the sites in the FACILITY'S Clinical Education Program.
- E. Retain primary responsibility for its patients.
- F. Provide STUDENT with added assistance in the form of: n/a.
- G. Complete forms requested by the PROGRAM, such as General Information Form, Student Evaluation Report, etc.

- H. Request the PROGRAM to immediately withdraw a STUDENT from assigned clinical practicum and/or internship/extenship experience when the STUDENT'S performance is unsatisfactory or the STUDENT'S behavior is disruptive or detrimental to the FACILITY and/or violates the Code of Ethics of the discipline, or FACILITY regulations, policies or procedures.
- I. Provide and/or facilitate emergency care for STUDENT; STUDENT shall be responsible for the cost of said emergency care.

# IV. GENERAL AGREEMENT

A. Any notice required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed given if delivered in person or three days after mailing by United States registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, and addressed as follows:

- B. All books, accounts, reports, files and other records relating to this Agreement shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection by PROGRAM or FACILITY or their agents for five (5) years after completion of this Agreement. Any person(s) reviewing documents shall execute a HIPAA and/or other nondisclosure agreement to protect the confidentiality of protected health information or other confidential information pertaining to client, patient, or student records.
- C. PROGRAM shall maintain adequate insurance to cover any liability arising from the acts and omissions of PROGRAM'S agents and employees arising out of the performance of this Agreement. PROGRAM shall not be responsible for maintaining insurance coverage for liability arising from the acts and omissions of FACILITY'S employee's or agents. FACILITY shall maintain adequate insurance to cover any liability arising from the acts and omissions of FACILITY'S employees or agents arising out of the performance of this Agreement. FACILITY'S employees or agents arising out of the performance of this Agreement. FACILITY shall not be responsible for maintaining insurance to cover liability arising from the acts and omissions of employees of PROGRAM.

- D. The parties agree that either party may terminate this Agreement at any time upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, except that any STUDENT already assigned to and accepted by the FACILITY shall be allowed to complete any in-progress clinical practicum and/or internship/externship assignment at the FACILITY.
- E. The parties agree that this agreement may be cancelled for conflict of interest in accordance with Arizona Revised Statutes §38-511.
- F. This agreement constitutes the entire agreement between PROGRAM and FACILITY. Any changes or modifications shall be accomplished by amendment to this agreement executed by the duly authorized representatives of the parties.

# **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

California's comprehensive accountability system monitors the academic achievement of all the state's public schools, including charter schools, and local educational agencies (LEAs) that serve students in kindergarten through grade twelve. This accountability system is based on state requirements, established by the Public Schools Accountability Act (PSAA) of 1999, and on federal requirements, established by the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001.

The California Department of Education (CDE) reports both state and federal accountability results under the general state-heading of the "Accountability Progress Reporting" (APR) system. State-required reports include Base and Growth Academic Performance Index (API) results. Federal-required reports include Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) and Program Improvement (PI) results. These reports were released on September 15, 2009.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

This agenda item provides to the Board for its consideration a summary of the 2009 Annual Progress Report.

 SUBJECT: APPROVAL: INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE PROGRAM AT HANKEY K-8

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

In February 1997, the Board gave conceptual approval of the International Baccalaureate program for San Clemente High School and Shorecliffs Middle School.

Founded in the 1960s, the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO) grew out of international school efforts to establish a common curriculum and university entry credit for geographically mobile students across the globe. At that time, international educators were also motivated by an idealistic vision. They hoped that a shared academic experience emphasizing critical thinking and providing students exposure to a variety of viewpoints would foster tolerance and inter-cultural understanding among young people of the world. The program was designed to be concentrated in the last two years of secondary education in order to build a comprehensive curriculum—leading to a "baccalaureate"—that could be administered in any country and recognized by universities in every country.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

This agenda item presents for Board approval an International Baccalaureate Program at Carl Hankey K-8 School beginning in October 2009 for Grades 6-8 and in January 2010 for Grades K-5.

#### Middle Years Program

The Middle Years Program (MYP) is designed for students in the 11-16 age range and can be offered in any language. It is a complete and coherent program that provides a framework of academic challenge and life skills appropriate to this age group. Because the educational philosophy and styles of teaching and learning are consistent, the five-year curriculum for Grades 6-10 serves as excellent preparation for successful participation in an IB program. However, completion of the MYP is not a prerequisite for the IBO Diploma Program. Schools may subscribe to one or the other or both.

The MYP offers an educational approach that embraces yet transcends traditional school subjects. While insisting upon thorough study of the various disciplines, MYP accentuates the

interrelatedness of the disciplines and advances a holistic view of knowledge. Students are encouraged to develop intercultural awareness along with a genuine understanding of their own history and traditions. In stressing communication, the MYP places fundamental importance on achieving firm command of one's own language and on the acquisition of a conversational proficiency in a foreign language.

#### **Primary Years Program**

The Primary Years Program (PYP) is a transdisciplinary program of international education designed to foster the development of the whole child. It is designed for students aged 3 to 12 and focuses on the total growth of the developing child, touching hearts as well as minds and encompassing social, physical, emotional and cultural needs in addition to academic development.

The PYP draws on research and best practice from a range of national systems with a wealth of knowledge and experience from international schools to create a relevant, engaging, challenging and significant educational framework for all children. Curriculum documents are published in English, French, and Spanish but schools may offer the program in other languages under certain conditions.

## FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

The cost of participation in the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program is outlined in Exhibit A. The costs will be met through a combination of EIA, Fundraiser, and GIFT funds. There will be no cost to the general fund.

## **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is respectfully requested that Board President Ellen Addonizio recognize Gail Richards Interim Assistant Superintendent, Secondary Education, who will then introduce Principal Scott Wilbur who will give a presentation to assist Trustees in their understanding of the Middle Years Program slated for Carl Hankey K-8.

At the conclusion of the discussion, it is respectfully recommended that the Board approve the implementation of an International Baccalaureate Diploma Program at Carl Hankey K-8 beginning in October 2009 for Grades 6-8 and in January 2010 for Grades K-5.

SUBJECT:	REINSTATEMENT OF PROGRAMS/SERVICES: CERTIFICATED - MANAGEMENT PERSONNEL

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

On March 9, 2009, the Board of Trustees adopted Resolution Number 0809-52, to authorize the layoff of certificated management. This resolution was prepared in order to create maximum flexibility in the budget development process for Fiscal Year 2009/10. With the adoption of that resolution, 62.7 certificated managers received layoff notices.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

On April 13, 2009 the Board directed staff to work with School Services of California (SSC) to assist the district in reviewing all categorically funded positions and identifying job functions that could be streamlined and/or eliminated. The district continues to utilize report findings as it finalizes a reorganization plan aligned with the recommendations of School Services.

