### INSTRUCTIONS FOR PRESENTATIONS TO THE BOARD BY PARENTS AND CITIZENS PRESENT AT THIS MEETING

We are pleased you can be with us at this meeting, and we hope you will return often. Your visit assures us of continuing community interest in our schools.

The members of the Board of Trustees of this District are locally elected state officials, who serve four-year terms of office, and who are responsible for the educational program of our community from grades kindergarten through twelve. They are required to conduct programs of the schools in accordance with the State of California Constitution, the State Education Code, and other laws relating to schools enacted by the Legislature, and policies and procedures which this Board adopts.

The Board is a policy-making body whose actions are guided by the school district's Mission and Goals. Administration of the District is delegated to a professional administrative staff headed by the Superintendent.

The agenda and its extensive background material are studied by each member of the Board for at least two days preceding the meeting. Board Members can call the administrative staff for clarification on any item, and many of the items on the agenda were discussed by the Board during previous meetings. These procedures enable the Board to act more effectively on agenda items than would otherwise be possible.

### WHAT TO DO IF YOU WISH TO ADDRESS THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

<u>CLOSED SESSION:</u> In accordance with Education Code § 35146 and Government Code § 54957, the Board may recess to Closed Session to discuss personnel matters which they consider inadvisable to take up in a public meeting.

Members of the public shall have an opportunity to address the Board regarding items on the agenda to be considered during Closed Session prior to the Board adjourning the meeting to Closed Session. Individual presentations are limited to a maximum of three minutes; however, the time assigned for individual presentations could be fewer than three minutes depending upon the total number of speakers who wish to address a specific agenda topic.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS (Non-Agenda Items): Regular, scheduled meetings of the Board shall have a portion of each meeting devoted to Oral Communications. Oral Communications, will take place following Special Recognitions. The total time for the Oral Communications portion of regular meetings shall be twenty minutes. Individual presentations are limited to a maximum of three minutes per individual but could be less if there are a large number of Oral Communication speakers. Legally, the Board may not take action on items raised by speakers under Oral Communications. The Board may, however, at its discretion, refer items to the administration for follow-up or place topics on a future Board agenda.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS (Agenda Items): Members of the public shall also have an opportunity to address the Board on Open Session agenda items before their consideration by the Board. Individual presentations for the Consent Calendar are limited to a maximum of five minutes for all Consent Calendar items. Individual presentations for Discussion/Action agenda items are limited to a maximum of three minutes however; the time assigned for individual presentations could be fewer than three minutes depending upon the total number of speakers, who wish to address a specific agenda topic. The total time for presentations shall be limited to twenty minutes per agenda topic, unless the Board grants additional time. The Board shall hear all presentations after any staff comments but prior to the formal discussion by Board members of the agenda topic under consideration.

Once an agenda item has been opened for public comment, no additional "Request to Address the Board of Trustees" cards shall be accepted for that topic unless otherwise approved by the Board. When addressing a specific item on the agenda, the Board may vote to allow additional public speaker time for an individual Discussion/Action item.

<u>PUBLIC HEARINGS:</u> Any time the Board schedules a separate public hearing on a given topic, it shall not hear speakers on that topic before the public hearing, except as to the scheduling of the hearing, nor shall it hear speakers after the hearing, except as to changes in the recommended action at the time of the hearing.

### REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION

### **HISTORY**

Pursuant to Resolution No. 1112-12 *Delegation of Authority* approved by the Board of Trustees on September 12, 2011, the Board delegated authority to the Deputy Superintendent, Business and Support Services, Executive Director, Fiscal Services, and Director, Purchasing, the authority to sign and execute all contracts and purchase orders. A previous Board Member requested that staff provide a listing of Board approved warrants for each vendor with a total payment exceeding \$250,000 per fiscal year. That listing is included in this report.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Requests for issuance of all warrants are submitted to the County Superintendent of Schools, Business Services Division, for review and preparation. Warrants are then returned to the District Fiscal Services Office and submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval.

In May 2017, the District transitioned from Quintessential School Systems (QSS) as the business system for generating purchase orders (PO), commercial warrants and related reports to the OCDE-supported BusinessPlus software system. Beginning in fiscal year 2017-2018, POs are issued in BusinessPlus. The PO report is separated by individual funds, such as the general fund (01), Food and Nutrition fund (13), various capital facilities funds (25, 35, 40, etc). The PO number indicates the fiscal year, the District ledger number, type of PO and number. POs indicating an "A" are associated with agreements, "P" are standard POs, "X" are purchases made through District-issued Cal-Cards, and "R" are rollover POs, spanning two or more fiscal years. An example of a "R" PO is a facilities project that was started in fiscal year 2016-2017, but will not be completed until Fiscal Year 2017-2018.

### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Under Education Code § 17605, all transactions entered into by the officer or employee delegated authority shall be reviewed by the governing board every 60 days. This agenda item requests Board approval and/or ratification of the attached list of purchase orders and commercial warrants.

### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The expenditures related to the listed purchase orders, commercial warrants, and previously approved bids and contracts were previously authorized as part of the District's budget approval process.

### **OTHER INFORMATION**

The QSS-generated reports slightly differ in format than the BusinessPlus reports; however, the new BusinessPlus reports organize the purchase orders by specific fund.

### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended the Board of Trustees adopt, approve and ratify the attached purchase order and warrant listing.

### **HISTORY**

Education Code §§ 17604 and 17605 allow the Board of Trustees to delegate certain authority to District staff and pursuant to Resolution No. 1112-12, adopted on September 12, 2011, the Board delegated authority to the Deputy Superintendent, Business and Support Services, Executive Director, Fiscal Services and the Director, Purchasing the authority to sign and execute all contracts.

Education Code § 17605 requires all delegated transactions entered into by delegated staff be reviewed by the governing board every 60 days.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Independent Contractor, Professional Services, Field Service, and Master Contract Agreements are standard District template contracts, which have been reviewed by independent District legal counsel. The Purchasing and Contracts department prepares contracts, utilizing the appropriate contract form for the type of service requested and submits the contract, less the standard terms and conditions for Board consideration and approval. The standard terms and conditions for every type of contract are posted on the Purchasing website for public viewing and efficiency purposes to reduce the size of the Board agenda. A contract listing summary is provided for ease of review and information; however, the Board is requested to approve the actual contract included in the agenda item, not the summary itself.

### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Each contract, at a minimum, includes the rate(s) of services, scope of work to be provided, and term of the agreement.

### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

Each contract varies to the financial cost, depending on need and availability of funding.

It is recommended the Board approve and/or ratify all contracts submitted for consideration.

### PROFESSIONAL SERVICES MASTER AGREEMENT

This Agreement for Professional Services ("<u>Agreement</u>") is effective as of December 7, 2017 ("Effective Date") by and between Capistrano Unified School District, located at 33122 Valle Road, San Juan Capistrano, California 92675 ("District") and the consultant listed below ("Consultant"). District and Consultant may be referred to as "<u>Party</u>" or collectively as the "<u>Parties</u>".

### THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, ON BEHALF OF THE UNIVERSITY OF SAN DIEGO, SCHOOL OF MEDICINE, DEPARTMENT OF PEDIATRICS

WHEREAS, District is authorized, following approval of this Agreement by its Board of Trustees, pursuant to its general authority set forth in California Education Code §35160, Government Code §84526 and 53060, to contract with and employ any persons for the furnishing of special professional services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters, if such persons are specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required;

WHEREAS, District is in need of such special services and advice, specifically those described in Exhibit A, and

WHEREAS, Consultant represents that he/she/it is specially trained, experienced, licensed, and competent to perform the special professional services required by the District, and such services are needed on a limited basis (hereinafter referred to as "Consulting Services");

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

Scope of Work/Services. Consultant shall appoint physician employee, Howard Taras, M.D., to perform the Consulting Services as set forth in Consultant's Proposal which is attached hereto, marked as Exhibit A (hereinafter referred to as "Contracted Services"), and incorporated as if fully set forth herein. Consultant's specific scope of work shall be set forth in Exhibit A and/or supplemented by purchase orders or other written instructions subsequently issued by the District. If Dr. Taras becomes unavailable to provide services, Consultant shall appoint a replacement physician subject to the approval by District.

<u>Fees and Expenses</u>. For the Consulting Services provided for hereunder, Consultant shall be compensated as set forth in Exhibit A. The total cost of services requested by District and provided by Consultant under this agreement is estimated to be **\$20,000.00** in the aggregate under term of this Agreement.

<u>Term of Agreement</u>. The term of this base Agreement is for **July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018**, with the option to extend annually by mutual agreement and upon Board approval for a total contract term not to exceed a total of five (5) years, as allowed by Education Code section 17596.

Additional Terms. This Agreement contains additional terms that are set forth in the attached documents titled General Conditions, Special Conditions and Required Documents and Certifications, and associated Purchase Order(s), which by this reference are incorporated herein. District and Consultant acknowledge, and agree to be bound by, the terms set forth in the selected documents attached to this Agreement, as if such additional terms were fully set forth in full herein.

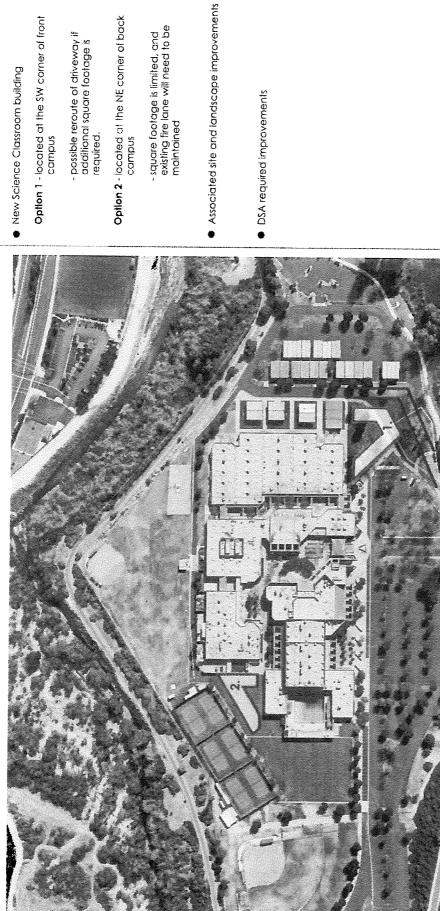

### GENERAL CONDITIONS

The following is part of and attachment to the Capistrano Unified School District "Field Services Contract".

- 1. **EQUIPMENT AND LABOR**: Contractor shall furnish all labor, materials and equipment necessary to complete the project in accordance with the approved plan and/or specifications. Where practical, "Standard Specifications for Public Works Construction" will apply.
- **2. <u>DEFAULT BY CONTRACTOR</u>**: Failure to comply with any of the terms and/or conditions of this contract shall constitute default by the Contractor.
- **3. FORCE MAJEURE CLAUSE**: Parties to the contract shall be excused from performance thereunder during the time and to the extent that they were prevented from obtaining or performing by act of "God, fire, strike, loss" or shortage of transportation facilities, lockout, or commandeering of materials, products, plants or facilities by the government, when satisfactory evidence thereof is presented to District, provided that it is satisfactorily established that the non-performance is not due to the fault or neglect of the party not performing.
- 4. PROVISIONS REOUIRED BY LAW: Each and every provision of law and clause required to be inserted in the contract shall be deemed to be inserted herein and this contract shall be read and enforced as though it were included herein and, if through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted or is not inserted correctly, then upon application of either party, the contract shall forthwith be physically amended to make such insertion or correction.
- **5. SUBCONTRACTORS:** Subcontractors, if any, engaged by the Contractor shall be subject to the approval of the District, Contractor shall be held responsible for all operations of the subcontractors and shall require them to maintain adequate California Worker's Compensation and appropriate liability insurance.
- **6. SENATE BILL 854:** Contractor and all subcontractors, if any, shall comply with all applicable provisions of Senate Bill 854 (Stats. 2014, Cir. 28) effective June 20, 2014.
- 7. **PREVAILING WAGE RATES:** Contractor and subcontractor shall adhere to the prevailing wage rate, and all applicable determinations made by the Director of Industrial Relations pursuant to California Labor Code.
- **8. APPRENTICEABLE OCCUPATIONS:** Contractor shall be responsible for compliance with Labor Code for all apprenticeship occupations.
- **PAYROLL RECORDS:** Contractor and subcontractor shall keep accurate payroll records, showing the name, address, social security number, work week and the actual per diem wages paid to each journeyman, apprentice, worker or other employee employed by Contractor, in connection with the public work.
- 10. <u>COMPLIANCE WITH SAFETY REGULATIONS</u>: It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor to perform all activities incident to this project in a manner consistent with applicable safety standards and to insure that all completed and in process work satisfies safety standards. Contractor is also responsible for obtaining District's rules and regulations pertaining to safety and security, including driving on school grounds, particularly when children are present.
- 11. PROTECTION OF WORK AND PROPERTY: Contractor shall erect and properly maintain at all times, as required by conditions and progress of work, all necessary safeguards, signs, barriers, lights, and watchmen for protection of workers and the public and shall post danger signs warning against hazards created by such features in the course of construction. In an emergency affecting life and safety of life, work of adjoining property, Contractor, without special instruction or authorization from District, is hereby permitted to act to prevent such threatened loss or injury.
- 12. ASBESTOS: Contractor shall not use or allow any subcontractor to use any materials containing asbestos.

- 13. HAZARDOUS MATERIAL AND MATERIAL SAFETY DATA SHEETS: In the event the Contractor encounters (during the scope of work as specified by individual contract or specifications), material believed to be asbestos, polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB), or any other identified or non-identified potentially hazardous material (which has not been rendered harmless and is labeled as such), Contractor shall immediately stop work in the area affected and report the condition to the District.
- 14. HOLD HARMLESS: Contractor agrees to and shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the District, its Governing Board, officers, agents, employees and volunteers from all claims, including active and passive claims, losses, costs, attorney fees and expenses arising out of any liability or claim of liability for personal injury, bodily injury to persons or death, furnishing or use of any copyrighted or uncopyrighted matters or patented invention, contractual liability, and damage to property sustained or claimed to have been sustained arising out of activities/services provided by Contractor or its subcontractors, whether authorized by this Agreement or not. Contractor further agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against the District. The provisions of this article do not apply to any damage or losses caused solely by the gross negligence or willful misconduct of District or any of its agents or employees.

### 15. INSURANCE:

### A. Insurance Requirements.

Before the commencement of the work, the Contractor shall purchase from and maintain in a company or companies lawfully authorized to do business in California with a financial rating of at least an A-VIII status as rated in the most recent edition of Best's Insurance Reports or as amended by the Supplementary General Conditions, such insurance as will protect the District from claims set forth below, which may arise out of or result from the Contractor's work under the Contract and for which the Contractor may be legally liable, whether such work are by the Contractor, by a Subcontractor, by anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or by anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable. Any required insurance shall not contain any exclusion that applies to the type of work performed by the Contractor under the Contract Documents:

- (1) Claims for damages because of bodily injury, sickness, disease, or death of any person District would require indemnification and coverage for employee claim;
- (2) Claims for damages insured by usual personal injury liability coverage, which are sustained by a person as a result of an offense directly or indirectly related to employment of such person by the Contractor or by another person;
- (3) Claims for damages because of injury or destruction of tangible property, including loss of use resulting therefrom, arising from operations under the Contract Documents;
- (4) Claims for damages because of bodily injury, death of a person, or property damage arising out of the ownership, maintenance, or use of a motor vehicle, all mobile equipment, and vehicles moving under their own power and engaged in the work;
- (5) Claims involving contractual liability applicable to the Contractor's obligations under the Contract Documents, including liability assumed by and the indemnity and defense obligations of the Contractor and the Subcontractors:
- (6) Claims involving Completed Operations, Independent Contractors' coverage, and Broad Form property damage, without any exclusions for collapse, explosion, demolition, underground coverage, and excavating (XCU); and
- (7) Claims involving sudden or accidental discharge of contaminants or pollutants.
- B. **Specific Insurance Requirements.** Contractor shall take out and maintain and shall require all subcontractors, if any, whether primary or secondary, to take out and maintain:
  - (1) Comprehensive General Liability Insurance with a combined single limit per occurrence of not less than \$2,000,000.00 or Commercial General Liability Insurance which provides limits of not less than:

(a) Per occurrence (combined single limit) \$1,000,000.00
 (b) Project Specific Aggregate (for this project only) \$1,000,000.00
 (c) Products and Completed Operations (aggregate) \$1,000,000.00
 (d) Personal and Advertising Injury Limit \$1,000,000.00

(2) Insurance Covering Special Hazards

The following special hazards shall be covered by riders or riders to above mentioned public liability

insurance or property damage insurance policy or policies of insurance, in amounts as follows:

(a) Automotive and truck where operated in amounts
(b) Material Hoist where used in amounts
(c) Explosion, Collapse and Underground (XCU)
(d) Hazardous materials

- (3) In addition, provide Excess Liability Insurance coverage in the amount of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00).
- C. **Subcontractor Insurance Requirements.** The Contractor shall require its Subcontractors to take out and maintain public liability insurance and property damage insurance required under this Agreement in like amounts. A "claims made" or modified "occurrence" policy shall not satisfy the requirements of this section without prior written approval of the District.
- D. Additional Insured Endorsement Requirements. The Contractor shall name, on any policy of insurance required under these articles, the District, Construction Manager (if any), Architect, Inspector, the State of California, their officers, employees, agents, volunteers and independent contractors as additional insureds. Subcontractors shall name the Contractor, the District, Architect, Inspector, the State of California, their officers, employees, agents, volunteers and independent contractors as additional insureds. The Additional Insured Endorsement included on all such insurance policies shall be an ISO CG 20 10 (04/13), or an ISO CG 20 38 (04/13), or their equivalent as determined by the District in its sole discretion, and must state that coverage is afforded the additional insured with respect to claims arising out of operations performed by or on behalf of the insured. If the additional insureds have other insurance which is applicable to the loss, such other insurance shall be on an excess or contingent basis. The insurance provided by the Contractor pursuant to Article 18.A must be designated in the policy as primary to any insurance obtained by the District. The amount of the

insurer's liability shall not be reduced by the existence of such other insurance.

- E. Workers' Compensation Insurance. During the term of this Contract, the Contractor shall provide workers' compensation insurance for all of the Contractor's employees engaged in work under this Contract on or at the Site of the Project and, in case any of the Contractor's work is subcontracted, the Contractor shall require the Subcontractor to provide workers' compensation insurance for all the Subcontractor's employees engaged in work under the subcontract. Any class of employee or employees not covered by a Subcontractor's insurance shall be covered by the Contractor's insurance. In case any class of employees engaged in work under this Contract on or at the Site of the Project is not protected under the Workers' Compensation laws, the Contractor shall provide or cause a Subcontractor to provide adequate insurance coverage for the protection of those employees not otherwise protected. The Contractor shall file with the District certificates of insurance as required under Article 18.J and in compliance with Labor Code section 3700. Workers' compensation limits as required by the Labor Code, but not less than \$1,000,000 and employers' liability limits of \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.
- F. Builder's Risk/ "All Risk" Insurance. The Contractor, during the progress of the work and until final acceptance of the work by District upon completion of the entire Contract, shall maintain Builder's Risk, Course of Construction or similar first party property coverage issued on a replacement cost value basis consistent with the total replacement cost of all insurable work and the Project included within the Contract Documents. Coverage is to insure against all risks of accidental direct physical loss, and must include, by the basic grant of coverage or by endorsement, the perils of vandalism, malicious mischief (both without any limitation regarding vacancy or occupancy), fire, sprinkler leakage, civil authority, sonic boom, earthquake, flood, collapse, wind, lightning, smoke and riot. The coverage must include debris removal, demolition, increased costs due to enforcement of building ordinance and law in the repair and replacement of damage and undamaged portions of the property, and reasonable costs for the Architect's and engineering services and expenses required as a result of any insured loss upon the work and Project which is the subject of the Contract Documents, including completed work and work in progress, to the full insurable value thereof. Such insurance shall include the District and the Architect as additional named insureds, and any other person with an insurable interest as designated by the District.

The Contractor shall submit to the District for its approval all items deemed to be uninsurable. The risk of the damage to the work due to the perils covered by the "Builder's Risk/All Risk" Insurance, as well as any other hazard which might result in damage to the work, is that of the Contractor and the Surety, and no Claims for such loss or damage shall be recognized by the District nor will such loss or damage excuse the complete and satisfactory

performance of the Contract by the Contractor.

- G. **Fire Insurance.** Before the commencement of the work, the Contractor shall procure, maintain, and cause to be maintained at the Contractor's expense, fire insurance on all work subject to loss or damage by fire. The amount of fire insurance shall be sufficient to protect the Project against loss or damage in full until the work is accepted by the District. This requirement may be waived upon confirmation by the District that such coverage is provided under the Builder's Risk Insurance being provided.
- H. Automobile Liability. The District, Architect and Construction Manager (if any), Inspectors, their directors, officers, employees, agents and volunteers shall be covered as additional insureds with respect to the ownership, operation, maintenance, use, loading or unloading of any auto owned, leased, hired or borrowed by the Contractor or for which the Contractor is responsible. Such insurance coverage shall be primary and non-contributory insurance as respects the District, Architect, Construction Manager (if any), Project Inspector, their directors, officers, employees, agents and volunteers, or if excess, shall stand in an unbroken chain of coverage excess of the Contractor's scheduled underlying coverage. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the District, Architect, Construction Manager (if any), Project Inspector, their directors, officers, employees, agents and volunteers shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not be called upon to contribute with it. The insurer shall agree to waive all rights of subrogation against the District, Architect, Construction Manager (if any), Project Inspector, their directors, officers, employees, agents and volunteers for losses paid under the terms of the insurance policy that arise from work performed by the Contractor. Insurance Services Office Business Auto Coverage Form Number CA 0001, Code 1 (any auto) is required. Comprehensive Automobile Liability insurance is to include all autos, owned, non-owned, and hired, with limits of \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- I. **Other Insurance.** The Contractor shall provide all other insurance required to be maintained under applicable laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations.
- J. **Proof of Insurance.** The Contractor shall not commence work nor shall it allow any Subcontractor to commence work under this Contract until all required insurance and certificates have been obtained and delivered in duplicate to the District for approval subject to the following requirements:
  - (1) Certificates and insurance policies shall include the following clause:
    - "This policy and any coverage shall not be suspended, voided, non-renewed, canceled, or reduced in required limits of liability or amounts of insurance or coverage until notice has been mailed via certified mail to the District. Date of cancellation or reduction may not be less than thirty (30) days after the date of mailing notice."
  - (2) Certificates of insurance shall state in particular those insured, the extent of insurance, location and operation to which the insurance applies, the expiration date, and cancellation and reduction notices.
  - (3) Certificates of insurance shall clearly state that the District and the Architect are named as additional insureds under the policy described and that such insurance policy shall be primary to any insurance or self-insurance maintained by District.
  - (4) The Contractor and its Subcontractors shall produce a certified copy of any insurance policy required under this Section upon written request of the District.
- K. Compliance. In the event of the failure of any contractor to furnish and maintain any insurance required by this Article, the Contractor shall be in default under the Contract. Compliance by Contractor with the requirement to carry insurance and furnish certificates or policies evidencing the same shall not relieve the Contractor from liability assumed under any provision of the Contract Documents, including, without limitation, the obligation to defend and indemnify the District and the Architect.
  - L. Waiver of Subrogation. Contractor waives (to the extent permitted by law) any right to recover

against the District for damages to the work, any part thereof, or any and all claims arising by reason of any of the foregoing, but only to the extent that such damages and/or claims are covered by property insurance and only to the extent of such coverage (which shall exclude deductible amounts) by insurance actually carried by the District.

The provisions of this Section are intended to restrict each party to recovery against insurance carriers only to the extent of such coverage and waive fully and for the benefit of each, any rights and/or claims which might give rise to a right of subrogation in any insurance carrier. The District and the Contractor shall each obtain in all policies of insurance carried by either of them, a waiver by the insurance companies thereunder of all rights of recovery by way of subrogation for any damages or claims covered by the insurance.

### 16. WORKERS:

- A. Contractor shall at all times enforce strict discipline and good order among Contractor's employees. Contractor and subcontractor shall not employ any person or anyone not skilled (or unfit, unqualified), in assigned work.
- B. Any person in the employ of the Contractor, whom the District may deem incompetent or unfit, shall be dismissed from the work and shall not again be employed on the project except with written consent of the District.
- **17. FINGERPRINTS:** Contractor shall comply with the fingerprinting and criminal background investigation requirements of the California Education Code. Contractor shall comply with all the California Department of Justice fingerprinting requirements.
- **18. SUPERVISION:** Contractor shall provide competent supervision of personnel employed on the job, use of equipment, and quality of workmanship.
- **19. CONTRACTOR NOT OFFICER. EMPLOYEE OR AGENT OF DISTRICT:** While engaged in carrying out the terms and conditions of the Contract, Contractor is an independent contractor and not an officer, employee or agent of District, by direction or inference.
- **20. PERMITS AND LICENSES:** Contractor shall be responsible for acquiring all necessary permits and shall secure and maintain in force such licenses and permits as required by law in connection with the project, including, but not limited to, registration required under SB854.
- **21. ACCESS TO WORK:** District representatives shall at all time have access to work, wherever it is, in preparation or in progress. Contractor shall provide safe and proper facilities for such access.
- **22. OCCUPANCY:** District reserves the right to occupy buildings or facilities at any time before contract completion. Such occupancy shall not constitute final acceptance of any part of work covered by this contract nor shall such occupancy extend the specified date for completion.
- **23.** CHANGES: No changes or alterations to this contract shall be made without specific prior written approval by District.
- 24. ASSIGNMENT: No assignment of this Contract shall be made without the prior written approval of District.
- **25. WARRANTY:** Contractor will be required to warranty all work and equipment supplied in the contract for a minimum one year period from date of final acceptance.
- **26. BRAND OR TRADE NAMES:** Attention of the Contractor is directed to the Government Code, which must be complied with as to brand or trade name products. Whenever in the specifications brand or trade name products are specified in writing, the words 'or approved equal' are to be assumed included. Exact compliance with specified brand or trade name products is required unless the District issues a written amendment. All requests to substitute must be in writing directed to the District's applicable representative. Contractor must provide for District's approval, the brand name, model number (including drawings and specifications) or other relative

information on any proposed product or equipment to be supplied by the Contractor.

- **27. PAYMENT:** Payment for work will be made in a lump sum upon acceptable completion (unless specified otherwise by agreement in writing or under special conditions in writing) and approval by the District.
- 28. ANTI-DISCRIMINATION: It is the policy of the Capistrano Unified School District Board of Trustees that in connection with any and all work and/or services performed under Public Works and Construction contracts, there will be no discrimination against any employee, company or individual or group of individuals, because of race, color, ancestry, sex, age, national origin, or religious belief. Therefore, the Contractor agrees to comply with applicable Federal and California laws including, but not limited to, California Fair Employment Practice Act, and/or Labor Code, or any code where anti-discrimination language occurs. In addition, Contractor agrees to require like compliance by all subcontractors.
- **29. CLEAN UP:** Debris shall be regularly removed from the premises. The job site shall be free of any and all debris at all times when work is not actually being performed. Upon completion, all debris and containers shall be removed and the work site left clean.



### PROFESSIONAL SERVICES MASTER AGREEMENT

This Agreement for Professional Services ("<u>Agreement</u>") is effective as of January 25, 2018 ("Effective Date") by and between Capistrano Unified School District, located at 33122 Valle Road, San Juan Capistrano, California 92675 ("District") and the consultant listed below ("Consultant"). District and Consultant may be referred to as "<u>Party</u>" or collectively as the "<u>Parties</u>".

### **AW INDUSTRIES**

WHEREAS, District is authorized, following approval of this Agreement by its Board of Trustees, pursuant to its general authority set forth in California Education Code §35160, Government Code §\$4526 and 53060, to contract with and employ any persons for the furnishing of special professional services and advice in financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal or administrative matters, if such persons are specially trained and experienced and competent to perform the special services required;

WHEREAS, District is in need of such special services and advice, specifically those described in Exhibit A, and

WHEREAS, Consultant represents that he/she/it is specially trained, experienced, licensed, and competent to perform the special professional services required by the District, and such services are needed on a limited basis (hereinafter referred to as "Consulting Services");

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

Scope of Work/Services. Consultant shall perform the Consulting Services as set forth in Consultant's Proposal which is attached hereto, marked as Exhibit A (hereinafter referred to as "Contracted Services"), and incorporated as if fully set forth herein. Consultant's specific scope of work shall be set forth in Exhibit A and/or supplemented by purchase orders or other written instructions subsequently issued by the District.

<u>Fees and Expenses</u>. For the Consulting Services provided for hereunder, Consultant shall be compensated as set forth in Exhibit A. The total cost of services requested by District and provided by Consultant under this agreement is estimated to be \$39,200.00 in the aggregate under term of this Agreement.

<u>Term of Agreement</u>. The term of this base Agreement is for **July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018**, with the option to extend annually by mutual agreement and upon Board approval for a total contract term not to exceed a total of five (5) years, as allowed by Education Code section 17596.

Additional Terms. This Agreement contains additional terms that are set forth in the attached documents titled General Conditions, Special Conditions and Required Documents and Certifications, and associated Purchase Order(s), which by this reference are incorporated herein. District and Consultant acknowledge, and agree to be bound by, the terms set forth in the selected documents attached to this Agreement, as if such additional terms were fully set forth in full herein.

- 1. AW Industries, agrees to provide for continuous inspection of work for compliance with approved contract documents. Project Inspector duties as outlined in Title 24, Part 1, Chapter 4, Sections 4-333 thru 4-342 California Code of Regulations, including DSA Interpretive Regulations A-6, A-7, A-8, and as incorporated in the following paragraphs.
- 2. Represent the District under the guidance of the designee of the District Representative. Attend all planning, pre-construction conference, project meetings, or meetings as required by the District.
- Monitor and observe all Special Inspections performed by the Districts contracted
  Testing Lab as required by the Testing and Inspections Sheet and as outlined in
  the Project Specifications. AW Industries shall assist in minimizing unnecessary
  costs for testing where possible.
- 4. The District & the Inspector, AW Industries shall each defend and hold harmless each other against any losses, liabilities, damages, injuries, claims, costs, or expenses arising out of, or connected with the provisions of this agreement and the contract documents.

- 5. The Agreement shall begin upon written notice by a representative of the District and remain in effect continuously until project closeout, unless terminated in writing. The anticipated duration of the project shall be 15 months. Contract is intended to be an agency agreement and may be terminated in 15 days by either party with or without cause. This Agency Agreement shall be assignable to other schools within the District, and shall apply to other Inspectors as requested and approved by the District. The District shall not employ, contract, or engage in business or mutually beneficial relationships with Inspectors introduced to the District thru AW Industries, for a period of two (2) years after the dissolution of any contracts thru AW Industries, unless permission is granted prior to such relationships.
- 6. AW Industries, shall maintain in effect a 1 million dollar General Liability insurance policy. District requests for additional insurances shall be paid additionally by the District at current market rates.
- 7. Capistrano Unified School District agrees to pay AW Industries the cost of project services billed at the rate as outlined in the fee schedule within 30 working days of receipt of invoice. The District shall provide all utility lines, office space and furniture per the project specifications. AW Industries shall provide to the District at the end of the project all project documentation in a professional format.

Hours billed for inspection services shall include only hours worked in support of the project. IOR may work as many projects as reasonable during the eight-hour billing increment. Other billing arrangements may be as agreed in writing by the District.
- 9. Administration services for preparation and submittal of monthly reports, paperwork, safety / job orientation, office management, project coordination and other job related clerical task will be billed in (2) hour increments per week.

### PATIENT AND FAMILY INFORMATION

Thank you for providing the neuropsychologists at Advanced Neurobehavioral Health of Southern California (ANH) with the opportunity to assist in your child's care. This document is designed to inform you about some important policies and procedures of the evaluation process.

### **Description of Neuropsychological Services**

Our clinicians provide comprehensive outpatient evaluation services for individuals from infancy through young adulthood, who may be experiencing a broad range of developmental, attention, learning, cognitive, emotional and behavioral difficulties. As clinicians who have completed formalized specialization in pediatric neuropsychology, they employ knowledge of the developing brain and its relationship to cognition and behavior in the evaluation and treatment of children and adolescents, and they are trained to utilize specialized testing procedures to diagnose and describe the cognitive and behavioral problems of the developing child as related to their neurological status. The goal is to integrate multiple sources of information using neuropsychological principles in order to identify and describe each child's unique profile of cognitive, academic, and emotional strengths and weaknesses. This information provides a guide for generating appropriate recommendations for the home, school and community settings.

There are 3 stages of the evaluation process (intake, evaluation, and feedback). Once you have contacted our office, we will schedule an initial intake meeting lasting for one hour, during which we will discuss and clarify your primary concerns. If a neuropsychological evaluation is indeed appropriate for your child's needs, we will proceed to schedule the evaluation date within the next 1-2 weeks. Please be aware that:

- 1. Prior to the evaluation date, parents may be asked to complete preliminary forms and return them by mail or fax. Your clinician may provide you with teacher rating scales, which can be completed by your child's teacher and returned to the clinic.
- 2. Prior to the evaluation date, a review of medical and school records will be completed.
- 3. On the day of the evaluation, administration of standardized individual tests and parent rating scales will be completed. You can expect that the evaluation day will last from 8:30am until approximately 2-3pm depending on the age of your child. Occasionally, a child may be unable to complete appropriate testing in one session and a second session may need to be scheduled. Further parent interviews may also be completed on the day of the evaluation. We will break for a 45-minute to 1-hour lunch period.
- 4. Approximately 2-3 weeks after testing has been completed, a one-hour interpretive/feedback conference will be scheduled to discuss test results and recommendations.
- 5. Your clinician will prepare a comprehensive report, describing your child's unique strengths and weaknesses along with detailed recommendations to address referral concerns. This report will be provided to you on the day of the feedback session or may be mailed to parents after the feedback conference.

### Parent/Caretaker Availability

Please note that we require that a parent or caretaker remain in the waiting room for the duration of our evaluation with your child. This ensures that a parent or caretaker is available for the child during breaks and to assist in the event of any potential emergency.

### **Professional Qualifications**

The neuropsychologists at ANH have received doctoral degrees in school or clinical psychology, and they have completed one-year internships and two-year post-doctoral fellowships in pediatric neuropsychology. In addition, some of our clinicians have been awarded Diplomate status in Clinical Neuropsychology (ABPP-CN) through the American Board of Clinical Neuropsychology and American Board of Professional Psychology. All our clinicians are licensed to practice in the state of California.

### **CLINIC POLICIES**

### **Availability**

Messages can be left for your clinician at the central line for Advanced Neurobehavioral Health (858) 693-3113. We strive to return all calls within 24 hours. When you call, please leave the optimal times when you can be reached. Please note that matters requiring extended clinical discussion will require scheduling an appointment with the clinician. In an emergency, you should call 911.

### **Email Policy - Patient Guidelines and Consent for Use of Email Communications**

To better serve our patients, we utilize email for routine matters such as scheduling, billing inquiries, and providing intake forms for you to print and complete offline. As there is some risk that any protected health information contained in such email may be disclosed to, or intercepted by, unauthorized third parties, we will use the minimum necessary amount of protected health information to complete routine matters. If you would like to discuss clinical matters or require more urgent attention, the email medium is not appropriate and we recommend that you contact us by phone. Email is not a secure medium and therefore we will not send or ask for any private/protected health care information via email. If your message is of a confidential nature and you have privacy concerns, please call instead of using email. If you choose to send confidential information by email, you are doing so at your own risk.

### **Patient and Parent Rights**

You are entitled to know the results of your child's tests, as well as our diagnoses and recommendations. You have the right to confidential services as described below. You have the right to withdraw from an evaluation or treatment at any time. You have the right to ask questions about any psychological or neuropsychological services provided. If you believe your rights have been violated or that you have been otherwise mistreated by a psychologist, you may file a formal complaint with the California State Board of Psychology.

### **Confidentiality**

Except under specific circumstances, information gathered from you and your child during the course of the evaluation is privileged and will be held in strict confidence. Your clinician will only share information regarding a child if he/she have obtained an authorization for the release of information to other agencies signed by the parent or legal guardian. You should be aware that exceptions to confidentiality include:

- 1. If the parent of a child or the child is believed to be potentially harmful to him/herself or someone else, confidentiality may be broken in order to protect people from imminent physical or psychological danger.
- 2. If there is known or suspected neglect, physical or sexual abuse of a child or vulnerable adult, our clinicians are mandated by law to report such concerns to appropriate social services and/or legal authorities.
- 3. If a court of law issues a subpoena, a psychologist may be required to provide the information

- specified in the subpoena.
- 4. In the event of a client's death, the spouse or parents of a deceased client have a right to access their child or spouse's records.
- 5. Professional misconduct by a health care professional must be reported by other health care professionals, so long as reporting does not violate patient confidentiality. In cases in which a professional or legal disciplinary meeting is being held regarding the health care professional's actions, related records may be released in order to substantiate disciplinary concerns.
- 6. Parents or legal guardians of nonemancipated minor clients have the right to access the client's records.

### **Protected Health Information**

We are committed, whenever possible, to keep the health/mental health information contained in your record private. Please review the Notice of Privacy Practices for more information.

### **Supervision of Psychological Associates**

Our clinicians are actively involved in the training and supervision of new professionals including graduate students, predoctoral interns, or postdoctoral fellows. A trainee with extensive testing experience may be involved in some aspect of the evaluation of your child, but as licensed supervising psychologists, our clinicians will remain responsible for all aspects of the evaluation, including selection, interpretation, and reporting of psychological assessments.

#### Fees

The fee for an initial one-hour intake is \$250. Neuropsychological evaluation services are set at a fee of \$200 per hour of service. A typical neuropsychological evaluation will require 8-16 hours depending on the child's age and the total cost will range from \$1850-3450, which includes: the one-hour intake, evaluation/testing, review of medical and school records, parent and child interviews, administration and scoring of tests, report writing and a one-hour feedback session to review the results of the evaluation. We will require a \$1000.00 deposit at the time your examination is scheduled and the final payment will be due when you return for your feedback session to review the testing results and recommendations.

### Billing/Payment

When fees for services are not paid in a timely manner, collection agencies may be utilized in collecting unpaid debts. The specific content of the services will not be disclosed. If a debt remains unpaid, it may be reported to credit agencies, and the client's credit report may state the amount owed, time frame and the name of the clinic. There will be a \$25.00 fee assessed for returned checks.

### **Appointments**

If you are unable to keep an appointment, please call to cancel as soon as possible. The neuropsychological evaluation takes from 6 to 8 hours, and therefore the entire day is reserved for your child. You will be charged a fee of \$500 for evaluation appointments that are not cancelled at least 4 business days in advance, except in the case of emergency. You will be charged a fee of \$200 for intake and feedback appointments that are not cancelled at least 4 business days in advance, except in the case of emergency. If you are significantly late for arrival for your scheduled appointment, please note that your appointment will have to be rescheduled which may delay the evaluation process for your child considerably given our typical waiting list.

### Insurance

Insurance companies vary considerably with respect to level of reimbursement for neuropsychological or psychological evaluations. You should be prepared for the possibility that they will reimburse you at a minimal percentage for the cost of the evaluation. While we cannot be responsible for attempting to collect insurance reimbursement from your provider, we always provide you with a copy of your bill that

you can submit directly to your insurance company for reimbursement. We recommend that you contact your insurance provider in advance to discuss the specifics of what they will and will not cover for neuropsychological and psychological evaluations.

### **Use of Clinical Data for Research**

As neuropsychologists, we are committed to advancing the understanding of how children's brain based profile of strengths and weaknesses might impact behavior and learning. Information collected during the course of your child's evaluation may be helpful in generating important research findings. We would like your permission to store information collected about your child for possible use in future research studies. Under no circumstance would any identifying information about your child appear in any presentation or publication resulting from such research. You are free to decline this opportunity with no effect on the care your child receives.

This report presents our findings, opinions and recommendations made in conjunction with our structural assessment at the Gymnasium and the Shower and Locker Buildings located at Dana Hills High School.

Our assessment was made on September 8, 2017 under fair and sunny weather conditions. Those present from the district included Mr. Ryan Carter, Director of Construction, Mr. Clark Hampton, Deputy Superintendent, and Mr. William Condon, Maintenance Supervisor. Our assessment was limited to visual observations and did not include destructive testing or other similar investigative procedures. Existing drawings dated June 17, 1970 (DSA A#32658) were made available to us prior to our assessment and were reviewed prior to us being on site.

# **BUILDING DESCRIPTION**

The gymnasium space is part of a multi-building structure utilizing pre-stressed, precast tee beams spanning to cast in place and precast concrete walls (with integral concrete beams in the walls at the gymnasium space) and cast in place concrete columns supported on concrete caisson foundations. The pre-stressed, recast tee beams at the roof bear on the integral beams within the walls at steel bearing plates.

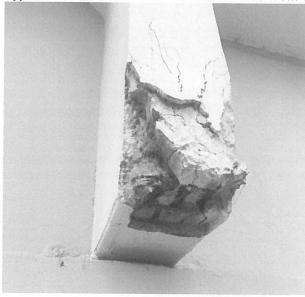
## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Upon walking the low roof adjacent to the gymnasium, we noted prevalent spalling of the concrete at the ends of the roof tee beams. We noted two different mixes of concrete; a sand aggregate mortar and a 3/8" lightweight aggregate mix. We also noted the presence of corrosion on the reinforcing and tendons. Also visible was a formed surface where the joint between the lightweight concrete for the tee beam had a pocket to allow stressing of the steel

tendons. The sand aggregate mortar made up the cast in place end cap as noted on detail 12 of sheet ST-4 of the original drawings.

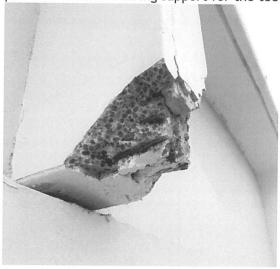
Typical tee beam tail with formed surface from original pocket visible:

#### DISCUSSION

We have concluded that the sand aggregate mortar mix was not a quality mix nor was it well bonded to the lightweight concrete tee beam. It did not provide proper protection for the mild steel ties or the steel pre-stressing tendons, which have corroded in the area of the cap resulting in expansive forces that have spalled the concrete. We did not note damage to any of the tee beams in the bearing area at the integral concrete beam that provides support or that the interior spans of the beams. All damage was limited to the cantilever tails at the eave of the building.

# **RECOMMENDATIONS**

As a first step, we recommend that the district authorize us to survey the site and identify any conditions that exist where falling debris could contact students or faculty in accordance with our discussions with the Division of the State Architect's San Diego office. We recommend the district provide barricades limiting path of travel in those areas until repairs are made. As a second step, we recommend that the district authorize us to perform a thorough survey of all tee beam ends on site and that we prepare a plan identifying every beam in need of repair details and specifications for the proper repair of the affected tee beams.