Keeping the above in mind, providing leadership and direction to school personnel is a critical function of district office staff. Management personnel assist schools and departments to remain in compliance with state and federal mandates. Staff also provides expertise to advise, counsel, direct and give site administration and staff members necessary knowledge to offer students quality instruction. In an effort to maximize human and material resources, duties from the former Director VI, Instructional Support and Interventions position and the Coordinator, Literacy and Instructional Materials have been combined into a new position, Director VI, Curriculum and Instructional Support, Exhibit A. In order to provide these services, it is necessary to approve the newly created Director VI, Curriculum and Instructional Support position.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The estimated cost to reinstate this position including benefits is \$150,171 (actual costs after furlough days/pay cut is \$136,500). This certificated management position was budgeted for the 2009-2010 school year from categorical funds. The funding breakdown will be 50% from Title I funds, 30% from Homeless funds, and 20% from School Improvement Program (SIP) funds.

#### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is respectfully requested that Board President Ellen Addonizio recognize Assistant Superintendent, Personnel Services, Jodee Brentlinger, who will introduce this item and be available for Trustee questions. Following the discussion, it is recommended the Board of Trustees ratify the position of Director VI, Curriculum and Instructional Support.

## DIRECTOR VI, CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT

#### DEFINITION

Under the direction of the Executive Director, Elementary and Secondary Support, coordinate English Learner programs for K-12 students; support curriculum and instruction activities designed to close the achievement gap, supervise library/media operations and textbook adoptions.

## **EXAMPLES OF DUTIES**

- Facilitate the development and implementation of curriculum and effective instructional support for all students.
- Facilitate best practices in differentiation of English Learner (EL) development.
- Assist in the research, review, and selection of supplemental materials.
- Collect and analyze data to improve student outcomes for low achieving learners.
- Complete appropriate grant applications; assure compliance with existing grant provisions for EL student programs.
- Supervise Indian Education, Migrant Education, EIA, ELAP, Two-Way Immersion, McKinney-Vento Homeless Program and the Language Assessment Center.
- Collaborate with internal and external agencies to assist English Learners and their families.
- Meet with parent, district ELAC and teacher advisory groups to resolve issues and strengthen instructional delivery models.
- Assist with the coordination and implementation of instructional initiatives such as, textbook adoption, assessment and reporting, and curriculum design.
- Works in conjunction with the appropriate Executive Director to develop, update, and renew the District Library Plan including site-based plans at the elementary, middle and high school levels.
- Supervise, evaluate, train and conduct regular meetings for library personnel.
- Designs literacy curriculum and training for hourly supplemental programs including after school and summer school programs.
- Establishes guidelines and procedures for the training of library volunteers.
- Acts as a liaison between library staff and PTA organizations to ensure continuity in library media center operations.
- Meets with the appropriate Executive Director to ensure instructional support for school sites.
- Collaborate with colleagues in the Reading Department and the Instructional Media Center to facilitate and support best practices in literacy and materials selection.
- Serves on the Instructional Materials Review Committee to assist in the selection, approval, and adoption of district K-12 textbook and instructional materials.
- Perform other duties as assigned.

 SUBJECT: REGIONAL OCCUPATIONAL PROGRAM (ROP) PASS-THROUGH OF AMERICAN RECOVERY AND REINVESTMENT ACT (AARA) REVENUE

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

For the 2008/09 and 2009/10 budget years, the state divided categorical programs into three tiers. Those programs contained in Tier III were cut 19.84% by the state over fiscal years 2008/09 and 2009/10. Districts were granted full spending flexibility such that they could treat remaining program revenue the same as unrestricted general fund dollars. In addition, program revenue as well as balances in these Tier III programs could be swept into the general fund. Regional Occupational Programs (ROP) are one of those categorical programs that the state placed in Tier III.

CUSD participates in a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) ROP with Laguna Beach USD called Capistrano Laguna Beach ROP. The Capistrano Laguna Beach ROP is a separate Local Education Authority, meaning they are allocated funding directly from the state. Not all ROPs are JPAs; some ROPs are operated within districts.

When the federal government provided the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) Fiscal Stabilization Funds to the state for distribution to local school districts, the California Department of Education (CDE) distributed this money based on a formula to backfill the cuts that were made to the categorical programs. For CUSD, the amount allocated to ROP was \$504K. However, because the ROP is located in Tier III, there is no obligation to pass this money on to the ROP. CUSD took full advantage of this flexibility and captured the entire \$504K. Now that the state has distributed ARRA money, and because it was allocated based on the categorical cuts, ROP has asked for the \$504K from CUSD.

Staff met with Rick Bogart, CEO of the Capistrano-Laguna Beach ROP, during August and followed up again with him via telephone September 28. During those discussions, Dr. Bogart explained that ROP managed their 19.84% cut through a 10% salary reduction and by drawing down their reserves. Dr. Bogart has discussed this issue with the ROP Board of Trustees and they have taken the position that 100% of the funds should be passed through to the ROP program. ROP has had to reduce the level of program service as a consequence of the above mentioned budget reductions. In planning for the scenario where all of this money could potentially be passed through to ROP, staff accounted for the entire amount and included it as reduction to revenue in the budget adjustment that was made in conjunction with the approval of the unaudited actuals on September 15.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Staff is presenting this issue to the Board of Trustees for review and consideration. Specifically the decision is whether or not to pass through \$504K in ARRA Fiscal Stabilization Funds to ROP. The District is under no obligation to do so and there is no consistent manner of handling this particular issue throughout the state. Some districts are keeping the money and others are passing it through. In this particular case, ROP is a separate agency from CUSD and Laguna Beach USD. A compelling argument can be made for passing the money through, given that the ROP program is not under the governing authority of CUSD. In addition, Laguna Beach USD passed through its portion of the ARRA Fiscal Stabilization Funds identified for ROP (\$20K).

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Approval of this item will reduce the District's General Fund by \$504K.

## **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is respectfully recommended Board President Ellen Addonizio recognize Ron Lebs, Deputy Superintendent, Business & Support Services, who will present this item. Following the discussion it is recommended the Board of Trustees direct staff regarding the potential pass through of \$504K of ARRA Fiscal Stabilization Funds to the Capistrano-Laguna Beach ROP.

SUBJECT: BUSINESS SERVICES DIVISION REORGANIZATION PLAN

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

During the past several months, staff has been working on an organization-wide reorganization plan. The impetus for this reorganization can be primarily found in the need to streamline district administration and operations in the face of layoffs, reductions in state funding over the past two years, and anticipated reductions in the coming years.