# **CONCLUSIONS**

The condition of the tee beams has not compromised the original vertical and lateral load carrying capacity of the structure and their current condition does not preclude the building from continuing to house students and staff.

District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matters in the name of District. All notices that are required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and sent by either personal delivery, nationally recognized overnight courier service or prepaid, first class United States postal mail. Notices shall be sent to signatories to this Agreement at the addresses given therein.
- 13. <u>Compliance with Applicable Laws</u>. The services completed herein must meet the approval of District and shall be subject to District's general right of inspection to ensure the satisfactory completion thereof. Consultant agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances that are now or may in the future become applicable to Consultant, Consultant's business, and personnel engaged in operations covered by this Agreement or accruing out of performing of such operations.

- 24. Captions. The captions of this Agreement shall have no effect on its interpretation.
- 25. <u>No Use of Mark or Name</u>. Consultant shall not use any name, trademark or service mark of District without first having received District's written consent to such use.

Within five (5) business days of receipt of the list, the other party shall then either: (1) select a mediator from the list and notify the proponent of the claim of the selection of a mediator; or (2) if none of the proposed mediators are acceptable, then that party shall send an alternative list of four recognized mediators to the proponent of the claim. Within five within (5) business days of recipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select a mediator; or (2) if none of the mediators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of a mediator, then the mediation requirement of this paragraph shall not be required and the parties will proceed to the process set forth in paragraph C of Section 30 hereof.

# C. Expedited Arbitration

Within five (5) business days following an unsuccessful mediation or if no mediation takes place, the proponent of the claim shall send a list of four recognized arbitrators to the other party. Within five (5) business days of receipt of the list, the other party shall then either: (1) select an arbitrator from the list and notify the proponent of the claim of the selection of an arbitrators; or (2) if none of the proposed arbitrators are acceptable, then that party shall send an alternative list of four recognized arbitrators to the proponent of the claim. Within five within (5) business days of receipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select an arbitrator; or (2) if none of the arbitrators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. The arbitrators shall be from either JAMS, ADR Services, or the American Arbitration Association. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of an arbitrator, then the proponent of the claim shall notify one of the foregoing three alternative dispute resolution services and that service shall select an arbitrator. The arbitration shall take place and be concluded within forty five (45) days of the selection of an arbitrator and shall not take more than two (2) full day sessions with the time of the arbitration being divided equally between the parties. The arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts. "Admissible Facts" are defined as facts that would be admissible in court under the California Rules of Evidence. The arbitrator's decision must also be based upon applicable law. The arbitrator does not have the power or discretion to fashion any remedy on the contract that he or she sees fit. Rather, the arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts and applicable law and in accord with the terms, condition and provisions of the contract. The arbitrator shall issue a written Statement of Decision applying the admissible facts to applicable law under the contract in reaching his/her determination. The arbitrator's decision shall be final and binding and can be introduced into court for the purpose of obtaining a judgment thereon provided the arbitrator has complied with the provisions of this paragraph. Should the arbitrator fail to do so, then an objecting party has the right to have the claim determined in court. The parties agree that the dispute resolutions of this Paragraph 30 are mandatory and the exclusive procedure to determine claims made regarding this Agreement that should a party fail to follow them that the claim is waived, released, and forever forfeited. Each party shall bear its own attorney's fees and costs.

The arbitration shall take place and be concluded within forty five (45) days of the selection of an arbitrator and shall not take more than two (2) full day sessions with the time of the arbitration being divided equally between the parties. The arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts. "Admissible Facts" are defined as facts that would be admissible in court under the California Rules of Evidence. The arbitrator's decision must also be based upon applicable law. The arbitrator does not have the power or discretion to fashion any remedy on the contract that he or she sees fit. Rather, the arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts and applicable law and in accord with the terms, condition and provisions of the contract. The arbitrator shall issue a written Statement of Decision applying the admissible facts to applicable law under the contract in reaching his/her determination. The arbitrator's decision shall be final and binding and can be introduced into court for the purpose of obtaining a judgment thereon provided the arbitrator has complied with the provisions of this paragraph. Should the arbitrator fail to do so, then an objecting party has the right to have the claim determined in court. The parties agree that the dispute resolutions of this Paragraph 30 are mandatory and the exclusive procedure to determine claims made regarding this Agreement that should a party fail to follow them that the claim is waived, released, and forever forfeited. Contractor shall ensure that persons who perform services on District's property, including without limitation K12 school districts, have not been convicted of any felony, have not been convicted of any controlled substance offense, and have not been convicted of any sex offense, as those terms are defined by Education Code section 45125.1.
- 30. Mandatory Claims Process, including Expedited Arbitration.

If District or Consultant has a claim regarding, arising from, or pertaining to this Agreement, this Mandatory Claims Process is the exclusive method for determing and resolving such claims.

#### A. Initial Review and Evaluation of a Claim

Within ten (10) business days of a party to this Agreement suffering a loss, that party shall advise the other party of the loss in writing by sending written notice to the signatory on this Agreement for the other party. Within ten (10)

business days of from the date of receipt of such written notice, the signatories to this Agreement shall meet and discuss and resolve the claim. A resolution reached at the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting shall be reduced to writing and become an amendment to this Agreement upon approval by District's Board of Trustees.

#### B. Expedited Mediation

If the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting does not resolve the claim, then within five (5) business days following the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting the proponent of the claim shall send a list of four recognized mediators to the other party. Within five (5) business days of receipt of the list, the other party shall then either: (1) select a mediator from the list and notify the proponent of the claim of the selection of a mediator; or (2) if none of the proposed mediators are acceptable, then that party shall send an alternative list of four recognized mediators to the proponent of the claim. Within five within (5) business days of recipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select a mediator; or (2) if none of the mediators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of a mediator, then the mediation requirement of this paragraph shall not be required and the parties will proceed to the process set forth in paragraph C of Section 30 hereof.

#### C. Expedited Arbitration

Within five (5) business days following an unsuccessful mediation or if no mediation takes place, the proponent of the claim shall send a list of four recognized arbitrators to the other party. Within five (5) business days of receipt of the list, the other party shall then either: (1) select an arbitrator from the list and notify the proponent of the claim of the selection of an arbitrators; or (2) if none of the proposed arbitrators are acceptable, then that party shall send an alternative list of four recognized arbitrators to the proponent of the claim. Within five within (5) business days of receipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select an arbitrator; or (2) if none of the arbitrators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. The arbitrators shall be from either JAMS, ADR Services, or the American Arbitration Association. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of an arbitrator, then the proponent of the claim shall notify one of the foregoing three alternative dispute resolution services and that service shall select an arbitrator. The arbitration shall take place and be concluded within forty five (45) days of the selection of an arbitrator and shall not take more than two (2) full day sessions with the time of the arbitration being divided equally between the parties. The arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts. "Admissible Facts' are defined as facts that would be admissible in court under the California Rules of Evidence. The arbitrator's decision must also be based upon applicable law. The arbitrator does not have the power or discretion to fashion any remedy on the contract that he or she sees fit. Rather, the arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts and applicable law and in accord with the terms, condition and provisions of the contract. The arbitrator shall issue a written Statement of Decision applying the admissible facts to applicable law under the contract in reaching his/her determination. The arbitrator's decision shall be final and binding and can be introduced into court for the purpose of obtaining a judgment thereon provided the arbitrator has complied with the provisions of this paragraph. Should the arbitrator fail to do so, then an objecting party has the right to have the claim determined in court. The parties agree that the dispute resolutions of this Paragraph 30 are mandatory and the exclusive procedure to determine claims made regarding this Agreement that should a party fail to follow them that the claim is waived, released, and forever forfeited. Each party shall bear its own attorney's fees and costs.

#### **GENERAL CONDITIONS**

District and Contractor acknowledge, and agree to be bound by, the provisions set forth below:

- 1. Engagement of Services. District engages the services of Contractor under the terms in the Agreement and these additional provisions. - 3. <u>Expenses</u>. Contractor shall handle all expenses incurred in performing services under the Agreement, unless otherwise agreed upon in writing by District.
- 4. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. Contractor, in performing this Agreement, shall be, and act as, an independent contractor. Contractor understands and agrees that he/she/it, all his/her/its employees, agents and contractors shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of District, and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of District and/or to which District's employees are normally entitled, including, but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Worker's Compensation. Contractor assumes the full responsibility for the acts and/or omissions of his/her/its employees, agents and contractors as they relate to the services to be provided under this Agreement. Contractor shall assume full responsibility for payment of all Federal, State and local taxes or contributions, including unemployment insurance, social security and income taxes, and insurance, including workers' compensation, with respect to Contractor's employees. Further, Contractor and its personnel shall not have the authority, express or implied, to act as an agent on behalf of, or bind, the District, unless expressly authorized in writing by the District.
- 5. <u>Originality of Services</u>. Contractor agrees that all technologies, formulae, procedures, processes, methods, writings, and ideas, dialogue, compositions, recordings, teleplays and video productions prepared for, written for, submitted to the District and/or used in connection with this Agreement, shall be wholly original to Contractor and shall not be copied in whole or in part from any other source.
- 6. Copyright/Trademark/Patent. Contractor understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement, including information prepared, produced, or provided, such as, for illustrative purposes, documents, writings, typewriting, printing, photostatting, computer models, plans, drawings, etc., shall become the property of District and cannot be used without District's express written permission. District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matters in the name of District. Contractor consents to use of Contractor's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium. Any trade secrets of the District which come into the possession of Contractor in connection with services under this Agreement, remain the property of the District and Contractor expressly agrees to keep such trades secrets confidential.
- 7. Termination. District may terminate the Agreement at its convenience and without any breach by Contractor upon ten (10) calendar days' prior written notice to Contractor. District may also terminate the Agreement immediately in its sole discretion for cause or upon Contractor's breach of any provision of the Agreement. Cause means (a) any act of dishonesty or a plea of no contest to a felony or any crime involving moral turpitude by an individual with whom the District contracts directly, or an owner, officer or director of an entity with whom the District contracts; (b) any reasonable suspicion of fraud; (c) negligence in the performance of duties under the Agreement; and (d) nonperformance, as determined by the District, of any reasonable and lawful duty assigned under the Agreement. Contractor may terminate this Agreement at any time upon thirty (30) days' prior written notice to District. Contractor and District each agree to sign any documents reasonably necessary to complete Contractor's discharge or withdrawal. Upon termination of this Agreement for any reason, Contractor's fees will be prorated based on the work completed at the time of termination for work then in progress, to and including the effective date of such termination, which shall be substantiated by appropriate

- documentation. Unless other terms are set forth in this Agreement, District will reimburse Contractor for previously approved expenses in compliance with the policies of the District.
- 8. Return of District Property. Upon termination of this Agreement or earlier as requested by District, Contractor will deliver to District any and all District property including, but not limited to, District-provided information, intellectual property, and equipment of District. Contractor further agrees that any property situated on District's premises, including disks and other storage media, filing cabinets or other work areas, is subject to inspection by District personnel at any time. The District shall have access, upon reasonable request, to Contractor's plans, job files, reports, data and records relating to the work performed under this Agreement.
- 9. <u>Indemnification and Hold Harmless</u>. Contractor agrees to and shall immediately defend, indemnify and hold harmless the District, its Board of Trustees, officers, agents, employees, and volunteers from all demands, claims, including active and passive claims, lawsuits, damages, of every kind and nature, losses, costs, attorneys' fees and expenses, liability or claim of liability for personal injury, bodily injury to persons or death, furnishing or use of any copyrighted or uncopyrighted matter or patented or unpatented invention, contractual liability, and damage to property sustained or claimed to have been sustained, arising out of, or pertaining to, activities or services provided by Contractor or its employees, subcontractors, or agents, whether authorized by this Agreement or not. Contractor further agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against the District. This paragraph does not apply to any damage or losses caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of District or its employees. The defense, indemnity and hold harmless provisions of this Agreement shall not be limited, impaired or diminished in any way by the insurance requirements set forth in this Agreement. This paragraph shall be construed in the broadest manner to provide for an immediate defense and indemnity of the claims set forth herein.
- 10. <u>Insurance</u>. Contractor agrees to carry commercial general liability insurance and automobile liability insurance with limits of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage in a form mutually acceptable to both parties to protect Contractor and District against liability or claims of liability, which may arise out of this Agreement. In addition, Contractor agrees to provide an endorsement to this policy stating, "Such insurance as is afforded by this policy shall be primary, and any insurance carried by District shall be excess and noncontributory." No later than the Effective Date, Contractor shall provide District with certificates of insurance evidencing all coverages and endorsements required hereunder. Contractor agrees to name District and its officers, agents and employees as additional insureds by separate endorsement under said policy or policies. Nothing herein shall limit the obligations for Contractor to provide insurance as required under other provisions of this Agreement.
- 11. <u>Assignment</u>. The obligations of the Contractor pursuant to this Agreement shall not be assigned by Contractor without prior written consent from the District.
- 12. <u>Notices</u>. All notices that are required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and sent by either personal delivery, nationally recognized overnight courier service or prepaid, first class United States postal mail. Notices shall be sent to signatories to this Agreement at the addresses given therein.
- 13. Compliance with Applicable Laws. The services completed herein must meet the approval of District and shall be subject to District's general right of inspection to ensure the satisfactory completion thereof. Contractor agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules, regulations and ordinances that are now or may in the future become applicable to Contractor, Contractor's business, and personnel engaged in operations covered by this Agreement or accruing out of performing of such operations.
- 14. <u>Permits/Licenses</u>. Contractor and all Contractor's employees or agents shall secure and maintain in force such permits and licenses as are required by law in connection with the furnishing of services under this Agreement.
- 15. <u>Employment with Public Agency</u>. Contractor, if an employee of another public agency, agrees that Contractor will not receive salary or remuneration, other that vacation pay, as an employee of another public agency for the actual time in which services are actually being performed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 16. Entire Agreement/Amendment. This Agreement and any exhibits, or general or specific terms and conditions attached hereto constitute the entire Agreement among the parties to it and supersedes any prior or contemporaneous understanding or agreement regarding the services contemplated, and may be amended only by a written amendment executed by both parties to this Agreement.
- 17. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. Contractor agrees that it will not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment of persons because of race, color, religious creed, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status,

- sexual orientation, or gender of such person. To the extent applicable to the this Agreement, Contractor shall comply with the Executive Order 11246 entitled "Equal Opportunity in Federal Employment", as amended by Executive Order 11375 and 12086, and as supplemented in Department of Labor regulations (41 CFR Chapter 60).
- 18. <u>Non-waiver</u>. The failure of District or Contractor to seek redress for violation of, or to insist upon, the strict performance of any term or condition of this Agreement, shall not be deemed a waiver by that party of such term or condition, or prevent a subsequent similar act from again constituting a violation of such term or condition.
- 19. <u>Severability</u>. If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 20. <u>Attorney Fees/Costs.</u> Should litigation be necessary to enforce any terms or provisions of the Agreement, then the prevailing party shall be entitled to all legally-permitted expenses, including, but not limited to, witness fees, court costs, and attorneys' fees.
- 21. <u>Governing Law</u>. The laws of the State of California shall govern the terms and conditions of this Agreement with venue for any dispute arising hereunder to be solely proper in Orange County, California.
- 22. <u>Construction of Agreement</u>. If there is any uncertainty or ambiguity in the terms of this Agreement, it shall not be construed for or against any Party hereto on the grounds that such Party was responsible for drafting of any particular term set forth herein. The Parties each waive and relinquish in connection with this Agreement any and all rights that he/ she/it may have or claim under <u>California Civil Code</u> section 1654.
- 23. <u>Conflict</u>. In the event of any alleged, implied, or actual conflict between the express or implied provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of the exhibits, or any other document included herein, the provisions of this Agreement shall govern.
- 24. <u>Captions</u>. The captions of this Agreement shall have no effect on its interpretation.
- 25. No Use of Mark or Name. Consultant shall not use any name, trademark or service mark of District without first having received District's written consent to such use.
- Singular and Plural. Where required by the context of this Agreement, the singular shall include the plural and viceversa.
- 27. <u>Successors in Interest</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon the heirs, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns of the respective Parties hereto.

- 30. Mandatory Claims Process, including Expedited Arbitration.

If District or Consultant has a claim regarding, arising from, or pertaining to this Agreement, this Mandatory Claims Process is the exclusive method for determing and resolving such claims.

#### A. <u>Initial Review and Evaluation of a Claim</u>

Within ten (10) business days of a party to this Agreement suffering a loss, that party shall advise the other party of the loss in writing by sending written notice to the signatory on this Agreement for the other party. Within ten (10)

business days of from the date of receipt of such written notice, the signatories to this Agreement shall meet and discuss and resolve the claim. A resolution reached at the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting shall be reduced to writing and become an amendment to this Agreement upon approval by District's Board of Trustees.

#### B. Expedited Mediation

If the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting does not resolve the claim, then within five (5) business days following the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting the proponent of the claim shall send a list of four recognized mediators to the other party. Within five (5) business days of receipt of the list, the other party shall then either: (1) select a mediator from the list and notify the proponent of the claim of the selection of a mediator; or (2) if none of the proposed mediators are acceptable, then that party shall send an alternative list of four recognized mediators to the proponent of the claim. Within five within (5) business days of recipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select a mediator; or (2) if none of the mediators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of a mediator, then the mediation requirement of this paragraph shall not be required and the parties will proceed to the process set forth in paragraph C of Section 30 hereof.

#### C. Expedited Arbitration

Within five (5) business days following an unsuccessful mediation or if no mediation takes place, the proponent of the claim shall send a list of four recognized arbitrators to the other party. Within five (5) business days of receipt of the list, the other party shall then either: (1) select an arbitrator from the list and notify the proponent of the claim of the selection of an arbitrators; or (2) if none of the proposed arbitrators are acceptable, then that party shall send an alternative list of four recognized arbitrators to the proponent of the claim. Within five within (5) business days of receipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select an arbitrator; or (2) if none of the arbitrators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. The arbitrators shall be from either JAMS, ADR Services, or the American Arbitration Association. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of an arbitrator, then the proponent of the claim shall notify one of the foregoing three alternative dispute resolution services and that service shall select an arbitrator. The arbitration shall take place and be concluded within forty five (45) days of the selection of an arbitrator and shall not take more than two (2) full day sessions with the time of the arbitration being divided equally between the parties. The arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts. "Admissible Facts" are defined as facts that would be admissible in court under the California Rules of Evidence. The arbitrator's decision must also be based upon applicable law. The arbitrator does not have the power or discretion to fashion any remedy on the contract that he or she sees fit. Rather, the arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts and applicable law and in accord with the terms, condition and provisions of the contract. The arbitrator shall issue a written Statement of Decision applying the admissible facts to applicable law under the contract in reaching his/her determination. The arbitrator's decision shall be final and binding and can be introduced into court for the purpose of obtaining a judgment thereon provided the arbitrator has complied with the provisions of this paragraph. Should the arbitrator fail to do so, then an objecting party has the right to have the claim determined in court. The parties agree that the dispute resolutions of this Paragraph 30 are mandatory and the exclusive procedure to determine claims made regarding this Agreement that should a party fail to follow them that the claim is waived, released, and forever forfeited. Each party shall bear its own attorney's fees and costs.

- 17. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. Contractor agrees that it will not engage in unlawful discrimination in employment of persons because of race, color, religious creed, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, medical condition, marital status,

- sexual orientation, or gender of such person. - 19. <u>Severability</u>. If any term, condition or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 20. <u>Attorney Fees/Costs.</u> Should litigation be necessary to enforce any terms or provisions of the Agreement, then the prevailing party shall be entitled to all legally-permitted expenses, including, but not limited to, witness fees, court costs, and attorneys' fees.
- 21. <u>Governing Law</u>. The laws of the State of California shall govern the terms and conditions of this Agreement with venue for any dispute arising hereunder to be solely proper in Orange County, California.
- 22. Construction of Agreement. If there is any uncertainty or ambiguity in the terms of this Agreement, it shall not be construed for or against any Party hereto on the grounds that such Party was responsible for drafting of any particular term set forth herein. The Parties each waive and relinquish in connection with this Agreement any and all rights that he/ she/it may have or claim under California Civil Code section 1654.
- 23. <u>Conflict</u>. In the event of any alleged, implied, or actual conflict between the express or implied provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of the exhibits, or any other document included herein, the provisions of this Agreement shall govern.
- 24. Captions. The captions of this Agreement shall have no effect on its interpretation.
- 25. No Use of Mark or Name. Consultant shall not use any name, trademark or service mark of District without first having received District's written consent to such use.
- 26. <u>Singular and Plural</u>. Where required by the context of this Agreement, the singular shall include the plural and viceversa.
- 27. <u>Successors in Interest</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon the heirs, successors, executors, administrators, and assigns of the respective Parties hereto.
- 28. <u>Survival and Severability</u>. Unless otherwise specifically provided, the covenants herein shall survive termination of this Agreement. The unenforceability, invalidity, or illegality of any provision of this Agreement shall not render the other provisions unenforceable, invalid, or illegal.
- 29. Consultant's Employees. Contractor shall at all times enforce appropriate discipline and good order among its employees and shall not employ or work any unfit person or anyone not skilled in providing the services required under this Agreement. It shall be the responsibility of Contractor to ensure compliance with this section. ### A. <u>Initial Review and Evaluation of a Claim</u>

Within ten (10) business days of a party to this Agreement suffering a loss, that party shall advise the other party of the loss in writing by sending written notice to the signatory on this Agreement for the other party. Within ten (10)

business days of from the date of receipt of such written notice, the signatories to this Agreement shall meet and discuss and resolve the claim. A resolution reached at the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting shall be reduced to writing and become an amendment to this Agreement upon approval by District's Board of Trustees.

### B. Expedited Mediation

If the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting does not resolve the claim, then within five (5) business days following the Initial Review and Evaluation Meeting the proponent of the claim shall send a list of four recognized mediators to the other party. Within five (5) business days of receipt of the list, the other party shall then either: (1) select a mediator from the list and notify the proponent of the claim of the selection of a mediator; or (2) if none of the proposed mediators are acceptable, then that party shall send an alternative list of four recognized mediators to the proponent of the claim. Within five within (5) business days of recipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select a mediator; or (2) if none of the mediators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of a mediator, then the mediation requirement of this paragraph shall not be required and the parties will proceed to the process set forth in paragraph C of Section 30 hereof.

# C. Expedited Arbitration

Within five (5) business days following an unsuccessful mediation or if no mediation takes place, the proponent of the claim shall send a list of four recognized arbitrators to the other party. Within five (5) business days of receipt of the list, the other party shall then either: (1) select an arbitrator from the list and notify the proponent of the claim of the selection of an arbitrators; or (2) if none of the proposed arbitrators are acceptable, then that party shall send an alternative list of four recognized arbitrators to the proponent of the claim. Within five within (5) business days of receipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select an arbitrator; or (2) if none of the arbitrators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. The arbitrators shall be from either JAMS, ADR Services, or the American Arbitration Association. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of an arbitrator, then the proponent of the claim shall notify one of the foregoing three alternative dispute resolution services and that service shall select an arbitrator. The arbitration shall take place and be concluded within forty five (45) days of the selection of an arbitrator and shall not take more than two (2) full day sessions with the time of the arbitration being divided equally between the parties. The arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts. "Admissible Facts" are defined as facts that would be admissible in court under the California Rules of Evidence. The arbitrator's decision must also be based upon applicable law. The arbitrator does not have the power or discretion to fashion any remedy on the contract that he or she sees fit. Rather, the arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts and applicable law and in accord with the terms, condition and provisions of the contract. The arbitrator shall issue a written Statement of Decision applying the admissible facts to applicable law under the contract in reaching his/her determination. The arbitrator's decision shall be final and binding and can be introduced into court for the purpose of obtaining a judgment thereon provided the arbitrator has complied with the provisions of this paragraph. Should the arbitrator fail to do so, then an objecting party has the right to have the claim determined in court. The parties agree that the dispute resolutions of this Paragraph 30 are mandatory and the exclusive procedure to determine claims made regarding this Agreement that should a party fail to follow them that the claim is waived, released, and forever forfeited. Each party shall bear its own attorney's fees and costs.

Contractor understands and agrees that all matters produced under this Agreement, including information prepared, produced, or provided, such as, for illustrative purposes, documents, writings, typewriting, printing, photostatting, computer models, plans, drawings, etc., shall become the property of District and cannot be used without District's express written permission. District shall have all right, title and interest in said matters, including the right to secure and maintain the copyright, trademark and/or patent of said matters in the name of District. Contractor consents to use of Contractor's name in conjunction with the sale, use, performance and distribution of the matters, for any purpose and in any medium. Within five within (5) business days of receipt of the alternative list, the proponent shall either: (1) select an arbitrator; or (2) if none of the arbitrators listed are acceptable, then notify the other party of that fact. The arbitrators shall be from either JAMS, ADR Services, or the American Arbitration Association. If the foregoing process does not result in the selection of an arbitrator, then the proponent of the claim shall notify one of the foregoing three alternative dispute resolution services and that service shall select an arbitrator. The arbitration shall take place and be concluded within forty five (45) days of the selection of an arbitrator and shall not take more than two (2) full day sessions with the time of the arbitration being divided equally between the parties. The arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts. "Admissible Facts" are defined as facts that would be admissible in court under the California Rules of Evidence. The arbitrator's decision must also be based upon applicable law. The arbitrator does not have the power or discretion to fashion any remedy on the contract that he or she sees fit. Rather, the arbitrator's decision must be based on admissible facts and applicable law and in accord with the terms, condition and provisions of the contract. The arbitrator shall issue a written Statement of Decision applying the admissible facts to applicable law under the contract in reaching his/her determination. The arbitrator's decision shall be final and binding and can be introduced into court for the purpose of obtaining a judgment thereon provided the arbitrator has complied with the provisions of this paragraph. Should the arbitrator fail to do so, then an objecting party has the right to have the claim determined in court. The parties agree that the dispute resolutions of this Paragraph 30 are mandatory and the exclusive procedure to determine claims made regarding this Agreement that should a party fail to follow them that the claim is waived, released, and forever forfeited. Each party shall bear its own attorney's fees and costs.

# AUTHORIZATION FOR MASTER CONTRACT AND GENERAL PROVISIONS

### 1. MASTER CONTRACT

This Master Contract is entered into this 29<sup>th</sup> day of June, 2017, between the Capistrano Unified School District (hereinafter referred to as "District" or local educational agency "LEA") and Ocean View School (hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR") for the purpose of providing special education and/or related services to District students with exceptional needs under the authorization of California Education Code sections 56157, 56361 and 56365 et seq. and Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 3000 et seq., AB490 (Chapter 862, Statutes of 2003) and AB1858 (Chapter 914, Statutes of 2004). It is understood that this agreement does not commit the District to pay for special education and/or related services provided to any District student, or CONTRACTOR to provide such special education and/or related services, unless and until an authorized LEA representative approves the provision of special education and/or related services by CONTRACTOR.

Upon acceptance of a student, LEA shall submit to CONTRACTOR an Individual Services Agreement (hereinafter referred to as "ISA"). Unless otherwise agreed in writing, the ISA shall acknowledge CONTRACTOR's obligation to provide all services specified in the student's Individualized Education Plan (hereinafter referred to as "IEP"). The ISA shall be executed within ninety (90) days of an LEA student's enrollment. LEA and CONTRACTOR shall enter into an ISA for each LEA student served by CONTRACTOR.

Unless placement is made pursuant to an Office of Administrative Hearings (hereinafter referred to as "OAH") order, a lawfully executed agreement between LEA and parent, authorized by LEA for a transfer student pursuant to California Education Code section 56325, or otherwise authorized by LEA without a signed IEP, LEA is not responsible for the costs associated with nonpublic school placement until the date on which an IEP team meeting is convened, the IEP team determines that a nonpublic school placement is appropriate, and the IEP is signed by the LEA student's parent.

### 2. CERTIFICATIONS AND LICENSES

CONTRACTOR shall be certified by the California Department of Education (hereinafter referred to as "CDE") as a nonpublic, nonsectarian school/agency. All nonpublic school and nonpublic agency services shall be provided consistent with the area of certification specified by CDE Certification and as defined in California Education Code, section 56366 et seq. and within the professional scope of practice of each provider's license, certification and/or credential. In addition to meeting the certification requirements of the State of California, a CONTRACTOR that operates a program outside of this State shall be certified or licensed by that state to provide, respectively, special education and related services and designated instruction and related services to pupils under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. Sec. 1400 et seq.).

If CONTRACTOR is a licensed children's institution (hereinafter referred to as "LCI"), CONTRACTOR shall be licensed by the state, or other public agency having delegated authority by contract with the state to license, to provide nonmedical care to children, including, but not limited to, individuals with exceptional needs. The LCI must also comply with all licensing requirements relevant to the protection of the child, and have a special permit, if necessary, to meet the needs of each child so placed. If the CONTRACTOR operates a program outside of California and provides services to LEA students in such out-of-state program, CONTRACTOR must obtain all required licenses from the appropriate licensing agency in both California and in the state where the LCI is located.

A current copy of CONTRACTOR's licenses and nonpublic school/agency certifications, or a validly issued waiver of any such certification, must be provided to LEA on or before the date this Master Contract is executed by CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR must immediately (and under no circumstances longer than three (3) calendar days) notify LEA if any such licenses, certifications or waivers are expired, suspended, revoked, rescinded, or subject to a pending administrative or legal complaint or lawsuit, or otherwise nullified during the effective period of this Master Contract. If any such licenses, certifications or waivers are expired, suspended, revoked, rescinded, or otherwise nullified during the effective period of this Master Contract, this Master Contract shall terminate as of the date of such action.

Total student enrollment shall be limited to capacity as stated on CDE certification. Total student enrollment shall be limited to capacity as stated in Section 24 of the Master Contract.

# 3. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS, STATUTES, REGULATIONS

During the term of this Master Contract, CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local statutes, laws, ordinances, rules, policies, and regulations including but not limited to the provision of special education and/or related services, facilities for individuals with exceptional needs, pupil enrollment, attendance and transfer, corporal punishment, pupil discipline, and positive behavioral interventions.

CONTRACTOR acknowledges and understands that LEA may report to the CDE any violations of the provisions of this Master Contract, and that this may result in the suspension and/or revocation of CDE nonpublic school/agency certification pursuant to California Education Code section 56366.4(a).

# 4. TERM OF MASTER CONTRACT

The term of this Master Contract shall be from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018 (Title 5 California Code of Regulations section 3062(a)) unless otherwise stated. Neither the CONTRACTOR nor the LEA is required to renew this Master Contract in subsequent contract years. However, the parties acknowledge that any subsequent Master Contract is to be renegotiated prior to June 30, 2017. In the event a Master Contract is not renegotiated by June 30<sup>th</sup>, an interim contract may be made available as mutually agreed upon for up to 90 days from July 1 of the new fiscal year. (Title 5, California Code of Regulations, Section 3062(d).) No Master Contract will be offered unless and until all of the contracting requirements have been satisfied. The offer of a Master Contract to a CONTRACTOR is at the sole discretion of the LEA. Requests for renegotiation of any rate, including but not limited to, related services for the subsequent contract year, are to be submitted in writing to Orange County Department of Education, Special Education Division, 200 Kalmus Drive, P.O. Box 9050, Costa Mesa, CA 92628-9050 prior to January 31, 2018.

# 5. INTEGRATION/CONTINUANCE OF CONTRACT FOLLOWING EXPIRATION OR TERMINATION

This Master Contract includes each Individual Services Agreement which is incorporated herein by this reference. This Master Contract supersedes any prior or contemporaneous written or oral understanding or agreement. This Master Contract may be amended only by written amendment executed by both parties.

CONTRACTOR shall provide the LEA with all information as requested in writing to secure a Master Contract or a renewal.

At a minimum, such information shall include copies of teacher credentials and clearance, insurance documentation and CDE certification. The LEA may require additional information as applicable. If the application packet is not completed and returned to the LEA, no Master Contract will be issued. If CONTRACTOR does not return the Master Contract to the LEA duly signed by an authorized representative within ninety (90) calendar days of issuance by LEA, the new contract rates will not take effect until the newly executed Master Contract is received by the LEA and will not be retroactive to the first day of the new Master Contract's effective date. If CONTRACTOR fails to execute the new Master Contract within such ninety day period, all payments shall cease until such time as the new Master Contract is signed. (California Education Code sections 56366(c)(1) and (2).) In the event that this Master Contract expires or terminates, CONTRACTOR and LEA shall continue to be bound to all of the terms and conditions of the most recent executed Master Contract between CONTRACTOR and LEA for so long as CONTRACTOR is servicing authorized LEA students at the direction of the LEA.

### 6. INDIVIDUAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Master Contract shall include an ISA developed for each LEA student for whom CONTRACTOR is to provide special education and/or related services. An ISA shall only be issued for LEA students enrolled with the approval of the LEA pursuant to Education Code section 56366(a)(2)(A). An ISA may be effective for more than one contract year provided that there is a concurrent Master Contract in effect. In the event that this Master Contract expires or terminates, CONTRACTOR shall continue to be bound to all of the terms and conditions of the most recent executed ISAs between CONTRACTOR and LEA for so long as CONTRACTOR is servicing authorized LEA students.

Any and all changes to a LEA student's educational placement/program provided under this Master Contract and/or an ISA shall be made solely on the basis of a revision to the LEA student's IEP. At any time during the term of this Master Contract, a LEA student's parent, CONTRACTOR, or LEA may request a review of a LEA student's IEP subject to all procedural safeguards required by law.

Unless otherwise provided in this Master Contract, the CONTRACTOR shall provide all services specified in the IEP unless the CONTRACTOR and the LEA agree otherwise in the ISA (California Education Code sections 56366(a)(5) and 3062(e)). In the event the CONTRACTOR is unable to provide a specific service at any time during the life of the ISA, the CONTRACTOR shall notify the LEA in writing within five (5) business days of the last date a service was provided.

If a parent or LEA contests the termination of an ISA by initiating a due process proceeding with the OAH, CONTRACTOR shall abide by the "stay-put" requirement of state and federal law unless the parent agrees otherwise. CONTRACTOR shall abide by the "stay-put" requirement of state and federal law when placement in an interim alternative educational setting is made by the LEA or OAH consistent with 20 U.S.C. section 1415(k)(1). CONTRACTOR shall adhere to all the LEA requirements concerning changes in placement.

Disagreements between the LEA and CONTRACTOR concerning the formulation of an ISA or the Master Contract may be appealed to the County Superintendent of Schools of the County where the LEA is located, or the State Superintendent of Public Instruction pursuant to the provisions of California Education Code section 56366(c)(2). Nothing herein shall limit LEA or CONTRACTOR from engaging in alternative dispute resolution. CONTRACTOR disagrees with the language of Education Code section 56366(c)(2), and nothing herein shall constitute a waiver by CONTRACTOR of its rights to challenge that provision.

# 7. **DEFINITIONS**

The following definitions shall apply for purposes of this contract:

- a. The term "CONTRACTOR" means a nonpublic, nonsectarian school/agency certified by the California Department of Education and identified in Paragraph 1 above.
- b. The term "authorized LEA representative" means a LEA administrator designated to be responsible for nonpublic school/agencies.
- c. The term "credential" means a valid credential, life diploma, permit, or document in special education or pupil personnel services issued by, or under the jurisdiction of, the State Board of Education if issued prior to 1970 or the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing, which entitles the holder thereof to perform services for which certification qualifications are required as defined in Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 3001(g).
- d. The term "qualified" means that a person holds a certificate, permit or other document equivalent to that which staff in a public school are required to hold to provide special education and designated instruction and services, and has met federal and state certification, licensing, registration, or other comparable requirements which apply to the area in which he or she is providing special education or related services, including those requirements set forth in Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations sections 3064 and 3065, or, in the absence of such requirements, the state-education-agency-approved or recognized requirements, and adheres to the standards of professional practice established in federal and state law or regulation, including the standards contained in the California Business and Professions Code. Nothing in this definition shall be construed as restricting the activities of services of a graduate needing direct hours leading to licensure, or of a student teacher or intern leading to a graduate degree at an accredited or approved college or university, as authorized by state laws or regulations.
- e. The term "license" means a valid nonexpired document issued by a licensing agency within the Department of Consumer Affairs or other state licensing office authorized to grant licenses and authorizing the bearer of the document to provide certain professional services, including but not limited to mental health and board and care services at a residential placement, or refer to themselves using a specified professional title. If a license is not available through an appropriate state licensing agency, a certificate of registration with the appropriate professional organization at the national or state level which has standards established for the certificate that are equivalent to a license, shall be deemed to be a license as defined in Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 3001(r).
- f. Parent means a biological or adoptive parent unless the biological or adoptive parent does not have legal authority to make educational decisions for the child, a guardian generally authorized to act as the child's parent or authorized to make educational decisions for the child, an individual acting in the place of a biological or adoptive parent, including a grandparent, stepparent, or other relative with whom the child lives, or an individual who is

legally responsible for the child's welfare, a surrogate parent, a foster parent if the authority of the biological or adoptive parent to make educational decisions on the child's behalf has been specifically limited by court order in accordance with Code of Federal Regulations 300.30(b)(1) or (2). Parent does not include the state or any political subdivision of government or the nonpublic school or agency under contract with the LEA for the provision of special education or designated instruction and services for a child. (California Education Code section 56028).

- g. The term "days" means calendar days unless otherwise specified.
- h. The phrase "billable day" means a school day in which instructional minutes meet or exceed those in comparable LEA programs.
- i. The phrase "billable day of attendance" means a school day as defined in California Education Code Section 46307, in which a LEA student is in attendance and in which instructional minutes meet or exceed those in comparable LEA programs unless otherwise stipulated in an IEP or ISA.
- j. It is understood that the term "Master Contract" also means "Agreement" and is referred to as such in this document.

### ADMINISTRATION OF CONTRACT

# 8. NOTICES

All notices provided for by this Master Contract shall be in writing. Notices shall be mailed by first class mail deposited with the United States Postal Service or delivered by hand and shall be effective as of the date of receipt by addressee. E-mail notifications may be used provided that a hard copy is also mailed by first class mail deposited with the United States Postal Service or delivered by hand and shall be effective as of the date of receipt by addressee via first class mail or hand delivery.

All notices mailed to the LEA shall be addressed to the person and address as indicated on the signature page of the Master Contract. Notices to CONTRACTOR shall be addressed as indicated on signature page of this Master Contract.

# 9. MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS

All records shall be maintained by CONTRACTOR as required by state and federal laws and regulations. Notwithstanding the foregoing sentence, CONTRACTOR shall maintain all records for at least five (5) years after the termination of this Master Contract. For purposes of this Master Contract, "records" shall include, but not be limited to student records as defined by California Education Code section 49061(b) including electronically stored information; cost data records as set forth in Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 3061; registers and roll books of teachers and/or daily service providers; daily service logs and notes and other documents used to record the provision of related services including supervision; daily service logs and notes used to record the provision of services provided through additional instructional assistants, NPA behavior intervention aides, and bus aides; absence verification records (parent/doctor notes, telephone logs, and related documents) if the CONTRACTOR is funded for excused absences, however, such records are not required if positive attendance is required; bus rosters; staff lists specifying credentials held and documents evidencing other staff qualifications, social security numbers, dates of hire, and dates of termination; records of employee training and certification, staff time sheets; non-paid staff and volunteer sign-in sheets; transportation and other related services subcontracts; school calendars; bell/class schedules when applicable; liability and worker's compensation insurance policies; state nonpublic school and/or agency certifications by-laws; lists of current board of directors/trustees, if incorporated; documents evidencing financial expenditures; federal/state payroll quarterly reports; and bank statements and canceled checks or facsimile thereof.

CONTRACTOR shall maintain LEA student records in a secure location to ensure confidentiality and prevent unauthorized access. CONTRACTOR shall maintain a current list of the names and positions of CONTRACTOR's employees who have access to confidential records. CONTRACTOR shall maintain an access log for each LEA student's record which lists all persons, agencies, or organizations requesting or receiving information from the record. Such log shall be maintained as required by California Education Code section 49064 and include the name, title, agency/organization affiliation, and date/time of access for each individual requesting or receiving information from the LEA student's record. Such log needs to record access to the LEA student's records by: (a) the LEA student's parent; (b) an individual to whom written consent has been executed by the LEA student's parent; or (c) employees of LEA or CONTRACTOR having a legitimate educational interest in requesting or receiving information from the record. CONTRACTOR/LEA shall maintain copies of any written parental concerns granting access to student records. For purposes of this paragraph, "employees of LEA or CONTRACTOR" do not include subcontractors. CONTRACTOR shall grant parents access to student records, and comply with parents' requests for copies of student records, as required by state and federal laws and regulations. CONTRACTOR agrees, in the event of school or agency closure, to forward all records within five (5) business days to LEA. These shall include, but not limited to, current transcripts, IEP/ISPs, and reports. CONTRACTOR acknowledges and agrees that all student records maintained by CONTRACTOR as required by state and federal laws and regulations are the property of LEA and must be returned to LEA without dissemination to any other entity.

### 10. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

If any provision of this Master Contract is held, in whole or in part, to be unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of that provision and of the entire Agreement shall be severable and remain in effect.

# 11. SUCCESSORS IN INTEREST

This contract binds CONTRACTOR's successors and assignees. CONTRACTOR shall notify the LEA of any change of ownership or corporate control.

#### 12. VENUE AND GOVERNING LAW

The laws of the State of California shall govern the terms and conditions of this Master Contract with venue in Orange County.

# 13. MODIFICATIONS AND AMENDMENTS REQUIRED TO CONFORM TO LEGAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE GUIDELINES

This Master Contract may be modified or amended to conform to administrative and statutory guidelines issued by any state, federal or local governmental agency. The party seeking such modification shall provide thirty (30) days' notice of any such changes or modifications made to conform to administrative or statutory guidelines and a copy of the statute or regulation upon which the modification or changes are based. If the parties cannot agree on such modifications or amendments, this Master Contract may be terminated in accordance with Paragraph 14.

# 14. TERMINATION

This Master Contract or an Individual Service Agreement may be terminated for cause. The cause shall not be the availability of a public class initiated during the period of the Master Contract or ISA

unless the parent agrees to the transfer of the student to the public school program at an IEP team meeting. To terminate the Master Contract for cause, either party shall give twenty (20) days prior written notice to the other party (California Education Code section 56366(a)(4)). At the time of termination, CONTRACTOR shall provide to the LEA any and all documents CONTRACTOR is required to maintain under this Master Contract. ISAs are void upon termination of this Master Contract, except as specified above in Paragraph 5. CONTRACTOR or the LEA may also terminate an individual ISA for cause. To terminate the ISA, either party shall also give twenty (20) days prior written notice to the other.

# 15. INSURANCE

CONTRACTOR shall, at his, her, or its sole cost and expense, maintain in full force and effect, during the term of this Agreement, the following insurance coverage from a California licensed and/or admitted insurer with an A minus (A-), VII, or better rating from A.M. Best, sufficient to cover any claims, damages, liabilities, costs and expenses (including counsel fees) arising out of or in connection with CONTRACTOR'S fulfillment of any of its obligations under this Agreement:

A. **Commercial General Liability Insurance**, including both bodily injury and property damage, with minimum limits as follows:

\$1,000,000 per occurrence \$ 5,000 medical expenses \$1,000,000 personal & adv. injury \$2,000,000 general aggregate \$5,000,000 sexual abuse or molestation

B. **Auto Liability Insurance.** To the extent vehicles are used to transport students, such vehicles shall have liability coverage of not less than \$1 million combined single limit.

If CONTRACTOR uses a vehicle to travel to/from school sites, between schools and/or to/from students' homes or other locations as an approved service location by the LEA, CONTRACTOR must comply with State of California auto insurance requirements.

C. Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability Insurance in a form and amount covering CONTRACTOR'S full liability under the California Workers' Compensation Insurance and Safety Act and in accordance with applicable state and federal laws.

Part A – Statutory Limits
Part B - \$1,000,000/\$1,000,000/\$1,000,000 Employers Liability

D. Errors & Omissions (E & O)/Malpractice (Professional Liability) coverage with the following limits:

\$1,000,000 per occurrence \$2,000,000 general aggregate

E. CONTRACTOR, upon execution of this Master Contract and periodically thereafter upon request, shall furnish the LEA with certificates of insurance and endorsements evidencing such coverage. The certificate of insurance shall include a thirty (30) day non-renewal, cancellation or modification notice provision. The Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability policy shall name the LEA and the District's Board of Education as additional insured's on all insurance policies and premiums shall be

paid by CONTRACTOR and shall be deemed included in CONTRACTOR's obligations under this contract at no additional charge.

- F. Unless CONTRACTOR is insured under the California Private Schools Self Insurance Group (CAPS SIG) or a similar self-insurance group, any deductibles or self-insured retentions above \$100,000 must be declared to and approved by the LEA. At its option, the LEA may require the CONTRACTOR, at the CONTRACTOR's sole cost, to: (a) cause its insurer to reduce to levels specified by the LEA or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions with respect to the LEA, its officials and employees or (b) procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigation.
- G. For any claims related to the services provided by CONTRACTOR, the CONTRACTOR's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the LEA, its subsidiaries, officials and employees. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the LEA, its subsidiaries, officials and employees shall be excess of the CONTRACTOR's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- H. All Certificates of Insurance shall reference the contract number, name of the school or agency submitting the certificate, and the location of the school or agency submitting the certificate on the certificate.

If the LEA or CONTRACTOR determines that changes in insurance coverage obligations under this section is necessary, either party may reopen negotiations to modify the insurance obligations.

### 16. INDEMNIFICATION AND HOLD HARMLESS

To the fullest extent allowed by law, CONTRACTOR shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless LEA and its directors, officers, agents, employees and guests against any claim or demand arising from any actual or alleged act, error, or omission by CONTRACTOR or its directors, officers, agents, employees, volunteers or guests arising from CONTRACTOR's duties and obligations described in this Agreement or imposed by law.

To the fullest extent allowed by law, LEA shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless CONTRACTOR and its directors, officers, agents, employees and guests against any claim or demand arising from any actual or alleged act, error, or omission by LEA or its directors, officers, agents, employees, volunteers or guests arising from LEA's duties and obligations described in this Agreement or imposed by law.

# 17. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

Nothing herein contained shall be construed to imply a joint venture, co-principal, partnership, principal-agent, employer-employee, or co-employer relationship between the LEA and CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall provide all services under this Agreement as an independent contractor, and neither party shall have the authority to bind or make any commitment on behalf of the other. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed to create any association, partnership, joint venture or relationship of principal and agent, master and servant, or employer and employee between the parties or any affiliates of the parties, or between the LEA and any individual assigned by CONTRACTOR to perform any services for the LEA.

If the LEA is held to be a partner, joint venturer, co-principal, employer or co-employer of CONTRACTOR based on any acts or omissions of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR shall indemnify and hold harmless the LEA from and against any and all claims for loss, liability, or damages arising from that holding, as well as any expenses, costs, taxes, penalties and interest charges incurred by the LEA as a result of that holding. If CONTRACTOR is held to be a partner,

joint venturer, co-principal, employer, or co-employer of the LEA based on any acts or omissions of LEA, LEA shall indemnify and hold harmless the CONTRACTOR from and against any and all claims for loss, liability, or damages arising from that holding, as well as any expenses, costs, taxes, penalties and interest charges incurred by the LEA as a result of that holding.

### 18. SUBCONTRACTING

CONTRACTOR shall not enter into any subcontracting relationship without first obtaining the written approval of the LEA. CONTRACTOR's written notification shall include the specific special education and/or related service to be subcontracted, including the corresponding hourly rate or fee. In the event LEA determines that it can provide the subcontracted service(s) at a lower rate, LEA may elect to provide such service(s). If LEA elects to provide such service(s), LEA shall provide written notification to CONTRACTOR within five (5) days of receipt of CONTRACTOR's original notice and CONTRACTOR shall not subcontract for said service(s).

CONTRACTOR shall incorporate all of the provisions of this Master Contract in all subcontracts, unless written approval for any change is first obtained by the LEA. Furthermore, when CONTRACTOR enters into subcontracts for the provision of special education and/or related services (including without limitation transportation) for any LEA student, CONTRACTOR shall cause each subcontractor to procure and maintain insurance during the term of each subcontract. Such subcontractor's insurance shall comply with the provisions of Section 15. Each subcontractor shall furnish the LEA with original endorsements and certificates of insurance effecting coverage required by Section 15. The endorsements are to be signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. LEA may request that the certificates and endorsements be completed on forms provided by the LEA. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the LEA before the subcontractor's work commences. The Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability policies shall name the LEA and the LEA/District Board of Education as additional insured. If LEA does not approve the subcontractor's insurance, the LEA shall provide CONTRACTOR notice within fifteen (15) days.

As an alternative to the LEA's forms, a subcontractor's insurer may provide complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements affecting the coverage required by this Master Contract. All Certificates of Insurance shall reference the LEA contract number, name of the school or agency submitting the certificate, indication if nonpublic school or nonpublic agency, and the location of the school or agency submitting the certificate. In addition, all sub-contractors must meet the requirements as contained in Section 45 (Clearance Requirements) and Section 46 (Staff Qualifications) of this Master Contract.

# 19. CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

CONTRACTOR shall provide to the LEA a copy of its current bylaws and a current list of its Board of Directors (or Trustees), if it is incorporated. This can be provided via e-mail to the SELPA Director of the LEA. CONTRACTOR and any member of its Board of Directors (or Trustees) shall avoid any relationship with the LEA that constitutes or may constitute a conflict of interest pursuant to California Education Code section 56042 including, but not limited to, employment with LEA, provision of private party assessments and/or reports, and attendance at IEP team meetings acting as a student's advocate. Pursuant to California Education Code section 56042, an attorney or advocate for a parent of an individual with exceptional needs shall not recommend placement at CONTRACTOR's facility if the attorney or advocate is employed or contracted by the CONTRACTOR, or will receive a benefit from the CONTRACTOR, or otherwise has a conflict of interest.

Unless CONTRACTOR and the LEA otherwise agree in writing, the LEA shall neither execute an ISA with CONTRACTOR nor amend an existing ISA for a LEA student when a recommendation for

special education and/or related services is based in whole or in part on assessment(s) or reports provided by CONTRACTOR to the LEA student without prior written authorization by LEA. This paragraph shall apply to CONTRACTOR regardless of when an assessment is performed or a report is prepared (i.e., before or after the LEA student is enrolled in CONTRACTOR's school/agency) or whether an assessment of the LEA student is performed or a report is prepared in the normal course of the services provided to the LEA student by CONTRACTOR. To avoid a conflict of interest, and in order to ensure the appropriateness of an Independent Educational Evaluation (hereinafter referred to as "IEE") and its recommendations, the District may, in its discretion, not fund an IEE by an evaluator who provides ongoing service(s) or is sought to provide service(s) to the student for whom the IEE is requested. Likewise, the LEA may, in its discretion, not fund services through the evaluator whose IEE the District agrees to fund. When no other appropriate assessor is available, the LEA may request and if CONTRACTOR agrees, the CONTRACTOR may provide an IEE.

When the CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic agency, the CONTRACTOR acknowledges that its authorized representative has read and understands Education Code section 56366.3 which provides, in relevant part, that no special education and/or related services provided by CONTRACTOR shall be paid for by the LEA if provided by an individual who was an employee of the LEA within the three hundred and sixty five (365) days prior to executing this Master Contract. This provision does not apply to any person who is able to provide designated instruction and services during the extended school year because he or she is otherwise employed for up to ten months of the school year by the LEA.

### 20. NON-DISCRIMINATION

CONTRACTOR shall not unlawfully discriminate on the basis of race, religion, sex, national origin, age, sexual orientation, disability or any other classification protected by federal or state law, in employment or operation of its programs.

# **EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM**

# 21. FREE AND APPROPRIATE PUBLIC EDUCATION

LEA shall provide CONTRACTOR with a copy of the IEP including the Individualized Transition Plan (hereinafter referred to as "ITP") of each LEA student served by CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall provide to each LEA student special education and/or related services (including transition services) within the nonpublic school or nonpublic agency consistent with the LEA student's IEP and as specified in the ISA. If CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR shall not accept a LEA student if it cannot provide or ensure the provision of the services outlined in the student's IEP.

Unless otherwise agreed to between CONTRACTOR and LEA, CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for the provision of all appropriate supplies, equipment, and/or facilities for LEA students, as specified in the LEA student's IEP and ISA. LEA shall provide low incidence equipment for eligible students with low incidence disabilities when specified in the student's IEP and ISA. Such equipment remains the property of the LEA and shall be returned to the LEA when the IEP team determines the equipment is no longer needed or when the student is no longer enrolled in the nonpublic school. CONTRACTOR shall make no charge of any kind to parents for special education and/or related services as specified in the LEA student's IEP and ISA (including, but not limited to, screenings, assessments, or interviews that occur prior to or as a condition of the LEA student's enrollment under the terms of this Master Contract). CONTRACTOR may charge a LEA student's parent(s) for services and/or activities not necessary for the LEA student to receive a free appropriate public education after: (a) verification that any such charge or fee is not a "pupil fee" under Education Code section 49010 et. seq.; (b) written notification to the LEA student's parent(s) of the cost and voluntary nature of the services and/or activities; and (c) receipt by the LEA of the

written notification and a written acknowledgment signed by the LEA student's parent(s) of the cost and voluntary nature of the services and/or activities. CONTRACTOR shall adhere to all LEA guidelines as well as all California state laws, regulations and guidelines prohibiting pupil fees, deposits or other charges.

Voluntary services and/or activities not necessary for the LEA student to receive a free appropriate public education shall not interfere with the LEA student's receipt of special education and/or related services as specified in the LEA student's IEP and ISA unless the LEA, CONTRACTOR and parent agree otherwise in writing.

### 22. GENERAL PROGRAM OF INSTRUCTION

All nonpublic school and nonpublic agency services shall be provided consistent with the area of certification specified by CDE Certification and as defined in California Education Code section 56366 et seq.

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR's general program of instruction shall: (a) be consistent with LEA's standards regarding the particular course of study and curriculum; (b) include curriculum that addresses mathematics, literacy and the use of educational, assistive technology and transition services; (c) be consistent with CDE's standards regarding the particular course of study and curriculum; (d) provide the services as specified in the LEA student's IEP and ISA. LEA students shall have access to: (a) State Board of Education (SBE) - adopted standards-based, core curriculum and the same instructional materials for kindergarten and grades 1 to 8, inclusive; and provide standards – aligned core curriculum and instructional materials for grades 9 to 12, inclusive, used by a local education agency (LEA), that contracts with the nonpublic school; (b) college preparation courses; (c) extracurricular activities, such as art, sports, music and academic clubs; (d) career preparation and vocational training, consistent with transition plans pursuant to state and federal law and; (e) supplemental assistance, including individual academic tutoring, psychological counseling, and career and college counseling. CONTRACTOR's general program of instruction shall be described in writing and a copy provided to LEA prior to the effective date of this Master Contract.

When CONTRACTOR serves LEA students in grades nine through twelve inclusive, LEA shall provide to CONTRACTOR a specific list of the course requirements to be satisfied by the CONTRACTOR leading toward graduation or completion of LEA's diploma requirements including the graduation requirements for pupils in foster care or pupils who are homeless as set forth in Education Code section 51225.1. CONTRACTOR shall not award a high school diploma to LEA students who have not successfully completed all of the LEA's graduation requirements, including, but not limited to, passing the California High School Exit Exam in accordance with state law.

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic agency and/or related services provider, CONTRACTOR's general program of instruction and/or services shall be consistent with LEA and CDE guidelines and certification, and provided as specified in the LEA student's IEP and ISA. The nonpublic agency providing Behavior Intervention services shall develop a written treatment plan that specifies the nature of their nonpublic agency service for each student within thirty (30) days of enrollment and shall be provided in writing to the LEA. School-based services may not be unilaterally converted by CONTRACTOR to a substitute program or provided at a location not specifically authorized by the IEP team. Except for services provided by a contractor that is a licensed children's institution, all services not provided in the school setting require the presence of a parent, guardian or adult caregiver during the delivery of services, provided such guardian or caregiver have a signed authorization by the parent or legal guardian to authorize emergency services as requested. LCI contractors shall ensure that appropriate and qualified residential or clinical staff is present during the provision of services under this Master Contract. CONTRACTOR shall immediately notify LEA in writing if no parent, guardian or adult caregiver is present. CONTRACTOR shall provide to the

LEA a written description of the services and location provided prior to the effective date of this Master Contract. Contractors providing Behavior Intervention services must have a trained behaviorist or trained equivalent on staff consistent with the requirements set forth in Education Code section 56520 et seq. It is understood that Behavior Intervention services are limited per CDE Certification and do not constitute as an instructional program.

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic agency, CONTRACTOR shall not provide transportation nor subcontract for transportation services.

#### 23. INSTRUCTIONAL MINUTES

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, the total number of instructional minutes per school day provided by CONTRACTOR shall be at least equivalent to the number of instructional minutes per school day provided to LEA students at like grade level, attending LEA schools and shall be specified in the LEA student's ISA developed in accordance with the LEA student's IEP.

For LEA students in grades kindergarten through 12, unless otherwise specified in the LEA student's IEP and ISA, the number of instructional minutes, excluding breakfast, recess, lunch, and passing time, shall be consistent with Education Code sections 46100 et. seq.

The total number of annual instructional minutes shall be at least equivalent to the total number of annual instructional minutes provided to LEA students attending LEA schools in like grade levels unless otherwise specified in the LEA student's IEP.

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic agency and/or related services provider, the total number of minutes per school day provided by CONTRACTOR shall be specified in the LEA student's ISA developed in accordance with the LEA student's IEP.

#### 24. CLASS SIZE

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR shall ensure that class size shall not exceed a ratio of one teacher per twelve (12) students unless CONTRACTOR and the LEA agree otherwise, in writing.

In the event a nonpublic school is unable to fill a vacant teaching position responsible for direct instruction to students, and the vacancy has direct impact on the California Department of Education Certification of that school, the nonpublic school shall develop a plan to assure appropriate coverage of students by first utilizing existing certificated staff. The nonpublic school and the LEA may agree to one 30 school day period per contract year where class size may be increased to assure coverage by an appropriately credentialed teacher. Such an agreement shall be in writing and signed by both parties. This provision does not apply to a nonpublic agency.

CONTRACTOR providing special education instruction for individuals with exceptional needs between the ages of three and five years, inclusive, shall also comply with the appropriate instructional adult to child ratios pursuant to California Education Code sections 56440 et seq.

#### 25. CALENDARS

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR shall submit to the LEA a school calendar with the total number of billable days not to exceed 180 days, plus up to twenty (20) extended school year billable days unless otherwise specified in the LEA student's IEP/IFSP and ISA. Billable days shall include only those days that are included on the submitted and approved school calendar, and/or required by the IEP (developed by the LEA) for each student. CONTRACTOR shall not be allowed to change its school calendar and/or amend the number of

billable days without the prior written approval of the LEA. Nothing in this Master Contract shall be interpreted to require the LEA to accept any requests for calendar changes.

Unless otherwise specified by the students' IEP, educational services shall occur at the school site. A student shall only be eligible for extended school year services if such are recommended by his/her IEP Team and the provision of such is specifically included in the ISA. Extended school year shall consist of twenty (20) instructional days, unless otherwise agreed upon by the IEP Team convened by the LEA. Any days of extended school year in excess of twenty (20) billable days must be mutually agreed to, in writing, prior to the start of the extended school year.

Student must have actually been in attendance during the regular school year and/or during extended school year and actually received services on a billable day of attendance in order for CONTRACTOR to be eligible for payment. It is specifically understood that services may not be provided on weekends/holidays and other times when school is not in session, unless agreed to by the LEA, in writing, in advance of the delivery of any nonpublic school service. Any instructional days provided without this written agreement shall be at the sole financial responsibility of the CONTRACTOR.

CONTRACTOR shall observe the same legal holidays as the LEA and shall identify the dates of observance on its school calendar submitted to the LEA. Those holidays are Labor Day, Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, President's Day, Memorial Day and Independence Day. With the approval of the LEA, CONTRACTOR may revise the date upon which CONTRACTOR closes in observance of any of the holidays observed by LEA.

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic agency, CONTRACTOR shall be provided with a LEA-developed/approved calendar prior to the initiation of services. CONTRACTOR herein agrees to observe holidays as specified in the LEA-developed/approved calendar. CONTRACTOR shall provide services pursuant to the LEA-developed/approved calendar; or as specified in the LEA student's IEP and ISA. Unless otherwise specified in the LEA student's ISA, CONTRACTOR shall provide related services to LEA students on only those days that the LEA student's school of attendance is in session and the LEA student attends school. CONTRACTOR shall bill only for services provided on billable days of attendance as indicated on the LEA calendar unless CONTRACTOR and the LEA agree otherwise, in writing. Student must have actually been in attendance and/or received services on a billable day of attendance in order for CONTRACTOR to be eligible for payment. It is specifically understood that services may not be provided on weekends/holidays and other times when school is not in session, unless agreed to by the LEA, in writing, in advance of the delivery of any nonpublic agency service provided by CONTRACTOR. Any instructional days provided without this written agreement shall be at the sole financial responsibility of the CONTRACTOR.

#### 26. DATA REPORTING

CONTRACTOR shall agree to provide to the LEA, all data related to students who are served by the CONTRACTOR. This shall include any and all data related to any section of this Master Contract. The specific format of the data to be provided shall be determined between the LEA and CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall not enter into a contract with a third party for the purpose of providing cloud-based services including but not limited digital storage, management and retrieval of pupil records or to provide digital educational software that authorizes such third party to access, store, and use pupil records, unless CONTRACTOR has obtained prior written authorization from LEA in compliance with Education Code section 49073.1.

The LEA may provide the CONTRACTOR with approved forms and/or format for such data, including but not limited to, invoicing, attendance reports, and progress reports. The LEA may approve use of CONTRACTOR-provided forms at LEAs discretion.

#### 27. LEAST RESTRICTIVE ENVIRONMENT/DUAL ENROLLMENT

CONTRACTOR and the LEA shall both follow policies and procedures that support Least Restrictive Environment ("LRE") options (and/or dual enrollment options if available and appropriate) for students to have access to the general curriculum and to be educated with their nondisabled peers to the maximum extent appropriate.

LRE placement options shall be addressed at all IEP team meetings regarding students for whom ISAs have been or may be executed. This shall include IEP team consideration of supplementary aids and services and goals and objectives necessary for placement in the LRE and necessary to enable students to transition to less restrictive settings.

When an IEP team has determined that a student should be transitioned into the public school setting, CONTRACTOR shall assist the LEA in implementing the IEP team's recommendations and/or activities to support the transition.

#### 28. STATEWIDE ACHIEVEMENT TESTING AND HIGH SCHOOL EXIT EXAMINATION

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR shall, in accordance with Education Code section 60640 et. seq. administer all Statewide assessments within the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress ("CAASP"), Desired Results Developmental Profile ("DRDP"), California Alternative Assessment ("CAA"), achievement and abilities tests (using LEA-authorized assessment instruments), the Fitness Gram, the California English Language Development Test ("CELDT"), and the English Language Proficiency Assessments for California ("ELPAC"), as appropriate to the student, and mandated by LEA pursuant to LEA guidelines as well as state and federal laws and regulations.

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR is subject to the alternative accountability system developed pursuant to Education Code section 52052, in the same manner as public schools and each LEA student placed with CONTRACTOR by the LEA shall be tested by qualified staff of CONTRACTOR in accordance with that accountability program. LEA shall provide test administration training to CONTRACTOR's qualified staff; CONTRACTOR shall attend LEA test training and comply with completion of all coding requirements as required by LEA. Contractor shall report the test results to the CDE as required by Education Code section 56366(a)(8)(A).

Where CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR shall administer all statewide achievement tests and the California High School Exit Examination as mandated by the LEA and pursuant to the LEA guidelines, as well as state and federal laws and regulations.

#### 29. DISTRICT MANDATED ATTENDANCE AT MEETINGS

CONTRACTOR shall attend District mandated meetings when legal mandates, and/or LEA policy and procedures are reviewed, including but not limited to the areas of: curriculum, high school graduation, standards-based instruction, behavior intervention, cultural and linguistic needs of students with disabilities, dual enrollment responsibilities, LRE responsibilities, transition services, and standardized testing. The LEA shall provide CONTRACTOR with reasonable advanced notice of mandated meetings. Attendance at such meetings shall not constitute a billable service hour(s).

#### 30. POSITIVE BEHAVIOR INTERVENTIONS

CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of Education Code section 56520 et seq. and applicable provisions of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations regarding positive behavior interventions including, but not limited to: the completion of functional behavioral assessments; the development, implementation, monitoring, supervision, modification, and evaluation of behavior intervention plans; and emergency interventions. CONTRACTOR shall notify the parent/guardian residential care provider (if appropriate) and LEA within one (1) school day of any behavior incident including when an emergency intervention is used or serious property damage occurs as well as provide LEA with a copy of the behavioral emergency report. It is understood that the LEA may require additional requirements for staff qualifications beyond what is required in Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations sections 3064 and 3065. Such requirements will be provided in writing to CONTRACTOR prior to entering into an ISA for a LEA student. Failure to maintain adherence to staff qualification requirements shall constitute sufficient cause for contract termination. CONTRACTOR shall provide the LEA with all training protocols for behavior intervention staff who do not possess a license, credential or recognized certification as part of their Master Contract application. CONTRACTOR shall provide certification that all behavior aides who do not possess a license, credential or recognized certification have completed required training protocols within ten days of the start of providing behavior intervention services to a LEA student. Failure to do so shall constitute sufficient cause for termination.

CONTRACTOR shall designate an individual employed, contracted, and/or otherwise hired by CONTRACTOR as a "behavior intervention case manager." CONTRACTOR shall maintain a written policy in compliance with Education Code section 56520 et seq. and applicable provisions of Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations regarding emergency interventions and behavioral emergency reports. Evidence of such training shall be submitted to the LEA at the beginning of the school year and within fourteen (14) days of any new hire. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all of its staff members are trained annually in crisis intervention and emergency procedures as related to appropriate behavior management strategies.

CONTRACTOR shall not authorize, order, consent to, or pay for any of the following prohibited interventions, or any other intervention similar to or like the following: (a) any intervention that is designed to, or likely to, cause physical pain, including but not limited to, electric shock; (b) releasing noxious, toxic, or otherwise unpleasant sprays, mists, or substances in proximity to the LEA student's face; (c) any intervention which denies adequate sleep, food, water, shelter, bedding, physical comfort, or access to bathroom facilities; (d) any intervention which is designed to subject, used to subject, or likely to subject the LEA student to verbal abuse, ridicule, or humiliation, or which can be expected to cause excessive emotional trauma; (e) restrictive interventions which employ a device, material, or objects that simultaneously immobilize all four extremities, including the procedure known as prone containment, except that prone containment or similar techniques may be used as a limited emergency intervention by CONTRACTOR's trained and qualified personnel as allowable by applicable law and regulations; (f) locked seclusion except as allowable by applicable law and regulations; (g) any intervention that precludes adequate supervision of the LEA student; and (h) any intervention which deprives the LEA student of one or more of his or her senses, pursuant to Education Code section 56521.2.

#### 31. STUDENT DISCIPLINE

CONTRACTOR shall maintain and abide by a written policy for student discipline that is consistent with state and federal law and regulations.

When CONTRACTOR seeks to remove a LEA student from his/her current educational placement for disciplinary reasons, CONTRACTOR shall immediately submit a written discipline report to the

LEA and a manifestation IEP team meeting shall be scheduled. Written discipline reports shall include, but not be limited to: the LEA student's name; the time, date, and description of the misconduct; the disciplinary action taken by CONTRACTOR; and the rationale for such disciplinary action. A copy of the LEA student's behavior plan, if any, shall be submitted with the written discipline report. CONTRACTOR and LEA agree to participate in a manifestation determination at an IEP meeting no later than the tenth (10<sup>th</sup>) day of suspension. CONTRACTOR shall notify and invite LEA representatives to the IEP team meeting where the manifestation determination will be made.

### 32. IEP TEAM MEETINGS

An IEP team meeting shall be convened at least annually to evaluate: (1) the educational progress of each student placed with CONTRACTOR, including all state assessment results pursuant to the requirements of Education Code section 52052; (2) whether or not the needs of the student continue to be best met at the nonpublic school and/or by the nonpublic agency; and (3) whether changes to the student's IEP are necessary, including whether the student may be transitioned to a public school setting. (California Education Code sections 56366(a)(2)(B)(i) and (ii).) If an LEA student is enrolled in the nonpublic school pursuant to a lawfully executed agreement between the LEA and parent, it shall be the responsibility of the LEA to notify CONTRACTOR in writing (1) when or whether an IEP meeting will be held, (2) whether placement in the nonpublic school should be documented as part of an IEP, and (3) the start date and, if known, the end date for services to be provided by CONTRACTOR to LEA student.

If a LEA student is to be transferred from a nonpublic school setting into a regular class setting in a public school for any part of the school day, the IEP team shall document, if appropriate, a description of activities provided to integrate the student into the regular education program, including the nature of each activity as well as the time spent on the activity each day or week and a description of the activities provided to support the transition of the student from the special education program into the regular education program. Each LEA student shall be allowed to provide confidential input to any representative of his or her IEP team. Except as otherwise provided in the Master Contract, CONTRACTOR and the LEA shall participate in all IEP team meetings regarding LEA students for whom ISAs have been or may be executed. At any time during the term of this Master Contract, a parent, the CONTRACTOR or the LEA may request a review of the student's IEP, subject to all procedural safeguards required by law, including reasonable notice given to, and participation of, the CONTRACTOR in the meeting. Every effort shall be made to schedule IEP team meetings at a time and place that is mutually convenient to the parent(s), the CONTRACTOR and the LEA. CONTRACTOR shall provide to the LEA any and all assessments (including testing protocols) and written assessment reports created by CONTRACTOR and any of its agents or subcontractors, upon request.

If the CONTRACTOR or LEA is unable to convince the parent or guardian that he or she should attend the IEP, CONTRACTOR shall maintain a written record of its attempts to arrange a mutually agreed-upon time and place. The CONTRACTOR and LEA shall also take any action necessary to ensure that the parent or guardian understands the proceedings at a meeting, including arranging for an interpreter.

Changes in any LEA student's educational program, including instruction, services, or instructional setting, provided under this Master Contract may only be made on the basis of revisions to the student's IEP. In the event that the CONTRACTOR believes the student requires a change of placement, the CONTRACTOR may request a review of the student's IEP for the purposes of considering a change in the student's placement. Student is entitled to remain in the last agreed upon and implemented placement unless parent agrees otherwise or unless an interim alternative educational placement is deemed lawful and appropriate by the LEA or OAH.

#### 33. SURROGATE PARENTS

CONTRACTOR shall comply with state and federal laws and regulations regarding assigning surrogate parents to LEA students.

#### 34. DUE PROCESS PROCEEDINGS

CONTRACTOR shall fully participate in special education due process proceedings including mediations and hearings, as requested by the LEA. CONTRACTOR shall also fully participate in the investigation of any complaint filed with the State of California, the Office for Civil Rights, or any other state and/or federal governmental body or agency. Full participation shall include, but in no way be limited to, cooperating with LEA representatives to provide complete answers raised by any investigator and/or the immediate provision of any and all documentation that pertains to the operation of CONTRACTOR's program and/or the implementation of a particular student's IEP/IFSP.

#### 35. COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

CONTRACTOR shall maintain and adhere to its own written procedures for responding to parent complaints. These procedures shall include annually notifying and providing parents of LEA students with appropriate information (including complaint forms) for the following: (1) Uniform Complaint Procedures pursuant to Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 4600 et seq.; (2) Nondiscrimination policies pursuant to Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 4960 (a); (3) Sexual Harassment Policies pursuant to California Education Code 231.5(a)(b)(c); (4) Student Grievance Procedure pursuant to Title IX 106.8 (a)(d) and 106.9 (a); and (5) Notice of Privacy Practices in compliance with Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPPA). CONTRACTOR shall include verification of these procedures to the LEA.

#### 36. LEA STUDENT PROGRESS REPORTS/REPORT CARDS AND ASSESSMENTS

Unless the LEA requests in writing that progress reports be provided on a monthly basis, CONTRACTOR shall provide to parents at least four written progress reports/report cards. At a minimum, progress reports shall include progress over time towards IEP goals and objectives. A copy of the progress reports/report cards shall be maintained at the CONTRACTOR's place of business and shall be submitted to the LEA and LEA student's parent(s).

CONTRACTOR shall also provide an LEA representative access to supporting documentation used to determine progress on any goal or objective, including but not limited to log sheets, observation notes, data sheets, pre-/post-tests, rubrics and other similar data collection used to determine progress or lack of progress on approved goals, objectives, transition plans or behavior support plans. The LEA may request copies of such data at any time within five (5) years of the date of service. CONTRACTOR agrees to maintain the information for at least five (5) years and also shall provide this data supporting progress within five (5) business days of request. Additional time may be granted as needed by the LEA.

CONTRACTOR shall complete academic or other assessment of the LEA student one month prior to the LEA student's annual or triennial review IEP team meeting for the purpose of reporting the LEA student's present levels of performance at the IEP team meeting as required by state and federal laws and regulations and pursuant to LEA policies, procedures, and/or practices. Contractor shall provide sufficient copies of its reports, documents, and projected goals to share with members of the IEP team five (5) business days prior to the IEP meeting. CONTRACTOR shall maintain supporting documentation such as test protocols and data collection, which shall be made available to LEA within five (5) business days of request.

CONTRACTOR is responsible for all assessment costs regarding the updating of goals and objectives, progress reporting and the development of present levels of performance. All assessments shall be provided by the LEA unless the LEA specifies in writing a request that CONTRACTOR perform such additional assessment. Any assessment costs may be added to the ISA and/or approved separately by the LEA at the LEA's sole discretion.

It is understood that all billable hours must be in direct services to pupils as specified in the ISA. For nonpublic agency services, supervision provided by a qualified individual as specified in Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 3065, shall be determined as appropriate and included in the ISA. Supervision means the direct observation of services, data review, case conferencing and program design consistent with professional standards for each professional's license, certification, or credential.

CONTRACTOR shall not charge the LEA student's parent(s) or LEA for the provision of progress reports, report cards, and/or any assessments, interviews, or meetings, unless the LEA agrees in writing prior to the completion of any work. It is understood that all billable hours have limits to those specified on the ISA consistent with the IEP. It is understood that copies of data collection notes, forms, charts and other such data are part of the pupil's record and shall be made available to the LEA upon written request.

#### 37. TRANSCRIPTS

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR shall prepare transcripts at the close of each semester, or upon LEA student transfer, for LEA students in grades nine through twelve inclusive. CONTRACTOR shall submit all transcripts to the LEA Director of Special Education for evaluation of progress toward completion of diploma requirements as specified by LEA.

### 38. LEA STUDENT CHANGE OF RESIDENCE

Upon enrollment, CONTRACTOR shall notify parents in writing of their obligation to notify CONTRACTOR of the LEA student's change of residence. CONTRACTOR shall maintain, and provide upon request by LEA, documentation of such notice to parents. Within five (5) school days after CONTRACTOR becomes aware of a LEA student's change of residence, CONTRACTOR shall notify the LEA, in writing, of the LEA student's change of residence.

If CONTRACTOR had knowledge or should reasonably have had knowledge of the LEA student's change of residence boundaries and CONTRACTOR fails to follow the procedures specified in this provision, the LEA shall not be responsible for the costs of services delivered after the LEA student's change of residence.

#### 39. WITHDRAWAL OF LEA STUDENT FROM PROGRAM

CONTRACTOR shall immediately report, by telephone and e-mail, to the LEA Representative responsible for overseeing nonpublic schools and nonpublic agencies, and any other required representative from the California Department of Education, when a LEA student is withdrawn from school and/or services. CONTRACTOR shall confirm such telephone call in writing via e-mail or other written notification to the LEA Director of Special Education and submit to the LEA and the Department of Education, if required, within five (5) business days of the withdrawal. CONTRACTOR shall assist LEA to verify and clear potential dropouts three (3) times per year, as required by the 2001 Elementary and Secondary Education Act (No Child Left Behind; NCLB), as documentation of graduation rate is one of the indicators of Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP).

#### 40. PARENT ACCESS

CONTRACTOR shall provide for reasonable parental access to LEA students and all facilities including, but not limited to, the instructional setting, recreational activity areas, meeting rooms and LEA student living quarters. CONTRACTOR shall comply with any known court orders regarding parental visits and access to LEA students.

CONTRACTOR, if operating a program with a residential component, shall cooperate with a parent's reasonable request for LEA student visits in their home during, but not limited to, holidays and weekends. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that parents obtain prior written authorization for therapeutic visits from the CONTRACTOR and the LEA.

#### 41. SERVICES AND SUPERVISION AND PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

If CONTRACTOR provides services on a LEA public school campus, CONTRACTOR shall comply with Penal Code section 627.1 et seq., as well as all other LEA and campus-specific policies and procedures regarding visitors to/on school campuses. CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for the purchase and provision of the supplies and assessment tools necessary to implement the provision of CONTRACTOR services on LEA public school campuses.

It is understood that the public school credentialed classroom teacher is responsible for the educational program.

It is understood that all employees, subcontractors and volunteers of any certified nonpublic school or agency shall adhere to customary professional standards when providing services. All practices shall be within the scope of professional responsibility as defined in the professional code of conduct for each profession. Reports regarding student progress shall be consistent with the provision of the Master Contract.

CONTRACTOR, if providing services in a student's home as specified in the ISA, shall assure that at least one parent of the child or an adult caregiver with written and signed authorization to make decisions in an emergency is present during the provision of services. The names of any adult caregiver other than the parent shall be provided to the LEA prior to the start of any home based services, including written and signed authorization in emergency situations. The parent shall inform the LEA of any changes of caregivers and provide written authorization for emergency situations. The adult caregiver cannot also be an employee or volunteer associated with the nonpublic school/nonpublic agency service provider. All problems and/or concerns reported to parents, both verbal and written shall also be provided to the LEA.

### 42. LICENSED CHILDREN'S INSTITUTION CONTRACTORS

If CONTRACTOR is a licensed children's institution, CONTRACTOR shall adhere to all legal requirements regarding educational placements for LCI students as stated in Education Code sections 56366(a)(2)(C) and 56366.9, Health and Safety Code section 1501.1 (AB1858, AB490 (Chapter 862, Statutes of 2003)) and any other applicable laws and/or regulations, including LEA guidelines or procedures. An LCI shall not require that a pupil be placed in its nonpublic school as a condition of being placed in its residential facility.

If CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic, nonsectarian school that is owned, operated by, or associated with a residential treatment center (hereinafter referred to as "NPS/RTC"), CONTRACTOR shall adhere to all legal requirements under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), 20 U.S.C. section 1400 et seq. including the federal regulations 34 C.F.R section 300 et seq. and Education

Code section 56000 et seq. including Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 3000 et seq.

In addition to meeting the certification requirements of the State of California, a CONTRACTOR that operates a program outside of this State shall be certified or licensed by that state to provide, respectively, special education and related services and designated instruction and related services to pupils under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. Sec. 1400 et seq.).

If CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic, nonsectarian school that is owned, operated by, or associated with a LCI, CONTRACTOR shall provide to the LEA, on a quarterly basis, a list of all LEA students, including those identified as eligible for special education. For those identified special education students, the list shall include: 1) special education eligibility at the time of enrollment; and 2) the educational placement and services specified in each student's IEP at the time of enrollment.

Unless placement is made pursuant to an Office of Administrative Hearings order or a lawfully executed agreement between the LEA and parent, the LEA is not responsible for the costs associated with nonpublic school placement until the date on which an IEP team meeting is convened, the IEP team determines that a nonpublic school placement is appropriate, and the IEP is signed by the LEA student's parent or another adult with educational decision-making rights.

#### 43. STATE MEAL MANDATE

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR and LEA shall satisfy the State Meal Mandate under California Education Code sections 49530, 49530.5 and 49550.

#### 44. MONITORING

CONTRACTOR shall allow representatives from the LEA access to its facilities for the purpose of monitoring each LEA student's instructional program. LEA shall have access to observe each LEA student at work, observe the instructional setting, interview CONTRACTOR, and review each LEA student's records and progress. Such access shall include unannounced monitoring visits. When making site visits, LEA shall initially report to CONTRACTOR's site administrative office. CONTRACTOR shall be invited to participate in the review of each student's progress.

If CONTRACTOR is also an LCI, the LEA or its SELPA shall annually evaluate whether CONTRACTOR is in compliance with Education Code section 56366.9 and Health and Safety Code section 1501.1(b).

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction ("Superintendent") shall monitor CONTRACTOR'S facilities, the educational environment, and the quality of the educational program, including the teaching staff, the credentials authorizing service, the standards-based core curriculum being employed, and the standard focused instructional materials used on a three-year cycle, as follows: (1) CONTRACTOR shall complete a self-review in year one; (2) the Superintendent shall conduct an onsite review in year two; and (3) the Superintendent shall conduct a follow-up visit in year three.

CONTRACTOR shall fully participate in any LEA and CDE compliance review, including any On-Site and Self Review and if applicable, District Validation Review. This review will address programmatic aspects of the nonpublic school/agency, compliance with relevant state and federal regulations, and Master Contract compliance. CONTRACTOR shall complete and submit a Nonpublic School/Agency Self-Review Assessment submitted as specified by the LEA. CONTRACTOR shall conduct any follow-up or corrective action procedures requested by LEA or CDE related to such compliance review.

CONTRACTOR understands that the LEA reserves the right to institute a program audit with or without cause. The program audit may include, but is not limited to, a review of core compliance areas of health and safety; curriculum/instruction; related services; and contractual, legal, and procedural compliance.

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR shall collect all applicable data and prepare the applicable portion of a School Accountability Report Card in accordance with California Education Code Section 33126.

#### **PERSONNEL**

## 45. CLEARANCE REQUIREMENTS

CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of California Education Code section 44237, 35021.1 and 35021.2 including, but not limited to: obtaining clearance from both the California Department of Justice (hereinafter referred to as "CDOJ") and clearance from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (hereinafter referred to as "FBI") for all of CONTRACTOR's employees and volunteers who will have or likely may have any direct contact with LEA students. CONTRACTOR hereby agrees that CONTRACTOR's employees and volunteers who will have or likely may have direct contact with LEA students shall not come in contact with LEA students until both CDOJ and FBI clearance are ascertained. CONTRACTOR shall further certify in writing to the LEA that none of its employees, volunteers, or subcontractors who will have or likely may have any direct contact with LEA students have been convicted of a violent or serious felony as those terms are defined in California Education Code section 44237(h), unless despite the employee's conviction of a violent or serious felony, he or she has met the criteria to be eligible for employment pursuant to California Education Code section 44237(i) or (j). Clearance certification shall be submitted to the LEA. In addition, CONTRACTOR shall make a request for subsequent arrest service from the CDOJ as required by California Penal Code section 11105.2.

#### 46. STAFF QUALIFICATIONS

CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all individuals employed, contracted, and/or otherwise hired by CONTRACTOR to provide classroom and/or individualized instruction or provide related services hold a license, certificate, permit, or other document equivalent to that which staff in a public school are required to hold to render the service consistent with Education Code section 56366.1(n)(1) and are qualified pursuant to Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations sections 200.56 and 200.58, and Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations sections 3001(r),3051, 3064 and 3065. Such qualified staff may only provide related services within the scope of their professional license, certification or credential and ethical standards set by each profession and not assume responsibility or authority for another related services provider or special education teacher's scope of practice.

Only those nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies located outside of California that employ staff who hold a current valid credential or license to render special education and related services as required by that state shall be eligible to be certified.

CONTRACTOR shall comply with personnel standards and qualifications regarding instructional aides and teacher assistants respectively pursuant to Federal requirements and California Education Code sections 45340 et seq. and 45350 et seq. Specifically, all paraprofessionals, including, but not limited to instructional aides and teacher assistants, employed, contracted, and/or otherwise hired by CONTRACTOR to provide classroom and/or individualized instruction or related services, shall possess a high school diploma (or higher) degree; or met a rigorous standard of quality and can demonstrate, through a formal state or local assessment (i) knowledge of, and the ability to assist in instructing, reading, writing, and mathematics; or (ii) knowledge of, and the ability to assist in

instructing, reading readiness, writing readiness, and mathematics readiness, as appropriate. CONTRACTOR shall comply with all laws and regulations governing the licensed professions, including but not limited to, the provisions with respect to supervision.

In addition to meeting the certification requirements of the State of California, a CONTRACTOR that operates a program outside of this state and serving a student by this LEA shall be certified or licensed by that state to provide special education and related services and designated instruction and related services to pupils under the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. Sec. 1400 et seq.).

#### 47. VERIFICATION OF LICENSES, CREDENTIALS AND OTHER DOCUMENTS

CONTRACTOR shall submit to the LEA a staff list, and copies of all current and required licenses, certifications, credentials, permits and/or other documents which entitle the holder to provide special education and/or related services by CONTRACTOR and all individuals employed, contracted, and/or otherwise hired or sub-contracted by CONTRACTOR. The LEA may file all licenses, certifications, credentials, permits or other documents with the office of the County Superintendent of Schools. CONTRACTOR shall notify the LEA in writing within thirty (30) days when personnel changes occur which may affect the provision of special education and/or related services to LEA students. CONTRACTOR shall provide the LEA with the verified dates of fingerprint clearance, Department of Justice clearance and Tuberculosis Test clearance for all employees, approved subcontractors and/or volunteers prior to such individuals starting to work with any student.

CONTRACTOR shall monitor the status of licenses, certifications, credentials, permits and/or other documents for CONTRACTOR and all individuals employed, contracted, and/or otherwise hired by CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall immediately, and in no circumstances longer than five (5) business days, provide to the LEA updated information regarding the status of licenses, certifications, credentials, permits and/or other documents of any known changes.