One of the first formal steps in the reorganization process started with reductions to all three divisions (Education, Business and Personnel) that were approved by the Board on April 13, 2009 as part of the \$25M budget reductions that were made for the 2009/10 fiscal year. These reductions were summed by division and shown as line items on the budget reduction spreadsheet approved by the Board. Staffs from all three divisions have continued to work on the project and with the hiring of Interim Superintendent Mahler, as well as other key individuals, a cohesive plan is being developed. The magnitude of an organization-wide reorganization is such that it cannot be accomplished all at once. Staff is proposing to bring this to the Board incrementally over the next several months.

The first wave of this reorganization plan presented for consideration and approval involves the Business Services Division. Actual work on the Business Services Division reorganization began in the latter part of 2008 and was subsequently formulated, vetted, and discussed among staff, and revised multiple times since it began to take shape after the first of the year. Initial reductions to the Business Services Division totaling approximately \$866K were approved by the Board on April 13, 2009, as stated above. The staffing reductions approved by the Board were comprised primarily of laid-off classified positions.

Reorganization plans for the other two divisions (Personnel and Education Services) are in process. It is anticipated that these plans will be brought forward to the Board for consideration during fiscal year 2009/10 with the complete plan having been presented to the Board for approval prior to or concurrent with the 2010/11 budget development so that reorganization changes can be incorporated into the budget document.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATION**

#### Background

The Business Services Division is comprised of eleven departments:

- 1. Accounting
- 2. Budget
- 3. Payroll
- 4. Facilities
- 5. Facilities Planning
- 6. Construction
- 7. Maintenance, Operations and Grounds
- 8. Food and Nutrition Services
- 9. Purchasing, Graphics & Warehouse
- 10. Transportation

Propose consolidating Facilities, Facilities Planning, Construction, and Maintenance Operations and Grounds under one director entitled Executive Director, Facilities and Plant Operations (F&PO)

11. Technology and Information Services (Transferred to the Business Division 7/1/09 from Education Services)

While there aren't necessarily distinct lines defining each of these departments, the functions performed within each department do exist. Functions tend to shift from time to time as the organization expands and, most recently, contracts. This contraction of the organization in the face of budget cuts poses a significant challenge for those members of the management team who remain, not only to identify what functions were being performed by laid-off employees, but also to absorb those functions into existing positions and, where appropriate, abandon functions and tasks that no longer need to be performed.

The recommendations presented herein attempt to more efficiently distribute and consolidate these remaining functions and responsibilities into fewer positions by establishing positions based on functional need. The goal of the organization is to provide a more efficient, streamlined, smaller and responsive school district with better communication, easier access, and greater transparency.

There following attachments are included as back-up for Trustee review and consideration:

- Business and Support Services Division Organization Charts (Exhibit A)
- Business & Support Services Reorganization Savings Calculation (Exhibit B)

## **Discussion of Proposed Changes**

There are six types of changes proposed with this reorganization plan:

- 1. New Positions To be filled in 2009/10
- 2. Proposed Positions To be filled at a future date
- 3. Restructured Positions A change in job duties and/or job description
- 4. Reporting Change A change of supervisor or lines of reporting only

- 5. Eliminated Positions Position either eliminated or recommended for elimination
- 6. Rescind Layoff Recommend rescinding a laid-off position.

Each type of change is represented by a different color on the organization chart for ease of identification and is discussed below.

#### New Positions (Light Green)

Eight new positions are recommended:

Supervisor IV, Custodial Services (F&PO) - Currently Alex Malfavon, Manager I, Maintenance & Operations, oversees over 150 district custodial positions. The majority of these positions are night custodians. The Supervisor IV, Custodial Services, position is proposed in order to provide oversight and supervision to the night custodians. Of all the changes proposed within this reorganization plan, the establishment of this position is of the highest priority due to the lack of direct oversight of night custodians.

Lock Smith Assistant (F&PO) - The district has only one locksmith and work orders related to locksmith work are by far the most backed up of all the trades--so much so that it is difficult for the locksmith to perform much work other than emergency repairs. For this reason, the new position of locksmith assistant is recommended.

Supervisor IV, Elementary School; Supervisor IV, Middle School; and Supervisor IV, High School (Food & Nutrition Services) – These three positions are proposed as replacements for four Supervisor II Food Service Operations positions that are to be eliminated (see below). Consolidation of the four existing positions into three allows for reconfiguration of the existing structure into the more logical division by type of school.

Supervisor IV, Transp. Safety & Training (Trans.) - The retiring Manager III provided oversight to the Safety and Training Department consisting of two supervisors, one state certified trainer, and four behind-the-wheel trainers. This department requires a point of authority for smooth operations. The scheduling and development of curriculum for original and renewal classes, behind-the-wheel training, first-aid classes, ongoing monthly training, as well as maintenance of driver records and overall oversight and evaluation of all drivers, is the function of this department. By upgrading a Supervisor III to Supervisor IV, the district will maintain a cohesive structure within the Safety and Training Department with minimal cost.

Supervisor I, Safety and Training (Trans.) - By upgrading the State Certified Trainer to a low level management position, the district will increase its ability to do ride-along evaluations of our drivers without adding significant cost. The current State Certified Trainer position is limited by the fact that this position, being in the bargaining unit, cannot perform evaluations and directly supervise drivers. This upgrade will resolve that issue and maintain the number of management positions in the department with minimal cost.

Supervisor V, Vehicle Maintenance/Dispatch (Trans.) - With the elimination of one manager, the remaining manager will be hard pressed to oversee all routing and planning, bus pass office, Safety and Training Department, along with the day-today operation of Dispatch. Dispatch was originally one-half of the primary responsibility of one manager. The Vehicle Maintenance Supervisor has been assisting in Dispatch this past year; by assuming the direct oversight along with vehicle maintenance, we eliminate the need for an additional position.

Trip Dispatcher (Trans.) - During the 2008/09 Transportation Department reductions, the cut that impacted the department the most was the elimination of a dispatcher. The original elimination of this position was predicated on an anticipated reduction of field trips and a reduction of demands on the Dispatch Department. In reality that did not occur. In fact, the reduction in driver positions impacted Dispatch negatively by reducing the number of available assets to draw from to cover work efficiently. The purpose of this position is to ensure athletic and field trips are performed correctly and economically. This position will be funded out of athletic transportation fees collected and should not have an impact to the general fund.