#### 48. STAFF ABSENCE

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school and CONTRACTOR's classroom teacher is absent, CONTRACTOR shall provide an appropriately credentialed substitute teacher in the absent teacher's classroom in accordance with California Education Code section 56061. CONTRACTOR shall provide to the LEA documentation of substitute coverage. Substitute teachers shall remain with their assigned class during all instructional time. The LEA shall not be responsible for any payment for instruction and/or services when an appropriately credentialed substitute teacher is not provided in accordance with California Education Code section 56061.

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic agency and/or related services provider, and CONTRACTOR's service provider is absent, CONTRACTOR shall provide a qualified (as defined in section seven (7) of this agreement and as determined by the LEA) substitute, unless the LEA provides appropriate coverage in lieu of CONTRACTOR's service providers. It is understood that the parent of a student shall not be deemed to be a qualified substitute for his/her student. The LEA will not pay for services unless a qualified substitute is provided and/or CONTRACTOR provides documentation evidencing the provision of "make-up" services by a qualified service provider within thirty (30) calendar days from the date on which the services should have been provided. CONTRACTOR shall not "bank" or "carry over" make up service hours under any circumstances, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by CONTRACTOR and an authorized LEA representative.

# 49. STAFF PROFESSIONAL BEHAVIOR WHEN PROVIDING SERVICES AT SCHOOL OR SCHOOL RELATED EVENTS OR AT SCHOOL FACILITY AND/OR IN THE HOME

It is understood that all employees, subcontractors, and volunteers of any certified nonpublic school or nonpublic agency shall adhere to the customary professional and ethical standards when providing services. All practices shall only be within the scope of professional responsibility as defined in the professional code of conduct for each profession as well as any LEA professional standards as specified in Board policies and/or regulations when made available to the CONTRACTOR. Reports regarding student progress shall be consistent with the provision of this Master Contract.

For services provided on a public school campus, sign in/out procedures shall be followed by nonpublic agency providers working in a public school classroom along with all other procedures for being on campus consistent with school and LEA policy. It is understood that the public school credentialed classroom teacher is responsible for the instructional program, and all nonpublic agency service providers shall work collaboratively with the classroom teacher, who shall remain in charge of the instructional program.

For services provided in a pupil's home as specified in the IEP, CONTRACTOR must assure that the parent or an LEA-approved responsible adult is present during the provision of services. All problems and/or concerns reported to parents, both verbal and written shall also be provided to the LEA.

#### **HEALTH AND SAFETY MANDATES**

#### **50.** HEALTH AND SAFETY

CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, ordinances, policies, and procedures regarding student and employee health and safety. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of California Education Code sections 35021 et seq., 49406, and Health and Safety Code section 121525 regarding the examination of CONTRACTOR's employees and volunteers for tuberculosis. CONTRACTOR shall provide to the LEA documentation for each individual volunteering, employed, contracted, and/or otherwise hired by CONTRACTOR of such compliance before an individual comes in contact with an LEA student.

CONTRACTOR shall comply with OSHA Blood Borne Pathogens Standards, 29 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) section 1910.1030, when providing medical treatment or assistance to a student. CONTRACTOR further agrees to provide annual training regarding universal health care precautions and to post required notices in areas designated in the California Health and Safety Code.

### 51. FACILITIES AND FACILITIES MODIFICATIONS

CONTRACTOR shall provide special education and/or related services to LEA students in facilities that comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and ordinances related, but not limited to: disability access; fire, health, sanitation, and building standards and safety; fire warning systems; zoning permits; and occupancy capacity. When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, CONTRACTOR shall conduct fire drills as required by Title 5 California Code of Regulations section 550. CONTRACTOR shall be responsible for any structural changes and/or modifications to CONTRACTOR's facilities is required to comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and ordinances.

#### **52. ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATION**

Unless otherwise set forth in the student's ISA, CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of California Education Code section 49423 and Title 5 of the California Code of Regulations section 600 et seq. when CONTRACTOR serves a LEA student that is required to take prescription and/or over-the-counter medication during the school day. CONTRACTOR may designate personnel to assist the LEA student with the administration of such medication after the LEA student's parent(s) provides to CONTRACTOR: (a) a written statement from a physician detailing the type, administration method, amount, and time schedules by which such medication shall be taken; and (b) a written statement from the LEA student's parent(s) granting CONTRACTOR permission to administer medication(s) as specified in the physician's statement. CONTRACTOR shall maintain, and provide to the LEA upon request, copies of such written statements. CONTRACTOR shall maintain a written log for each LEA student to whom medication is administered. Such written log shall specify the LEA student's name; the type of medication; the date, time, and amount of each administration; and the name of CONTRACTOR's employee who administered the medication. CONTRACTOR maintains full responsibility for assuring appropriate staff training in the administration of such medication consistent with student's physician's written orders. Any change in medication type, administration method, amount or schedule must be authorized by both a licensed physician and parent.

#### 53. INCIDENT/ACCIDENT REPORTING

CONTRACTOR shall submit within 24 hours by fax and mail, or electronically, any accident or incident report to the LEA, including any behavior incident or behavior emergency intervention. LEA may specify procedures to be implemented by CONTRACTOR or forms to be submitted by CONTRACTOR related to accident or incident reporting.

### 54. CHILD ABUSE REPORTING

CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to annually train all staff members, including volunteers, so that they are familiar with and agree to adhere to its own child and dependent adult abuse reporting obligations and procedures as specified in California Penal Code section 11164 et seq. To protect the privacy rights of all parties involved (i.e. reporter, child and alleged abuser), reports will remain confidential as required by law and professional ethical mandates. A written statement acknowledging the legal requirements of such reporting and verification of staff adherence to such reporting shall be submitted to the LEA.

#### 55. SEXUAL HARASSMENT/DISCRIMINATION

CONTRACTOR shall have a Sexual and Gender Identity Harassment Policy that clearly describes the kinds of conduct that constitutes sexual harassment and that is prohibited by the CONTRACTOR's policy, as well as federal and state law. The policy should include procedures to make complaints without fear of retaliation, and for prompt and objective investigations of all sexual harassment complaints. CONTRACTOR further agrees to provide annual training to all employees regarding the laws concerning sexual harassment and related procedures.

#### 56. REPORTING OF MISSING CHILDREN

CONTRACTOR assures the LEA that all staff members, including volunteers, are familiar with and agree to adhere to requirements for reporting missing children as specified in California Education Code section 49370. A written statement acknowledging the legal requirements of such reporting and verification of staff adherence to such reporting shall be properly submitted to the LEA. The written statement shall be submitted as specified by the LEA.

#### **FINANCIAL**

# 57. ENROLLMENT, CONTRACTING, SERVICE TRACKING, ATTENDANCE REPORTING, AND BILLING PROCEDURES

CONTRACTOR shall assure that the nonpublic school or nonpublic agency has the necessary financial resources to provide an appropriate education for the children enrolled and will distribute those resources in such a manner to implement the IEP and ISA for each and every child.

CONTRACTOR shall provide all records requested by LEA concerning enrollment, contracting, attendance reporting, service tracking and billing, including requirements of electronic billing. CONTRACTOR shall be paid for the provision of special education and/or related services specified in the LEA student's IEP and ISA which are provided on billable days of attendance. All payments by LEA shall be made in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Master Contract and all applicable federal and state laws.

CONTRACTOR shall maintain separate registers for the basic education program and each related service. Original attendance forms (for example, roll books for the basic education program, service tracking documents and notes for instructional assistants, behavioral intervention aides, bus aides, and each related service) shall be completed by the actual service provider whose signature shall appear on such forms and shall be available for review, inspection, or audit by the LEA during the effective period of this Master Contract and for a period of five (5) years thereafter. CONTRACTOR shall verify the accuracy of minutes of reported attendance that is the basis of services being billed for payment.

CONTRACTOR shall submit invoices and related documents to the LEA for payment, for each calendar month when education or related services were provided. Invoices and related documents may be submitted electronically if requested by LEA and CONTRACTOR has the systems in place to generate the requested documents. The LEA may designate forms for use by CONTRACTOR when submitting invoices. At a minimum, each invoice must contain the following information: month of service; specific days and times of services coordinated by the LEA approved calendar unless otherwise specified in the ISA or agreed to by the LEA; name of staff who provided the service; approved cost of each invoice; total for each service and total for the monthly invoice; date invoice was mailed; signature of the nonpublic school/nonpublic agency administrator authorizing that the information is accurate and consistent with the ISA, CDE certificates and staff notification; verification that attendance report is attached as appropriate; indication of any made-up session consistent with this Master Contract; verification that progress reports have been provided consistent with the ISA (monthly or quarterly unless specified otherwise on the ISA); and the name or initials of each student for when the service was provided.

In the event services were not provided, rationale for why the services were not provided shall be included.

Such an invoice is subject to all conditions of this Master Contract. At the discretion of the LEA, an electronic invoice may be required provided such notice has been made in writing and training provided to the CONTRACTOR at no additional charge for such training.

Invoices shall be submitted no later than thirty (30) days after the end of the attendance accounting period in which the services were rendered. LEA shall make payment to CONTRACTOR based on the number of billable days of attendance and hours of service at rates specified in this Master Contract within forty-five (45) days of LEA's receipt of properly submitted hard copy of invoices prepared and submitted as specified in California Education Code Section 56366.5 and the LEA.

CONTRACTOR shall correct deficiencies and submit rebilling invoices no later than thirty (30) calendar days after the invoice is returned by LEA. LEA shall pay properly submitted re-billing invoices no later than forty-five (45) days after the date a completely corrected re-billing invoice is received by the LEA.

In no case shall initial payment claim submission for any Master Contract fiscal year (July through June) extend beyond December 31<sup>st</sup> after the close of the fiscal year. In no case shall any rebilling for the Master Contract fiscal year (July through June) extend beyond six months after the close of the fiscal year unless approved by the LEA to resolve billing issues including rebilling issues directly related to a delay in obtaining information from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing regarding teacher qualification, but no later than 12 months from the close of the fiscal year. If the billing or rebilling error is the responsibility of the LEA, then no limit is set provided that the LEA and CONTRACTOR have communicated such concerns in writing during the 12-month period following the close of the fiscal year. LEA will not pay mileage for NPA employee.

#### 58. RIGHT TO WITHHOLD PAYMENT

The LEA may withhold payment to CONTRACTOR when: (a) CONTRACTOR has failed to perform, in whole or in part, under the terms of this Master Contract; (b) CONTRACTOR has billed for services rendered on days other than billable days of attendance or for days when student was not in attendance and/or did not receive services; (c) CONTRACTOR was overpaid by LEA as determined by inspection, review, and/or audit of its program, work, and/or records; (d) CONTRACTOR has failed to provide supporting documentation with an invoice, as required by EC 56366(c)(2); (e) education and/or related services are provided to LEA students by personnel who are not appropriately credentialed, licensed, or otherwise qualified; (f) LEA has not received, prior to school closure or contract termination, all documents concerning one or more LEA students enrolled in CONTRACTOR's educational program; (g) CONTRACTOR fails to confirm a student's change of residence to another district or confirms the change or residence to another district, but fails to notify LEA with five (5) days of such confirmation; or (h) CONTRACTOR receives payment from Medi-Cal or from any other agency or funding source for a service provided to a LEA student. It is understood that no payments shall be made for any invoices that are not received by six months following the close of the prior fiscal year, for services provided in that year.

The amount which may be withheld by the LEA with respect to each of the subparagraphs of the preceding paragraph are as follows: (a): the value of the service CONTRACTOR failed to perform; (b) the amount of overpayment; (c) the portion of the invoice for which satisfactory documentation has not been provided by CONTRACTOR; (d) the amount invoiced for services provided by the individual not appropriately credentialed, licensed, or otherwise qualified; (e) the proportionate amount of the invoice related to the applicable pupil for the time period from the date of the violation occurred and until the violation is cured; or (f the amount paid to CONTRACTOR by Medi-Cal or another agency or funding source for the service provided to the LEA student.

If the LEA determines that cause exists to withhold payment to CONTRACTOR, LEA shall, within ten (10) business days of this determination, provide to CONTRACTOR written notice that LEA is withholding payment. Such notice shall specify the basis or bases for the LEA's withholding payment and the amount to be withheld. Within thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of such notice, CONTRACTOR shall take all necessary and appropriate action to correct the deficiencies that form the basis for the LEA's withholding payment, submit a written request for extension of time to correct the deficiencies or submit to LEA written documentation demonstrating that the basis or bases cited by the LEA for withholding payment is unfounded. Upon receipt of CONTRACTOR's written request showing good cause, the LEA shall extend CONTRACTOR's time to correct deficiencies (usually an additional thirty (30) days), otherwise payment will be denied.

If after subsequent request for payment has been denied and CONTRACTOR believes that payment should not be withheld, CONTRACTOR shall send written notice to the LEA specifying the reason it believes payment should not be withheld. The LEA shall respond to CONTRACTOR's notice within thirty (30) business days by indicating that a warrant for the amount of payment will be made or stating the reason the LEA believes payment should not be made. If the LEA fails to respond within thirty (30) business days or a dispute regarding the withholding of payment continues after the LEA's response to CONTRACTOR's notice, CONTRACTOR may invoke the following escalation policy.

After forty-five (45) business days: The CONTRACTOR may notify the Authorized LEA's Representative of the dispute in writing. The LEA Authorized Representative shall respond to the CONTRACTOR in writing within fifteen (15) business days.

After sixty (60) business days: Disagreements between the LEA and CONTRACTOR concerning the Master Contract may be appealed to the Orange County Superintendent of Schools or the State Superintendent of Public Instruction pursuant to the provisions of California Education Code Section 56366(c)(2). CONTRACTOR disagrees with the language of California Education Code Section 56366(c)(2), and nothing herein shall constitute a waiver by CONTRACTOR of its right to challenge that provision.

#### 59. PAYMENT FROM OUTSIDE AGENCIES

CONTRACTOR shall notify the LEA when Medi-Cal or any other agency is billed for the costs associated with the provision of special education and/or related services to LEA students. Upon request, CONTRACTOR shall provide to the LEA any and all documentation regarding reports, billing, and/or payment by Medi-Cal or any other agency for the costs associated with the provision of special education and/or related services to LEA students. CONTRACTOR shall provide prior written notice of the rights and protections required by Title 34 of the Code of Federal Regulations section 300.154(d) whenever it seeks to use the LEA students' public benefits to pay for special education and related services. Such notice shall be provided before seeking payment from Medi-Cal for the first time and annually thereafter.

#### 60. PAYMENT FOR ABSENCES

#### NONPUBLIC SCHOOL STAFF ABSENCE

Whenever a classroom teacher employed by CONTRACTOR is absent, CONTRACTOR shall provide an appropriately credentialed substitute teacher in the absent teacher's classroom in accordance with California Education Code section 56061. CONTRACTOR shall provide to the LEA documentation of substitute coverage. Substitute teachers shall remain with their assigned class during all instructional time. The LEA will not pay for instruction and/or services unless said instruction or service is provided by an appropriately credentialed substitute teacher.

Whenever a related service provider is absent, CONTRACTOR shall provide a qualified (as defined in section seven (7) of this Agreement and as determined by LEA) substitute. The LEA will not pay for services unless a qualified substitute is provided and/or CONTRACTOR provides documentation evidencing the provision of "make-up" services by a qualified service provider within thirty (30) calendar days from the date on which the services should have been provided unless otherwise agreed in LEA student's IEP or ISA.

#### NONPUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENT ABSENCE

If CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic school, no later than the tenth (10<sup>th</sup>) cumulative day of the LEA student's unexcused absence, CONTRACTOR shall notify the LEA of such absence.

Criteria for a billable day for payment purposes is one day of attendance as defined in California Education Code, sections 46010, 46010.3 and 46307. The LEA shall not pay for services provided on days that a student's attendance does not qualify for Average Daily Attendance (ADA) reimbursement under state law. *Per Diem* rates for students whose IEPs authorize less than a full instructional day may be adjusted on a pro rata basis in accordance with the actual proportion of the school day the student was served. The LEA shall not be responsible for payment of DIS or related services for days on which a student's attendance does not qualify for Average Daily Attendance (ADA) reimbursement under state law, nor shall student be eligible for make-up services.

#### NONPUBLIC AGENCY STAFF ABSENCE

When CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic agency and CONTRACTOR's service provider is absent, CONTRACTOR shall provide a qualified (as defined in section seven (7) of this Agreement and as determined by the LEA) substitute, unless the LEA provides appropriate coverage in lieu of CONTRACTOR's service providers. The LEA shall not pay for services unless a qualified substitute is provided and/or CONTRACTOR provides documentation evidencing the provision of "make-up" services by a qualified service provider within thirty (30) calendar days from the date on which the services should have been provided. CONTRACTOR shall not "bank" or "carry over" make up service hours under any circumstances, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by CONTRACTOR and the LEA. In the event services were not provided, reasons for why the services were not provided shall be included. In the event of a service provider absence for Behavior Intervention Implementation services provided at the school site, services shall not be deemed eligible for make up.

#### NONPUBLIC AGENCY STUDENT ABSENCE

If CONTRACTOR is a nonpublic agency, it shall notify LEA of the absence of a LEA student no later than the fifth consecutive service day of the student's absence. The LEA shall not be responsible for the payment of services when a student is absent.

#### 61. INSPECTION AND AUDIT

The CONTRACTOR shall maintain and the LEA shall have the right to examine and audit all of the books, records, documents, accounting procedures and practices and other evidence that reflect all costs claimed to have been incurred or fees claimed to have been earned under this Agreement.

CONTRACTOR shall provide the LEA access to all records including, but not limited to: student records as defined by California Education Code section 49061(b); registers and rollbooks of teachers; daily service logs and notes or other documents used to record the provision of related services; Medi-Cal/daily service logs and notes used to record provision of services provided by instructional assistants, behavior intervention aides, bus aides, and supervisors; absence verification records (parent/doctor notes, telephone logs, and related documents); bus rosters; staff lists specifying credentials held, business licenses held, documents evidencing other qualifications, social security numbers (last four digits unless otherwise required), dates of hire, and dates of termination; staff time sheets; non-paid staff and volunteer sign-in sheets; transportation and other related service subcontracts; school calendars; bell/class schedules when applicable; liability and worker's compensation insurance policies; state nonpublic school and/or agency certifications; by-laws; lists of current board of directors/trustees, if incorporated; other documents evidencing financial expenditures; federal/state payroll quarterly reports Form 941/DE3DP; and bank statements and canceled checks or facsimile thereof. Such access shall include unannounced inspections by the LEA. CONTRACTOR shall make available to the LEA all budgetary information including operating budgets submitted by CONTRACTOR to the LEA for the relevant contract period being audited.

CONTRACTOR shall make all records available at the office of the LEA or CONTRACTOR's offices at all reasonable times and without charge. All records shall be provided to the LEA within five (5) working days of a written request from the LEA. CONTRACTOR shall, at no cost to the LEA, provide reasonable assistance for such examination or audit. The LEA's rights under this section shall also include access to CONTRACTOR's offices for purposes of interviewing CONTRACTOR's employees. If any document or evidence is stored in an electronic form, a hard copy shall be made available to the LEA, unless the LEA agrees to the use of the electronic format.

CONTRACTOR shall obtain from its subcontractors and suppliers written agreements to the requirements of this section and shall provide a copy of such agreements to the LEA upon request by the LEA.

If an inspection, review, or audit by the LEA, a state agency, a federal agency, and/or an independent agency/firm determines that CONTRACTOR owes the LEA monies as a result of CONTRACTOR's over billing or failure to perform, in whole or in part, any of its obligations under this Master Contract, the LEA shall provide to CONTRACTOR written notice demanding payment from CONTRACTOR and specifying the basis or bases for such demand. Unless CONTRACTOR and the LEA otherwise agree in writing, CONTRACTOR shall pay to the LEA the full amount owed as result of CONTRACTOR's over billing and/or failure to perform, in whole or in part, any of its obligations under this Master Contract, as determined by an inspection, review, or audit by the LEA, a state agency, a federal agency, and/or an independent agency/firm. CONTRACTOR shall make such payment to the LEA within thirty (30) days of receipt of the LEA's written notice demanding payment.

#### 62. RATE SCHEDULE

The attached rate schedule (Exhibit A) limits the number of LEA students that may be enrolled and the maximum dollar amount of the contract. It may also limit the maximum number of students that can be provided specific services. Per Diem rates for LEA students whose IEPs authorize less than a full instructional day may be adjusted proportionally. In such cases only, the adjustments in basic education rate shall be based on the percentage of a 310-minute instructional day.

Special education and/or related services offered by CONTRACTOR shall be provided by qualified personnel as per State and Federal law, and the codes and charges for such educational and/or related services during the term of this contract, shall be as stated in Exhibit A.

## 63. DEBARMENT CERTIFICATION

By signing this agreement, CONTRACTOR certifies that:

- (a) CONTRACTOR and any of its shareholders, partners, or executive officers are <u>not</u> presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, or declared ineligible for the award of contracts by any Federal agency, and
- (b) Has/have <u>not</u>, within a three-year period preceding this contract, been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for: commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a Federal, state or local government contract or subcontract; violation of Federal or state antitrust statutes relating to the submission of offers; or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, tax evasion, or receiving stolen property; and are not presently indicted for, or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a Government entity with, commission of any of these offenses.

The parties hereto have executed this Master Contract by and through their duly authorized agents or representatives. This Master Contract is effective on the \_\_\_\_1st\_\_ day of July 2017 and terminates at 5:00 P.M. on June 30, 2018, unless sooner terminated as provide herein.

## **HISTORY**

The District has a long term relationship and agreement with the Aliso Viejo Community Association (AVCA) for the use of their parks by Aliso Niguel High School (ANHS).

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The District and AVCA have worked cooperatively for many years to allow for District use of Foxborough Park, owned by AVCA, under past limited use and maintenance agreements.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Approval of the ratification of the Aliso Viejo Community Association Limited Use and Maintenance Agreement (LUMA) for Winter 2018 allowing the District to use Foxborough Park, fields 1 and 2, from February 15, 2018 through April 30, 2018.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The District will incur a Limited Use and Maintenance fee of \$750 payable to AVCA, which will be paid by ANHS site funds.

## LIMITED USE & MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT

#### AVCA/CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

This Limited Use and Maintenance Agreement (hereinafter "Agreement") is entered into this 8<sup>th</sup> day of January, 2018 by and between the Aliso Viejo Community Association, a nonprofit public benefit corporation ("AVCA") and Capistrano Unified School District ("User Group"). This Agreement shall be evaluated based upon the ability of all parties to effectively perform necessary maintenance and the past history of User Group. The goal of this Agreement is to provide quality parks for residents of AVCA and for the AVCA organizations who request use of the facilities.

#### 1. Definitions.

As used in this Agreement, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

- 1.1. Agreement Term: The period of time starting on the date on which this Agreement is signed by the Parties, and ending on April 30, 2018.
- 1.2. AVCA Property: All property owned or controlled by AVCA.
- 1.3. <u>Participant</u>: A player on the team organized by User Group. Coaches and other support staff are not considered Participants for the purposes of the age and residency requirements.
- 1.4. Start Date: The first day of use of AVCA Property by User Group under this Agreement.

#### 2. User Group's Obligations

- 2.1. For usage of those areas listed on the attached Exhibit "A" during the times and for the term set forth in such Exhibit, User Group shall pay a fee set forth at Exhibit "B". A fee of \$16.00 per hour will be charged for the use of sports lighting.
- 2.2. User Group shall ensure that at least one team on every field used by User Group under this Agreement is comprised of Participants at least seventy-five percent (75%) of whom are residents of AVCA and 18 years of age or under. Under no circumstances may two teams not meeting this requirement play on the same field at the same time.
- 2.3. User Group shall designate one person to serve as a liaison to AVCA for all matters related to this Agreement and User Group's use of AVCA property, including but not limited to required submissions to and communication with AVCA ("Liaison"). AVCA will

communicate only with the Liaison regarding this Agreement and User Group's use of AVCA property, using only the contact information provided by the Liaison. The identity of the Liaison may be changed at any time by written notice to AVCA. Notwithstanding the above, in an emergency AVCA may be contacted by any authorized User Group member.

- 2.4. User Group shall ensure that an individual familiar with all park use rules and the obligations of this Agreement is onsite during the times set forth at Exhibit "A" for the purpose of ensuring compliance with such rules and obligations during such times.
- 2.5. AVCA Property shall be kept clean, free of debris, and in good condition. User Group is responsible for ensuring clean-up of all AVCA Property and the surrounding areas after any use. No rubbish, trash, garbage or other waste material shall be kept or permitted on any portion of the AVCA Property, except in enclosed trash receptacles or dumpsters, and no odor shall be permitted to arise therefrom so as to render the AVCA Property, or any portion thereof, unsanitary, unsightly, or offensive as determined in the sole discretion of AVCA. Failure to keep any AVCA Property clean of trash and debris may result in AVCA having the area cleaned at User Group's expense.
- 2.5.1. User Group shall operate concession stands only if disclosed on this Agreement on Exhibit A, with submission of a current Food Facility Health Permit from the Orange County Environmental Health department and after written approval from AVCA. User Group shall ensure at all times that concession stands are clean, neat, and present no health hazards. User Group shall reimburse AVCA for any and all costs AVCA incurs for violations of these rules, as solely determined by AVCA, including but not limited to pest extermination and re-keying costs. AVCA reserves the right to withdraw permission to operate and re-key concession stands at any time if it determines that User Group has failed to meet the standards stated above.
- 2.6. User Group acknowledges that use of AVCA Property for any reason during closure times is strictly prohibited, and agrees on behalf of itself and all of its Participants to abide by all closure times. User Group further understands and agrees that if User Group or any of its employees, agents, and/or Participants uses the field in any way during closure periods, AVCA will suffer damage. Therefore, User Group shall pay to AVCA as liquidated damages the sum of ONE THOUSAND Dollars (\$1,000), or a greater amount as necessary to pay all damages and costs incurred by AVCA for necessary repairs to AVCA Property, as reasonably determined by AVCA, for each occasion on which User Group or any of its employees, agents, and/or Participants violates this provision.

- 2.7. User Group is responsible for ensuring all Participants and spectators follow AVCA's rules and regulations at all times, including, but not limited to, the prohibition of alcoholic beverages on the park sites.
- 2.8. User Group is responsible for the set-up and breakdown of all equipment used by User Group's Participants or spectators pursuant to this Agreement. AVCA shall not be held responsible for the damage, loss or theft of any property owned or stored by User Group on AVCA Property.
- 2.9. User Group shall reimburse AVCA for any and all costs incurred by AVCA to repair damage to AVCA Property that is due to User Group's neglect or abuse. AVCA may restore AVCA Property to the state it was in immediately prior to the Start Date.
- 2.10. If during the term of this Agreement User Group fails to perform any required maintenance within 24 hours of notice from AVCA that such maintenance is lacking, AVCA may perform such maintenance without further notice at User Group's expense.
- 2.11. No improvements may be made to AVCA Property by User Group without first receiving the express written permission of AVCA. Should User Group place, move, or install any improvements on the AVCA Property without first receiving the express written permission of AVCA, AVCA shall have the sole right to remove or restore such improvements at User Group's expense. Absent a more specific agreement, any improvements that are approved by AVCA must be maintained by User Group to a standard that is acceptable to AVCA, and AVCA may require the removal of any such improvements at any time at User Group's expense. AVCA shall not be responsible for any damages, expenses, reimbursement or charges related to the installation, maintenance or removal of such improvements.
- 2.12. User Group shall promptly notify AVCA of any maintenance that AVCA is responsible to perform, including, but not limited to, turf damage or irrigation issues that are unrelated to User Group's use of AVCA Property. In the event of any emergency repairs, only AVCA authorized contractors may perform any necessary repair. User Group shall reimburse AVCA for any repairs which are not related to the ordinary use of the facilities.
- 2.13.
- (a) This Agreement shall be subject to termination upon ninety (90) days' written notice to either party, unless earlier termination is allowed herein due to breach of any provision of this Agreement.

- (b) Should any breach of this Agreement occur, or if performance of any of the duties and/or obligations of User Group is not timely and completely performed, AVCA shall provide written notice to User Group of the breach. If said breach is not cured within thirty (30) days of the date notice is sent, this Agreement may be immediately terminated by AVCA. In such an event, User Group shall not be entitled to any refund of use fees. Written notice of termination shall be sent by first class mail to User Group at the address set forth in this agreement, or such address as User Group has provided to receive such notices.
- 2.14. User Group may not swap, trade, gift, sell, authorize or otherwise transfer the right to use any AVCA Property to any other person, entity or organization (even if an affiliated entity or organization). In addition, except with the prior express written consent of AVCA, User Group shall not permit any outside vendors (including without limitation food vendors, sponsors, or contractors) on the AVCA Property.
- 2.15. AVCA may, in its sole discretion, withhold reasonable sums from the refundable deposit to ensure User Group's compliance with this Agreement, including, but not limited to, expenses for repair of AVCA Property, damages for injury to or loss by third persons, unpaid fees or other obligations due from User Group under this Agreement, or attorney's fees related to pursuit of compliance with this Agreement. In the event that any damage, maintenance, repair or other expense owed by User Group pursuant to this Agreement exceeds the amount of the refundable deposit, then AVCA shall be entitled to retain the entirety of such deposit and shall have the right to pursue User Group for the balance owed.
- 2.16. User Group shall ensure and enforce that NO PARKING takes place on any area other than in marked designated parking stalls in asphalt parking areas/lots or other areas that AVCA has designated as an Overflow Parking Lot/Area and signage of such has been installed by AVCA. In addition, User Group shall ensure and enforce that NO PARKING takes place on any grass or turf on the AVCA Property.
- 2.17. If use includes the use of the concession stand, User Group shall not store any items in the electrical room at the concession stand without the express prior written permission of AVCA. In no event shall User Group store any items on the floor of the electrical room in the concession stand. User Group is only permitted to store items on the built-in shelving within the electrical room, provided that it first receives the prior written consent of AVCA. Any items not placed on the shelves shall be immediately removed and discarded. Failure to adhere to keeping the floor/walkways clear at all times may result in the future loss of use of the electrical room for any storage purposes. User Group shall keep the concession stand kitchen, storage rooms and electrical rooms clean and clear of all items so that inspections and routine maintenance work can occur unimpeded.

- 2.18. User Group shall not permit the use of any portable, transportable, or non-stationary barbeques on the AVCA Property except with the prior written consent of AVCA.
- 2.19. User Group shall not permit the use of the AVCA facilities described in Exhibit A by any of User Group's Participants, employees, volunteer coaches and/or spectators if field conditions are considered hazardous, such as in the event of wet, muddy, or uneven fields. AVCA reserves the right to determine whether field conditions are hazardous, in which case the use of the AVCA facilities shall not be permitted at such time.
- 2.20. As provided in this paragraph, User Group shall complete and report all incidents that occur during the course of User Group's use of the AVCA Property to AVCA within twenty-four (24) hours of said incident using the Incident Report Form attached as Exhibit "C" hereto. An incident report must be completed for (1) any injury that requires advanced first aid, (2) any injury or illness that could have future complications or require subsequent medical attention, including without limitation severe sprains, broken limbs, and concussions, (3) any act of suspected sexual harassment or child abuse, (4) any act that violates the law, and (5) any act that results in damage to the AVCA Property. An incident report is not required for (1) minor injuries such as scratches and blisters and (2) other personal illnesses that are not likely to have future complications even if the illness causes the person at issue to leave the AVCA Property.

## 3. AVCA's Obligations

- 3.1. AVCA shall perform reasonable maintenance and repair of AVCA property. No portion of AVCA was designed for performance as a professional level sports field. For the most part AVCA's sport fields were designed as passive parks and AVCA is making its best efforts to utilize such areas, where desired, as sports fields to meet the community's changing needs.
- 3.2. AVCA shall use reasonable efforts to keep all AVCA Property specified herein in a manner that is clean, free of debris and in useable condition for the periods specified in this Agreement. The parties to this agreement understand that AVCA is a nonprofit entity. AVCA does not stand as a guarantor that any field or other property is ready and available for use. In the event that the AVCA Property that is specified in this Agreement is unsuitable or unavailable for use, then AVCA shall either provide a comparable site or refund a prorated share of the fees paid by User Group under this Agreement to reimburse User Group for the lost use. User Group acknowledges that AVCA is not responsible to reimburse any expenses or costs associated with finding an alternate site due to the unavailability of AVCA Property.

- 3.3. AVCA shall cause to be inspected all AVCA Property, including, but not limited to, any applicable facilities and/or fencing for damage and report as necessary. User Group retains, however, the obligation to inspect AVCA Property prior to each use to ensure the safety of User Group's Participants.
- 3.4. AVCA shall have a representative available for on-site inspection of the AVCA Property as requested to review existing conditions in the event of any problems. AVCA is dedicated to the success of its user groups, and to this end reserves the right to determine the use schedule that best meets the needs of the community as a whole and to ensure the best maintenance of AVCA Property. User Group should expect that there will be times where a portion of AVCA Property must be closed to let the area rehabilitate or for a needed maintenance to be performed. In such instances, User Group is expected to cooperate with AVCA's efforts. Past use of AVCA Property does not guarantee use by User Group of such area in the future.

#### 4. INSURANCE

- 4.1. User Group shall provide: (a) a \$1,000,000 liability policy with an additional insured endorsement specifically naming "Aliso Viejo Community Association", its employees, officers and directors, and "Powerstone Property Management, Inc." its employees, officers, and directors as additional insureds; (b) such endorsement shall provide that User Group's policy shall be primary, and non-contributory with any policies of insurance owned by said additional insureds; & (c) said policy shall provide for 30 days written notice to AVCA of cancellation, termination and/or non-renewal. A full copy of the entire policy, including the endorsement specified herein, is required prior to any use of AVCA Property and whenever such policy is renewed or replaced. User Group agrees to require any and all vendors, contractors, and/or subcontractors to provide the same insurance coverage and the same evidence of insurance as required of User Group under the Agreement (see "Other Provisions", page 5).
- 4.2. Insurance documents provided pursuant to Section 4.1 must state User Group's name exactly as it is stated in this Agreement. Documents for insurance purchased through a parent organization are subject to AVCA's approval, and may be subject to review by AVCA's legal counsel, all in AVCA's sole and absolute discretion.
- 4.3. Insurance Certificates specifically naming both "Aliso Viejo Community Association" and "Powerstone Property Management, Inc." as additional insured with a second page endorsement must be received a minimum of thirty (30) days prior to the Start Date.

- 4.4. User Group agrees to require any and all vendors, contractors, and/or subcontractors to provide the same insurance coverage and the same evidence of insurance as required of User Group under this Agreement
- 4.5. AVCA shall have the right, but not the obligation, to prohibit User Group from using AVCA Property until the required evidence of insurance of both User Group and its vendors, contractors, and/or subcontractors has been received by AVCA. Failure to provide the required evidence of insurance shall be a material breach of the Agreement, and grounds for immediate termination of the Agreement, at AVCA's discretion.

#### 5. INDEMNIFICATION

- 5.1. User Group agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold AVCA and the additional insureds referenced herein free and harmless from all loss, claims, demands, costs, expenses, obligations, liabilities, damages, recoveries, and deficiencies, including interest, penalties, attorney's fees and legal costs, that Association or such additional insureds may incur as a result of any act or omission by User Group related to or in furtherance of the purposes of this Agreement. User Group further agrees that such indemnity shall include any loss, claims, demands, costs, expenses, obligations, liabilities, damages, recoveries, and deficiencies, including interest, penalties, attorney's fees and costs, that Association or such additional insureds may incur as a result of any act or omission by User Group's Participants, employees, volunteer coaches and/or spectators associated with an event arranged by User Group at the location and during the times set forth in Exhibit "A".
- 5.2. User Group agrees that the indemnity provided by User Group to AVCA under the Agreement shall also include any loss, claims, demands, costs, expenses, obligations, liabilities, damages, recoveries, and deficiencies, including interest, penalties, attorney's fees and costs, that AVCA and the additional insureds referenced in the Agreement may incur as a result of any act or omission by User Group vendors, contractors, subcontractors and/or any other agents associated with an event arranged by User Group at the location and during the times set forth in Exhibit "A" of the Agreement.

#### 6. WAIVER AND RELEASE FORMS

6.1. User Group shall require each Participant and their family to sign a waiver and release acceptable to AVCA, which waives the right to make, bring or maintain any and all claims of any type and kind which said Participants might have, or acquire in the future, against AVCA, its directors and employees, and/or Powerstone Property Management, Inc. its directors and employees (hereinafter "Released Parties") and that releases said Released Parties from any claim, liability and/or demand of every type and kind which might be

- brought against any one or more of them as to any injury or damage which arise from or out of the User Group's program and/or the use of AVCA Property.
- 6.2. AVCA's signed, original Waiver & Release Forms for each and every Participant must be received a minimum of seven (7) days prior to the Start Date, subject to the submission requirements in Section 10.2.
- 6.3. If User Group submits Waiver & Release Forms in an electronic format, a fee of \$2.00 per electronic signature will be assessed to cover AVCA's cost for use of software. User Group shall pay these fees upon receipt of an invoice from AVCA.

## 7. RESIDENCY AND AGE REQUIREMENTS

- 7.1. Age Requirement for Participants: At least 75% of User Group's Participants must be 18 years of age or younger.
- 7.2. Residency Requirement for Participants: At least 75% of User Group's Participants must be residents of AVCA. Research

#### **HISTORY**

Board Policy 6143, Courses of Study, requires that "the Governing Board shall adopt a course of instruction which sufficiently prepares students for the high school course of study required by state law. The Superintendent or designee shall keep the Board informed of any changes in the high school curriculum."

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

In order to make certain that District students are prepared for the twenty-first century, the changes in standards and a-g requirements, new secondary courses are routinely proposed to ensure post-secondary success for all students.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Advanced Placement (AP) Research, the second course in the AP Capstone experience, allows students to deeply explore an academic topic, problem, issue or idea of individual interest. Students design, plan and implement a yearlong investigation to address a research question. Through this inquiry, they further the skills they acquired in the AP Seminar course by learning research methodology, employing ethical research practices, and accessing, analyzing and synthesizing information. Students reflect on their skill development, document their processes and curate the artifacts of their scholarly work through a process and reflection portfolio. The course culminates in an academic paper of 4,000 - 5,000 words (accompanied by a performance, exhibit or product where applicable) and a presentation with an oral defense.<sup>1</sup>

AP Seminar is a prerequisite for AP Research. Completing AP Seminar and all its required assessment components is necessary for students to develop the skills to be successful in AP Research.

Students who complete AP Seminar, AP Research and four additional AP courses with a score of three or higher will be awarded a Capstone Diploma which is recognized by numerous California universities as a program that equips students with the independent research, collaborative teamwork, and communication skills that are increasingly valued by colleges. It cultivates curious, independent, and collaborative scholars and prepares them to make logical, evidence-

based decisions. Students who earn scores of three or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research but not on all four additional AP courses are awarded an AP Seminar and Research Certificate.

The AP Capstone Program is designed to provide students the necessary skills needed to excel in college. Students will become experts in conducting independent research, participating in collaborative teamwork and in developing and using sound communication skills.

AP Research will be offered at Tesoro High School beginning in the 2018-2019 school year and available at all comprehensive high schools should they choose to offer this course. This course will satisfy the "g" requirement of the University of California a-g requirements.

# **AP Research Curricular Requirements**

The curricular requirements are the core elements of an AP course. The curriculum framework and supporting documents provided during professional development serve as resources to assist teachers in determining the appropriate level of evidence to include within their syllabi to meet or exceed the requirements. (All AP Research teachers must attend College Board AP Research intensive training prior to their first year of teaching the AP Research course.)

Evidence of the following curricular requirements should be included in the course syllabus developed by the teacher and submitted to the College Board for review and approval.

- Students develop and apply discrete skills identified in the learning objectives of the enduring understandings within the following five big ideas: Question and Explore, Understand and Analyze, Evaluate Multiple Perspectives, Synthesize Ideas, Team, Transform, and Transmit.
- Students develop an understanding of ethical research practices and the AP Capstone™ Policy on Plagiarism and Falsification or Fabrication of Information.
- ▶ In the classroom and independently (while possibly consulting any expert advisers), students learn and employ research and inquiry methods to develop, manage, and conduct an in-depth investigation of an area of personal interest, culminating in an academic paper of 4,000–5,000 words that includes the following elements:
  - > Introduction
  - Method, Process, or Approach
  - Results, Product, or Findings
  - > Discussion, Analysis, and/or Evaluation
  - Conclusion and Future Directions
  - > Bibliography
- Using a process and reflection portfolio (PREP), students document their inquiry processes, communication with their teachers and any expert advisers as needed, and reflections on their thought processes. Students have regular work-in-progress interviews with their teachers to review their progress and to receive feedback on their scholarly work.
- Students develop and deliver a presentation (using an appropriate medium) and an oral defense to a panel on their research processes, method, and findings.

## **AP Research Curriculum Framework**

#### **Overview of the Curriculum Framework**

Based on the Understanding by Design (Wiggins and McTighe) model, this curriculum framework is intended to provide a clear and detailed description of the course requirements necessary for student success. This conceptualization will guide the development and organization of learning outcomes from general to specific, resulting in focused statements about content knowledge and skills needed for success in the course. The curriculum framework contains the following structural components:

- The course is organized around five big ideas. Tied to each big idea are several essential questions. These are open-ended questions that encourage students to think deeply about a topic, ask additional questions and investigate solutions, and develop the deeper conceptual understanding that the course seeks to foster. Teachers should communicate to students that these big ideas are not meant to represent a linear progression of research processes but instead are a recursive set of ideas and skills that the student researcher will strengthen by the end of the research process.
- Within each big idea are several enduring understandings. These are the long-term takeaways related to the big ideas that a student should have after exploring the content and skills. These understandings are expressed as generalizations that specify what students will come to understand about the key concepts in the course. Enduring understandings are numbered to correspond to each big idea. The enduring understandings for the AP Seminar and AP Research courses are the same.
- ▶ Linked to each enduring understanding are the corresponding learning objectives. The learning objectives articulate what students need to be able to do in order to develop the enduring understandings. The learning objectives will become targets of assessment for the course. Learning objectives are numbered to correspond with the appropriate big ideas and enduring understandings.
  - Learning objectives in italics with a blue shaded background represent those from the AP Seminar course that are not assessed in the AP Research course.
  - Learning objectives with a green shaded background are those that do carry over from the AP Seminar course and should be used to develop instructional strategies and/or will be formally assessed by the summative assessment task components of the AP Research course.
- For each of the learning objectives, essential knowledge statements describe the facts and basic concepts that a student should know and be able to recall in order to demonstrate mastery of the learning objective. Essential knowledge components are numbered to correspond with the appropriate big ideas, enduring understandings, and learning objectives.
  - > Essential knowledge statements in italics with a blue shaded background are those from the AP Seminar course that do not carry over into the AP Research course.
  - Essential knowledge statements with a green shaded background are those that do carry over from the AP Seminar course into the AP Research course.

### **Big Idea 1: Question and Explore**

Inquiry and investigation begin when students encounter information about ideas, complex issues, and problems that stimulates their intellectual curiosity. They then continue the research process by developing a critical question about one or more of those complex issues or ideas. Seeking answers to such questions requires exploration of numerous, often competing perspectives; the context surrounding those perspectives; and the reliability and credibility of the perspectives. Through this exploration, students begin to develop their own perspectives, rather than simply accepting those of others. They consider the purpose of their research—what is supposed to be achieved and why. Ideally, they also develop additional questions that lead to further inquiry. The intrinsic value of asking and answering questions cannot be overstated. Giving students the opportunity to dig deeper and feed their curiosity makes for meaningful discoveries and discussions.

### **Big Idea 2: Understand and Analyze**

Developing understanding starts with comprehension of the concepts and perspectives under examination. Being able to summarize by identifying and explaining the salient ideas in a text is foundational. When students summarize and explain an author's perspective to others, they are building understanding. Students must comprehend a perspective or argument in order to be able to analyze it. That analysis — including consideration of the author's point of view and purpose, the reasoning and details the author selects, develops, and conveys, and the way the author chooses to situate those details — in turn leads to greater understanding of the topic or concept being explored. Students evaluate the validity of an argument by examining the strength of the line of reasoning and the quality of the evidence the author uses. This level of understanding allows students to recognize the implications and predict the consequences of an argument.

## **Big Idea 3: Evaluate Multiple Perspectives**

Understanding the complexity of an issue, idea, or problem requires students to compare and contrast different perspectives. These multiple perspectives, which may support, oppose, compete with, or otherwise vary from one another, come together to create the conversation on the issue. Students must consider the biases and assumptions behind those perspectives in order to evaluate their relevance and importance in the conversation. Evaluating multiple perspectives and arguments allows students to better understand the complexities of an issue or topic.

- How might others see a problem or issue differently?
- What patterns or trends can be identified among the arguments about this issue?
- What are the implications and/or consequences of accepting or rejecting a particular argument?
- How can I connect the multiple arguments? What other issues, questions, or topics do they relate to?

- From whose perspective is this information being presented, and how does that affect my evaluation?

## Big Idea 4: Synthesize Ideas

Once enough information is gathered and evaluated, students synthesize their accumulated knowledge, emerging ideas, and perspectives to form conclusions of their own. Students must consider other points of view but also analyze material to develop their own perspectives and scholarly works. The goal is for students to think critically about the information and then add to, not simply repeat, the ideas of others. In this way, students establish a unique, creative voice within the larger conversation.

#### **Essential Questions**

- How do I connect and analyze the evidence in order to develop an argument and support a conclusion?
- Are there other conclusions I should consider?
- How does my scholarly work emerge from my perspective, design choices, or aesthetic rationale?
- How do I acknowledge and account for my own biases and assumptions?
- What is the most appropriate way to acknowledge and attribute the work of others that was used to support my argument? How do I ensure the conclusions I present are my own?

### Big Idea 5: Team, Transform, and Transmit

Collaboration, communication, and reflection are skills that provide opportunities for students to develop their learning. When collaborating, students draw upon their own strengths and the strengths of a team of peers, expert advisers, and teachers to achieve their best possible work. Students should engage in peer review and personal revision to refine and tailor their arguments.

An argument is effectively communicated when its purpose is clear, it is tailored to a specific audience and context, and it is conveyed through a medium appropriate and appealing to the intended audience. Adhering to standard language conventions and engaging delivery techniques establishes a writer's or speaker's credibility with his or her audience. Sometimes arguments or perspectives are associated with and accompanied by an innovation or artistic work. These works should make clear the artistic choices for the aesthetic rationale or focus on one perspective over another.

Whether working alone or in a group, students reflect on their work and learning processes, which can lead to personal growth as well as even more effective inquiry, learning, and collaboration.

- What is the best medium or genre through which to reach my audience?
- How might I adapt my written and oral presentations for different audiences and situations?
- How might my communication choices affect my credibility with my audience?

- ► How do I provide feedback that is valuable to others? How do I act upon feedback I have received?
- How can I benefit from reflecting on my own work?

#### **HISTORY**

Board Policy 6143, Courses of Study, requires that "the Governing Board shall adopt a course of instruction which sufficiently prepares students for the high school course of study required by state law. The Superintendent or designee shall keep the Board informed of any changes in the high school curriculum."

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

In order to make certain that District students are prepared for the twenty-first century, the changes in standards and a-g requirements, new secondary courses are routinely proposed to ensure post-secondary success for all students.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Advanced Placement (AP) Seminar is the first course in the AP Capstone Program. The Capstone Program is designed to provide students the necessary skills needed to excel in college. Students will become experts in conducting independent research, participating in collaborative teamwork and in developing and using sound communication skills.

Students who complete AP Seminar, AP Research and four additional AP courses with a score of three or higher will be awarded a Capstone Diploma which is recognized by numerous California universities as a program that equips students with the independent research, collaborative teamwork, and communication skills that are increasingly valued by colleges. It cultivates curious, independent, and collaborative scholars and prepares them to make logical, evidence-based decisions. Students who earn scores of three or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research but not on all four additional AP courses are awarded an AP Seminar and Research Certificate.

AP Seminar is a foundational course that engages students in cross-curricular conversations that explore the complexities of academic and real-world topics and issues by analyzing divergent perspectives. Using an inquiry framework, students practice reading and analyzing articles, research studies, and foundational, literary and philosophical texts; listening to and viewing speeches, broadcasts and personal accounts; and experiencing artistic works and performances. Students learn to synthesize information from multiple sources, develop their own perspectives

in written essays and design and deliver oral and visual presentations, both individually and as part of a team. Ultimately, the course aims to equip students with the power to analyze and evaluate information with accuracy and precision in order to craft and communicate evidence-based arguments.<sup>1</sup>

AP Seminar will be offered at Tesoro High School beginning in the 2018-2019 school year and available at all comprehensive high schools should they choose to offer this course. This course will satisfy the "g" requirement of the University of California a-g requirements.

AP Capstone™ is an innovative diploma program from the College Board that equips students with the independent research, collaborative teamwork, and communication skills that are increasingly valued by colleges. AP Capstone is built on the foundation of two AP® courses — AP Seminar and AP Research — and is designed to complement and enhance the in-depth, discipline-specific study experienced in other AP courses.

In AP Seminar, students investigate real-world issues from multiple perspectives, gathering and analyzing information from various sources in order to develop credible and valid evidence-based arguments. AP Seminar is a prerequisite for AP Research. Completing AP Seminar and all its required assessment components is necessary for students to develop the skills to be successful in AP Research. In AP Research, students cultivate the skills and discipline necessary to conduct independent research and inquiry in order to produce and defend their scholarly work.

The AP Capstone program aims to empower students by

- engaging them with rigorous college-level curricula focused on the skills necessary for successful college completion;
- extending their abilities to synthesize information from multiple perspectives and apply skills in new situations and cross-curricular contexts;
- enabling them to collect and analyze information with accuracy and precision;
- cultivating their abilities to craft, communicate, and defend evidence-based arguments; and
- providing opportunities for them to practice disciplined and scholarly research skills while exploring relevant topics that appeal to their interests and curiosity.

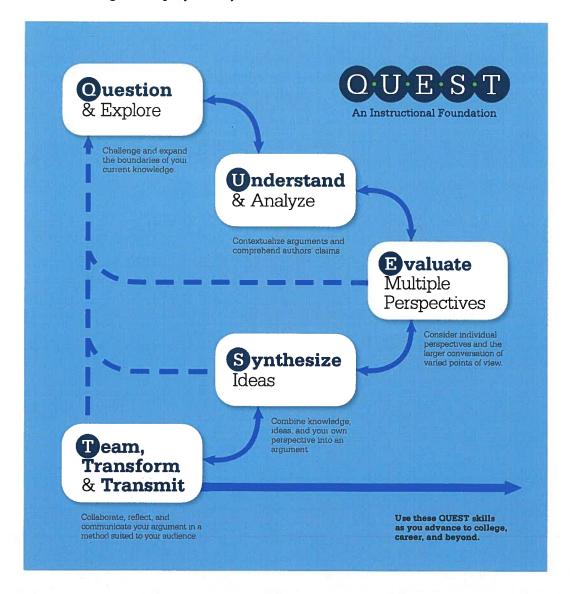

# **AP Capstone Pedagogical Framework**

### **Overview of the Pedagogical Framework**

Throughout the program, students consider and evaluate multiple points of view to develop their own perspectives on complex issues and topics through inquiry and investigation. The AP Capstone program provides students with a framework that allows them to develop, practice, and hone their critical and creative thinking skills as they make connections between various issues and their own lives. Teachers should help students understand that this process is recursive, not linear. The recursive nature of this process allows students to go back and forth between the different stages of inquiry as they encounter new information.



## **AP Capstone Reasoning Processes**

The AP Capstone program allows students to develop and practice reasoning processes that help them to make intentional, strategic decisions. It is important for teachers to understand these reasoning processes, which are embedded within the learning objectives:

- Situating being aware of the context of one's own as well as others' perspectives, realizing that individual bias can lead to assumptions;
- Choosing making intentional and purposeful choices, realizing that choices have both intended and unintended consequences;
- Defending being able to explain and justify personal choices, logic, line of reasoning, and conclusions; and
- Connecting seeing intersections within and/or across concepts, disciplines, and cultures.

# AP Research Course Transferable Skills and Proficiencies

The AP Capstone reasoning processes are also embedded in the AP Research course transferable skills and proficiencies. The transferable skills and proficiencies are high-level descriptions of the understanding, knowledge, and skills that students should be able to apply in novel situations long after completing the AP Research course.

# **AP Seminar Curricular Requirements**

The curricular requirements are the core elements of an AP course. The curriculum framework and supporting documents provided during professional development serve as resources to assist teachers in determining the appropriate level of evidence to include within their syllabi to meet or exceed the requirements. (All AP Seminar teachers must attend College Board AP Seminar intensive training prior to their first year of teaching the AP Seminar course.)

Evidence of the following curricular requirements should be included in the course syllabus developed by the teacher and submitted to the College Board for review and approval.

- ▶ Students explore the complexities of one or more themes by making connections within, between, and/or among multiple cross-curricular areas and by exploring multiple perspectives and lenses (e.g., cultural and social, artistic and philosophical, political and historical, environmental, economic, scientific, futuristic, ethical) related to those themes.
- Students develop and apply discrete skills identified in the learning objectives of the enduring understandings within the following five big ideas:
  - Question and Explore
  - Understand and Analyze
  - Evaluate Multiple Perspectives
  - Synthesize Ideas
  - > Team, Transform, and Transmit
- Students gain a rich appreciation and understanding of issues through the following activities:
  - reading articles and research studies;
  - reading foundational, literary, and philosophical texts;
  - > viewing and listening to speeches, broadcasts, and/or personal accounts;
  - and experiencing artistic works and performances.
- ► Students develop an understanding of ethical research practices and the AP Capstone™ Policy on Plagiarism and Falsification or Fabrication of Information.
- Students work collaboratively with a team to identify, investigate, analyze, and evaluate a real-world or academic problem or issue; consider and evaluate alternatives or options; propose one or more solutions or resolutions; and present and defend the argument for their solutions through a multimedia presentation.
- Students work independently to identify a research question based on provided stimulus material; research the issue; analyze, evaluate, and select evidence to develop an argument; present and defend a conclusion; and produce a multimedia presentation to be delivered to their peers.

# **AP Seminar Curriculum Framework**

#### **Overview of the Curriculum Framework**

Based on the Understanding by Design (Wiggins and McTighe) model, this curriculum framework is intended to provide a clear and detailed description of the course requirements necessary for student success. This conceptualization will guide the development and organization of learning outcomes from general to specific, resulting in focused statements about content knowledge and skills needed for success in the course. The curriculum framework contains the following structural components:

- ▶ The course is organized around five **big ideas**. Tied to each big idea are several **essential questions**. These are open-ended questions that encourage students to think deeply about a topic, ask additional questions and investigate solutions, and develop the deeper conceptual understanding that the course seeks to foster.
- Within each big idea are several enduring understandings. These are the long-term takeaways related to the big ideas that a student should have after exploring the content and skills. These understandings are expressed as generalizations that specify what students will come to understand about the key concepts in the course. Enduring understandings are numbered to correspond to each big idea.
- Linked to each enduring understanding are the corresponding learning objectives. The learning objectives articulate what students need to be able to do in order to develop the enduring understandings. The learning objectives will become targets of assessment for the course. Learning objectives are numbered to correspond with the appropriate big ideas and enduring understandings.
- For each of the learning objectives, essential knowledge statements describe the facts and basic concepts that a student should know and be able to recall in order to demonstrate mastery of the learning objective. Essential knowledge components are numbered to correspond with the appropriate big ideas, enduring understandings, and learning objectives.

# **Big Idea 1: Question and Explore**

Inquiry and investigation begin when students encounter information about complex issues and problems that stimulates their intellectual curiosity. They then continue the research process by developing a critical question about one or more of those complex issues or ideas. Seeking answers to such questions requires exploration of numerous, often competing perspectives; the context surrounding those perspectives; and the reliability and credibility of the perspectives. Through this exploration, students begin to develop their own perspectives, rather than simply accept those of others. They consider the purpose of their research — what is supposed to be achieved and why. Ideally, they also develop additional questions that lead to further inquiry. The intrinsic value of asking and answering questions cannot be overstated. Giving students the opportunity to dig deeper and feed their curiosity makes for meaningful discoveries and discussions.

#### **Essential Questions**

- How does the context of a problem or issue affect how it is interpreted or presented?
- How might others see the problem or issue differently?
- What questions have yet to be asked?
- What voices or perspectives are missing from my research?
- What do I want to know, learn, or understand?
- How does my research question shape how I go about trying to answer it?
- What information do I need to answer my question?
- What keywords should I use to search for information about this topic?

## Big Idea 2: Understand and Analyze

Developing understanding starts with comprehension of the concepts and perspectives under examination. Being able to summarize by identifying and explaining the salient ideas in a text is foundational. When students summarize and explain an author's perspective to others, they are building understanding. Students must comprehend a perspective or argument in order to be able to analyze it. That analysis — including consideration of the author's point of view and purpose, the reasoning and details the author selects, develops, and conveys, and the way the author chooses to situate those details — in turn leads to greater understanding of the topic or concept being explored. Students evaluate the strength of an argument by examining the line of reasoning and the quality of the evidence the author uses. This level of understanding allows students to recognize the implications and predict the consequences of an argument.

## **Big Idea 3: Evaluate Multiple Perspectives**

Understanding the complexity of an issue, idea, or problem requires students to compare and contrast different perspectives. These multiple perspectives, which may support, oppose, compete with, or otherwise vary from one another, come together to create the conversation on the issue. Students must consider the biases and assumptions behind those perspectives in order to evaluate their relevance and importance in the conversation. Evaluating multiple perspectives and arguments allows students to better understand the complexities of an issue or topic.

- What patterns or trends can be identified among the arguments about this issue?
- What are the implications and/or consequences of accepting or rejecting a particular argument?
- ▶ How can I connect the multiple perspectives? What other issues, questions, or topics do they relate to?
- How can I explain contradictions within or between arguments?
- From whose perspective is this information being presented, and how does that affect my evaluation?

## Big Idea 4: Synthesize Ideas

Once enough information is gathered and evaluated, students synthesize their accumulated knowledge, emerging ideas, and perspectives to form conclusions of their own. In order to situate their perspectives within the larger conversation, students must consider other perspectives and points of view. Strong arguments have a clear purpose and are grounded in a logical line of reasoning supported by carefully chosen and relevant evidence. Effective arguments analyze the material and develop a perspective on it. Information from other sources should not stand in for students' own thinking. The goal is for students to think critically about the information and then add to, not simply repeat, the ideas of others. Building arguments on the ideas of others recognizes and acknowledges their perspectives while also establishing one's unique voice in the conversation.

#### **HISTORY**

Board Policy 6143, Courses of Study, requires that "the Governing Board shall adopt a course of instruction which sufficiently prepares students for the high school course of study required by state law. The Superintendent or designee shall keep the Board informed of any changes in the high school curriculum."

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

In order to make certain that District students are prepared for the twenty-first century, the changes in standards and a-g requirements, new secondary courses are routinely proposed to ensure post-secondary success for all students.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Algebra II with Financial Applications is a regular college preparatory math course that fulfills the a-g requirement for the University of California (UC) system. This course is aligned with the California Algebra II standards. Topics include banking, investing, credit, employment and income taxes, automobile ownership, independent living, and retirement planning and household budgeting. The course offers students multiple opportunities to use, construct, question, model and interpret financial situations through multiple representations, including symbolic algebraic, graphical, geometric and verbal.

It is anticipated that this course will be offered at all six comprehensive high schools beginning in the 2018-2019 school year. This course will satisfy the "c" requirement of the UC a-g requirements.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Expenditures for textbooks are required for this course and are estimated to be \$30,000-\$60,000 for all six comprehensive high schools depending on the number of sections offered. The textbooks will be paid for with lottery funds.

College and Career Advantage is requesting this course and it is the first course in a sequenced career pathway. It explores the many careers in the fields of aviation and aeronautics and prepares students for upper level courses in this pathway. Instruction includes a study of the development of aircraft and the aviation/aeronautical industries. Through a project-based learning approach, students will learn about the scientific and mathematical principles of flight and aerodynamics. Students will learn the requirements and opportunities for careers and post-secondary education in aviation and aeronautics. They will develop a personal career/life plan while also practicing valuable foundation skills in technical reading and writing, public speaking and technology. #### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Chamber Orchestra is a course for the most advanced string students with extensive training and experiences that study class five and six (A, AA) music literature. Students will study advanced/university level theory and vocabulary used in concert literature. Students will discover the historical concepts for various styles and genres of string and full orchestra repertoire. Students will understand, synthesize and demonstrate music as a way to create and communicate the composer's meaning and emotion through performance. Students will identify and demonstrate listening skills, analyze group and individual performances using appropriate musical language and pedagogical skills related to their instrument. Guest clinicians and conductors will be invited into the classroom to extend student knowledge of instrument skills and music literature. Students will develop fundamental artistic and aesthetic understanding with written critiques of live music performances. Communication and interpretation skills will be used by students while producing and performing solo and ensemble works in collaboration with other art disciplines. Rehearsals and performance outside of class time are required.

Students must audition as a prerequisite for this course. Chamber Orchestra will be offered at Tesoro High School beginning in the 2018-2019 school year and available at all comprehensive high schools should they choose to offer this course. In order to make certain that District students are prepared for the twenty-first century, the changes in standards and a-g requirements, new secondary courses are routinely proposed to ensure post-secondary success for all students.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

International Baccalaureate (IB) Marine Science is an Honors level college preparatory science course that fulfills the a-g requirement for the University of California system. The course is aligned with the Next Generation Science Standards and includes the following topics: Earth Science (origin and structure of oceans, dynamics of Earth's crust, plate tectonics and seismic activity); Physical and Chemical Oceanography (waves, tides, currents, ocean circulation, chemical properties of seawater, ocean acidification; Marine Biology (primary productivity, marine organisms, marine ecosystems); Environmental Science (atmospheric circulation, climate changes, climate modeling, marine ecosystem conservation); and Biotechnology (human activities and human threats to marine ecosystems, biochemical and medicinal opportunities of marine ecosystems, deep sea mining, overfishing and pollution).

Prerequisites for this course include a C or better in Biology and Chemistry or Physics. Students may enroll in this course even if they are not enrolled in the IB program. This course will meet the "d" requirement for University of California a-g requirements.

IB Marine Science will be offered at Capistrano Valley High School beginning in the 2018-2019 school year and be available at San Clemente High School should it choose to offer this course.

### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

#### **HISTORY**

Providing students with a robust level of instruction in Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA) includes ensuring that students have rich instruction in visual art. This instruction should include both the teaching of various visual art styles and techniques, but also an introduction to famous artists and their stories. Schools across the district have been implementing the Art Masters Legacy program for the past 18 years.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The Art Masters Legacy program augments the school's Visual Arts program by providing art teachers-lecturers that conduct and present multimedia assemblies for students using art visuals, images, and engrossing stories covering specific artists in history. These artists include names such as Remington, Chagall, Da Vinci, Audubon, and O'Keefe (among many others). Schools sign up for a particular series of artists to be presented to students in the year. Following these multimedia assemblies, students have an opportunity with the art teacher-lecturer to engage in a hands-on art activity in which they create their own individual works of art in the manner of the master artist and/or art subject, using the same styles, techniques, media, and disciplines.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Three school sites are participating with Art Masters Legacy. Each has selected a different program series emphasizing a different set of artists and/or art subject. Truman Benedict Elementary School (ES) has selected six artists or art styles to study. Bergeson ES and Don Juan Avila ES have selected five artists or art styles to study.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The estimated total expenditure for these agreements is \$22,591 paid by site and/or gift funds from each participating school site. The cost for Don Juan Avila ES is \$7,453, the cost for Truman Benedict ES is \$8,036 and the cost for Bergeson ES is \$7,102.

#### **HISTORY**

Del Obispo Elementary School has branded itself as a "Next Generation Learning Academy." It is engaging in a variety of actions at the site to bring improved Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) experiences and learning to its students. Part of this strategy includes providing students with regular and on-going instruction in computer coding. In order to implement this strategy, the school is requesting approval of a partnership with CodeCampus, LLC.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

CodeCampus, LLC is an organization that provides computer coding instruction to students. Currently, CodeCampus has been providing after school coding classes across Orange County through Saddleback College's fee-based programs. Recently, their Bit Scouts program was at the San Juan Capistrano YMCA located at the Del Obispo ES/Marco Forster Middle School campus. They have also recently partnered with Anaheim Unified School District to provide professional development training in computer coding to teachers across the district in order to increase computer science/coding instruction to schools across the district.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

CodeCampus would provide an instructor that would visit Del Obispo each week and provide 30-45 minute lessons to students in their classrooms. The CodeCampus instructor will co-plan and co-teach CodeCampus lessons with Del Obispo ES teachers. Students in grades K-2 will receive 35 minutes of instruction weekly and grade 3 – 5 students will receive 40 minutes of instruction. The expectation of the program is to provide students with curriculum taught by the CodeCampus teacher, in collaboration with Del Obispo ES teachers. Within the course of the year, teachers and students will become proficient in teaching and using coding. Ultimately, students will use the language of computer science fluently in student directed projects, proctored by Del Obispo ES teachers, creating a true Computer Science immersion program. CodeCampus does not collect a student's personal identification information.

### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The cost for CodeCampus is \$1.50 per student per week, for 20 weeks. The estimated expenditure under this contract for the year is \$11,250 paid by site Title I funds.

#### CODECAMPUS SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Services Agreement and the exhibits, schedules and attachments, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference (collectively, this "Agreement"), is entered into effective as of November 8th, 2017 (the "Effective Date"), by and between Codecampus, LLC ("codeCampus") and Del Obispo Elementary School ("Del Obispo").

#### Background

WHEREAS, codeCampus provides instructional services for elementary schools ("Services"), as set forth in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference; and

WHEREAS, Del Obispo wishes to provide coding lessons to the children enrolled in its elementary school ("Students"), to be held on its premises and grounds ("Site");

NOW, THEREFORE, acknowledging the receipt of adequate consideration and intending to be legally bound, the parties agree as follows:

#### 1. Services, Fees and Payment.

- 1.1. Services. codeCampus shall provide the Services as set forth in Exhibit A.
- 1.2. Instructional Materials, Supervision, and Limitation of Instructor Responsibilies. Del Obispo shall provide all computers, projectors, whiteboards, and other classroom resources ("Instructional Materials"), and agrees that one or more of its employees, volunteers, or teaching staff shall be present to provide classroom supervision during all times that codeCampus or its instructional staff ("Instructors") are on Site. Del Obispo agrees to hold codeCampus and Instructors harmless for any incidental or accidental damage that occurs to Instructional Materials during the Services. Del Obispo further agrees that codeCampus and its Instructors shall not be responsible for any child care, instruction, or supervisional responsibilities outside of the scope of Services as set forth in Exhibit A. codeCampus and its Instructors agree to put forth best efforts to ensure proper usage of Instructional Materials by Students, and to provide appropriate assistance during any emergency situation.
  - 1.3. Fees. The fees and other charges of codeCampus are set forth on Exhibit A.
- 1.4. Taxes. The fees set forth on Exhibit A are exclusive of all federal, state, municipal, or other government excise, sales, use, value-added, gross receipts, personal property, occupational, or other taxes now in force or enacted in the future, and codeCampus shall pay any such tax (excluding taxes on Del Obispo's net income) that Del Obispo may be required to collect or pay now or at any time in the future with respect to such fees.
- 1.5. Payment. Payment of the amounts due to codeCampus shall be made in accordance with the payment schedule set forth on Exhibit A by wire transfer, check, or other immediately-available funds. Any amount not paid within thirty (30) days following CodeCampus' invoice shall bear a finance charge at the lesser rate of 1 ½% per month or the maximum amount allowed by law.

#### 2. Representations and Warranties.

- 2.1. Compliance with Laws. Del Obispo shall use commercially reasonable efforts to conduct the Services in compliance with all applicable laws, rules and regulations.
- 2.2. No Other Warranties by CodeCampus. THE SERVICES ARE PROVIDED BY CODECAMPUS "AS IS," WITHOUT WARRANTY OF ANY KIND, INCLUDING THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY, FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, TITLE, OR ANY WARRANTY THAT THE CURRICULUM OR SERVICES WILL BE ERROR-FREE OR OPERATE WITHOUT INTERRUPTION, OR THAT THE CURRICULUM OR SERVICES WILL MEET DEL OBISPO'S OR THE STUDENTS' REQUIREMENTS, AND ANY WARRANTIES IMPLIED BY LAW, BY THE COURSE OF DEALING BETWEEN THE PARTIES, OR OTHERWISE, ARE HEREBY EXCLUDED TO THE FULLEST EXTENT PERMITTED BY LAW.

#### Term.

- 3.1. In General. The initial term of this Agreement shall begin upon execution of this Agreement, and end on June 30th, 2018, followed by successive automatic renewal periods of one (1) year each (together, the "Term"), unless sooner terminated pursuant to this Section 6 or other provisions of this Agreement providing for termination.
- 3.2. Termination for Cause. This Agreement may be terminated at any time if either party fails to perform any of its material obligations hereunder and such failure continues for thirty (30) days following written notice from the non-breaching party. For these purposes (i) any obligation of Del Obispo to pay any amount to codeCampus shall be treated as a material obligation, and (ii) if Del Obispo fails to make a required payment by the due date, codeCampus may (but shall not be required to) suspend the Services, or terminate this Agreement without giving written notice of such failure or any additional failure.
- 3.3. Termination Without Cause. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by either party by giving at least thirty (30) days' written notice to the other party.

#### 4. Limitation of Claims and Damages.

- 4.1. Limitation of Claims. CODECAMPUS SHALL NOT BE LIABLE TO DEL OBISPO UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES (EVEN IF THIS AGREEMENT IS TERMINATED) FOR ANY CONSEQUENTIAL, SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, PUNITIVE OR INDIRECT DAMAGES (INCLUDING WITHOUT LIMITATION LOSS OF PROFIT, REVENUE, BUSINESS OPPORTUNITY OR BUSINESS ADVANTAGE), WHETHER BASED UPON A CLAIM OR ACTION OF TORT CONTRACT, WARRANTY, NEGLIGENCE, STRICT LIABILITY, BREACH OF STATUTORY DUTY, CONTRIBUTION, INDEMNITY OR ANY OTHER LEGAL THEORY OR CAUSE OF ACTION, EVEN IF ADVISED OF THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH DAMAGES.
- 4.2. Limitation of Damages. CODECAMPUS' TOTAL LIABILITY UNDER OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, REGARDLESS OF THE CAUSE OR FORM OF ACTION, AND WHETHER BEFORE OR AFTER ITS TERMINATION, SHALL NOT EXCEED THE TOTAL OF ALL AMOUNTS PAID TO CODECAMPUS BY DEL OBISPO DURING THE PRIOR SIX (6) MONTH PERIOD.

#### 5. Indemnification by Del Obispo.

- 5.1. Obligation to Indemnify. Del Obispo will indemnify and hold harmless codeCampus, its service providers, and their respective affiliates, managers, agents and employees, from and against all losses, costs, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fee, from third party claims arising from the Del Obispo's use of the Services, except for claims arising from the wrongful acts or omissions of codeCampus.
- 5.2. Notice and Defense of Claims. codeCampus will promptly notify Del Obispo of any claim for which it believes it is entitled to indemnification under the preceding paragraph. Del Obispo may, but shall not be required to, assume control of the defense and settlement of such claim provided that (i) such defense and settlement shall be at the sole cost and expense of codeCampus (ii) Del Obispo shall be permitted to control the defense of the claim only if Del Obispo is financially capable of such defense and engages the services of a qualified attorney, each in the reasonable judgment of Del Obispo; (iii) Del Obispo shall not thereafter withdraw from control of such defense and settlement without giving reasonable advance notice to codeCampus; (iv) codeCampus shall be entitled to participate in, but not control, such defense and settlement at its own cost and expense; (v) before entering into any settlement of the claim, Del Obispo shall be required to obtain the prior written approval of codeCampus, which shall be not unreasonably withheld, if pursuant to or as a result of such settlement, injunctive or other equitable relief would be imposed against codeCampus; and (vi) Del Obispo will not enter into any settlement of any such claim without the prior written consent of codeCampus unless Del Obispo agrees to be liable for any amounts to be paid to the third party pursuant to such settlement and is financially able to do so.

#### 6. Miscellaneous.

- 6.1. Amendments; Waivers. No amendment, modification, or waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall be binding unless in writing and signed by the party against whom the operation of such amendment, modification, or waiver is sought to be enforced. No delay in the exercise of any right shall be deemed a waiver thereof, nor shall the waiver of a right or remedy in a particular instance constitute a waiver of such right or remedy generally.
- 6.2. Notices. Any notice or document required or permitted to be given under this Agreement may be given by a party or by its legal counsel and shall be deemed to be given by electronic mail with transmission acknowledgment, to

if to Del Obispo, to raj@codecampus.com if to codeCampus, or to such other email address or addresses as the parties may designate from time to time by notice satisfactory under this section.

- 6.3. Governing Law; Dispute Resolution. This Agreement shall be governed by California law without reference to conflict of law principles. Any dispute between the parties arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be resolved exclusively by JAMS arbitration, which shall be held in Orange County, California, or another location mutually agreed upon, and conducted in accordance with the JAMS then in effect. Judgment upon the award rendered shall be final and non-appealable and may be entered in any court having jurisdiction. The prevailing party shall be entitled to recovery of all its reasonable attorneys' fees from the other party in addition to any other award of damages.
- 6.4. Assignment. Neither Del Obispo nor codeCampus may assign its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other. Notwithstanding the preceding sentence, a party may assign its interest in this Agreement to a person acquiring (by sale, merger, reorganization, or otherwise) substantially all of the transferor's assets or business, provided that (i) the transferee agrees to assume and perform all obligations of the transferor for periods following the transfer; and (ii) the transferor remains liable for all obligations prior to the transfer. The transferring party may charge a reasonable fee for the review and processing of the information regarding the transfer.
- 6.5. Independent Contractors. Each party to this Agreement is an independent contractor and neither shall be considered the employee, agent, party or joint venturer of or with the other (regardless of how the parties are referred to in writing or orally) or have any express or implied authority to bind the other except as specifically set forth in this Agreement.
- 6.6. Language Construction. The language of this Agreement shall be construed in accordance with its fair meaning and not for or against any party. The parties acknowledge that each party and its counsel have reviewed and had the opportunity to participate in the drafting of this Agreement and, accordingly, that the rule of construction that would resolve ambiguities in favor of non-drafting parties shall not apply to the interpretation of this Agreement.
- 6.7. Force Majeure. Neither party shall be entitled to recover damages or terminate this Agreement by virtue of any delay or default in performance by the other party (other than a delay or default in the payment of money) if such delay or default is caused by Acts of God, government restrictions (including the denial or cancellation of any export or other necessary license), wars, insurrections and/or any other cause beyond the reasonable control of the party whose performance is affected; provided that the party experiencing the difficulty shall give the other prompt written notice following the occurrence of the cause relied upon, explaining the cause and its effect in reasonable detail. Dates by which performance obligations are scheduled to be met will be extended for a period of time equal to the time lost due to any delay so caused.
- 6.8. Signature in Counterparts. This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be a fully-executed original.
- 6.9. Signature by Facsimile or Email. An original signature transmitted by facsimile or email shall be deemed to be original for purposes of this Agreement.
- 6.10. No Third Party Beneficiaries. This Agreement is made for the sole benefit of the parties. No other persons shall have any rights or remedies by reason of this Agreement against any of the parties or shall be considered to be third party beneficiaries of this Agreement in any way.
- 6.11. Binding Effect. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of the respective heirs, legal representatives and permitted assigns of each party, and shall be binding upon the heirs, legal representatives, successors and assigns of each party.
- 6.12. Titles and Captions. All article, section and paragraph titles and captions contained in this Agreement are for convenience only and are not deemed a part of the context hereof.
- 6.13. Pronouns and Plurals. All pronouns and any variations thereof are deemed to refer to the masculine, feminine, neuter, singular or plural as the identity of the person or persons may require.
- 6.14. Days. Any period of days mandated under this Agreement shall be determined by reference to calendar days, not business days, except that any payments, notices, or other performance falling due on a Saturday, Sunday, or

federal government holiday shall be considered timely if paid, given, or performed on the next succeeding business day.

6.15. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between Del Obispo and CodeCampus and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings.

#### **HISTORY**

The Orange County Department of Education's (OCDE) Inside the Outdoors' program provides engaging outdoor education field trip experiences and assemblies on science topics for schools and districts in Southern California. District students have been participating in Inside the Outdoors programs since 1997.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

District schools routinely participate in the OCDE's Inside the Outdoors education field trip experiences and assemblies. This program provides a hands-on opportunity for students in grades Preschool through High School to develop an awareness and appreciation of science concepts.

The Board approved, on August 23, 2017, the participation of 5 schools in OCDE's Inside the Outdoors' School Program for a variety of dates across the 2017-2018 school year. Nine school sites have expressed an interest in adding additional sessions to those already scheduled and approved.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Several school sites have expressed an interest in securing the "Traveling Scientist" assembly program. Inside the Outdoors offers multiple 45-75 minute Traveling Scientist program assemblies on a variety of topics. These assemblies will help inspire and promote student interest in science. Schools interested in adding additional sessions with OCDE's Inside the Outdoors' School Program include Don Juan Avila Elementary School, Laguna Niguel Elementary School, Dana Hills High School, R.H. Dana Elementary School, Malcom Elementary School, Palisades Elementary School, Vista Del Mar Elementary School, Wagon Wheel Elementary School and Wood Canyon Programs selected include a variety of life science and physical science topics. It is estimated that 1260 District students will participate in the additional OCDE's Inside the Outdoors' Traveling Scientist assemblies.

### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The scheduled attendance and contracted amounts for these programs varies by school site at a total expenditure of \$8592.80 paid by gift or site funds.

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# AGREEMENT FOR PARTICIPATION INSIDE THE OUTDOORS SCHOOL PROGRAM PUBLIC SCHOOLS 2017-2018

This AGREEMENT is hereby entered into this 1st day of September, 2017, by and between the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, 200 Kalmus Drive, Costa Mesa, California 92626, hereinafter referred to as SUPERINTENDENT, and Capistrano Unified School District, hereinafter referred to as DISTRICT. SUPERINTENDENT and DISTRICT shall be collectively referred to as the Parties.

#### TERMS, CONDITIONS, AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1.0 SUPERINTENDENT shall provide a forty-five (45) minute to seventy-five (75) minute Inside the Outdoors School Program, hereinafter referred to as PROGRAM, more specifically described in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.
- 2.0 This AGREEMENT shall be in full force and effect for the period commencing September 1, 2017 and ending August 31, 2018. This AGREEMENT must be fully executed by the Parties and be on file with the SUPERINTENDENT prior to DISTRICT participating in the PROGRAM.
- 3.0 In compliance with Education Code Section 35330 DISTRICT hereby declares that no student has been denied the opportunity to participate in the PROGRAM because of the inability to pay the required fee. DISTRICT has made every effort to acquire the financial support from fund-raising efforts, parents, and the

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community to assist those students who are unable to pay the required fee.

- 4.0 SUPERINTENDENT shall provide the PROGRAM for DISTRICT'S school(s) pursuant to Exhibit "A".
- 5.0 DISTRICT shall provide one (1) certificated employee to participate in the PROGRAM with each group of 25-30 students.
  - 5.1 All participating certificated employees and adult aides, in cooperation with the PROGRAM staff, shall be expected to take an active role in the supervision of students.
- 6.0 Should a DISTRICT group exceed four (4) classrooms on a given day (approximately one hundred twenty (120) students), the additional classroom(s) may be scheduled to participate on another day.
- 7.0 DISTRICT shall be responsible for the supervision and care of its students. DISTRICT shall also be responsible for the actions of its students and employees while participating in the PROGRAM.
- 8.0 DISTRICT shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, the Orange County Board of Education, and its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims for damages resulting from the acts or omissions of DISTRICT, its officers, agents, employees, and students with respect to the Inside the Outdoors School Program.

SUPERINTENDENT shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the DISTRICT, its Governing Board, officers, agents, employees, and students from any and all claims for damage resulting from the acts or omissions of the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, the

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1 Orange County Board of Education and its officers, agents, and 2 employees with respect to the Inside the Outdoors - School Program. Any notice of cancellation by DISTRICT must be received in 3 writing by SUPERINTENDENT at least twenty (20) business days, 4 excluding holidays, prior to the scheduled PROGRAM date. 5 In the event of a cancellation, the DISTRICT is responsible to find an 6 equivalent replacement no later than ten (10) business days prior to 7 the cancelled program date; SUPERINTENDENT may also attempt to find 8 an equivalent replacement if possible. If DISTRICT or SUPERINTENDENT 9 is unable to find an equivalent replacement, DISTRICT will be charged 10 ninety percent (90%) of the full cost of the scheduled PROGRAM. 11 DISTRICT'S School wishes to reschedule a scheduled PROGRAM date, 12 DISTRICT'S School may be charged an additional fee of One hundred 13 dollars (\$100.00). 14 10.0 DISTRICT agrees to pay SUPERINTENDENT per student or per PROGRAM 15 more specifically described in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto 16 and incorporated by reference herein. Payment shall be based on the 17 number of students that actually attend, but no less than ninety 18 percent (90%) of the number of students identified in Exhibit "A". 19 If DISTRICT'S SCHOOL is designated as sponsored, a minimum enrollment 20 requirement is ninety percent (90%) of the contracted number of 21 students, and is paid by sponsorship. If the number of students who 22 attend is less than ninety percent (90%) of the contracted enrollment 23 number, SCHOOL will be charged a per student fee for all students 24 that fall below ninety percent (90%).

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- 10.1 A day of participation is defined as a student being present during any part of a scheduled PROGRAM day.
- 10.2 Should the scheduled attendance from any given school in a DISTRICT change by more than ten percent (10%), the DISTRICT shall inform SUPERINTENDENT in writing at least twenty (20) business days prior to the first (1st) day of attendance.
- 10.3 Schools may be charged an additional transportation fee of \$50.00 \$125.00 per day, if and as set forth in Exhibit A.
- 11.0 Full payment of fees by DISTRICT must be received by SUPERINTENDENT within thirty (30) calendar days of billing postmark.
- 12.0 DISTRICT agrees to bear the expense of repairs and/or breakage resulting from unreasonable wear or abuse to property and/or equipment caused by its students and/or teachers participating in the PROGRAM.
- 13.0 DISTRICT hereby delegates, by approval of this AGREEMENT to the District Superintendent or the District Superintendent's designee, pursuant to Education Code Section 17604, the authority to allow additional schools or students to participate in the Inside the Outdoors School Program during the term of AGREEMENT.
- 14.0 NOTICE. All notices or demands to be given under this AGREEMENT by either party to the other, shall be in writing and given either by: (a) personal service or (b) by U.S. Mail, mailed either by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with postage prepaid. Service shall be considered given when received if

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personally served or if mailed on the third day after deposit in any U.S. Post Office. The address to which notices or demands may be given by either party may be changed by written notice given in accordance with the notice provisions of this section. ## AGREEMENT FOR PARTICIPATION INSIDE THE OUTDOORS FIELD PROGRAM PUBLIC SCHOOLS 2017-2018

This AGREEMENT is hereby entered into this 1st day of September, 2017, by and between the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, 200 Kalmus Drive, Costa Mesa, California 92626, hereinafter referred to as SUPERINTENDENT, and Capistrano Unified School District, hereinafter referred to as DISTRICT. SUPERINTENDENT and DISTRICT shall be collectively referred to as the Parties.

#### TERMS, CONDITIONS, AND RESPONSIBILITIES

1.0 SUPERINTENDENT shall provide a one (1) hour to two (2) day Inside the Outdoors - Field Program, hereinafter referred to as PROGRAM, more specifically described in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.

- 2.0 This AGREEMENT shall be in full force and effect for the period commencing September 1, 2017 and ending August 31, 2018. This AGREEMENT must be fully executed by the Parties and be on file with the SUPERINTENDENT prior to DISTRICT participating in the PROGRAM.
- 3.0 In compliance with Education Code Section 17604 DISTRICT hereby declares that no student has been denied the opportunity to participate in the PROGRAM because of the inability to pay the required fee. DISTRICT has made every effort to acquire the financial support from fund-raising efforts, parents, and the community to assist those pupils who are unable to pay the required fee.

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4.0 SUPERINTENDENT shall provide the PROGRAM for DISTRICT'S school(s) pursuant to Exhibit "A". Transportation and food are not included and shall be the sole responsibility of DISTRICT.

- 5.0 DISTRICT shall provide one (1) certificated employee and one (1) adult aide or parent to participate in the PROGRAM with each group of 25-30 students.
  - 5.1 A certificated employee shall ride with and supervise students on the bus.
  - All participating certificated employees and adult aides, in cooperation with the PROGRAM staff, shall be expected to take an active role in the supervision of students. All guests must be eighteen (18) years of age or older.
- 6.0 Should a DISTRICT group exceed two (2) classrooms on a given day (approximately sixty (60) students), the additional classroom(s) may be scheduled to participate on another day.
- 7.0 It is recommended that at least one (1) adult accompanying each DISTRICT group hold a valid California driver's license and maintain appropriate insurance coverage to drive a vehicle and have the DISTRICT'S authority to transport sick or injured students requiring medical attention (a district vehicle may be provided).
- 8.0 DISTRICT shall be responsible for the supervision and care of its students from the time of departure from home or school to the time of arrival back at the home or school. DISTRICT shall also be responsible for the actions of its students and employees while participating in the PROGRAM.