Executive Director I, Technology and Information Services (TIS) – The Chief Information Officer (CIO) position was eliminated in the April 13 budget reductions. This position was responsible for oversight of the TIS Department. It is proposed that the eliminated CIO position be replaced with a new position titled Executive Director I, Technology and Information Services. It is further proposed that Susan Holliday be appointed to the position. Susan's current position (Director VI Technology & Information Services, which is grant funded) will be left open pending identification of a funding source. Funding from her current position is being used to backfill the cost of a critical technology resource teacher position whose grant funding source expired at the end of 2008/09. The Executive Director I, Technology and Information Services position will head the department and report to the Deputy Superintendent, Business Services. This reporting change took place on July 1, 2009, when the TIS Department was moved from the Education Services Division to the Business Services Division. #### Proposed Positions (Yellow)

Staff is recommending the addition of three management positions pending identification of an appropriate funding source.

Executive Director, Facilities and Plant Operations (F&PO) – With the merging of Facilities, Construction, Maintenance/Operations and Grounds into one department, consolidated leadership is needed. In the past these functions were performed by independent managers who didn't always coordinate efforts. Consolidation helps create better channels of communication, accountability, and information flow within these disciplines. Of the number of positions that have been eliminated over the past few years, direct facilities oversight is of the highest priority to reinstate. Establishment of this position helps to fill the gap created buy the loss of four separate key management positions in the Facilities Department of the past several years.

Manager I, Building Trades (F&PO) – This position was originally going to be proposed for addition in 2009/10 but it was decided to hold off as we transition Director I, Construction, John Forney, to his new role as Director I, Maintenance & Operations. See "Restructured Position" below. We could very well need this position within the next six months, but would like to hold off for the time being.

Programmer/Analyst (TIS) – With the district focus on improving information systems and technology to support the efficiency and effectiveness of the organization, the future need of an additional programmer to streamline and merge information systems is apparent. With district information systems currently existing in silos, there is a need to have these systems integrated to a Data Warehouse-like environment. The Data Warehouse will make all critical district data available in a standard form for rapid inquiry, analysis, and reporting. When pursued, this objective will require additional programming staff.

Three positions in the Transportation Department are being considered; these will be funded 100% by Saddleback USD.

Manager I (Trans.) - This position is currently under negotiation with Saddleback USD and would be 100% paid by Saddleback USD. This position will be domiciled at the Saddleback Valley Transportation office and provide routing and oversight of that operation.

Dispatcher, 2 positions (Trans.) - These positions are currently under negotiation with Saddleback USD and would be 100% paid by Saddleback USD. These positions will be domiciled at the Saddleback Valley Transportation office and provide routing and oversight of that operation.

#### Restructured Positions (Blue)

Ten positions are proposed for restructuring:

Manager IV, Budget (Budget) – The primary responsibility of this current position is budget development and oversight of the Budget Department. It is proposed to change this position into Manager IV, Budget Liaison. This would shift the focus from budget development and oversight to that of a point of contact/reference for the other divisions regarding budget and budget accountability. This would increase accountability and communication within the organization as well as provide a direct link to financial and budget information for the sites. The focus of this position would be to help the sites manage their budgets as well as act as a resource on financial matters. The budget functions currently being performed by this position will shift to the Executive Director of Fiscal Services.

Account Clerk III (Accounting) – It is recommended that one of the five Account Clerk III positions in the Accounting Department be transferred to the Facilities, Construction, Maintenance, and Operations Department. Construction budget and accounting, accounts payable processing, state recordkeeping/reporting and developer fees collection would be consolidated into the responsibilities of this position. In effect all facilities-related budget and accounting functions would be transferred from the Accounting Department to Facilities. The same work will be performed, except that it will be consolidated into one position as opposed to being spread across several positions. It also consolidates facilities functions under the Facilities Department.

Executive Director of Maintenance Operations and Transportation (Trans.) – This position was created two years ago to bridge a gap in the organization. With the restructuring of the Director I, Construction, to Director I, Maintenance & Operations, the position is no longer needed and can be "rolled back" to overseeing just Transportation. The proposed restructured position is Director IV, Transportation. With the advent of overseeing the Saddleback Unified Transportation program and the retirement of a Manager III in the Transportation Department, more focused oversight is warranted. As a side note, this position will continue to oversee the Facilities Use program. It was decided to leave this function with Director IV, Transportation, given the position's oversight of and involvement with the program this past year and anticipated work revamping the program during 2009/10.

Director I, Construction (F&PO) – With the current downturn in district construction projects, a full time director is not needed in the short term. One of the most important issues facing the Facilities, Construction, Maintenance, and Operations Department is a need for a clear cohesive vision followed by an executable plan of action. This process got underway this July with consolidation

of the construction and maintenance functions under one position. The proposed reorganization would formally recognize this change and establish the restructured position of Director I, Maintenance Operations and Construction. When construction ramps up again, the position of the Director I, Construction, can be separated from Maintenance and Operations and be reinstated if appropriate. It is recommended the Director I, Construction, position be held vacant and unbudgeted, as opposed to eliminated.

Manager III, Energy/Safety (F&PO) – This position is being proposed to change from Manager III, Energy/Safety, to Manager III, Deferred Maintenance & Safety. The focus of this new position will be to develop a comprehensive data base of each school campus to catalog and inventory things such as HVAC equipment, roofing, carpet, paint, lighting, etc. Where the Facilities Master Plan prepared by the architects looks at the macro picture, this position will focus on the individual systems and specific components that make up the facilities. This information will be used to develop and then execute the deferred maintenance plan as well as general maintenance by prioritizing these systems across the district.

Manager III, Building Trades (F&PO) – This position was overseeing the Maintenance crews during 2008/09. For 2009/10 it was converted to Manager III, Construction, and is primarily responsible for managing in-house as well as outsourced repair and construction projects. This position is overseeing deferred maintenance, repair and renovation projects, and projects other than those being performed in the regular course of maintenance by the various trade crews.

Buyer (Purchasing) – There is a 10 month buyer position located in the Purchasing Department. This position was initially located in the Food & Nutrition Service Department and primarily does purchasing for Food Services. Funding for the position is split 50:50 between the General Fund and the Food Services Fund. With the reduction of two assistant buyer positions in the department (see below), it is necessary to increase this position to 12 months. The proposal is simply to increase the position from 10 months to 12 months.

Staff Secretary, Construction (F&PO) – As with the Director I, Construction, the current downturn in district construction projects doesn't necessitate the need for a full-time staff secretary position supporting the Director I, Construction. Facilities Use processing which has been handled out of the Maintenance office has been shifted to this position to provide direct focus on the issue. This has freed up resources in the Maintenance Department to focus more directly on maintenance issues. This position will also provide direct support to the Director IV, Transportation, with the Facility Use process as it is revamped over the next year as mentioned above.