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- A. DISTRICT shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, the Orange County Board of Education, and their officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims for damages resulting from the acts or omissions of DISTRICT, its officers, agents, employees, and students with respect to the Inside the Outdoors Field Program.
- B. SUPERINTENDENT shall hold harmless, defend, and indemnify the DISTRICT, its Governing Board, officers, agents, employees, and students from any and all claims for damage resulting from the acts or omissions of the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, the Orange County Board of Education and its officers, agents, and employees with respect to the Inside the Outdoors Field Program.
- C. DISTRICT must furnish to SUPERINTENDENT a certificate of insurance evidencing all coverages and additional insured endorsements required no less than fourteen (14) business days, excluding holidays, prior to DISTRICT'S first day of participation. DISTRICT shall not participate in the Inside the Outdoors Field Program until SUPERINTENDENT has received a valid certificate of insurance evidencing the insurance coverage required.
- D. DISTRICT'S insurance must be with an insurance company admitted and licensed by the Insurance Commissioner of the

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 State of California or a program of self-insurance approved by the SUPERINTENDENT.

- E. If the DISTRICT is either partially or fully self-insured for its liability exposures, DISTRICT must notify the SUPERINTENDENT in writing fourteen (14) business days, excluding holidays, prior to DISTRICT'S first day of participation and provide the SUPERINTENDENT with a statement signed by an authorized representative of DISTRICT which states that DISTRICT agrees to protect the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, the Orange County Board of Education, and its officers, employees, and agents as if the insurance requirements in Section 9.0 were in full effect.
- F. DISTRICT agrees to maintain Comprehensive General Liability Insurance, including bodily injury, property damage, premises-operations, products-completed operations and personal injury, in the amount of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence or a program of self-insurance approved by SUPERINTENDENT.
- G. The following two (2) policy endorsements must be included and written as follows:
  - (a) "The Orange County Superintendent of Schools, the Orange County Board of Education, and their officers, agents and employees shall be added as an additional insured to the policy."

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- (b) "Such insurance as is afforded by this policy for the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, the Orange County Board of Education, and its officers, agents, and employees shall be primary, and any insurance carried by the Orange County Superintendent of Schools, or the Orange County Board of Education, for the Orange County Superintendent of Schools and the Orange County Board of Education and its officers, agents, and employees shall be ежсевв and non-contributory. "
- H. DISTRICT shall, at DISTRICT'S sole cost and expense, take out prior to participation in the Inside the Outdoors Field Program, and maintain in full force and effect, from the first day of participation through the last day of participation, a policy or policies of insurance covering DISTRICT'S participation in the Inside the Outdoors Field Program.
- I. Insurance certificate description should read as "Participation in the Inside the Outdoors Programs."
- J. In addition, DISTRICT shall provide a thirty (30) day cancellation or reduction of coverage clause.
- K. Insurance certificate holder shall be named proper as "Orange County Superintendent of Schools, 200 Kalmus Drive, P.O. Box 9050, Costa Mesa, California 92628-9050, Attn: Contracts Department."

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10.0 Any notice of cancellation by DISTRICT must be received in 1 2 writing by SUPERINTENDENT at least twenty (20) business days, 3 excluding holidays, prior to the scheduled PROGRAM date. event of a cancellation, the DISTRICT is responsible to find an equivalent replacement no later than ten (10) business days prior to the cancelled program date; SUPERINTENDENT may also attempt to find an equivalent replacement if possible. If DISTRICT or SUPERINTENDENT is unable to find an equivalent replacement, DISTRICT will be charged ninety percent (90%) of the full cost of the scheduled PROGRAM. DISTRICT'S School wishes to reschedule a scheduled PROGRAM date, 10 DISTRICT'S School may be charged an additional fee of One hundred 11 dollars (\$100.00). 12 11.0 Cancellation of a PROGRAM due to inclement weather conditions 13 may be made by the SUPERINTENDENT'S designated staff (no charge will be incurred for those days). DISTRICT groups will be rescheduled at 15 a later date, upon request of DISTRICT and when space is available. 16 If DISTRICT decides to participate in the PROGRAM in inclement 17 weather conditions, DISTRICT will be charged the full fee regardless 18 of weather conditions. 19 12.0 DISTRICT agrees to pay SUPERINTENDENT per student or per PROGRAM 20 more specifically described in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto 21 and incorporated by reference herein. # **HISTORY**

The District had a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with K to College (K2C) beginning in 2014 through December 2017 to receive and distribute materials and supplies to students identified as homeless as defined by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. The MOU was for a three year period.

# **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The K to College name was changed to SupplyBank.Org which reflects the expanded scope of their agency to address a broader range of unmet material needs. K to College is now a program of the greater SupplyBank.Org.

# **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Staff seeks approval of the renewal MOU with K to College (K2C) for 2017-2022 because the MOU had expired. The MOU outlines conditions to be met by the District as they relate to receiving and distributing materials and supplies for students identified as homeless as defined by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act. Materials and supplies include but are not limited to school supply, dental and hygiene kits.

# **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

These materials and supplies are provided free of charge to the District; there is no financial impact.

This Agreement is made on January 24, 2018 by and between K to College (K2C), which is also doing business as "Supplybank.Org" and Capistrano Unified School District (CUSD). K2C is a tax-exempt non-profit corporation organized under § 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code with the mission of efficiently addressing the unmet material needs of homeless and other impoverished children, and adults working towards self-sufficiency. CUSD is a public school district in Orange County, CA.

K2C hereby agrees to use its best efforts to provide as many CUSD students as possible identified as homeless (as defined by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act), or otherwise enrolled in the Free or Reduced Price Meal Program (FRPM), with school supply kits, dental kits, hygiene kits, and other materials. As a condition of receiving donated materials from K2C, CUSD hereby agrees to the following:

- 1. To utilize appropriate outreach methods to inform **eligible** and targeted students about materials available through CUSD's partnership with K2C
- 2. To agree that K2C may only be able to provide resources for certain populations of students and that K2C will notify the district in advance of shipment which students are eligible to receive them
- 3. To use one of the following distribution methods:

**Option 1: McKinney-Vento Homeless Only:** Distributing to students verified as homeless as defined by the United States McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act:

- i. Providing notification and instruction to all appropriate staff that work with homeless students that these materials are available and how to access them, and
- ii. Facilitating a check-in process following each distribution, verifying each student is enrolled in the district and designated as homeless before they receive K2C materials, and
- iii. Maintaining ownership of the check-in list for the duration of the distribution or distribution cycle, and
- iv. Following distribution(s), comparing the list of recipients to the list of eligible students for a final report as outlined in Section 4, OR

**Option 2: Targeted Community Distribution:** Distributing to students verified as homeless, FRPM eligible or below 200% of the federal poverty level as follows:

- v. Providing an adequate number of district staff at each community distribution venue or school with a list of those eligible (as defined above or by amendment to this agreement) to ensure only those at or below 200% of the federal poverty level benefit from the program, and
- vi. Facilitating a check-in process at each community distribution venue and/or school, verifying each student is enrolled in the district before they receive K2C materials, and
- vii. Maintaining ownership of the check-in list for the duration of the distribution at each distribution venue and/or school, and
- viii. Following distribution(s), comparing the list of recipients to the list of eligible students for a final report as outlined in the verification letter template provided by K2C, OR

**Option 3: School-wide Distribution:** Distributing to every student at **eligible schools**\* and/or distributing to select grade-level(s) of students at eligible schools as follows:

- ix. Providing an adequate number of district staff at each school with a list of *every* enrolled student, regardless of FRPM status, and
- x. Facilitating the distribution process, verifying each student's identity and checking his or her name off the roster before they receive K2C materials, and
- xi. Maintaining ownership of the lists for the duration of the distribution at each distribution venue and/or school, and
- xii. Comparing the distribution lists to the district's internal FRPM enrollment lists, verifying the exact number of students who were eligible to receive K2C materials and the exact number of those who were not eligible, and
- xiii. Verifying the two calculated numbers are the same as initially submitted to K2C, and
- xiv. Compensating K2C for any discrepancy resulting in an increased number of students **not** eligible.

- \* **Eligible Schools:** Unless otherwise noted, eligible schools are defined as those with a minimum of 70% FRPM enrollment.
- 4. To maintain an *internal (accessible to CUSD only)*, detailed district-wide roster that includes every child/family that receives K2C materials for auditing and/or any other purposes.<sup>†</sup> This may be done by maintaining ownership of the lists of those receiving K2C materials at each CUSD school and/or community distribution venue. This list will include:

# **HISTORY**

Since 2014-2015, several District schools have successfully partnered with the YMCA to provide Physical Education (P.E.) instruction to students. These schools include George White Elementary, Ladera Ranch Elementary, Castille Elementary, Carl Hankey Elementary and Viejo Elementary.

# **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The YMCA offers a P.E. program for elementary schools for grades K-5. The program provides 60 minute P.E. lessons that are modeled after the Physical Education Content Standards for California Public Schools (Happy Healthy Kids, 2016), to supplement the required minutes of P.E. instruction required for grades 1-5 students as per Education Code. Education Code § 51223 requires all students in grades 1-6 to receive 200 minutes of P.E. instruction every 10 days. In this program YMCA staff provide the instruction and resources for the lessons. The YMCA requires that the "teacher of record" (the classroom teacher) be present during the instructional time and assist with supervision.

# **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Carl Hankey, Castille and Hidden Hills Elementary schools have expressed interest in securing this P.E. program for their grade 1-5 students. The program will provide rich, engaging and challenging P.E. instruction for students at the school while also helping each site to meet its requirement to provide 200 minutes of P.E. instruction every 10 days. Currently, teachers in grades 1-5 submit weekly lessons plans to their site principals detailing daily and weekly schedules and when the P.E. lessons are taught over a two-week period. These lesson plans are collected at the District Office. If this agreement with the YMCA is approved, teachers would submit revised lesson plans reflecting the P.E. lessons delivered by the YMCA, and principals would review these plans and provide them to the District.

# **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The estimated expenditure under this contract is \$42,300 paid by Title I or gift funds from each participating school site.

# **DATA**

It is estimated that 1300 District students will participate in the YMCA of Orange County Laguna Niguel Physical Education program in the 2017-2018 school year.

THE PROGRAM SERVICE RECIPIENTS INSURANCE SHALL BE THE SOLE REMEDY FOR SUCH LOSSES.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The District has provided special education and related services to students of Laguna Beach Unified School District (LBUSD) who attend the District's Adult Transition Program (ATP) in prior years. The District staff has provided these services to LBUSD from the time both districts were part of the South Orange County Special Education Local Plan Area.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

The Laguna Beach Unified School District is requesting to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the District to provide services for a LBUSD student that would be placed in the District's Adult Transition Program (ATP) during the 2017-2018 school year. LBUSD does not have an ATP within their district. The District will provide services to LBUSD students per the MOU. LBUSD will reimburse the District for all services provided.

#### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND LAGUNA BEACH UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

This Agreement is made by and between the Capistrano Unified School District (CUSD also referred to herein as the Provider District) and the Laguna Beach Unified School District (LBUSD also referred to herein as the Sending District). CUSD and LBUSD are also referred to individually as Party, and collectively as Parties. This Agreement is based upon the following factual recitals:

#### **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, Education Code §§ 56195.1 and 56195.5 authorize school districts and special education local plan areas (SELPAs) to enter into agreements to provide for the education of special education students who may reside in other districts or counties;

WHEREAS, Education Code § 56041 provides that, except for those students meeting residency requirements for school attendance specified in Education Code section 48204(a), the district of residence responsible for providing special education and related services to students between the ages of 18-22 years, inclusive, shall be the last district of residence in effect prior to the student attaining the age of majority for non-conserved pupils, as long as and until the parent or parents relocate to a new district of residence, at which time the new district of residence shall become the responsible local educational agency;

WHEREAS, Education Code section 56028 defines a "parent" as a guardian generally authorized to act as the child's parent or authorized to make educational decisions for the child, including a court appointed responsible adult and further provides that the court appointed responsible adult shall be determined to be the "parent" for purposes of determining residency under Education Code section 48200 et. seq.;

WHEREAS, Student is an 18 year old conserved adult student (Student) eligible for special education and related services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA);

WHEREAS, Student's parent resides within the boundaries of LBUSD which the Parties believe to be Student's district of residence;

WHEREAS, Student currently resides in parent's home and parent desires student to attend school within the boundaries of CUSD;

WHEREAS, the Parties wish to enter into this Agreement regarding the provision of special education and related services for Student.

NOW, THEREFORE, CUSD and LBUSD agree as follows:

1. Recitals

The recitals stated above are incorporated into this Agreement.

#### 2. Term of Agreement

This Agreement is effective for the period beginning December 28, 2017 through June 30, 2018.

#### 3. Educational Placement and Services

The Parties agree that Student will be enrolled in an adult transition program within CUSD. CUSD agrees to implement Student's Individualized Education Program (IEP) developed by LBUSD, including all related services, and provide Student with a free appropriate public education during the time that Student is enrolled in a CUSD educational program.

In the event CUSD determines it is no longer able to implement Student's IEP or to continue to provide Student's special education and related services, CUSD shall immediately notify LBUSD of its intent to terminate this MOU, by sending a letter to LBUSD's Director of Special Education and SELPA Operations and this MOU will be considered terminated 60 days following such notification. In the event LBUSD wishes to terminate this MOU, written notice must be provided to CUSD's Assistant Superintendent, SELPA and Special Education Operations and 60 days following such notification this MOU will be considered terminated.

In the event Student moves out of LBUSD's boundaries, LBUSD shall immediately notify CUSD of Student's change in residence.

#### 4. Annual and Triennial IEP Meetings

CUSD shall notify LBUSD of Student's IEP meetings (Student/school request, annual, and triennial review IEP team meetings) by e-mail to LBUSD's Director of Special Education with at least two weeks' advance notice, and LBUSD will provide a representative to participate in the development of the IEP (telephonically or in person). For any change in services specified on the current IEP, a LBUSD representative who is authorized to approve or disapprove the allocation of specified LBUSD resources necessary for the implementation of the IEP shall be involved in the development of the IEP. LBUSD will complete assessments/evaluations required for Student's triennial assessment/IEP. CUSD will participate and collaborate in the assessment process. If Parent or court appointed responsible adult requests assessment outside this triennial assessment, CUSD will inform LBUSD within two days of the request by notifying LBUSD's Director of Education via e-mail.

#### 5. <u>Due Process Proceedings</u>

If Parent or court appointed responsible adult contests the termination of services by initiating a due process proceeding with the Office of Administrative Hearing (OAH), CUSD will abide by the "stay-put" requirement of state and federal law unless the Student or his court appointed responsible adult agree otherwise or an interim alternative educational placement is deemed lawful and appropriate by LBUSD or OAH.

Upon request by LBUSD, CUSD will fully participate in special education due process proceedings including mediations and hearings, as requested by LBUSD. Full participation shall include, but in no way limited to, cooperating with LBUSD representatives to provide all documentation that pertains to CUSD's adult transition program and/or the implementation of Student's IEP.

#### 6. Payment for Educational Placement and Services

LBUSD agrees to fund Student's educational placement and services within CUSD. LBUSD agrees to pay CUSD as follows:

- a. <u>Placement and Services</u>: LBUSD will fund Student's placement in CUSD's Adult Transition Program in accordance with the funding formula included in Exhibit A.
- b. <u>Payment and Final Accounting:</u> A final accounting to determine the cost of attendance and billing costs to LBUSD will be made no later than September 15, 2018 for the 2017-2018 school year.
- c. <u>Attendance:</u> For the purpose of this MOU, Student will be considered enrolled for the 2017-2018 school year. For each month Student is enrolled, payment will be due for all services. To withdraw Student from attendance, this Agreement must be terminated (per Section 3) or Student/District may provide written notice to CUSD by the 25<sup>th</sup> of the month that Student will not be attending the following month.

#### 7. No Waiver

The failure of CUSD in any one or more instances to insist upon strict performance of any of the terms of this Agreement or to exercise any option herein conferred shall not be construed as a waiver or relinquishment to any extent of the right to assert or rely upon such terms or option on any future occasion.

#### 8. Hold Harmless

To the extent permitted by law, and except for the gross negligent acts or omissions of employees, agents and officers of LBUSD, CUSD hereby agrees to hold harmless, indemnify and defend LBUSD and its governing board, officers, agents and employees from all claims, demands, liabilities, losses, damages, or expenses of any nature whatsoever arising from or connected with CUSD's performance of services during the term of this Agreement.

To the extent permitted by law, and except for the gross negligent acts or omissions of employees, agents and officers of CUSD, LBUSD hereby agrees to hold harmless, indemnify and defend CUSD and its governing board, officers, agents and employees from all claims, demands, liabilities, losses, damages, or expenses of any nature whatsoever arising from or connected with the performance of services other than for the operation of CUSD during the term of this Agreement.

#### 9. Independent Contractors

CUSD and LBUSD, in the performance of services pursuant to this Agreement, shall be and act as an independent contractor. Each party understands and agrees that it and all of its employees shall not be considered officers, employees or agents of either of the parties to this Agreement. Each party assumes the full responsibility for the acts and/or omissions of its employees as they relate to the services to be provided under this Agreement.

#### 10. Complete Agreement

This Agreement is the complete Agreement of the Parties. Any amendments hereto shall be in writing and shall be dated and executed by both Parties.

#### 11. Applicable Law

This Agreement is governed by California state and federal law, and shall be interpreted as if jointly drafted by the Parties to this Agreement.

#### 12. Severability

If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

#### 13. Counterparts

This Agreement may be signed in counterparts. A copy or original of this document with all signature pages appended together shall be deemed a fully executed Agreement. Facsimile signatures shall be deemed as binding as original signatures.

#### 14. Authorized Signatures

The individuals signing this Agreement warrant that they are authorized to do so, and further, that they are authorized to make the promises in this Agreement on behalf of the respective Parties.

#### 15. Governing Board Approval

This Agreement is contingent upon approval by the Parties' respective Governing Boards.

#### **HISTORY**

This is a standing item that is presented to the Board of Trustees on a quarterly basis.

The *Eliezer Williams*, et al., vs. State of California, et al. (Williams) case was filed as a class action in 2000 in San Francisco County Superior Court. The plaintiffs include nearly 100 San Francisco County students, who filed suit against the State of California and state education agencies, including the California Department of Education (CDE). The basis of the lawsuit was that the agencies failed to provide public school students with equal access to instructional materials, safe and decent school facilities, and qualified teachers.

The case was settled in 2004, and as a result, the CDE has made changes to the School Accountability Report Card (SARC) template that all schools must update and publish annually. The changes will help all schools report the overall condition of their facilities, the number of teacher misassignments and vacant teacher positions, and the availability of textbooks or instructional materials.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Board Policy 1312.4 mandates school districts establish policies and procedures to resolve deficiencies related to textbooks and instructional materials, teacher vacancies or misassignments, and facility conditions posing a threat to student/staff health or safety. Furthermore, Education Code § 35186 requires any deficiencies or complaints be reported to the Board of Trustees at a regularly scheduled public meeting each quarter.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between Brandman University hereinafter called the "UNIVERSITY," and the Capistrano Unified School District, hereinafter called "FIELDWORK SITE."

#### I. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY

- A. The UNIVERSITY will assure that the student shall have completed the necessary educational prerequisites, to be eligible for supervised fieldwork including proof of negative TB test current within one year of supervised fieldwork and issuance of finger print clearance.
- B. The UNIVERSITY shall designate a faculty or staff member to coordinate, consult, and collaborate with the classroom teacher or district designee of the FIELDWORK SITE, the activities of each student assigned to FIELDWORK SITE and student fieldwork experience.
- C. The UNIVERSITY shall complete periodic observations and/or evaluations of the student regarding his/her performance at the FIELDWORK SITE as per arrangement between the UNIVERSITY faculty or staff member and the FIELDWORK SITE supervisor.
- D. The UNIVERSITY may provide monetary compensation for services rendered by the FIELDWORK SITE in an amount not to exceed the actual cost of the services rendered by the FIELDWORK SITE per Appendix A.

#### II. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE FIELDWORK SITE

- A. The FIELDWORK SITE shall provide students with experiences with a student population that is diverse in terms of ethnicity, culture, language, socio-economics and/or special needs.
- B. The FIELDWORK SITE staff will promptly and thoroughly investigate any complaint by any participating student of unlawful discrimination or harassment at the FIELDWORK SITE or involving employees or agents of the FIELDWORK SITE, take prompt and effective remedial action when discrimination or harassment is found to have occurred, and promptly notify the UNIVERSITY of the existence and outcome of any complaint of harassment by, against, or involving any participating student.
- C. The FIELDWORK SITE staff will provide, upon request by any participating student, such reasonable accommodations at the FIELDWORK SITE as required by law in order to allow qualified disabled students to participate in the program.

- D. To provide for emergency health care of the student in case of accident at the expense of the student.
- E. To provide all participating students with a copy of the FIELDWORK SITE'S rules, regulations, policies, and procedures with which the students are expected to comply and notify the UNIVERSITY of any change in its personnel, operation, or policies which may affect the field education experience.
- F. Comply with all federal, state and local statutes and regulations applicable to the operation of the program, including without limitation, laws relating to the confidentiality of student records.
- G. The FIELDWORK SITE staff shall comply with APPENDIX B regarding the FIELDWORK SITE'S supervision of UNIVERSITY students.

#### III. THE PARTIES MUTUALLY AGREE

- A. The FIELDWORK SITE shall provide field experiences in such schools or classes of the FIELDWORK SITE and under the direct supervision and instruction of such employees of the FIELDWORK SITE, as specified by the duly authorized representatives of the FIELDWORK SITE and the UNIVERSITY.

The UNIVERSITY may terminate the field experience assignment or student teaching assignment of any student of the UNIVERSITY at the FIELDWORK SITE at any time, and may do so if the FIELDWORK SITE so requests in writing with a statement of reasons why the FIELDWORK SITE desires to have the student withdrawn.
- C. Neither party shall discriminate in the assignment of students on the basis of race, color, disability, sex, religion, national origin, ancestry, sexual orientation, or any other basis prohibited by law.
- D. The UNIVERSITY agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the FIELDWORK SITE, its agents, and employees from and against all loss or expense (including costs and attorney fees) resulting from liability imposed by law upon the FIELDWORK SITE because of bodily injury to or death of any person or on account of damages to property, including loss of use thereof, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement and due or claimed to be due to the negligence of the UNIVERSITY, its agents, employees, or students.
- E. The FIELDWORK SITE agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and at the UNIVERSITY'S request, defend the UNIVERSITY, its agencies and employees from and against all loss or expenses (including costs and attorney fees) resulting from liability imposed by law upon the UNIVERSITY because of bodily injury to or death of any person or on account of damages to property, including loss of use thereof, arising out of or in connection with this Agreement, and due or claimed to be due to the negligence of the FIELDWORK SITE, its agents, or employees.
- F. The parties agree that the students are considered learners who are fulfilling specific requirements for field experiences as part of a degree and/or credential requirement. Therefore, regardless of the nature or extent of the acts performed by them, students are not to be considered employees or agents of either the UNIVERSITY or the FIELDWORK SITE for any purpose including Workers' Compensation or any other employee benefit programs. The students shall not be entitled to any monetary remuneration for services performed by them in the course of their training.

- G. The parties mutually agree each shall provide and maintain commercial general liability insurance or self-insurance acceptable to both parties in the minimum amounts of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$3,000,000 general aggregate and upon request shall furnish proof thereof in the form of a certificate of insurance within 30 days of the effective date of this Agreement. Each Certificate of Insurance shall specify that should any above described policies be cancelled before the expiration date thereof, notice will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions.
- H. Both parties acknowledge they are independent contractors, and nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed to create an agency, joint venture, franchise or partnership relation between the parties and neither party shall so hold itself out. Neither party shall have the right to obligate or bind the other party in any manner whatsoever, and nothing contained in this Agreement shall give or is intended to give any right of any kind to third persons.
- I. Any failure of a party to enforce that party's right under any provision of this Agreement shall not be construed or act as a waiver of said party's subsequent right to enforce any provisions contained herein.
- J. Notices required or permitted to be provided under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if mailed first class to the parties that signed this agreement and to the addresses below.

- N. This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California in effect at the time of the execution of this Agreement. Should either party institute legal action to enforce any obligation contained herein, it is agreed that the proper venue of such suit or action shall be Orange County, California.

# Appendix A Payment for Master Teachers for Teacher Education Fieldwork Only

#### I. SPECIAL PROVISIONS – RATES and PAYMENTS

- (a) \$200 Master Teacher stipend per eight (8) week session of full-time student teaching consisting of three to six (3-6) units for Multiple and Single Subject Credential candidates.
- (b) \$200 Master Teacher stipend per eight (8) week session of full-time student teaching consisting of three to six (3-6) units for Education Specialist Instruction Credential (Special Education) candidates.

METHOD OF PAYMENT: Stipend is to be paid directly to the Master Teacher.

In the event the assignment of a UNIVERSITY student is terminated by the UNIVERSITY and/or the FIELDWORK SITE for any reason after the student has been in student teaching and has been at the assignment for a minimum of two weeks, MASTER TEACHER shall receive payment for one assignment on account of each student as though there had been no termination of the assignment. Said payment is to exceed no more than six (6) units per session of terminated assignment. In the event the field experience of a UNIVERSITY student is terminated by the UNIVERSITY and/or the MASTER TEACHER for any reason after the student has been in the field experience for a minimum of two weeks, MASTER TEACHER shall receive payment for one assignment on account of each student as though there had been no termination of the assignment.

Within thirty (30) days following the close of each session or academic session of the UNIVERSITY, the MASTER TEACHER shall submit an invoice and I-9 form as provided and signed to them by the UNIVERSITY, to the UNIVERSITY for payment at the rate provided therein for all field experiences provided by the FIELDWORK SITE under and in accordance with this agreement during said session. This process may be altered according to individual districts procedures as to the manner in which the invoicing will proceed so long as the parties mutually agree to such alteration in advance.

# Appendix B Specific Supervision Requirements for Each Program

#### **Teacher Education Fieldwork:**

- A. "Field Experience" as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement means active participation in the duties and function of classroom under the direct supervision and instruction of employees of the FIELDWORK SITE who hold valid teaching credentials issued by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the schools or classes in which the field experience is provided, and have completed a minimum of three years successful teaching experience. "Student Teaching" is used herein and elsewhere in this agreement means participation in the duties and function of classroom teaching under the direct supervision and instruction of employees of the FIELDWORK SITE who hold valid, teaching credentials issued by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the schools or classes in which the student teaching experience is provided, and have completed a minimum of three years successful teaching experience.
- B. The UNIVERSITY'S Teacher Education Policy provides that student teachers without emergency or substitute permits may not be asked by the school districts to serve and be paid for substitute teaching as, under California law, student teachers are not certificated personnel and as they require full-time supervision. Those holding substitute or emergency permits may substitute for their master teacher only (a maximum of four (4) days only): when s/he is ill; when it is determined by the principal that this is in the best interest of the students in the classroom as well as the candidate; after the first four weeks of the first assignment; and/or when the candidate is paid.
- C. "Session of Student Teaching," for Multiple Subject and Single Subject Credential candidates as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement is considered to be a full day of student teaching daily for five (5) days a week for a minimum of eight (8) weeks for elementary credential candidates (for this, the elementary credential candidate receives three to six (3-6) session units of practice teaching credit), and three periods a day for five (5) days a week for a minimum of eight (8) weeks for secondary credential candidates (for this, the secondary credential candidate receives three to six (3-6) session units of practice teaching credit).
- D. "Session of Student Teaching," for Education Specialist Instruction Credential (Special Education) candidates as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement is considered to be a full day of student teaching daily for five (5) days a week for a minimum of eight (8) weeks for elementary credential candidates (for this, the elementary credential candidate receives three to six (3-6) session units of practice teaching credit), and three periods a day for five (5) days a week for a minimum of eight (8) weeks for secondary credential candidates (for this, the secondary credential candidate receives three to six (3-6) session units of practice teaching credit).
- E. An assignment of a Multiple Subject and Single Subject Credential candidate of the UNIVERSITY to student teaching in classes of schools of the FIELDWORK SITE shall be for a two eight (8) week session as mutually agreed between the UNIVERSITY and FIELDWORK SITE.
- F. An assignment of an Education Specialist Instruction Credential (Special Education) candidate of the UNIVERSITY to student teaching in classes of schools of the FIELDWORK SITE shall be for a single eight (8) week session as mutually agreed between the UNIVERSITY and FIELDWORK SITE.
- G. The assignment of a UNIVERSITY student to field experiences and student teaching at FIELDWORK SITE shall be deemed to be effective for the purposes of this agreement as of the date the student presents to the proper FIELDWORK SITE officials the assignment papers or

other documents provided by the UNIVERSITY effecting such assignment, but not earlier than the date of such assignment as shown on such card or other document.

#### School Counseling Fieldwork:

- A. Provide an average of one (1) hour of individual or one-and-one-half (1.5) hours of small group supervision per week from an experienced school counselor with at least two years of professional experience.
- B. Provide opportunities for students to gain a broad range of experiences, including experiences in:
  - a. Personal and career assessments
  - b. Personal counseling experience in either an individual or group context
  - c. Experience in School-based programs serving parents and family members
  - d. Observing classroom instruction
  - e. Attending district and school based meetings
  - f. Mapping school-based community resources
  - g. The candidate is to perform, under supervision, the functions of school counselors in school counseling domains.
  - h. Participating in professional development activities.
  - i. Participating in individual or group supervision.
  - j. Learning about and using technology and information systems.
  - k. Learning about Individual differences and student diversity.
- C. The FIELDWORK SITE shall provide activities that occur across at minimum of two of four settings, including, (a) middle school or junior high, and (b) high school.
- D. The FIELDWORK SITE in collaboration with the UNIVERSITY will designate one school counselor who has at least two years experience in school counseling to serve as the primary supervisor. The student may also work with other experienced school counselors for specific activities. In no case shall any supervisor be assigned by the FIELDWORK SITE to provide concurrent supervision for more than two interns or students.
- E. The FIELDWORK SITE shall ensure that the student receives an average of one hour of individual or one and one-half hours of group face-to-face supervision per week, although more time may be needed, especially at the beginning of the FIELDWORK experience.
- F. The FIELDWORK SITE supervisor, in collaboration with the UNIVERSITY faculty, will complete at least one written evaluation of the student's performance near the end of each university session.
- G. The FIELDWORK SITE shall ensure that the student will be treated by the district as part of the professional staff and provided a supportive work environment, adequate supplies, counseling and test materials. - C. Provide experiences with a variety of educational programs.
- D. Provide opportunities for students to gain a broad range of experiences, including experiences in:

- a. Data based decision making: Assessing and reevaluating individual pupils and their programs.
- b. Collaboration and consultation with school personnel and participation on interdisciplinary teams.
- c. Developing, implementing and evaluating academic and behavioral interventions.
- d. Providing counseling and other mental health interventions.
- e. Home, school, community collaboration: working with parents and community members.
- f. Learning about, helping develop, or evaluating policy, practices and programs.
- g. Participating in professional development activities.
- h. Participating in individual or group supervision.
- i. Learning about and using technology and information systems.
- j. Learning about Individual differences and student diversity.
- E. The FIELDWORK SITE shall provide activities that occur across at minimum of two of four settings, including (a) preschool, (b) elementary, (c) middle school or junior high, and (d) high school.
- F. The FIELDWORK SITE in collaboration with the UNIVERSITY will designate one school psychologist who has at least two years experience in School Psychology to serve as the primary supervisor. ## Appendix A Definition of Internship

#### I. Specific Supervision Requirements School Psychology Fieldwork:

- A. Provide an average of one (1) hour of individual or one-and-one-half (1.5) hours of small group supervision per week from an experienced school psychologist with at least two years of professional experience.
- B. Provide experiences with a diverse student population.

- C. Provide experiences with a variety of educational programs.
- D. Provide opportunities for students to gain a broad range of experiences, including experiences in:
  - a. Data based decision making: Assessing and reevaluating individual pupils and their programs.
  - b. Collaboration and consultation with school personnel and participation on interdisciplinary teams.
  - c. Developing, implementing and evaluating academic and behavioral interventions.
  - d. Providing counseling and other mental health interventions.
  - e. Home, school, community collaboration: working with parents and community members.
  - f. Learning about, helping develop, or evaluating policy, practices and programs.
  - g. Participating in professional development activities.
  - h. Participating in individual or group supervision.
  - i. Learning about and using technology and information systems.
  - j. Learning about Individual differences and student diversity.
- E. The FIELDWORK SITE shall provide activities that occur across at minimum of two of four settings, including (a) preschool, (b) elementary, (c) middle school or junior high, and (d) high school.
- F. The FIELDWORK SITE in collaboration with the UNIVERSITY will designate one school psychologist who has at least two years experience in School Psychology to serve as the primary supervisor. The student may also work with other experienced school psychologists for specific activities. In no case shall any supervisor be assigned by the FIELDWORK SITE to provide concurrent supervision for more than two interns or students.
- G. The FIELDWORK SITE shall ensure that the student receives an average of one hour of individual or one and one-half hours of group face-to-face supervision per week, although more time may be needed, especially at the beginning of the FIELDWORK experience.
- H. The FIELDWORK SITE supervisor, in collaboration with the UNIVERSITY faculty, will complete at least one written evaluations of the student's performance near the end of each university session.
- I. The FIELDWORK SITE shall ensure that the student will be treated by the district as part of the professional staff and provided a supportive work environment, adequate supplies, counseling and test materials. In addition, it shall see that the student is encouraged to participate in district, SELPA, or county committees; and that he/she is provided release time as needed to attend professional development experiences or professional association meetings.

#### School Administration Fieldwork:

- A. The FIELDWORK SITE shall provide student with individual and/or small group supervision from an experienced school administrator.
- B. The FIELDWORK SITE shall provide student with experiences with a diverse student population.
- C. The FIELDWORK SITE shall provide student with experiences with a variety of educational programs.
- D. The FIELDWORK SITE shall ensure that the student receives an average of one hour of individual and/or one and one-half hours of group face-to-face supervision per week, although more time may be needed, especially at the beginning of the FIELDWORK experience.
- E. The FIELDWORK SITE supervisor, in collaboration with the UNIVERSITY faculty, will complete at least one written evaluation of the student's performance near the end of each university semester.
- F. The FIELDWORK SITE shall ensure that the student will be treated by the FIELDWORK SITE as part of the professional staff and is provided a supportive work environment and adequate supplies. In addition, it shall see that the INTERN is encouraged to participate in district or county committees and that he/she is provided release time as needed to attend professional development experiences or professional association meetings.

# MASTER CLINICAL FIELD EXPERIENCE AGREEMENT California Baptist University

This Master Clinical Field Experience Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into this <u>24 day of January, 2018</u> (the "Effective Date") by and between <u>California Baptist University located in Riverside</u>, <u>California</u> ("CBU") and <u>Capistrano Unified School District</u> (the "Experience Provider") located at <u>33122 Valle Blvd.</u>, <u>San Juan Capistrano</u>, <u>CA 92675</u>. CBU and Experience Provider are each a "Party" and are sometimes collectively referred to herein as the "Parties."

1. **INTER-INSTITUTIONAL APPLICATION:** In order to facilitate clinical field experience opportunities, this Agreement is intended to govern the relationship between CBU and Experience Provider with respect to students from CBU involved in a clinical field experience arrangement with the Experience Provider.

#### 2. **GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS:**

- 2.1 A clinical field experience is a cooperative program between CBU and approved Experience Providers. The Experience Providers provide supervision, facilities, and instruction which help students acquire the skills and knowledge needed in their chosen field of study or occupation.
  - 2.2 This Agreement is for the period agreed upon between the Experience Provider and CBU.
- 2.3 This Agreement may be terminated by CBU or the Experience Provider for good and sufficient cause by providing reasonable advance written notice to the other.
- 2.4 Neither Party to this Agreement agrees to indemnify the other Party or hold harmless the other Party from liability hereunder. However, if the common law or a statute provides for either a right to indemnity and/or a right to contribution to any Party to this Agreement, then the right to pursue one of both of these remedies is preserved.

#### 3. THE STUDENT AGREES TO:

- 3.1 Comply with the Experience Provider's policies and procedures.
- 3.2 Comply with CBU's dress and grooming standards and honor code.
- 3.3 Enroll as an academic clinical field experience student and perform the duties indicated unless released by CBU and the Experience Provider.
  - 3.4 Report serious problems, including safety and personnel problems, to CBU and the Experience Provider.
  - 3.5 Maintain personal health insurance or student health insurance.
- 3.6 Obtain approval from CBU to participate in the clinical field experience program including agreeing to abide by the terms of this Agreement and to perform additional duties and responsibilities as required by CBU.

## 4. THE EXPERIENCE PROVIDER AGREES TO:

- 4.1 Experience Provider will provide a qualified speech language pathologist to provide appropriate supervision for speech language pathology student interns.
- 4.2 Designate an individual who will serve as the liaison with CBU and speech language pathology student interns.
- 4.3 Involve the student for the entire period of clinical field experience as agreed unless this Agreement is terminated for cause pursuant to Section 2.3 above.
  - 4.4 Give the student the opportunity to perform a variety of tasks to acquire and practice various skills.
  - 4.5 Orient the student to the Experience Provider's rules, policies, procedures, methods, and operations.

- 4.6 Evaluate the student's performance and notify CBU's Clinical Field Experience Director, as defined in Section 5.1, immediately, preferably by phone, of any cause of dissatisfaction with or of misconduct on the part of the student.
- 4.7 Accept the primary responsibility for supervision and control of the student at the clinical field experience site.

#### 5. **CBU AGREES TO:**

- 5.1 Designate a point of contact for clinical field experience (a "Clinical Field Experience Director").
- 5.2 Ensure the Clinical Field Experience Director contacts the student and Experience Provider, discusses the student's progress, and advises relative to the program of study.
- 5.3 Ensure the Clinical Field Experience Director strives to promote harmony and cooperation between the Experience Provider, the student, and the educational institution.
- 5.4 Provide liability insurance for the student to cover damage or harm caused by the student in the amount of \$1,000,000 per student, per occurrence, \$3,000,000 in the aggregate, when this Agreement is signed and returned to CBU.
- 5.5 Cause each student participating in the clinical experience program which is the subject of this Agreement to acknowledge certain obligations as shown in substantial form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit "A"</u> and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 6. **AMENDMENT:** No amendment or modification of this Agreement shall be valid unless in writing and executed by each of the Parties.
- 7. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT:** This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement. This Agreement is not assignable without the prior written consent of the non-assigning party which consent will not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.
- 8. **COUNTERPARTS:** This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which, taken together, shall constitute one and the same Agreement. This Agreement may be executed by way of facsimile signature.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties through their authorized representatives have executed this Agreement effective as of the Effective Date.

# Participants in Learning, Leading and Serving Agreement – Out of State

By way of this agreement,	agrees to participate in Grand
Canyon University's Participants in Learning, Leading and Serving (PLLS) pr	ogram. The purpose of this agreement is to define
the relationship between Grand Canyon University (GCU) and signee as it rela	ites to the PLLS membership. All benefits are
available at no cost, or at a discounted rate, to participants as part of the partici	pant agreement. There is no limit or minimum on
the number of benefits a district may utilize, and participants are not expected	to partake in all benefits to become and remain
PLLS participants.	

#### BENEFITS AND CONTRIBUTIONS TO PLLS SCHOOLS AND DISTRICTS

1. High school students graduating from a PLLS participant high school, who are fully admissible to GCU (not Accepted with Specifications), will receive a minimum institutional scholarship package of \$4,000 per academic year. The total GCU scholarship package could be higher based upon a student's level of academic merit, Program of Study, Registration Date, and other offers for incoming students including those related to participation in athletics, pep band, theater, debate, etc.

With the University's commitment to provide an affordable private, Christian education, effective tuition rates would *not* exceed \$12,500 per academic year after the minimum GCU scholarship package is applied.

The high school must be a PLLS participant on or before the August 1<sup>st\*</sup> immediately following the student's graduation in order for the student to be eligible for the \$4,000 minimum award.

(The PLLS scholarship cannot be used in conjunction with any other scholarship except the College of Education Cohort Scholarship or the College of Doctoral Studies Cohort Scholarship.)
- 6. PLLS faculty, staff, governing board members\*\* and families will receive discounts for GCU academic and athletic camps along with other events sponsored by Strategic Educational Alliances.

- 7. PLLS participants may request cohort programs for continuing education, individual courses and/or master's and doctoral degree programs to be delivered at regionally approved GCU sites or online.

- 15. PLLS participants will be featured on GCU's website along with a link to their district website.

\*\*\*In order to remain eligible for this tuition scholarship, students must maintain continuous enrollment in their program of study and meet minimum scholastic achievement requirements. Continuous enrollment is defined as no breaks greater than 14 days unless an approved leave of absence has been granted by Grand Canyon University. The minimum scholastic achievement requirement for undergraduate programs is maintaining a minimum GPA of 2.0 and for graduate level programs it is maintaining a minimum GPA of 3.0. # Hope International University of Fullerton, California

## **AGREEMENT**

THIS AGREEMENT entered into this 24th day of January, 2018, by and between Hope International University of Fullerton, California, hereinafter called the University, and

#### CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

hereinafter called the District:

#### WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Section 11006 of the Education Code, the governing board of any school district is authorized to enter into agreements with a state college, the University of California, or any other university or college accredited by the State Board of Education as a teacher education institution, to provide teaching experience through practice teaching to students enrolled in teacher training curricula of such institutions; and

#### CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, any such agreement may provide for the payment in money or in services for the services rendered by the school district of an amount not to exceed the actual cost to the school district of the services rendered; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined between parties hereto that the payments to be made to the District under this agreement do not exceed the actual cost to the District of the services rendered by the District;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed between the parties hereto as follows:

I.

The district shall provide teaching experience through practice teaching in schools and classes of the District in terms of a defined unit of time for students of the university possessing valid preliminary certificates and assigned by the University to practice teaching in schools or classes of the District, and under the direct supervision and

instruction of such employees of the District, as the University through their duly authorized representative may agree upon.

If either the District or the University concludes that a particular assignment is not beneficial to the elementary or secondary school class(es) involved, and/or the cooperating teaching, and/or the student teacher, that assignment may be terminated. If the District and the University mutually agree, another assignment within the District may be pursued.

"Practice teaching" as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement means active participation in the duties and functions of classroom teaching under the direct supervision and instruction of employees of the District holding valid life diplomas or credentials issued by the State Commission on Teacher Credentialing, other than emergency or provisional credentials, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the schools and classes in which the practice teaching is provided.

Employees supervising practice teaching (a) shall have completed a minimum of three (3) years of satisfactory teaching in the subject(s) of the classes in which the practice teaching is to occur, and in teaching the age groups(s) represented in the class(es) in which practice teaching is to occur; and (b) shall have been recommended by the District for supervising practice teachers by virtue of exemplary teaching performance, knowledge of current trends in teaching of the subject(s) taught in classes in which practice teaching is to occur, and knowledge of the student population represented in the class(es) in which practice teaching is to occur.

II.

The University will pay the Master Teacher according to the following schedule:

- A. For each candidate who student teaches for eight (8) to ten (10) weeks, the supervising master teacher will receive \$200.
- B. For each candidate who student teaches for up to (12-20) weeks, the supervising master teacher will receive \$400.

"Unit of practice teaching" as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement shall mean the specified period of time assigned in the District to qualify for the practice teaching requirement by the University. It is understood that in each instance a unit must fall within the semester or school year calendar adopted by the District.

The number of units of practice teaching to be provided for each student of the University assigned to practice teaching under this agreement shall be determined by the University.

An assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching in schools or classes of the District ordinarily shall be for approximately four (4), five (5), eight (8), ten (10) or twelve (12) weeks.

The assignment of a student of the University to practice teaching in the District shall be deemed to be effective for the purposes of this agreement as of the date the student presents to the proper authorities of the District the assignment card or other document given him or her by the University effecting such assignment, but not earlier than the date of such assignment as shown on such card or other document.

A student of the University will provide verification and proof of a Certificate of Clearance issued by the State, a TB test and a current CPR/First Aid card.

Absences of a student from assigned practice teaching shall not be counted as absences in computing the quarter units of practice teaching provided the student by the District.

IV.

The term of this agreement shall commence on the 29<sup>th</sup> day of January, 2018 and shall be ongoing until June 30, 2020.

V.

The University or District may terminate the agreement date by giving at least thirty (30) days prior written notice.

VI.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this agreement, details such as maximum number of students, the defined unit of time, or the distribution of assignments of said students to training levels, shall be arranged for by and between the University and the District; it being understood that the District shall not be obligated to accept assignments of training students beyond the ability of the District, within their established training programs, to effectively provide services pursuant to this agreement; and further, that the University shall not be obligated to pay the District for services in any amount in excess of that provided for under the terms of this agreement.

#### VII.

Each of the parties to this agreement agrees to indemnify, defend, and save harmless the officers, agents, and employees of the other from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting in connection with the performance of this agreement, and from any and all claims and losses accruing and resulting to any person, firm or corporation who may be

injured or damaged by the actions arising directly out of the work to be performed pursuant to this agreement.

If any legal action is necessary to enforce the terms of this agreement or to settle a dispute concerning this agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees and court costs in addition to any other relief to which the party may be entitled to the extent awarded by the court.

#### VIII.

All workers' compensation insurance shall be at the cost of the University, and all premiums will be paid by the University.

## **HISTORY**

For teachers and school and district leaders to be as effective as possible, they continually expand their knowledge and skills to implement the best educational practices. Educators learn to help students learn at the highest levels. All employees, instructional or non-instructional, contribute to creating the learning environment that effects student achievement.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

University and college partnerships are integral to supporting the on-going professional learning of our employees. These partnerships add value to our District and provide a network of support ranging from discounted tuition rates and scholarships to cohort programs for continuing education. Many agreements provide additional benefits to District students and family members of employees.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

This agenda item presents for Board consideration the approval of partnership Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)with Student Resource USA (SR USA), effective January 25, 2018 and expiring January 25, 2021. SR USA will identify graduate degree programs offered by Partnership Universities that will award grants and/or scholarships to qualified District employees that qualify and apply for admission. The offer is available to District educators, nurses, administrators, staff, and employees. Current Partnering Universities include Concordia University Nebraska, New York, and Portland, St. Thomas University, and Wilkes University. Grants and scholarships range between \$1,944 and \$10,000.

## Partnership Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

This MOU is entered into as of January 24, 2018, by Student Resource USA (SR USA), *a division of HotChalk, Inc.* ("**SRUSA**"), with its main office located at 1721 W. Rio Salado Parkway; Tempe, Arizona 85281; and Capistrano Unified School District, located at 33122 Valle Rd., San Juan Capistrano 92675. Pursuant to this MOU, the Partner and SRUSA agree as follows:

**STUDENT RESOURCE USA:** *SRUSA* commits to identifying graduate degree programs offered by Partnering Universities that will award grants and/or scholarships (as defined in greater detail in Appendix A) to qualified employees of "Partner" that qualify and apply for admission. This offer available entirely to Partner educators, nurses, administrators, staff, and ("Employees").

**THE PARTNER:** in consideration of the above benefits, agrees to:

- Keep Employees aware of the partnership and its benefits through the District's bi-yearly University Partnership communication(s) to employees via email.
- List and promote the programs found in Appendix A on its intranet and provide a link on its intranet to a landing page that will provide additional information on program(s) to employees interested in the programs.
- Recognize the Institutions as event sponsors and grant the Institutions, or on their behalf, the Service, access to events twice a year for the purpose of informing employees of partnership benefits.
- Identify a Partner liaison as direct point of contact and advocate, designated as responsible for providing program information to employees, and for coordinating program promotions.
- (OPTIONAL) Partner with SRUSA in conducting a longitudinal study examining the long-term impact and outcomes of
  earning an advanced degree for employees and the Partner. The longitudinal study is designed to offer our partners a
  measurable return on their educational investment.

#### **TERMS:**

- This MOU goes into effect beginning on the Effective Date for a period of three (3) years, and, unless terminated by either party, shall automatically renew for another 3-year period. The MOU shall renew for successive three-year terms in this manner until cancelled.
- The parties agree: (1) SRUSA and Partner are the only beneficiaries of this agreement, and they do not intend to create a third party beneficiary; (2) this MOU is the entire agreement of the parties, superseding any prior agreements; and (3) NEITHER PARTY SHALL HAVE ANY LIABILITY TO THE OTHER PARTY FOR INDIRECT, INCIDENTAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, SPECIAL, PUNITIVE OR RELIANCE DAMAGES, HOWEVER CAUSED, WHETHER BASED IN CONTRACT, TORT, PRODUCT LIABILITY OR OTHERWISE.
- This MOU may be cancelled by either party with a 90-day notice at any time and for any reason. Cancellation of this MOU will have no impact on benefits awarded to Employees already enrolled in the program.
- These offers cannot be combined with any other offers and the Partnering Universities reserve the right to alter the amount and/or existence of any grant or scholarship in their sole and absolute discretion.

## **HISTORY**

The activity list for employment, separation and additional assignments of classified employees is a standing item that is presented during each regularly scheduled Board of Trustees meeting.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

In accordance with California Education Code §§ 44830(a), 45102, 44930, 45201 and 45190, employment actions or processes that affect an employee's status or pay during their employment must be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Classified activity lists may include a variety of "Temporary Additional Assignments" or TAAs. These are brief assignments in which an employee is to perform a task outside of his or her normal working hours and outside of his or her regular responsibilities. These tasks may include attending a required meeting, working at a school open house, helping at registration, and the like. These TAAs are performed at the normal hourly rate of pay for the work to be done, and are approved for a number of hours not to exceed (NTE) a specified amount. After the assignment is completed, the Payroll Department will receive an employee timesheet, signed by a supervisor, showing the time worked on the TAA. The Payroll Department will determine whether the hours worked were approved and will pay the employee for the hours worked, up to the approved amount. If the employee works fewer than the approved number of hours, s/he is paid only for the number of hours worked. If the assignment cannot be completed within the approved number of hours, a new request must be submitted for the estimated amount of work remaining.

#### **HISTORY**

The activity list for employment, separation and additional assignments of certificated employees is a standing item that is presented during each regularly scheduled Board of Trustees meeting.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

In accordance with California Education Code §§ 44830(a), 45102, 44930, 45201 and 45190, employment actions or processes that affect an employee's status or pay during their employment must be approved by the Board of Trustees.

Certificated activity lists may include a variety of "Additional Assignments." These may be instructional assignments outside an employee's normal instructional duties, such as teaching summer school or providing home/hospital instruction, or they may be non-instructional assignments such as professional development. Hourly pay for teachers is \$35 per hour for additional instructional assignments or \$30 per hour for non-instructional assignments. Other certificated employees may have different pay rates or per diem rates. After the assignment is completed, the Payroll Department will receive an employee timesheet, signed by a supervisor, showing the time worked on the assignment. The Payroll Department will determine whether the hours worked were approved and will pay the employee for the hours worked, up to the approved amount. If the employee works fewer than the approved number of hours, he or she is paid only for the number of hours worked. If the assignment cannot be completed within the approved number of hours, a new request must be submitted for the estimated amount of work remaining.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

This agenda item presents for Board consideration the approval of the activity list for certificated employees.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

These positions will be charged to the appropriate fund and are included in the adopted budget.

## **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

# **DISCUSSION/ACTION ITEMS**

In the Fall of 2017, the District invited all stakeholders to apply to serve on the School Facilities and Finance Advisory Committee. The School Facilities and Finance Advisory Committee was established to provide input, advice, and recommendations on topics pertaining to school facilities and finance, including the implementation of the general obligation bond program. The committee was designed to include regional representation from high school attendance boundaries throughout the District.

The Advisory Committee has been meeting since January 2017. The Committee independently established its own governing structure, meeting agendas and subjects of interest to examine and research. District staff attends the meeting to provide information and presentations and to follow up on requests from the Committee.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

A subject of interest to the Committee was a discussion and evaluation of pre- and post- Measure M, the CUSD Facilities Bond that was on the November 2017 election ballot. An ad-hoc committee was formed to evaluate Measure M and provide recommendations on future facilities financing options. The Committee is presenting their report to the Board this evening.

#### INTRODUCTION:

On November 4, 2016 Capistrano Unified School District ("District") announced the formation of a School Facilities and Finance Advisory Committee ("Committee"). The purpose of this Committee is to serve as an administrative advisory committee to provide input, advice and recommendations on topics pertaining to school facilities and financing, including a general obligation bond. The Committee would have regional representation from school families throughout the District and examine reasons why Measure M did not pass and ways to ensure adequate future funding for District schools. Following a research and evaluation phase, the Committee would provide recommendations to the District.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Bond Measure M (Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the Capistrano Unified School District #1617-17) was on the ballot for District voters on November 8, 2016. The Measure included \$889 million in bonds for repairing and upgrading classrooms in the District's 53 schools. The Measure needed 55% voter approval and received 45.5%.

On January 19, 2017 the CUSD Facilities and Finance Committee held its first meeting to discuss the future of District facilities and related funding. The Committee held five additional meetings during the year to explore the issues that contributed to the failure of Measure M, and to generate funding ideas and recommendations for successful voter approval. An ad hoc committee was formed to explore in greater detail the factors associated with the failure of Measure M, and to determine what suggestions and recommendations should be made for any future funding. The ad hoc committee made presentations on its research findings to the full Committee on September 21, 2017 and presented recommendations for Committee review on November 6, 2017.

#### **RESEARCH FINDINGS:**

In evaluating the rejection of Measure M the ad hoc committee conducted a literature review on school bond funding; reviewed bond funding at two other County districts; interviewed a wide array of individuals and groups, both inside and outside the District; met with District staff, including its superintendent; reviewed reports and media coverage of the bond, and conducted five ad hoc and full committee meetings to discuss its research, findings and conclusions.

Research on bond funding over the past decade in the United States indicated that about seventy percent of public schools were in need of major repairs and remodeling. Districts engage in efforts to gain support for funding, but often do so without a long-range plan or a short-term strategy. It is clear that obtaining the support of the electorate for multi-million dollar bonds requires an understanding of school and community issues and how this translates into maintenance/repair and capital improvements. Moreover, successful districts had a well-thought out and executed strategy to deal with: 1) the complexity of bond funding 2) voter attitudes and composition 3) reputation of the schools and district administration 4) the economy and bond costs 5) school and district communications 6) shifts in school and community demographics, and 7) the skill set of district leaders.

The following were key findings of successful bond measures that emerged from the ad hoc committee's research. While some may be more important in CUSD's area, all were observed to be of significant importance.

- 1. COMPLEXITY OF BOND FUNDING: While guidelines are available to assist school districts in putting together bond measures, so many factors exist that can affect the outcome that no two campaigns are exactly alike. This fact, combined with organizational, legal and regulatory requirements, means that every such effort is exceptionally complex. As such, research indicates that information presented about the bond plays a crucial role in the success of the funding effort. This fact was especially true for CUSD, since it is so large and includes not one, but multiple cities and unincorporated area.
- 2. ECONOMIC CONDITIONS AND BOND COSTS: The financial crisis that began in 2008 placed serious financial burdens on the local economy, including County school districts. CUSD felt this impact and significant funding cuts impaired all schools, including teachers, classes and school facilities. Despite the poor economy, funding for deferred maintenance, infrastructure and upgrades is still needed. Today, the County economy is prospering, but the size of funding needed to make up for years of deferred investment in CUSD schools is sizable. School districts need to carefully prioritize and document need in order to avoid "sticker shock" when a bond amount is announced.
- 3. COMMUNICATIONS: Research shows that communication is often the number one problem in implementing an effective bond measure. Clear and ongoing communications with district families and other stakeholders must be initiated and maintained. Both internal and external communications are required, including teachers, district staff, employees and consultants.
- 4. DISTRICT REPUTATION: School district reputations are not required to be at an outstanding rating to pass a bond. However, the electorate must perceive that the district has systems in place that demonstrate trustworthiness, fiscal accountability, community loyalty and strong organizational policies and practices in its responsiveness to the needs of district children and families. Strong district leaders with high reputations, excellent communication skills and connection with their community play a key role in successful bond efforts.
- 5. BOARD AND STAKEHOLDER SUPPORT: Research suggests that bond measures tend to fail if a school board is not fully supportive. While full support of the board of trustees is first, citizen participation and advocacy is equally important. Inclusionary participation by a wide segment of the community gives voters a personal stake in the results of the election. Districts with this experience saw the greatest margins of approval.
- 6. VOTER COMPOSITION: The makeup of the voters within a district, and their perceptions and attitudes toward education, schools and the school district can significantly affect the outcome of a bond measure. It is important to identify and quantify voters and demographic groups that tend to have positive attitudes toward schools and education and those that do not.

#### MEASURE M OVERVIEW:

The failure of Measure M to pass at the polls was caused by numerous of factors. Through interviews, attendance public presentations, literature reviews and media reports, the following factors emerged as playing a key role in influencing voters:

- BOND SIZE: The size of the bond, and its accompanying tax burden, caused many voters to
  question its validity and affordability. The underlying documentation of what constituted the
  bond dollar size was not adequately clear and understood by many voters. It was also observed
  that most voters don't clearly understand how school districts are actually funded.
- NEED VS. WANT: A sizable number of voters were confused as to how much of the bond was
  devoted to what is actually needed by the schools, and how much represented a wish list. While
  the Master Plan was presented to support the bond amount, it was questioned due to its age
  and complexity.
- FUNDING EQUALITY: Since the bond was district-wide, the question of equality of funding for
  each city became important in voter's minds, as well as for city councils. Further complicating
  this was the fact that in some cities their schools accept students who live in neighboring cities.
- SHORT TIME LINE: The sentiment that Measure M was placed on the ballot in a rush was voiced by a number of elected officials. Coupled with their perception that the bond amount was too high, and questions with oversight controls, many of the elected officials from District cities chose to oppose the Measure.
- COMMUNICATIONS: Feedback on communications with the voters and elected officials suggested that the complexity of the bond measure, and the absence of short, simple sound bite answers clouded understanding of much of the Measure's repayment, administration and fiscal accountability. While it is unclear if more outreach efforts would have convinced those citizen voters opposed to the Measure to change their vote, it is clear that numerous elected officials were firmly in opposition, and further outreach would not have achieved any change.

A review of stakeholder positions on Measure M highlighted the role of elected officials and several industry groups in opposing the bond. Their argument was that the bond would be the largest ever proposed by a school district in Orange County and would increase property taxes, which were already high enough. While the District did provide multiple presentations, information and materials on the Measure, explaining what the bond would be used for and the projected tax rates, various elected officials deemed it inadequate. In addition, woven into this was the lingering sentiment that CUSD did not have tight enough fiscal controls to handle such a large bond, and that the funds could be used for purposes other than facilities repair, maintenance and improvements, such as salaries and administrative projects.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

Upon completion of research, evaluations and discussions with the full Facilities and Finance Committee the following recommendations were made. It was noted that these recommendations were identified and approved by the Committee as being clearly prescriptive, based on available research and evidence. However, several potential recommendations were also identified, but are not on the approved list due to the absence of data and information to support a definitive finding.

DETERMINE FUNDING NEED AND PROVIDE STRONG DOCUMENTATION: The size of CUSD
generated a funding amount that was unacceptable to the district-wide electorate and city
councils. The acceptable viewpoint was to take care of the District's critical needs in
maintenance and repair, in order to make schools safe and healthy. While upgrades and other

- capital improvements are needed, not all cities wanted to take on that burden at this time. As such, school upgrades and enhancements should be identified for each city's consideration.
- PROVIDE A SOLID BASIS FOR THE FUNDING AMOUNT: The validation for the \$889 million funding was challenged by various groups. More accurate, up-to-date cost estimates are now available through Kitchell's Facility Condition Assessment Reports, and should be utilized to support any proposed funding.
- BUILD A CLEAR AND PERSUASIVE COMMUNICATIONS AND OUTREACH PLAN: CUSD's
  explanation of Measure M's amount, structure and implementation was challenged as not
  clear or adequately explained. A well-prepared and executed communication plan, coordinated
  with District officials, teachers, parent and campaign groups must be established. In addition to
  the investment in our youth, consider a major focus on educating the voting public as to how
  school districts are funded and the contribution that taxpayer investments in schools enhances
  property values.
- RETAIN PROFESSIONAL BOND CONSULTANTS: Consider retaining professional consultants who
  specialize in advising school districts in structuring bond measures. Bring such consultants on
  board as early as possible to allow their assessment of any projected bond funding.
- BUILD A STRONG STAKEHOLDER TEAM: Engaging a strong campaign team early in the process, made up of key stakeholders within the district, should be integral to any district effort.
   Research shows that the success of a campaign is significantly increased with the participation and support of key public and private individuals and organizations, including community groups, such as chambers of commerce, service organizations, and parent/teacher associations, and business and industry groups. While CUSD cannot advocate for a bond once it is on the ballot, it should recognize a strong involvement by these individuals and groups.
- PREPARE EARLY: CUSD was criticized for rushing a bond measure that was too large and costly, and not explained clearly enough. Determine the appropriate timeline for presenting the bond measure to ballot that allows adequate time to evaluate need, prepare a workable strategy, educate and engage stakeholders.

The Committee also discussed two additional issues: 1) Placing a bond measure on the ballot in 2018 and, 2) Conducting a series of bond ballots for specific cities over time. These issues emerged after the Committee's evaluation period and the amount of data and information concerning factors favoring or not favoring adoption was not sufficient to draw strong conclusions. However, in general, a ballot measure in 2018 was deemed as risky due to the short time frame in which sufficient preparations and outreach could be made. Favoring this shorter time frame would be lower funding amount(s) more acceptable to stakeholders, as well as funding might not be district-wide, but only for high-need schools.

Other unknown variables include the consensus among economists that a recessionary downturn will occur by 2020, which would dampen prospects for passing any types of bonds. Regarding funding only high-need schools, the question of acceptability by other cities and schools remains unanswered. How one city and its voters view "need" may be totally different than another city. Further complicating the issue is the fact that some city's schools accept students from other cities, so that under this individual city funding method, the funded city's taxpayers would be subsidizing their neighbors.

## **HISTORY**

During the past three years, several components of Board Policy 6146.1, *High School Graduation Requirements*, have been reviewed and updated to align to Board values, changes in policies and education code. Most of the areas addressed could be classified under the topics of rigor and flexibility. Additional components of the policy were selected and evaluated as they were viewed as barriers to student success. The most significant areas considered included the following:

- The value of College and Career Planning (CCP) and whether or not it should be a graduation requirement.
- The preparedness of District students for college mathematics.
- The required Health units of study and whether mandated Health content could be taught within the Biology curriculum or if the Health course should remain a separate course requirement for graduation.
- Courses that students can take through other accredited institutions for high school credit.
- Emphasizing Career Technical Education (CTE) courses as fulfilling the same intent as Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA) or World Language courses for purposes of meeting high school graduation requirements.
- Options for students to receive credit for Physical Education including expanding access to Independent Study Physical Education (ISPE).

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Board Policy 6146.1, *High School Graduation Requirements* was a discussion item at the following board workshops or meetings where the identified actions were taken:

March 25, 2015; Trustees began reviewing Board Policy 6146.1, *High School Graduation Requirements*. Staff reviewed state requirements, District academic performance, college attendance data as well as addressed new University of California Honors requirements.

July 15, 2015; Trustees reviewed and approved Honors English I & II, Honors Biology, Honors Chemistry, Honors Algebra II-Trig, Honors World History.

January 20, 2016; Trustees reviewed Health and CCP data including a student and parent survey on whether they would take the courses as an elective.

May 18, 2016; Trustees updated the policy to remove language related to California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE) requirements and approved the change in the Math requirement from 20 to 30 units. Staff moved forward with working on Common Interim Assessments (CIA) and Curriculum Alignment Guides (CAG) for program consistency in both CCP and Health.

January 25, 2017; Trustees updated policy to include CTE classes with World Language and Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA) classes to meet the graduation requirement.

March 15, 2017; Trustees were presented with information related to PE courses including ISPE and discussed ways to increase rigor and flexibility for District students. A new process for considering students to take ISPE who are not nationally ranked athletes or medically restricted was developed and communicated to ISPE coordinators at each site.

April 12, 2017; Trustees reviewed CTE and College and Career Advantage (CCA) data, reviewed college and career indicators, and considered language to increase flexibility.

May 24, 2017; Trustees approved recommended adjustments to Board Policy increasing flexibility for students in completing graduation requirements.

June 28, 2017; Trustees were provided an update on CCP course revisions and alignment including the development of Common Interim Assessments and metrics identifying the value that students attached to the course as helping them prepare to make college or career decisions.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Based on Trustee direction during the June 28, 2017 Board Meeting, staff was requested to bring back to the Board in January 2018 data on CCP courses and increased access to Cal Prep courses for students who do not attend Cal Prep. Numbers reported to the Board in June indicated that ninth grade students who took the course during the 2016-2017 school year overwhelmingly saw value in CCP compared to twelfth grade students who took the course in years prior. Further data about student perception regarding the value of CCP courses collected at the end of the first semester of the 2017-2018 school year confirmed previous feedback related to ninth grade students. The data also reflected that as students progressed to higher grade levels that the value they initially attached to CCP waned. Based on data collected from current and former CCP students, feedback from principals, as well as the emphasis the District has placed on college and career readiness tied to our current work with Saddleback College to develop a promise program, staff recommends retaining CCP as a graduation requirement for all District students while continuing to maintain flexibility in the ways that students can take this course. The course will continue to be reviewed and improved to ensure that it is benefiting students as they make plans for future college and career success. Pending direction, staff will begin work to ensure that the online course aligns with the course being offered in the brick and mortar setting. Staff recommends returning in August of 2019 to report on progress and assess implementation to that point.

Options for comprehensive high school students taking courses through Cal Prep have been expanded and sites are accommodating students who are taking advantage of these opportunities. During the second semester of the 2016-2017 school year 5 students who were not Cal Prep students were enrolled in Cal Prep. During the first semester of the 2017-2018 school year that number increased to 82 students and there are currently 132 students enrolled in Cal Prep classes who are not Cal Prep students for the second semester of 2017-2018. In addition to this, through partnership with Saddleback College, a course sequence for concurrently enrolled high school students to obtain or make significant progress toward completing the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) requirements or obtaining an Associate's Degree upon graduation from high school has been developed and communicated to high schools.

Opportunities for students to take Health outside of the regular school day continue to be utilized by students seeking to free up their schedule for other courses. Efforts to identify alternative methods of ensuring that high school students are provided the health education required by CA Healthy Youth Act outside of a traditional health class have not been viable. Due to Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) changes in science standards at the high school level, staff is currently working with teachers, students, and parents to develop a science pathway that enables every student to develop proficiency with every standard. While this work is being done, staff does not recommend embedding Health into an existing science course. Staff recommends maintaining Health as a separate semester course taught by a credentialed Health teacher, as intended in the CA Healthy Youth Act. Staff recommends revisiting this topic after the NGSS and new middle school Health Curriculum are fully implemented during the 2019-2020 school year.

## **Additional Changes to Board Policy 6146.1**

#### Changes to Requirements for Mathematics

In order to address the College Readiness of our graduating seniors related to mathematics preparation, the Graduation Requirements were increased from 20 credits in mathematics to 30 required credits for graduation beginning with the Class of 2020.

  - One on one Fall and Spring Advisement in all high schools

  - Advertising of Saddleback pathway to completing or making progress toward IGETC or degree requirements during high school.



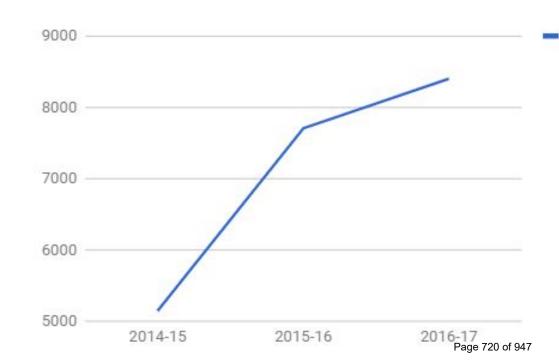

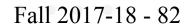

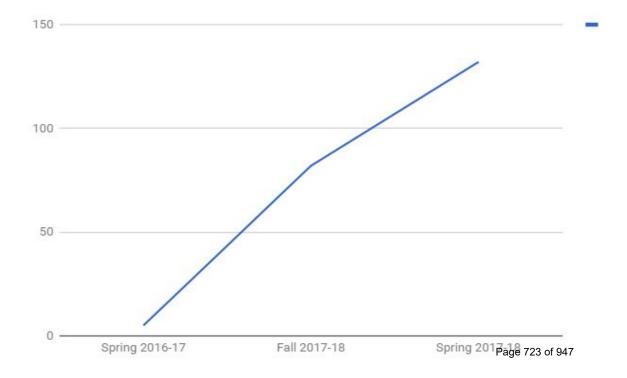
## **Cal Prep Update**

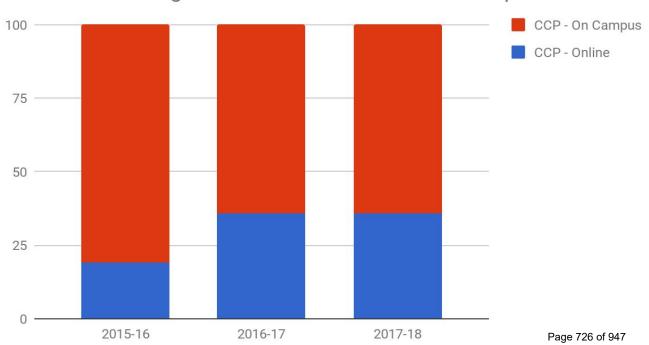

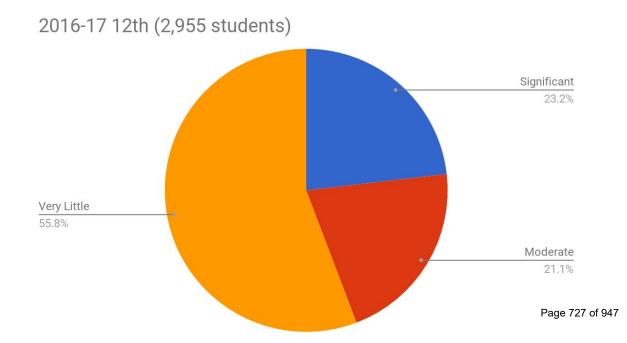


#### % students taking CCP - Online and CCP - On Campus



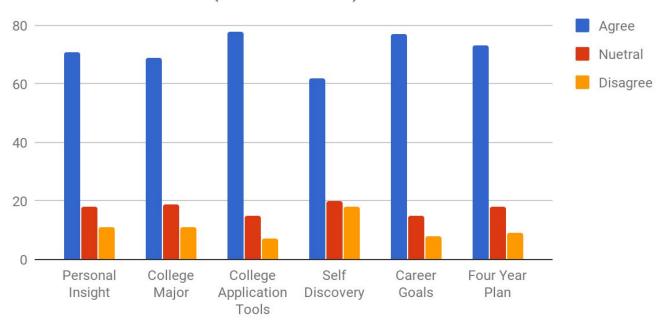


What was the level of impact CCP had on your success as a high school student?

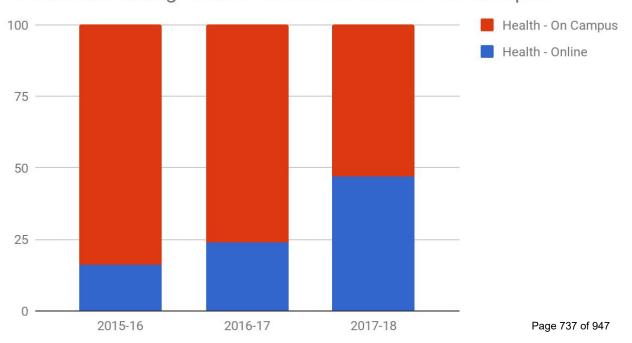

Board Item: First Reading – BP 5124, Graduation Ceremonies and Activities

#### **HISTORY**

Each spring District students are recognized for their stellar scholastic achievements at various events including graduation ceremonies. During graduation, students who have maintained a cumulative Grade Point Average of 4.0 or higher are granted the valedictorian distinction and are recognized by wearing white robes. Additionally, one student from each class is selected as the Scholar of Scholars based on their academic performance.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Under current policy, school staff are responsible for verifying student academic performance and determining which students qualify for these distinctions. In the past, there have been instances where information was not recorded accurately on a student's transcript and was not corrected until late in the spring creating disruptions in the planning and execution of commencement ceremonies or other awards celebrations. The additional language being recommended will add another verification layer. Students will be required to verify that their transcripts are correct early enough in the spring to enable staff to identify students warranting academic distinction with enough time to appropriately plan.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Approval of the additional language being recommended for BP 5124, *Graduation Ceremonies and Activities*. High school principals have provided input into the proposed additional language.

#### GRADUATION CEREMONIES AND ACTIVITIES

High school graduation ceremonies shall be held to recognize those students who have successfully completed the required course of study, passed all proficiency standards, and thereby earned the right to receive a diploma. The <u>Board of Trustees Governing Board</u> believes that these students deserve a public celebration that recognizes the significance of their achievement, and encourages them to continue the pursuit of learning throughout their lives.

Students who have passed California High School Proficiency Examination or the General Education Development Test must also meet District graduation requirements in order to participate in graduation ceremonies.

Invocations and/or benedictions shall not be included in graduation ceremonies. Ceremonies or programs involving prayer for graduates may not be sponsored by the school or District.

#### **Disciplinary Considerations**

While recognizing the importance of graduation ceremonies, the Board also desires to maintain high standards of student conduct and behavior. Graduation ceremonies are offered for students in good standing. The principal may deny the privilege of participating in these ceremonies in accordance with school rules which provide for due process.

#### **Honors and Awards**

The valedictorians of each high school's graduating class shall be all the students with cumulative grade point averages of 4.0 or higher, based on all courses taken, except physical education courses. The valedictorian GPA calculation shall include second semester progress reports issued in the eighth semester. Students are responsible to verify the accuracy of their academic records and to report any errors to the school administration for resolution within ten days following the posting of twelve week grades.

Each high school will identify and recognize a "Scholar of Scholars" who will be the student with the highest overall weighted grade point average based only upon coursework in the following academic disciplines: English, History/Social Science, Mathematics, Science, and Foreign Language, as well as all Advanced Placement/International Baccalaureate courses. Transferable college-level coursework taken as part of concurrent enrollment will also be used to identify the "Scholar of Scholars." This "Scholar of Scholars" will be given the opportunity to speak at graduation ceremonies.

#### GRADUATION CEREMONIES AND ACTIVITIES (continued)

In the event of a tie, the student who has taken the most honors level and/or advanced placement courses will be the "Scholar of Scholars."

If a tie still exists, the student who has earned the most credits will be selected. If still tied, the student with the highest SAT scores will be selected.

Each high school principal and/or graduation committee may identify other school-sponsored awards which may be given out during graduation exercises. A separate awards program may be held to recognize graduating students receiving other school and non-school awards.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

State law requires each school district in California have an annual audit conducted by a state-certified independent auditor. The audit is conducted according to generally accepted auditing standards, specific guidelines, and procedures set by the State Controller's office. This audit, when completed, is to be presented to Trustees at a public meeting.

Under state law, annual fiscal audits are neither accepted nor rejected by a board, but merely received by the district. For record keeping purposes, the Board of Trustees has annually adopted a motion indicating recognition of receipt of the District and Community Facilities Districts (CFDs) annual audit reports.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATION**

This item pertains to the presentation of the 2016-2017 fiscal year District and CFDs Annual Financial Reports to the Board of Trustees. The Annual Financial Reports for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017, were completed by the firm Nigro and Nigro, PC, Certified Public Accountants.

The audit firm is required to make any recommendations regarding state and federal compliance issues as well as items that are appropriate for improving the fiscal or internal controls of the District. The 2016-2017 fiscal year Annual Financial Reports contains three findings, all relatively minor, and corrective action plans were developed to address each of these issues.

The auditor also provides letters to District management that presents items observed during the audit process where improvements could be made to internal controls and operational efficiencies. The letter of the District audit report, lists observations found in the area of Associated Student Body accounts. Business Services and Education Services staff members, as appropriate, are working with school sites and relevant District departments to ensure improvements are made.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There is a minor financial impact of \$255 for one of the findings.

# **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended the Board President recognize Clark Hampton, Deputy Superintendent, Business and Support Services, who will introduce a partner from the audit firm Nigro and Nigro, PC, to present a summary of the audit reports for the year ending June 30, 2017.

Following discussion, it is recommended the Board of Trustees receive the District and Community Facilities Districts Annual Financial Reports for the District for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017.

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#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

#### **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Capistrano Unified School District, as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### **Auditors' Responsibility**

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the 2016-17 Guide for Annual Audits of K-12 Local Education Agencies and State Compliance Reporting. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

#### **Opinions**

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Capistrano Unified School District, as of June 30, 2017, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the fiscal year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Other Matters**

#### Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis, budgetary comparison information, schedule of funding progress, schedule of proportionate share of the net pension liability, schedule of pension contributions, and the notes to the required supplementary information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

#### Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements. The supplementary information on pages 60 to 63 and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards on page 64 are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole. The information on pages 59 and 65 has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 7, 2017, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Management's Discussion and Analysis (Unaudited) For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2017

This discussion and analysis of Capistrano Unified School District's financial performance provides an overview of the District's financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. Please read it in conjunction with the District's financial statements, which immediately follow this section.

#### FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The District's financial status increased overall as a result of this year's operations. Net position of governmental activities increased by \$34.2 million, or 8.4%.
- Governmental expenses were about \$522.9 million. Revenues were about \$557.0 million.
- The District acquired over \$63.5 million in new capital assets during the year. These additions were incurred primarily from CFD and other capital projects funds, as well as the acquisition of \$33.8 million of land for the Esencia K-8 site.
- The District decreased its outstanding long-term debt by \$3.95 million. This was primarily due to payments on general obligation bonds.
- Grades K-12 average daily attendance (ADA) decreased by 727, or 1.5%.

#### **OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

This annual report consists of three parts – management discussion and analysis (this section), the basic financial statements, and required supplementary information. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the District:

- The first two statements are *district-wide financial statements* that provide both short-term and long-term information about the District's overall financial status.
- The remaining statements are *fund financial statements* that focus on individual parts of the District, reporting the District's operations in more detail than the district-wide statements.
  - The *governmental funds* statements tell how basic services like regular and special education were financed in the short term as well as what remains for future spending.
  - Short and long-term financial information about the activities of the District that operate like businesses (self-insurance funds) are provided in the *proprietary funds statements*.
  - *Fiduciary funds* statement provides information about the financial relationships in which the District acts solely as a trustee or agent for the benefit of others to whom the resources belong.

The financial statements also include notes that explain some of the information in the statements and provide more detailed data. Figure A-1 shows how the various parts of this annual report are arranged and related to one another.

#### **OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued)**

The remainder of this overview section of management's discussion and analysis highlights the structure and contents of each of the statements.

#### **District-Wide Statements**

The district-wide statements report information about the District as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The statement of net position includes all of the District's assets and liabilities. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of activities regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two district-wide statements report the District's net position and how it has changed. Net position – the difference between the District's assets and deferred outflows of resources and liabilities and deferred inflows of resources – is one way to measure the District's financial health, or *position*.

- Over time, increases and decreases in the District's net position are an indicator of whether its financial position is improving or deteriorating, respectively.
- To assess the overall health of the District, you need to consider additional nonfinancial factors such as changes in the District's demographics and the condition of school buildings and other facilities.
- In the district-wide financial statements, the District's activities are categorized as *Governmental Activities*. Most of the District's basic services are included here, such as regular and special education, transportation, and administration. Property taxes and state aid finance most of these activities.

#### **Fund Financial Statements**

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the District's most significant funds – not the District as a whole. Funds are accounting devices the District uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending on particular programs:

- Some funds are required by State law and by bond covenants.
- The District establishes other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes (like repaying its long-term debt) or to show that is properly using certain revenues.

The District has three kinds of funds:

1) Governmental funds – Most of the District's basic services are included in governmental funds, which generally focus on (1) how cash and other financial assets that can readily be converted to cash flow in and out and (2) the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental funds statements provide a detailed short-term view that helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the District's programs. Because this information does not encompass the additional long-term focus of the district-wide statements, we provide additional information on a separate reconciliation page that explains the relationship (or differences) between them.

#### **Fund Financial Statements (continued)**

- 2) **Proprietary funds** When the District charges other District funds for the services it provides, these services are reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds are reported in the same way that all activities are reported in the Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities. In fact, the District's internal service fund is included within the governmental activities reported in the district-wide statements but provide more detail and additional information, such as cash flows. The District uses the internal service fund to report activities that relate to the District's self-insured programs for workers compensation claims, health and welfare benefits, and property and liability claims.
- 3) *Fiduciary funds* The District is the trustee, or fiduciary, for assets that belong to others, such as the student activities funds and CFD Debt Service. The District is responsible for ensuring that the assets reported in these funds are used only for their intended purposes and by those to whom the assets belong. All of the District's fiduciary activities are reported in a separate statement of fiduciary net position. We exclude these activities from the district-wide financial statements because the District cannot use these assets to finance its operations.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DISTRICT AS A WHOLE

**Net Position.** The District's combined net position was higher on June 30, 2017, than it was the year before – increasing 8.4% to \$442.3 million (See Table A-1).

**Changes in net position, governmental activities.** The District's total revenues increased 5.9% to \$557.0 million (See Table A-2). The increase is due primarily to increased state funding and the recognition of a contribution for the land acquisition.

The total cost of all programs and services increased 6.8% to \$522.9 million. The District's expenses are predominantly related to educating and caring for students, 82.6%. The purely administrative activities of the District accounted for just 5.0% of total costs. A significant contributor to the increase in costs was increased operating costs and pension contributions.

#### FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DISTRICT'S FUNDS

The financial performance of the District as a whole is reflected in its governmental funds as well. As the District completed this year, its governmental funds reported a combined fund balance of \$156.0 million, which is below last year's ending fund balance of \$159.4 million. The primary cause of the decreased fund balance is ongoing construction and modernization costs.

#### **General Fund Budgetary Highlights**

Over the course of the year, the District revised the annual operating budget several times. The major budget amendments fall into these categories:

- Revenues increased by \$11.0 million primarily to reflect federal and state budget actions.
- Salaries and benefits costs increased \$5.4 million due to reflect revised cost estimates.
- Other non-personnel expenses decreased \$3.0 million to revise operational cost estimates.

While the District's final budget for the General Fund anticipated that revenues would exceed expenditures by about \$6.7 million, the actual results for the year show that revenues exceeded expenditures by roughly \$16.5 million. Actual revenues were \$2.4 million less than anticipated, but expenditures were \$12.2 million less than budgeted. That amount consists primarily of restricted categorical program dollars that were not spent as of June 30, 2017, that will be carried over into the 2017-18 budget.

#### CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

#### **Capital Assets**

By the end of 2016-17 the District had acquired \$63.5 million in new capital assets, related to land, construction in progress, site improvements, and equipment purchases. (More detailed information about capital assets can be found in Note 6 to the financial statements). Total depreciation expense for the year was \$21.0 million.

#### **Long-Term Debt**

At year-end the District had \$101.1 million in general obligation bonds, certificates of participation, accrued vacation, claims liability, and postemployment benefits – a decrease of 3.8% from last year – as shown in Table A-5. The Governor signed the 2017-18 *Budget Act* and other budget-related bills on June 27, 2017.

#### **Proposition 98**

#### **Overview**

State budgeting for schools and community colleges is based primarily on Proposition 98, approved by voters in 1988 and amended in 1990. In this section, we provide an overview of Proposition 98 changes under the enacted budget package.

#### Proposition 98 Establishes Minimum Spending Level

Proposition 98 establishes a minimum spending requirement commonly called the minimum guarantee. The minimum guarantee is determined by three main formulas (known as tests) and various inputs, including General Fund revenue, per capita personal income, and K-12 attendance. The state can spend at the minimum guarantee or any level above it. Spending above the minimum guarantee one year typically becomes part of the base for calculating the minimum guarantee the next year. If the minimum guarantee increases after budget enactment due to updated inputs, the state owes a "settle-up" obligation. In some years, the state also creates or pays "maintenance factor." Maintenance factor is created when General Fund revenue is weak relative to per capita personal income and is paid when General Fund revenue is stronger.

#### 2015-16 and 2016-17 Minimum Guarantees Down but Total Spending Up Slightly

The 2015-16 minimum guarantee has decreased \$379 million due to lower-than-expected General Fund revenue. Proposition 98 spending that year, however, has increased \$53 million due to various minor adjustments involving the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) and community college apportionments. The 2016-17 minimum guarantee has decreased \$558 million, again due to lower estimates of General Fund revenue. Proposition 98 spending that year has decreased by \$484 million, but total spending, including a settle-up payment of \$514 million, is up slightly (\$29 million) from the June 2016 level. The settle-up payment allows the state to cover some 2016-17 LCFF costs using funds set aside for Proposition 2 (2014) debt payments. In both 2015-16 and 2016-17, Proposition 98 spending is above the calculated minimum guarantees.

#### 2017-18 Spending Up \$3.1 Billion Over Revised 2016-17 Level

In 2017-18, total spending across all segments is \$74.5 billion, an increase of \$3.1 billion (4.4 percent) from the revised 2016-17 level. For 2017-18, the state funds at the estimate of the minimum guarantee. This estimate builds upon the higher levels of spending provided in 2015-16 and 2016-17. (Had the state not funded above the guarantee in those two years, the 2017-18 guarantee would have been \$542 million lower.) Test 2 is the operative test in 2017-18, with the change in the guarantee attributable to a 3.7 percent increase in per capita personal income and a 0.05 percent decline in K-12 attendance. The increase in the guarantee also reflects a maintenance factor payment of \$536 million. Under the administration's estimates, the state would end 2017-18 with an outstanding maintenance factor obligation of \$900 million.