Manager V, Business Systems (TIS) – The primary responsibility of this current position is to manage the district business system. It is proposed to change this position into Manager V, Information Systems, and reposition it over Student

Systems support staff. This would shift the focus from supporting only the business system to all information systems including, but not limited to, Student Information Systems, Personnel Systems, and Business Systems. This would increase accountability and communication within the department as well as create an opportunity for information systems specialists to cross-train and acquire knowledge and skills to support all systems.

Account Clerk III (Food & Nutrition Service) – There are three Account Clerk III positions in the Food and Nutrition Services Department: one 10-month position, one 11-month position, and one 12-month position. Due to scheduling, vacations and work load over the summer, it is recommended to make all three positions 11-month. This will avoid the annual necessity of additional assignment hours. Costs associated with this change are negligible and will be paid from the Food Service fund.

#### Reporting Change (Pink)

Several positions are slated for supervisorial reporting changes only. They are: Director II, Food & Nutrition Services; Director II, Purchasing & Graphics; Director IV, Ed Technology; six positions in the Budget Department, and the Trainer User Support Specialist.

The Director II, Food & Nutrition Services; Director II, Purchasing & Graphics; Executive Director I, Technology and Information Services, (formerly the Director VI, Education Technology) will all report to the Deputy Superintendent, Business and Support Services. Previously the Director II, Food & Nutrition Services, and Director II, Purchasing & Graphics, reported to the Executive Director I, Fiscal Services. Six positions in the Budget Department previously reporting to the Manager IV, Budget, will now report to the Executive Director I, Fiscal Services.

The Trainer User Support Specialist (TUSS) position currently resides under Technical Services. It is proposed to shift this position under Information Systems to support and maintain the multitude of educational programs and electronic systems. With the loss of two technology resource teachers and the resultant loss of support they provided to the implementation and support of electronic learning programs and systems, the TUSS will help fill in those gaps and provide the necessary support and training on these critical learning and intervention programs.

#### Eliminated Positions (Orange)

Eliminated positions by department are listed below. The majority of these positions were included in the Board-approved April 13, 2009, budget reductions. Please see the attached spreadsheet for more information and a breakdown of the savings associated with the elimination of these positions.

Reinstated Positions (Green)

Three positions are recommended for reinstatement.

Plumber – The April 13 budget reductions included the elimination of two plumber positions. In retrospect, only one of these positions should have been eliminated. Given the workload it is recommended to reinstate this position.

Director IV, Technical Services – Because this position was vacated mid-year in 2008/09 it was included as a cut in the April 13 budget reductions and eliminated through attrition. However, in light of the reorganization, it is now recommended that this position be reinstated and the Director IV, Information Systems, be eliminated instead. The original cut did not consider the department organizational structure or functions that each position in the department performed. The position was eliminated because it was expedient and didn't involve a layoff.

> Corporation Yard Utility Person (Storekeeper) – In response to continued work load and unforeseen gaps in job duties created by the elimination of this position in the April 13 budget reductions, staff is recommending reinstatement of the Storekeeper position as a restructured position of Corporation Yard Utility Person. The current job description will be revised and modified to reflect the actual duties that this new position will be performing.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The Fiscal Impact of the proposed reorganization is an ongoing savings of approximately \$1.2M of which approximately \$866K has already been recognized and incorporated into the 2009/10 budget. The net estimated overall savings of this proposed reorganization is \$300K over what was included in the budget.

#### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is respectfully requested that Board President Ellen Addonizio recognize Deputy Superintendents Naomi Suenaka and Ron Lebs who will present the information and be available for questions. Following the presentation, it is recommended the Board provide input to staff regarding the planned reorganization in anticipation of considering approval of the plan at its November 10, 2009 meeting.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

School districts in California are required under AB 1200 to adopt budgets that demonstrate fiscal solvency for the current budget year plus two future years. The 2009/10 fiscal year budget adopted by the Board of Trustees on June 24, 2009, included budget reductions of \$25M in 2010/11 and another \$5M in 2011/12. These reductions were shown as a line item reduction without any supporting detail.

Prior to the first interim financial report, which is due December 15, the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) is requiring that districts identify specifically the reductions they intend to make for the 2010/11 fiscal year. As the budget for 2010/11 is developed in the spring, these reductions can be altered; never-the-less a list of plausible reductions will need to be turned in to OCDE along with the first interim report.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

This is the first of three scheduled discussions specifically regarding budget reductions for 2010/11. The second discussion will take place on November 10; the third discussion will take place on December 15. The December 15 discussion will include a recommendation to approve a formal list of cuts. Staff is compiling a draft list of possible budget reductions that will be presented to Trustees under separate cover at the October 13 board meeting for review and discussion.

Staff is currently developing a process to garner input from various CUSD constituent groups within the community. It is anticipated that this process will be initiated sometime this fall and carried into next spring as the budget is developed and compiled. It was felt that the various stakeholder groups should be afforded the opportunity to provide input as well as participate in the budget development process. Meetings with stakeholder groups will also provide an opportunity to open channels of communication and address questions early in the process.

If approved at a future meeting, these reductions would reduce General Fund operating expenditures by \$25M.

At the request of the Board, an update was sent to the Board of Trustees on February 9, 2009, on the progress being made to close with certification the District's outstanding applications listed on the Division of State Architect's (DSA) web site. This agenda item is a continuation of the progress being made to close out outstanding applications.

The Division of State Architect's has recently announced beginning July 2009 through June 2010, all DSA offices will be closed the first three Fridays of each month. Additionally, in response to the current fiscal conditions in California, they have stated their intent is to focus their resources on school construction projects that are fully funded.

These announcements will directly impact the District in closing out projects in a timely manner due to the District not meeting DSA close out priorities as well as DSA cutting back their work hours.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATION**

Exhibit A is a copy of the October 31, 2008 letter from the Department of General Services regarding outstanding projects not certified by Department of State Architect. Exhibit B is the Orange County Department of Education Schools Legal Service's opinion on DSA's letter. Exhibit C is an update on the progress being made to close out the outstanding applications, with the updates appearing in bold. Certification and close of file letters are also attached for Trustees review (Attachments 1 and 2).

The Division of the State Architect (DSA) requests that you inform your governing board members that they may be held personally liable for the failure of educational buildings not certified by DSA. Please have your staff contact DSA to determine which, if any, buildings are not currently certified.

Project certification is evidenced by a letter DSA issues certifying that the building project has been completed in accordance with requirements as to the safety of design and construction pursuant to Education Code §§ 17280-17316 and 81130-81147 (The Field Act).

California Education Code §§ 17315 and 81147 provide that when an educational building is constructed in accordance with approved plans and specifications, and all the proper documents have been filed, and all fees have been paid, then the building will be granted certification that it complies with the requirements of the Field Act.

Project certification is important because it provides a method of documenting that all efforts have been made to ensure the safety of educational building construction. Additionally, failure to obtain project certification can result in some serious and negative consequences: DSA will be unable to approve future proposed construction affecting or utilizing the uncertified construction and, more importantly, governing board members may be held personally liable for projects until certified. The California Education Code (§§ 17371 and 81177) shields members of a school or community college district governing board from personal liability for injury to persons or damages to property resulting from the failure of a educational building as long as the requirements of the Field Act are met (i.e., the building is certified).

In an effort to aid school and community college districts in closing all projects with certification, DSA has prepared and published on our website a project certification guide. The guide can be found at:

Re: Field Act – Liability of Board Members

We have been asked whether board members are personally liable for failure to comply with the Field Act.<sup>1</sup> The Field Act requires defined school buildings to meet stringent earthquake safety requirements.<sup>2</sup> In our opinion, in some circumstances, board members may be held personally liable if school buildings fail to comply with the building and safety standards of the Field Act. However, board members, in most cases, would be indemnified by the district for any judgment rendered against them.<sup>3</sup>

In our opinion, when school buildings comply with the building standards of the Field Act but the compliance has not been certified, board members would not be personally liable. In our view, the remedy for lack of certification is to complete the certification process.

#### **LETTER FROM DSA**

On October 31, 2008, the Department of General Services, Division of State Architect (DSA) for the State of California, sent a letter to district superintendents stating, "The Division of State Architect (DSA) requests that you inform your governing board members that they may be held personally liable for the failure of educational buildings not certified by DSA." This portion of the letter is unclear as to whether DSA is referring to lack of certification by DSA or failure to comply with the building and safety standards of the Field Act.

In addition, DSA published a Project Certification Guide on October 22, 2008, which states, "School board members may be personally liable for projects until certified."<sup>4</sup>

#### **FIELD ACT PROVISIONS**

The letter from DSA further states that California Education Code sections 17371 and 81177 shield members of the governing board of a community college district or school district from personal liability for injuries to persons or damages to property resulting from the failure of an educational building as long as the building and safety requirements of the Field Act are met.

Education Code section 17371 states in part:

"No member of the governing board of a school district shall be held personally liable for injury to persons or damage to property resulting from the fact that a school building was not constructed under the requirements of Article 3 (commencing with Section 17280) of this chapter, if such governing board complies with the provisions of this article. Such limit on liability shall commence when such governing board initiates action to comply with the provisions of Section 17367....<sup>5</sup> [Emphasis added]

Education Code section 17367 states:

"The governing board of any school district which has in use for school purposes any school buildings which were not constructed under approved plans and the supervision and inspection requirements of Article 3 (commencing with Section 17280) of this chapter shall have such buildings examined pursuant to this section and shall have completed on or before January 1, 1970, the examination, reporting and estimate requirements of this section and Section 39223.

Whenever an examination of the structural condition of any school building of a school district has been made by the Department of General Services, or by any licensed structural engineer or licensed architect for the governing board of the school district, or under the authorization of law, and a report of the examination, including the findings and recommendations of the agency or person making the examination, has been made to the governing board of the district, and the report shows that the building is unsafe for use, the governing board of the district shall immediately have prepared an estimate of the cost necessary to make such repairs to the building or buildings as are necessary, or, if necessary, to reconstruct or replace the building so that the building when repaired or reconstructed, or any building erected to replace it, shall meet such standards of structural safety as are established in accordance with law. The estimate shall be based on current costs and may include other costs to reflect modern educational needs. Also an estimate of the cost of replacement based on the standards established by the State Allocation Board for area per pupil and cost per square foot, shall be made and reported.

The report required by this section shall include a statement that each of the buildings examined is safe or unsafe for school use. For the purpose of this statement the sole consideration shall be protection of life and the prevention of personal injury at a level of safety equivalent to that established by Article 3 (commencing with Section 17280) of this chapter and the rules and regulations adopted thereunder, disregarding, insofar as possible, such building damage not jeopardizing life which would be expected from one disturbance

of nature of the intensity used for design purposes in said rules and regulations.

The governing board, utilizing the information acquired from the examination and report developed pursuant to this section, <u>shall</u> <u>establish a system of priorities for the repair</u>, <u>reconstruction</u>, <u>or</u> <u>replacement of unsafe school buildings</u>.<sup>\*6</sup> [Emphasis added]

Therefore, it appears that Sections 17367 and 17371 would limit the personal liability of board members when the governing board initiates action to establish a system of priorities for the repair, reconstruction or replacement of school buildings that do not comply with the building and safety standards of the Field Act.

Education Code section 17315 states that when a school building was constructed in accordance with plans and specifications approved by the Department of General Services, the project is completed, the notice of completion is filed, and all final verified reports and all testing and inspection documents, as required by the Field Act, are submitted to and filed with the Department of General Services, and all required fees paid by the school district, the Department of General Services shall issue a certification that the school building complies with the requirements of the Field Act. However, Section 17315(a) also states, "Nothing in this Article shall prevent beneficial occupancy by a school district prior to the issuance of this certification."<sup>7</sup>

The language of Section 17315(a) would indicate that certification is a clerical process that should be completed but should not delay occupancy of the building if the building otherwise complies with the requirements of the Field Act.<sup>8</sup> Therefore, in our opinion, the failure to complete the certification process would not give rise to civil liability but would suggest the completion of the administrative process of certification may be completed after the building is occupied.

#### PUBLIC AGENCY LIABILITY FOR DANGEROUS CONDITION ON ITS PROPERTY

A public entity is liable for injury caused by a dangerous condition of its property if the plaintiff establishes that the property was in dangerous condition at the time of the injury (e.g. failure to comply with the requirements of the Field Act), that the injury was proximately caused by the

dangerous condition, that the dangerous condition created a reasonably foreseeable risk of the kind of injury which was incurred and either:

- 1. A negligent or wrongful act or omission of an employee<sup>9</sup> of the public entity within their scope of employment created the dangerous condition; or
- 2. The public entity had actual or constructive notice of the dangerous condition under Section 835.2 a sufficient time prior to the injury to have taken measures to protect against the dangerous condition.<sup>10</sup>

Under Section 835.2, a public entity has actual notice of a dangerous condition, if it had actual knowledge of the existence of the condition and knew or should have known of its dangerous character.<sup>11</sup> A public entity had constructive notice of the dangerous condition within the meaning of Section 835(b) only if the plaintiff establishes that the condition had existed for such a period of time and it was of such an obvious nature that the public entity, in the exercise of due care, should have discovered the condition and its character.<sup>12</sup> On the issue of due care, admissible evidence includes but is not limited to, evidence as to:

- 1. Whether the existence of the condition and its dangerous character would have been discovered by an inspection system that was reasonably adequate to inform the public entity whether the property was safe for the use or uses for which the public entity used or intended others to use the public property and for uses that the public entity actually knew others were making of the public property or adjacent property.
- 2. Whether the public entity maintained and operated such an inspection system with due care and did not discover the condition.<sup>13</sup>

A public entity is not liable under Section 835(a) for injury caused by a condition of its property if the public entity establishes that the act or omission that created the condition was reasonable. The reasonableness of the act or omission that created the condition shall be determined by weighing the probability and gravity of potential injury to persons and property foreseeably exposed to the risk of injury against the practicability and cost of taking alternative action that would not create the risk of injury or protecting against the risk of injury.<sup>14</sup>

A public entity is not liable under Government Code section 835(b) for injury caused by a dangerous condition of its property if the public entity establishes that the action it took to protect against the risk of injury created by the condition or its failure to take such action was reasonable. The reasonableness of the action or inaction of the public entity is determined by taking into consideration the time and opportunity the public entity had to take action and by weighing the probability and gravity of potential injury to persons and property foreseeably exposed to the risk of injury against the practicability and cost of protecting against the risk of such injury.<sup>15</sup>

A dangerous condition is defined as a condition of property that creates a substantial, as distinguished from a minor, trivial or insignificant, risk of injury when such property, or property adjacent to it, is used with due care in a manner that is reasonably foreseeable.<sup>16</sup> Public property is in a dangerous condition whenever it involves an unreasonable risk of injury to the public.<sup>17</sup>

#### PUBLIC AGENCY LIABILITY FOR PLAN OR DESIGN OF BUILDING

A public entity and a public employee are not liable for an injury caused by the plan or design of a construction of, or an improvement to, public property where such plan or design has been approved in advance by either the legislative body of the public entity or by some other body (e.g. DSA) or employee exercising discretionary authority to give such approval.<sup>18</sup> Where the plan or design is prepared in conformity with standards on the basis of which a reasonable public employee could have adopted the plan or design, or a reasonable legislative body could have approved the plan or design or the standards for the plan or design, there is no liability.<sup>19</sup>

#### INDEMNIFICATION AND DEFENSE OF BOARD MEMBERS AND EMPLOYEES

If an employee or former employee of a public entity requests the public entity to defend him or her against any claim or action against him or her for an injury rising out of an act or omission occurring within the scope of his or her employment, and such request is made in writing not less than ten days before the day of trial, and the employee or former employee cooperates in good faith in the defense of the claim or action, the public entity must pay any judgment based on it or any compromise or settlement of the claim or action to which the entity has agreed.<sup>20</sup>

Generally, in civil actions, a public entity has a duty to defend a public officer or employee.<sup>21</sup> A public entity may refuse to provide for the defense of a civil action or proceeding brought against an officer, employee or former employee if the public entity determines:

- 1. The act or omission was not within the scope of his or her employment;
- 2. He or she acted or failed to act because of actual fraud, corruption or actual malice;
- 3. The defense of the action or proceeding by the public entity would create a specific conflict of interest between the public entity and the employee or former employee. "Specific conflict of interest" is defined to mean a conflict of interest or an adverse or pecuniary interest.<sup>22</sup>

If an employee or former employee requests in writing that the public entity through its designated legal counsel provide a defense, the public entity shall, within 20 days, inform the employee or former employee whether it will or will not provide a defense and the reason for the refusal to provide a defense.<sup>23</sup> If an actual and specific conflict of interest arises after the 20 day period following the employee's written request for defense, the public entity may refuse to provide further defense to the employee. The public entity shall inform the employee of the reason for the refusal to provide a further defense.<sup>24</sup>

The California Government Code provides that in civil actions, public agencies, including school districts, are required to provide a legal defense for public officers and employees when the action is brought against them in their official or individual capacity on account of an act or omission in the scope of their employment for the school district.

Government Code section 995.2 states in part:

"A public entity has the right to refuse to provide for the defense of a civil action or proceeding brought against an employee or former employee if the public entity determines any of the following:

a) The act or omission was not within the scope of his or her employment;

b) He or she acted or failed to act because of actual fraud, corruption or actual malice;

c) The defense of the action or proceeding by the public entity would create a specific conflict of interest between the public entity and the employee or former employee . . . "

#### ATTORNEY GENERAL OPINIONS

In a 1964 opinion, the Attorney General concluded that members of a governing board of a school district, when advised of the unsafe condition of a school building under Education Code sections 15503-15516, are under a mandatory duty to repair the building if funds are available, if the building is to be continued in use as a school building.<sup>25</sup> The Attorney General stated that failure to repair these school buildings will result in personal liability, although indemnification is available under Government Code section 825.<sup>26</sup>

The Attorney General noted that there is general immunity under Education Code section 15515,<sup>27</sup> which stated in part:

"No member of the governing board of the district shall be held personally liable for injury to personal property by use and abuse of any building."

The Attorney General noted that Government Code section 840.2 imposes liability upon officers and employees of governmental agencies for injury or damage caused by dangerous and defective conditions on school property. A dangerous and defective condition is defined as a condition of property that creates a substantial risk of injury when such property is used with due care in a manner in which it is reasonably foreseeable that it will be used.<sup>28</sup> Government Code section 840.2 states:

"An employee of a public entity is liable for injury caused by a dangerous condition of public property if the plaintiff establishes that the property of the public entity was in a dangerous condition at the time of the injury, that the injury was proximately caused by the dangerous condition, that the dangerous condition created a reasonably foreseeable risk of the kind of injury which was incurred, and that either:

(a) The dangerous condition was directly attributable wholly or in substantial part to a negligent or wrongful act of the employee and the employee had the authority and the funds and other means immediately available to take alternative action which would not have created the dangerous condition; or

(b) The employee had the authority and it was his responsibility to take adequate measures to protect against the dangerous condition at the expense of the public entity and the funds and other means for doing so were immediately available to him, and he had actual or constructive notice of the dangerous condition under Section 840.4 a

sufficient time prior to the injury to have taken measures to protect against the dangerous condition."

The Attorney General noted that the governing board has no discretion after notice is received that a school building is unsafe from the Division of State Architect. Therefore, the board must take action to remedy the situation, or attempt to obtain funds to do so.

Under Government Code section 825, public officials will be indemnified, except where they have acted fraudulently, corruptly, or with actual malice. A public official will not, however, be indemnified for punitive or exemplary damages.<sup>29</sup>

In a 1966 opinion, the Attorney General stated that an unsafe building which failed to meet the structural support requirements of the Field Act would be a dangerous condition for which a school district would be held liable.<sup>30</sup> The Attorney General noted that if it can be shown that the dangerous condition existed at the time of the injury, that the dangerous condition proximately caused the injury and that the dangerous condition created a reasonably foreseeable risk of the kind of injury which was incurred, a public entity would be liable for injury caused by the dangerous condition of which it had actual or constructive notice, a sufficient time prior to the injury to have taken measures to protect against the dangerous condition.<sup>31</sup>

A public entity has constructive notice that the condition has existed for some time and it is of such an obvious nature that the public entity, in the exercise of due care, should have discovered the condition and its dangerous character.<sup>32</sup> On the issue of due care, Government Code section 835.2(b) provides that admissible evidence includes whether the existence of the condition and its dangerous character would have been discovered by an inspection system that was reasonably adequate to inform the public entity whether the property was safe for the use or uses by which the public entity used or intended others to use the public property and for uses that the public entity actually knew others were making of the public property or adjacent property.<sup>33</sup>

In a 1967 opinion, the Attorney General stated that a school district which has complied with the requirements to inspect pre-1933 school buildings is not exempt, as a matter of law, from liability from injury caused by a dangerous condition of a pre-1933 school building.<sup>34</sup> However, under the provisions of Government Code section 835.4(b), a school district may be found not liable where it has complied with the required action specified in the Education Code prior to an injury, such compliance would be prima facie evidence of reasonable conduct on the part of the agents of the public entity.

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#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S OPINION

In a 1996 opinion, the Legislative Counsel discussed the civil liability of board members for failure to comply with the Field Act.<sup>35</sup> The Legislative Counsel noted that a public entity or public officer or employee will not be liable for injuries caused by the dangerous condition of its property, even if it had actual or constructive notice of the existence of that condition, if the public entity or public employee took reasonable action to protect against the risk of injury created by the condition, or if the failure to take protective action was reasonable.<sup>36</sup>

The availability of funds and the authority to dispose of the funds are essential elements of liability. The Legislative Counsel stated that it is an open question whether the liability of a member of the governing board of a school district is predicated on his or her own personal control of the funds and his or her own authority, acting alone, to dispose of them. Under one view, a member of the governing board of a school district could not be held personally liable under Section 840.2 for the dangerous condition of a school building, because no one of the governing board members acting individually would have the requisite authority and available funds.<sup>37</sup> The Legislative Counsel noted that a contrary view was held by the Attorney General, that if a statutory duty arises to perform certain actions upon the occurrence of certain conditions, the governing board of a school district must take action after notice is received and failure to take that action can result in personal liability for a member of the governing board of the school district under Government Code section 840.2.<sup>38</sup>

The Legislative Counsel noted that there are no recorded judicial decisions resolving the issue of availability of funds. The Legislative Counsel went on to state that despite the conflict in view, a board member could lessen their potential liability if he or she established that they took reasonable action to protect against the risk of injury created by the condition, or if the failure to take protective action was reasonable, such action could include applying for funds to repair buildings not in compliance with the Field Act.<sup>39</sup> The Legislative Counsel concluded:

"Accordingly, it is our opinion that, depending on the facts and reasonableness of the action or inaction of the governing board of

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a school district and its individual members in response to a dangerous condition, the governing board of a school district and its individual members may be held civilly liable for personal injury resulting from a relocatable building that the school district purchases or leases, and requires pupils and teachers to occupy, whether or not the relocatable building complies with the Field Act."<sup>40</sup>

#### CONCLUSION

In summary, board members may, in some circumstances, be held personally liable if a school building owned by the school district fails to comply with the requirements of the Field Act and, as a result of the failure of a school building to meet the building and safety standards of the Field Act, an individual is injured by the collapse of that school building in an earthquake or other natural disaster. For example, if the governing board of a district is advised by district employees that school buildings (including relocatables) utilized and operated by the district do not meet the building and safety standards of the Field Act and the governing board does not establish a system of priorities for the repair, reconstruction or replacement of the buildings that do not comply with the Field Act, including making application for state funding, as required by Education Code sections 17367 and 17371, then board members could possibly be held personally liable. <sup>41</sup> However, if a system of priorities is put in place and funding is sought, the members of the governing board, would, most likely, not be held personally liable. It should also be kept in mind that the district would have a duty to defend and indemnify the board member unless the board member caused the school district's failure to comply with the Field Act due to actual fraud, corruption or actual malice.

We do not believe that board members would be personally liable when school buildings comply with the building standards set forth in the Field Act but compliance has not been certified by DSA. In our opinion, the remedy for lack of certification is to complete the certification process.

On September 30, 2010 the Orange County Committee on School District Organization held a Public Hearing to consider a Petition to change the current trustee election method from an atlarge "from-trustee area" method to a "by-trustee area" method. At this meeting, the County Committee ordered an election in June 2010 for voters within CUSD boundaries to consider this change of voting method. If voters approve this change, it will be necessary for the district to examine the current trustee areas and realign areas to meet constitutional requirements prior to the general election in November 2010.

The district's current trustee area boundaries were established in 2003. At this time, trustee areas were approved based on the population of registered voters. Changing the voting methodology to "by-trustee area" would require trustee areas to be based on the legally required standard of total population. The district's existing trustee areas vary from a theoretical average sized trustee area in the district by a total of 37.6 percent. Such a population deviation would violate the "one-person, one-vote" requirement under the Equal Protection Clause and would be considered unconstitutional. A deviation of less than 10% is needed to remain in compliance.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATION**

The need for redrawn trustee-area boundaries will not become apparent until the voters decide whether to approve the proposed change in election methodology in June 2010. However, if we do not move forward with redrawing boundaries and the new voting method is approved, the district will not be able to redraw boundaries in time to meet the Education Code requirements of implementing the new voting methodology at the next succeeding election which would be held in November 2010. (Education Code section 5020(a).) Utilizing the current trustee areas in this case could potentially make the district vulnerable to a legal challenge. Exhibit A, developed with and completed by the Orange County Department of Education, addresses all codes and regulations pertinent to a "by area" election.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

It is estimated that the cost of hiring a demographer to redraw trustee areas will be in the range of \$20,000 to \$40,000. A significant amount of staff time will be required to complete this project. We also anticipate the need to contract with legal counsel to ensure compliance with the California Voting Rights Act, California Elections Code sections 14025-14032 and the Equal Protection Clause.

#### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is respectfully recommended the Board approve the proposed timeline for readjustment to trustee areas, Exhibit A and authorize the Superintendent to take all necessary steps to accomplish the timeline activities.