#### **Overview (continued)**

#### About One-Third of Increase Covered With Higher Property Tax Revenue

Of the total Proposition 98 spending provided in 2017-18, \$52.6 billion is state General Fund and \$21.9 billion is local property tax revenue. From 2016-17 to 2017-18, state General Fund increases \$2.1 billion (accounting for about two-thirds of the \$3.1 billion increase in spending) and property tax revenue increases by \$1 billion. The primary factor explaining the growth in property tax revenue is the projected 5.3 percent growth in assessed property values, which is similar to the average growth rate over the past 20 years. Regarding local revenue associated with the dissolution of redevelopment agencies, the budget plan assumes a net increase of \$31 million. This consists of a \$131 million increase in the ongoing revenue shifted to schools and community colleges, offset by a \$100 million decrease in revenue from the sale of assets formerly owned by redevelopment agencies.

#### Spending Package Reduces Outstanding Settle-Up Obligation by \$603 Million

The budget plan includes a \$603 million settle-up payment related to meeting the 2009-10 minimum guarantee. This payment reduces the state's outstanding settle-up obligation from slightly above \$1 billion to \$440 million. Of the \$603 million provided, the budget plan allocates \$514 million for covering 2016-17 LCFF costs, \$86 million for the community college guided pathways initiative, and \$3 million for the Career Technical Education Incentive Grant program. The state budget package scores all of the settle-up spending as a Proposition 2 debt payment.

#### **K-12 Education**

#### \$64.7 Billion Proposition 98 Funding for K-12 Education in 2017-18

The budgeted 2017-18 level is \$2.7 billion (4.3 percent) more than revised 2016-17 level and \$2.2 billion (3.6 percent) more than the *2016-17 Budget Act* level. The budget increases funding per student by \$450 (4.3 percent) over the *2016-17 Budget Act* level, bringing Proposition 98 funding per student up to \$10,863.

#### Package Includes Mix of Ongoing and One-Time Spending

The budget includes \$2.4 billion in augmentations for K-12 education. Of these augmentations, \$1.5 billion are ongoing increases and \$933 million are one-time initiatives. In addition to these changes, the budget package includes \$328 million in one-time initiatives funded from other sources. (Of this amount, \$325 million is from Proposition 98 reversion dollars and \$3 million is from a settle-up payment. Of the reversion dollars, \$114 million is for a fund swap primarily relating to special education.) The budget also authorizes \$593 million from Proposition 51 (2016) general obligation bond proceeds for school facilities.

#### **General Purpose Funding**

#### Accelerates Implementation of LCFF for School Districts and Charter Schools

The budget provides an additional \$1.4 billion ongoing Proposition 98 funding for this purpose, bringing total LCFF funding for school districts and charter schools to \$57.4 billion, a 2.7% increase over the revised 2016-17 level. The administration estimates this funding will result in the LCFF-target level being 97 percent-funded. School districts and charter schools may use LCFF monies for any educational purpose.

#### Funds One-Time Discretionary Grants

The largest one-time augmentation for K-12 education is \$877 million that local education agencies (LEAs) may use for any educational purpose. Funding is distributed based on average daily attendance (\$147 per ADA). If an LEA has unpaid mandate claims, funding counts toward those claims. As most LEAs do not have any such claims, we estimate only about one-third (\$268 million) of the funding will end up reducing the K-12 mandates backlog. We estimate the K-12 mandates backlog will be \$799 million at the end of 2017-18.

#### **Other Changes**

#### Specifies Use of Remaining Proposition 39 Funds and Extends Energy-Efficiency Programs Indefinitely

The budget provides \$423 million Proposition 98 funding for energy-efficiency projects at schools and community colleges. This reflects the fifth and final year of Proposition 39 (2012) funding. Trailer legislation, however, extends the date for schools to use this funding by one year, to June 30, 2019, and sets rules for how any remaining uncommitted funds are to be used. The first \$75 million in remaining funds is earmarked for school districts and COEs to replace or retrofit school buses. Priority is given to LEAs having the oldest buses, serving disadvantaged communities, or serving high shares of low-income students. The next \$100 million is earmarked for a competitive grant program to provide K-12 LEAs with low- and no-interest loans for energy projects. Any funding still remaining is to be distributed as grants to K-12 LEAs according to Proposition 39 rules. The trailer legislation also extends the Proposition 39 energy-efficiency programs for K-12 and CCC LEAs beginning in 2018-19, contingent upon funds being made available through the annual budget act or other statute.

#### Augments After School Education and Safety (ASES) Program

Proposition 49, passed by the voters in 2002, requires the state to provide \$550 million in Proposition 98 funds annually for the ASES program. Since Proposition 49 was enacted, ASES providers have received \$7.50 per child per day. The budget increases ASES funding by \$50 million (9%)—bringing total funding to \$600 million. The augmentation will increase the per-child per-day rate.

#### **School Facilities**

#### Provides First Installment of Proposition 51 Bond Funding for School Facilities

Passed by the voters in November 2016, Proposition 51 authorizes the state to sell \$9 billion in general obligation bonds—\$7 billion for schools and \$2 billion for community colleges. The state plans to issue \$593 million of these bonds for K-12 facility projects in 2017-18. This would fully fund the state's list of \$368 million in already approved facility projects, as well as \$225 million in additional projects.

#### **Establishes New Audit Rules**

Trailer legislation shifts audit responsibilities for state-funded school facility projects from the Office of Public School Construction to local independent auditors. Moving forward, the local auditors are to review facility expenditures to ensure that they comply with the rules of the state's School Facilities Program. In June 2017, the State Allocation Board also enacted a regulatory change requiring districts to sign grant agreements prior to receiving state funding that specify allowable project expenditures.

All of these factors were considered in preparing the Capistrano Unified School District budget for the 2017-18 fiscal year.

#### NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Capistrano Unified School District (the "District") accounts for its financial transactions in accordance with the policies and procedures of the California Department of Education's *California School Accounting Manual*. The accounting policies of the District conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. The following is a summary of the more significant policies:

#### A. Reporting Entity

A reporting entity is comprised of the primary government, component units, and other organizations that are included to ensure the financial statements are not misleading. The primary government of the District consists of all funds, departments, and agencies that are not legally separate from the District. For Capistrano Unified School District, this includes general operations, food service, and student related activities of the District.

Component units are legally separate organizations for which the District is financially accountable. Component units may also include organizations that are fiscally dependent on the District, in that the District approves their budget, the issuance of their debt or the levying of their taxes. In addition, component units are other legally separate organizations for which the District is not financially accountable but the nature and significance of the organization's relationship with the District is such that exclusion would cause the District's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete.

For financial reporting purposes, the component units have a financial and operational relationship which meets the reporting entity definition criteria of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 14, *The Financial Reporting Entity*, and thus are included in the financial statements using the blended presentation method as if they were part of the District's operations because the Board of Trustees of the component units is essentially the same as the Board of Trustees of the District and because their purpose is to finance the construction of facilities to be used for the direct benefit of the District.

The Capistrano USD Financing Authority (the Authority) and Capistrano USD Financing Corporation (the Corporation) financial activity are presented in the financial statements as the Debt Service Fund. Certificates of participation and other debt issued by the Authority and the Corporation are included as long-term liabilities in the government-wide financial statements. Individually prepared financial statements are not prepared for the Authority or the Corporation.

The Capistrano Unified School District Community Facilities Districts (CFDs) financial activity is presented in the financial statements as the Capital Projects Fund for Blended Component Units and in the Fiduciary Funds Statement as the Debt Service Fund for Special Tax Bonds. Special Tax Bonds issued by the CFDs are not included in the long-term obligations of the *Statement of Net Position* as they are not obligations of the District. Individually prepared financial statements are available for the CFDs through the Business Office.

#### B. Basis of Presentation, Basis of Accounting

#### 1. Basis of Presentation

#### **Government-Wide Financial Statements**

The statement of net position and the statement of activities display information about the primary government (the District) and its component units. These statements include the financial activities of the overall government, except for fiduciary activities. Eliminations have been made to minimize the double-counting of internal activities. Governmental activities generally are financed through taxes, intergovernmental revenues, and other nonexchange transactions.

The statement of activities presents a comparison between direct expenses and program revenues for each function of the District's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a program or function and, therefore, are clearly identifiable to a particular function. Program revenues include (a) fees, fines, and charges paid by the recipients of goods or services offered by the programs and (b) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues, including all taxes, are presented as general revenues.

#### **Fund Financial Statements**

The fund financial statements provide information about the District's funds, including its fiduciary funds (and blended component units). Separate statements for each fund category - *governmental*, *proprietary*, and *fiduciary* - are presented. The emphasis of fund financial statements is on major governmental funds, each displayed in a separate column. All remaining governmental and enterprise funds are aggregated and reported as nonmajor funds. Proprietary fund operating revenues, such as charges for services, result from exchange transactions associated with the principal activity of the fund. Exchange transactions are those in which each party receives and gives up essentially equal values. Nonoperating revenues, such as subsidies and investment earnings, result from nonexchange transactions or ancillary activities.

## **Major Governmental Funds**

The District maintains the following major governmental funds:

**General Fund:** This fund is the general operating fund of the District. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. The District also maintains an Adult Education Fund, a Deferred Maintenance Fund, and a Special Reserve Fund for Postemployment Benefits. These funds do not currently meet the definition of special revenue funds as they are not primarily composed of restricted or committed revenue sources. Because these funds do not meet the definition of special revenue funds under GASB 54, the activity in those funds is being reported within the General Fund.

**Special Reserve Fund for Capital Outlay Projects:** This fund is used to account for funds set aside for Board designated construction projects.

**Capital Projects Fund for Blended Component Units:** This fund is used to account for the capital activity of the Community Facilities Districts.

#### 1. Basis of Presentation (continued)

#### **Non-Major Governmental Funds**

#### **Special Revenue Funds:**

**Charter Schools Fund:** This fund is used to account for the activities of district-operated charter schools that would otherwise be reported in the authorizing District's General Fund.

**Child Development Fund:** This fund is used to account for resources committed to child development programs maintained by the District.

**Cafeteria Fund:** This fund is used to account for revenues received and expenditures made to operate the District's food service operations.

#### **Capital Projects Funds:**

**Building Fund:** This fund is used to account for the acquisition of major governmental capital facilities and buildings from the sale of general obligation bonds.

**Capital Facilities Fund:** This fund is used to account for resources received from developer impact fees assessed under provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act.

**County School Facilities Fund:** This fund is used to account for state apportionments provided for modernization of school facilities under SB50.

#### **Debt Service Funds:**

**Bond Interest and Redemption Fund:** This Fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the repayment of, District bonds, interest, and related costs.

**Debt Service Fund:** This fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the repayment of, certificates of participation issued for the District.

#### **Proprietary Funds**

Proprietary fund reporting focuses on the determination of operating income, changes in net position, financial position, and cash flows. Proprietary funds are classified as enterprise or internal service. The District has the following proprietary fund:

**Internal Service Funds:** These funds are used to account for services rendered on a cost-reimbursement basis within the District. The District operates workers' compensation and property and liability insurance programs that are accounted for in the Internal Service Fund. In addition, the District's health and welfare benefit programs are accounted for in the Internal Service Fund.

#### 1. Basis of Presentation (continued)

#### **Fiduciary Funds**

Fiduciary fund reporting focuses on net position and changes in net position. Fiduciary funds are used to report assets held in a trustee or agency capacity for others and therefore cannot be used to support the District's own programs. The fiduciary fund category includes pension (and other employee benefit) trust funds, investment trust funds, private-purpose trust funds, and agency funds. The District maintains the following fiduciary funds:

**Agency Funds:** The District maintains a separate agency fund for each school that operates an Associated Student Body (ASB) Fund, whether it is organized or not.

**Debt Service Fund for Special Tax Bonds:** This fund is used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the repayment, of Community Facility District bonds, interest and related costs.

#### 2. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting

#### **Government-Wide and Fiduciary Fund Financial Statements**

The government-wide and fiduciary fund financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred, regardless of when the related cash flows take place. Nonexchange transactions, in which the District gives (or receives) value without directly receiving (or giving) equal value in exchange, include property taxes, grants, entitlements, and donations. On an accrual basis, revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied.

#### **Governmental Fund Financial Statements**

Governmental funds are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recognized when measurable and available. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on general long-term debt, claims and judgments, and compensated absences, which are recognized as expenditures to the extent they have matured. Capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. Proceeds of general long-term debt and financing from capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

#### 3. Revenues - Exchange and Non-Exchange Transactions

Revenue resulting from exchange transactions, in which each party gives and receives essentially equal value, is recorded on the accrual basis when the exchange takes place. On a modified accrual basis, revenue is recorded in the fiscal year in which the resources are measurable and become available. Available means that the resources will be collected within the current fiscal year. Generally, available is defined as collectible within 60 days. However, to achieve comparability of reporting among California districts and so as not to distort normal revenue patterns, with specific respect to reimbursement grants and corrections to state-aid apportionments, the California Department of Education has defined available for districts as collectible within one year. The following revenue sources are considered to be both measurable and available at fiscal year-end: State apportionments, interest, certain grants, and other local sources.

#### 4. Revenues - Exchange and Non-Exchange Transactions (continued)

Non-exchange transactions, in which the District receives value without directly giving equal value in return, include property taxes, certain grants, entitlements, and donations. Revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year in which the taxes are received. Revenue from certain grants, entitlements, and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include time and purpose requirements. On a modified accrual basis, revenue from non-exchange transactions must also be available before it can be recognized.

#### C. Budgetary Data

The budgetary process is prescribed by provisions of the California *Education Code* and requires the Board of Trustees to hold a public hearing and adopt an operating budget no later than July 1 of each year. The District Board of Trustees satisfied these requirements. The adopted budget is subject to amendment throughout the year to give consideration to unanticipated revenue and expenditures primarily resulting from events unknown at the time of budget adoption with the legal restriction that expenditures cannot exceed appropriations by major object account.

The amounts reported as the original budgeted amounts in the budgetary statements reflect the amounts when the original appropriations were adopted. The amounts reported as the final budgeted amounts in the budgetary statements reflect the amounts after all budget amendments have been accounted for. For budget purposes, on behalf payments have not been included as revenue and expenditures as required under generally accepted accounting principles.

### D. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting is used in all budgeted funds to reserve portions of applicable appropriations for which commitments have been made. Encumbrances are recorded for purchase orders, contracts, and other commitments when they are written. Encumbrances are liquidated when the commitments are paid. All encumbrances are liquidated as of June 30.

## E. Assets, Deferred Outflows of Resources, Liabilities, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position

#### 1. Cash and Cash Equivalents

The District considers cash and cash equivalents to be cash on hand and demand deposits. In addition, because the Treasury Pool is sufficiently liquid to permit withdrawal of cash at any time without prior notice or penalty, equity in the pool is also deemed to be a cash equivalent.

#### 2. Inventories

Inventories are valued at cost using the first-in/first-out (FIFO) method. The costs of governmental fund-type inventories are recorded as expenditures when consumed rather than when purchased.

# 3. Capital Assets

Purchased or constructed capital assets are reported at cost or estimated historical cost. Donated capital assets, donated works of art and similar items, and capital assets received in a service concession arrangement are reported at acquisition value rather than fair value. The cost of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend assets' lives are not capitalized.

Capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

#### 4. Unearned Revenue

Unearned revenue arises when potential revenue does not meet both the "measurable" and "available" criteria for recognition in the current period or when resources are received by the District prior to the incurrence of qualifying expenditures. In subsequent periods, when both revenue recognition criteria are met, or when the District has a legal claim to the resources, the liability for unearned revenue is removed from the combined balance sheet and revenue is recognized.

Certain grants received that have not met eligibility requirements are recorded as unearned revenue. On the governmental fund financial statements, receivables that will not be collected within the available period are also recorded as unearned revenue.

#### 5. Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, *deferred outflows of resources*, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. The District has two items that qualify for reporting in this category. The first item is related to its pension plans as more fully described in the footnote entitled "Pension Plans". The second is deferred amount on refunding, which resulted from the difference in the carrying value of refunded debt and its reacquisition price. This amount is shown as deferred and amortized over the shorter of the life of the refunded or refunding debt.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, *deferred inflows of resources*, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period and will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The District has one item that qualifies for reporting in this category. That item is to recognize the District's proportionate share of the deferred inflows of resources related to its pension plans as more fully described in the footnote entitled "Pension Plans".

#### 6. Compensated Absences

The liability for compensated absences reported in the government-wide statements consists of unpaid, accumulated vacation leave balances. The liability has been calculated using the vesting method, in which leave amounts for both employees who currently are eligible to receive termination payments and other employees who are expected to become eligible in the future to receive such payments upon termination are included.

#### 7. Pensions

For purposes of measuring the net pension liability and deferred outflows/inflows of resources related to pensions, and pension expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the District's California State Teachers Retirement System (CalSTRS) and California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) plans and addition to/deductions from the Plans' fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by CalSTRS and CalPERS. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

#### 8. Fund Balances

The fund balance for governmental funds is reported in classifications based on the extent to which the government is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent.

**Nonspendable:** Fund balance is reported as nonspendable when the resources cannot be spent because they are either in a nonspendable form or legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. Resources in nonspendable form include inventories and prepaid assets.

**Restricted:** Fund balance is reported as restricted when the constraints placed on the use of resources are either externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or imposed by law through constitutional provision or by enabling legislation.

**Committed:** The District's highest decision-making level of authority rests with the District's Board. Fund balance is reported as committed when the Board passes a resolution that places specified constraints on how resources may be used. The Board can modify or rescind a commitment of resources through passage of a new resolution.

**Assigned:** Resources that are constrained by the District's intent to use them for a specific purpose, but are neither restricted nor committed, are reported as assigned fund balance. Intent may be expressed by either the Board, committees (such as budget or finance), or officials to which the Board has delegated authority.

**Unassigned:** Unassigned fund balance represents fund balance that has not been restricted, committed, or assigned and may be utilized by the District for any purpose. When expenditures are incurred, and both restricted and unrestricted resources are available, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources in the order of committed, assigned, and then unassigned, as they are needed.

#### 9. Net Position

Net position is classified into three components: net investment in capital assets; restricted; and unrestricted. These classifications are defined as follows:

- **Net investment in capital assets** This component of net position consists of capital assets, including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets. If there are significant unspent related debt proceeds at year-end, the portion of the debt attributable to the unspent proceeds are not included in the calculation of net investment in capital assets. Rather, that portion of the debt is included in the same net position component as the unspent proceeds.
- **Restricted** This component of net position consists of constraints placed on net position use through external constraints imposed by creditors (such as through debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or constraints imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- **Unrestricted net position** This component of net position consists of net position that does not meet the definition of "net investment in capital assets" or "restricted".

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed.

#### F. Minimum Fund Balance Policy

This Fund Balance Policy establishes the procedures for reporting unrestricted fund balance in the General Fund financial statements. Certain commitments and assignments of fund balance will help ensure that there will be adequate financial resources to protect the District against unforeseen circumstances and events such as revenue shortfalls and unanticipated expenditures. The policy also authorizes and directs the Chief Financial Officer to prepare financial reports which accurately categorize fund balance as per Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) No. 54, Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions.

The District's minimum reserve standard is 2% as per the recommended level for districts with more than 30,000 ADA (California Department of Education) or not less than two months of General Fund operating expenditures, or up to 17% of General Fund expenditures and other financing uses.

When an expenditure is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available, the District considers restricted funds to have been spent first. When an expenditure is incurred for which committed, assigned, or unassigned fund balances are available, the District considers amounts to have been spent first out of committed funds, then assigned funds, and finally unassigned funds, as needed unless the Board of Trustees has provided otherwise in its commitment or assignment actions.

#### G. Property Tax Calendar

The County is responsible for the assessment, collection, and apportionment of property taxes for all jurisdictions including the schools and special districts within the County. The Board of Supervisors levies property taxes as of September 1 on property values assessed on July 1. Secured property tax payments are due in two equal installments. The first is generally due November 1 and is delinquent with penalties on December 10, and the second is generally due on February 1 and is delinquent with penalties on April 10. Secured property taxes become a lien on the property on January 1.

#### H. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### I. New GASB Pronouncements

During the 2016-17 fiscal year, the following GASB Pronouncements became effective:

# 1. Statement No. 73, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets That Are Not Within the Scope of GASB Statement 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68 (Issued 06/15)

The requirements of this Statement extend the approach to accounting and financial reporting established in Statement 68 to all pensions, with modifications as necessary to reflect that for accounting and financial reporting purposes, any assets accumulated for pensions that are provided through pension plans that are not administered through trusts that meet the criteria specified in Statement 68 should not be considered pension plan assets. It also requires that information similar to that required by Statement 68 be included in notes to financial statements and required supplementary information by all similarly situated employers and nonemployer contributing entities.

# 2. Statement No. 74, Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans (Issued 06/15)

This Statement replaces Statements No. 43, Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans, as amended, and No. 57, OPEB Measurements by Agent Employers and Agent Multiple-Employer Plans. Statement No. 75, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions, establishes new accounting and financial reporting requirements for governments whose employees are provided with OPEB, as well as for certain nonemployer governments that have a legal obligation to provide financial support for OPEB provided to the employees of other entities. The scope of this Statement includes OPEB plans – defined benefit and defined contribution – administered through trusts that meet the following criteria:

- Contributions from employers and nonemployer contributing entities to the OPEB plan and earnings on those contributions are irrevocable.
- OPEB plan assets are dedicated to providing OPEB to plan members in accordance with the benefit terms.
- OPEB plan assets are legally protected from the creditors of employers, nonemployer contributing entities, and the OPEB plan administrator. If the plan is a defined benefit OPEB plan, plan assets also are legally protected from creditors of the plan members.

#### 3. Statement No. 77, Tax Abatement Disclosures (Issued 08/15)

For financial reporting purposes, this Statement defines a tax abatement as resulting from an agreement between a government and an individual or entity in which the government promises to forgo tax revenues and the individual or entity promises to subsequently take a specific action that contributes to economic development or otherwise benefits the government or its citizens. This Statement requires disclosure of tax abatement information about (1) a reporting government's own tax abatement agreements, and (2) those that are entered into by other governments and that reduce the reporting government's tax revenues.

# 4. Statement No. 78, Pensions Provided Through Certain Multiple-Employer Defined Benefit Pension Plans (Issued 12/15)

This Statement amends the scope and applicability of Statement 68 to exclude pensions provided to employees of state or local governmental employers through a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that (1) is not a state or local governmental pension plan, (2) is used to provide defined benefit pensions both to employees of state or local governmental employers and to employees of employers that are not state or local governmental employers, and (3) has no predominant state or local governmental employer (either individually or collectively with other state or local governmental employers that provide pensions through the pension plan).

# 5. Statement No. 80, Blending Requirements for Certain Component Units - An Amendment of GASB Statement No. 14 (Issued 01/16)

This Statement amends the blending requirements for the financial statement presentation of component units of all state and local governments. The additional criterion requires blending of a component unit incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation in which the primary government is the sole corporate member.

# 6. Statement No. 82, Pension Issues – An Amendment of GASB Statements No. 67, No. 68, and No. 73 (Issued 03/16)

The objective of this Statement is to address certain issues that have been raised with respect to Statements No. 67, Financial Reporting for Pension Plans, No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, and No. 73, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets That Are Not within the Scope of GASB Statement 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68. Specifically, this Statement addresses issues regarding (1) the presentation of payroll-related measures in required supplementary information, (2) the selection of assumptions and the treatment of deviations from the guidance in an Actuarial Standard of Practice for financial reporting purposes, and (3) the classification of payments made by employers to satisfy employee (plan member) contribution requirements.

#### **Pooled Funds**

In accordance with Education Code Section 41001, the District maintains substantially all of its cash in the County Treasury. The County pools and invests the cash. These pooled funds are carried at cost which approximates fair value. Interest earned is deposited annually to participating funds. Any investment losses are proportionately shared by all funds in the pool.

Because the District's deposits are maintained in a recognized pooled investment fund under the care of a third party and the District's share of the pool does not consist of specific, identifiable investment securities owned by the District, no disclosure of the individual deposits and investments or related custodial credit risk classifications is required.

In accordance with applicable state laws, the County Treasurer may invest in derivative securities with the State of California. However, at June 30, 2017, the County Treasurer has represented that the Pooled Investment Fund contained no derivatives or other investments with similar risk profiles.

### **Custodial Credit Risk - Deposits**

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District does not have a policy for custodial credit risk for deposits. Cash balances held in banks are insured up to \$250,000 by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and are collateralized by the respective financial institutions. In addition, the California Government Code requires that a financial institution secure deposits made by State or local governmental units by pledging securities in an undivided collateral pool held by a depository regulated under State law (unless so waived by the governmental unit).

The market value of the pledged securities in the collateral pool must equal at least 110 percent of the total amount deposited by the public agencies. California law also allows financial institutions to secure public deposits by pledging first trust deed mortgage notes having a value of 150 percent of the secured public deposits and letters of credit issued by the Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco having a value of 105 percent of the secured deposits.

As of June 30, 2017, \$5,716,140 of the District's bank balances was exposed to custodial credit risk because it was uninsured and collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agency, but not in the name of the District.

#### **Investments - Interest Rate Risk**

The District's investment policy limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. The District's investment policy limits investment purchases to investments with a term not to exceed three years. Investments purchased with maturity terms greater than three years require approval by the Board of Trustees. Investments purchased with maturities greater than one year require written approval by the Superintendent prior to commitment. #### Investments - Credit Risk

The District's investment policy limits investment choices to obligations of local, state and federal agencies, commercial paper, certificates of deposit, repurchase agreements, corporate notes, banker acceptances, and other securities allowed by State Government Code Section 53600. At June 30, 2017, all investments represented governmental securities which were issued, registered and held by the District's agent in the District's name.

#### **Investments - Concentration of Credit Risk**

The District does not place limits on the amount it may invest in any one issuer. At June 30, 2017, the District had the following investments that represents more than five percent of the District's net investments.

#### **Fair Value Measurements**

The District categorizes the fair value measurements of its investments based on the hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The fair value hierarchy, which has three levels, is based on the valuation inputs used to measure an asset's fair value. The following provides a summary of the hierarchy used to measure fair value:

Level 1 – Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets that the District has the ability to access at the measurement date. Level 1 assets may include debt and equity securities that are traded in an active exchange market and that are highly liquid and are actively traded in over-the-counter markets.

Level 2 – Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable, such as interest rates and curves observable at commonly quoted intervals, implied volatilities, and credit spreads. For financial reporting purposes, if an asset has a specified term, a Level 2 input is required to be observable for substantially the full term of the asset.

#### Fair Value Measurements (continued)

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs should be developed using the best information available under the circumstances, which might include the District's own data. The District should adjust that date if reasonably available information indicates that other market participants would use different data or certain circumstances specific to the District are not available to other market participants.

Uncategorized – Investments in the Orange County Treasury Investment Pool are not measured using the input levels above because the District's transactions are based on a stable net asset value per share. All contributions and redemptions are transacted at \$1.00 net asset value per share.

Payments on the General Obligation Bonds are made by the Bond Interest and Redemption Fund with local property tax revenues. Payments on the Certificates of Participation are made by the Debt Service Fund. Capital leases are paid by the General Fund. The compensated absences and OPEB will be paid by the fund for which the employee worked. The claims liability will be paid by the Internal Service Fund.

#### A. General Obligation Bonds

#### 1999 General Obligation Bonds, Series B

In February 2001, the Capistrano Unified School District issued both current and capital appreciation, 1999 General Obligation Bonds, Series B in the amount of \$29,999,930, with the value of the capital appreciation bonds accreting \$22,550,070, and an aggregate debt service balance of \$52,550,000. The bonds have a final maturity occurring on August 1, 2025, with interest rates ranging from 4.00 to 5.10 percent. The bonds were issued for the acquisition, construction, and repair of schools.

#### 2012 General Obligation Refunding Bonds

In December 2012, the Capistrano Unified School District issued the \$27,455,000 of 2012 General Obligation Refunding Bonds. The current interest bonds mature August 1, 2026, with interest yields of 3.00 to 4.00 percent. The bonds were issued at an aggregate price of \$31,177,966 (representing the principal amount of \$27,455,000 plus an original issue premium of \$3,722,966 less cost of issuance of \$336,695).

Proceeds from the bonds were to be used to advance refund the District's outstanding 1999 General Obligation Bonds, Series A, a portion of the District's outstanding 1999 General Obligation Bonds, Series B, the District's outstanding General Obligations Bonds, Series C, and pay costs associated with the issuance of the bonds. The prepayment for these refunding bonds occurred December 19, 2012.

#### **Prior-Year Defeasance of Debt**

In prior years, the District defeased certain general obligation bonds by placing the proceeds of new refunding bonds in an irrevocable trust to provide for all future debt service payments on the old bonds. Accordingly, the trust account assets and the liability for the defeased bonds are not included in the District's financial statements. At June 30, 2017, none of the defeased bonds remain outstanding.

#### **Prior-Year Defeasance of Debt (continued)**

The difference between the reacquisition price and the net carrying amount of the old debt is reported as a deferred outflow of resources and recognized as a component of interest expense in a systematic and rational manner over the remaining life of the old debt or the life of the new debt, whichever is shorter. At June 30, 2017, deferred amounts on refunding were \$428,359.

## **B.** Certificates of Participation

#### 2012 Refunding Certificates of Participation

In November 2012, the Capistrano Unified School District issued the \$19,635,000 of 2012 Refunding Certificates of Participation, pursuant to a lease agreement between the Corporation and the District. Under the agreement, the District will lease certain District property to the Corporation and will lease the property back from the Corporation. The current interest certificates have a final maturity occurring on August 1, 2025, with interest yields of 1.00 to 3.00 percent. The certificates were issued at an aggregate price of \$19,319,921 (representing the principal amount of \$19,635,000 plus an original issue premium of \$282,182 less cost of issuance of \$597,261).

Proceeds from the bonds were to be used to advance refund the District's outstanding 2002 Certificates of Participation and pay costs associated with the issuance of the certificates. The prepayment for the refunding occurred December 1, 2012.

At June 30, 2017, the principal balance outstanding on the 2012 Refunding Certificates of Participation was \$9,945,000.

#### **Prior-Year Defeasance of Debt**

In prior years, the District defeased certain certificates of participation by placing the proceeds of new refunding certificates in an irrevocable trust to provide for all future debt service payments on the old certificates. Accordingly, the trust account assets and the liability for the defeased certificates are not included in the District's financial statements. At June 30, 2017, none of the defeased certificates remain outstanding.

The difference between the reacquisition price and the net carrying amount of the old debt is reported as a deferred outflow of resources and recognized as a component of interest expense in a systematic and rational manner over the remaining life of the old debt or the life of the new debt, whichever is shorter. At June 30, 2017, deferred amounts on refunding were \$378,210.

#### D. Non-Obligatory Debt

Non-obligatory debt relates to debt issuances by the Community Facilities Districts as authorized by the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 as amended, and the Mark-Roos Local Bond Pooling Act of 1985, and are payable from special taxes levied on property within the Community Facilities Districts according to a methodology approved by the voters within the District. Neither the faith and credit nor taxing power of the District is pledged to the payment of the bonds. Reserves have been established from the bond proceeds to meet delinquencies should they occur. If delinquencies occur beyond the amounts held in those reserves, the District has no duty to pay the delinquency out of any available funds of the District. The District acts solely as an agent for those paying taxes levied and the bondholders, and may initiate foreclosure proceedings. Special assessment debt of \$239,108,863 as of June 30, 2017, does not represent debt of the District and, as such, does not appear in the accompanying basic financial statements.

#### **NOTE 8 - JOINT VENTURES**

The District is a member of ASCIP public entity risk pool, College and Career Advantage (CCA) and Orange County Special Education Legal Alliance (OCSELA) joint powers authorities (JPA's). Payments for the District's regional occupational program and special education legal services are paid to the JPA's. The District pays an annual premium to ASCIP for its property and liability and excess liability coverage. The relationships between the District, the pools, and the JPA's are such that they are not component units of the District for financial reporting purposes.

These entities have budgeting and financial reporting requirements independent of member units and their financial statements are not presented in these financial statements; however, fund transactions between the entities and the District are included in these statements. Audited financial statements are generally available from the respective entities.

During the year ended June 30, 2017, the District made payments of \$2,056,097, \$2,786,455, and \$4,723 to ASCIP, CCA, and OCSELA, respectively for purposes described above.

#### NOTE 9 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

#### A. State and Federal Allowances, Awards, and Grants

The District has received state and federal funds for specific purposes that are subject to review and audit by the grantor agencies. Although such audits could generate expenditure disallowances under terms of the grants, it is believed that any required reimbursement will not be material.

#### **B.** Construction Commitments

As of June 30, 2017, the District had commitments with respect to unfinished capital projects of approximately \$60.8 million.

#### C. Litigation

The District is involved in certain legal matters that arose out of the normal course of business. The District has not accrued a liability for any potential litigation against it because it does not meet the criteria to be considered a liability at June 30, 2017.

#### D. Penalty Waivers

At June 30, 2017, the District accrued a liability in the amount of \$1,094,064 to accrue a penalty for class size per Education Code Sections 41376(a), (c), and (d), relating to grades 1 through 3. On September 21, 2017, the District was notified that it was granted a waiver from the California Department of Education, and therefore, the liability will be removed from the District's financial statements and a restatement to the beginning fund balance will be recorded in 2017-18.

#### E. Land Acquisition

The District acquired real property for the future K-8 Esencia School valued at \$33,860,000. One half of the purchase price was paid by a CFD through the County of Orange. The other half of the purchase price was "forgiven" by the developer, but must be repaid by the District if it receives state construction funds for the project. No liability has been accrued for this contingency.

#### **NOTE 10 - RISK MANAGEMENT**

#### **Property and Liability**

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees and natural disasters. During fiscal year ending June 30, 2016, the District contracted with Alliance of Schools Cooperative Insurance Programs (ASCIP) for property and liability insurance coverage. Excess liability coverage is obtained through participation in Schools Excess Liability Fund (SELF) (through ASCIP). Settled claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage in any of the past three years. There has not been a significant reduction in coverage from the prior year. In addition, property and liability claims for which the District retains the risk of loss (claims below the District's retained limits), are administered by the Self- Insurance Fund.

#### **Workers' Compensation**

Beginning in 2009, the District has established a fund to self-insure itself for workers' compensation coverage. The workers' compensation experience of the District was calculated and applied to a premium rate, which was utilized to charge funds for the administration of the program. Excess liability coverage for workers' compensation claims is provided through the purchase of commercial insurance.

#### **Employee Medical Benefits**

The District has contracted with the Metropolitan Employee Benefit Association (MEBA), an employee/employer benefits trust to provide employee medical and surgical benefits. MEBA obtains benefit programs on behalf of the District through the purchase of commercial insurance. Rates are set through an annual calculation process. The District pays a monthly contribution, which is placed in a common fund from which claim payments are made for all participating districts.

#### **Claims Liabilities**

The District records an estimated liability for indemnity torts and other claims against the District. Claims liabilities are based on estimates of the ultimate cost of reported claims (including future claim adjustment expenses) and an estimate for claims incurred, but not reported based on historical experience.

# **Unpaid Claims Liabilities**

The District establishes a liability for both reported and unreported events, which includes estimates of both future payments of losses and related claim adjustment expenses. #### **NOTE 11 - PENSION PLANS**

Qualified employees are covered under multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans maintained by agencies of the State of California. Certificated employees are members of the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS), and classified employees are members of California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS).

#### A. General Information about the Pension Plans

#### **Plan Descriptions**

The District contributes to the California State Teachers' Retirement System (CalSTRS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system defined benefit pension plan administered by CalSTRS. Benefit provisions under the Plan are established by State statute and District resolution. CalSTRS issues publicly available reports that include a full description of the pension plan regarding benefit provisions, assumptions, and membership information that can be found on the CalSTRS website.

The District also contributes to the School Employer Pool under the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS), a cost-sharing multiple-employer public employee retirement system defined benefit pension plan administered by CalPERS. Benefit provisions under the Plan are established by State statute and District resolution. CalPERS issues publicly available reports that include a full description of the pension plan regarding benefit provisions, assumptions, and membership information that can be found on the CalPERS website.

#### **Benefits Provided**

CalSTRS provides retirement, disability, and death benefits. Retirement benefits are determined as 2% of final compensation for each year of credited service at age 60 for members under CalSTRS 2% at 60, or age 62 for members under CalSTRS 2% at 62, increasing to a maximum of 2.4% at age 63 for members under CalSTRS 2% at 60, or age 65 for members under CalSTRS 2% at 62. The normal retirement eligibility requirements are age 60 for members under CalSTRS 2% at 60, or age 62 for members under CalSTRS 2% at 62, with a minimum of five years of service credited under the Defined Benefit Program, which can include service purchased from teaching in an out-of-state or foreign public school. Employees are eligible for service-related disability benefits after five years of service, unless the member is disabled due to an unlawful act of bodily injury committed by another person while working in CalSTRS covered employment, in which case the minimum is one year. Disability benefits are equal to fifty percent of final compensation regardless of age and service credit. Designated recipients of CalSTRS retired members receive a \$6,163 lump-sum death payment. There is a 2% simple increase each September 1 following the first anniversary of the date on which the monthly benefit began to accrue. The annual 2% increase is applied to all continuing benefits other than Defined Benefit Supplement annuities. However, if the member retires with a Reduced Benefit Election, the increase does not begin to accrue until the member reaches age 60 and is not payable until the member receives the full benefit. This increase is also known as the improvement factor.

CalPERS also provides retirement, disability, and death benefits. Retirement benefits are determined as 1.1% of final compensation for each year of credited service at age 50 for members under 2% at 55, or 1.0% at age 52 for members under 2% at 62, increasing to a maximum of 2.5 percent at age 63 for members under 2% at 55, or age 67 for members under 2% at 62. To be eligible for service retirement, members must be at least age 50 and have a minimum of five years of CalPERS-credited service. Members joining on or after January 1, 2013 must be at least age 52. Disability retirement has no minimum age requirement and the disability does not have to be job related. However, members must have a minimum of five years of CalPERS service credit.

#### **NOTE 11 - PENSION PLANS (continued)**

#### A. General Information about the Pension Plans (continued)

#### **Benefits Provided (continued)**

Pre-retirement death benefits range from a simple return of member contributions plus interest to a monthly allowance equal to half of what the member would have received at retirement paid to a spouse or domestic partner. To be eligible for any type of monthly pre-retirement death benefit, a spouse or domestic partner must have been either married to the member or legally registered before the occurrence of the injury or the onset of the illness that resulted in death, or for at least one year prior to death. Cost-of-living adjustments are provided by law and are based on the Consumer Price Index for all United States cities. Cost-of-living adjustments are paid the second calendar year of the member's retirement on the May 1 check and then every year thereafter. The standard cost-of-living adjustment is a maximum of 2% per year.

#### **Contributions**

Active CalSTRS plan members under 2% at 60 were required to contribute 10.25% and plan members under 2% at 62 were required to contribute 9.205% of their salary in 2016-17. The required employer contribution rate for fiscal year 2016-17 was 12.58% of annual payroll. The contribution requirements of the plan members are established by State statute. Active CalPERS plan members are required to contribute 7.0% of their salary, and the District is required to contribute an actuarially determined rate. The actuarially determined rate is the estimated amount necessary to finance the costs of benefits earned by employees during the year, with an additional amount to finance any unfunded accrued liability. The required employer contribution for fiscal year 2016-17 was 13.888%. The contribution requirements of the plan members are established by State statute.

The District's net pension liability for each Plan is measured as the proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability of each of the Plans is measured as of June 30, 2016, and the total pension liability for each Plan used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2015, rolled forward to June 30, 2016, using standard update procedures. The District's proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the District's long-term share of contributions to the pension plans relative to the projected contributions of all participating employers, actuarially determined. CalSTRS uses custom mortality tables to best fit the patterns of mortality among its members. These custom tables are based on RP2000 series tables adjusted to fit CalSTRS experience. RP2000 series tables are an industry standard set of mortality rates published by the Society of Actuaries. See CalSTRS July 1, 2006 - June 30, 2010 Experience Analysis for more information. The underlying mortality assumptions and all other actuarial assumptions used in the CalPERS June 30, 2015, valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study for the period 1997 to 2011. Further details of the Experience Study can be found on the CalPERS website.

### **Discount Rate** - for CalSTRS

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.60%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from plan members and employers will be made at statutory contribution rates in accordance with the rate increase per Assembly Bill 1469. Projected inflows from investment earnings were calculated using the long-term assumed investment rate of return (7.60%) and assuming that contributions, benefit payments, and administrative expense occur midyear. Based on those assumptions, the STRP's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments to current plan members.

Therefore, the long-term assumed investment rate of return was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

#### **Discount Rate** – for CalPERS

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability for PERF B was 7.65%. A projection of expected benefit payments and contributions was performed to determine if the assets would run out. The test revealed the assets would not run out. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability for PERF B. The results of the crossover testing for the Plan are presented in a detailed report that can be obtained on CalPERS' website.

#### **Discount Rate** – for CalPERS (continued)

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class.

In determining the long-term expected rate of return, both short-term and long-term market return expectations as well as the expected pension fund cash flows were taken into account. Using historical returns of all of the funds' asset classes, expected compound (geometric) returns were calculated over the short term (first 10 years) and the long-term (11-60 years) using a building-block approach. Using the expected nominal returns for both short-term and long-term, the present value of benefits was calculated for each fund. The expected rate of return was set by calculating the single equivalent expected return that arrived at the same present value of benefits for cash flows as the one calculated using both short-term and long-term returns. The expected rate of return was then set equivalent to the single equivalent rate calculated above and rounded down to the nearest one quarter of one percent.

The long-term expected real rates of return by asset class can be found in CalPERS' Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016.

The table below reflects the long-term expected real rate of return by asset class. The rate of return was calculated using the capital market assumptions applied to determine the discount rate and asset allocation. These rates of return are net of administrative expenses.

At June 30, 2017, the District reported a payable of \$968,169 and \$0 for the outstanding amount of contributions to the CalSTRS and CalPERS pension plans, respectively, required for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017.

#### **NOTE 12 - OTHER POSTEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS**

#### **Plan Descriptions**

The Postemployment Benefits Plan (the Plan) is a single-employer defined benefit healthcare plan administered by the Capistrano Unified School District. The Plan provides medical and dental insurance benefits to eligible retirees and their spouses. Eligible retirees are those individuals who retired on or after attaining the age of 53 for classified retirees or 55 for certificated retirees and have at least 10 years of service with the District. Benefits will continue for these retirees until they reach the age of 65. Membership of the Plan consists of 284 retirees and beneficiaries currently receiving benefits, and 3,031 active Plan members.

#### **Contribution Information**

The contribution requirements of plan members and the District are established and may be amended by the District and the Capistrano Unified Education Association (CUEA), the local California Service Employees Association (CSEA), and unrepresented groups. The required contribution is based on projected pay-as-you-go financing requirements, with an additional amount to prefund benefits as determined annually through the agreements between the District, CUEA, CSEA and the unrepresented groups. For fiscal year 2016-17, the District contributed \$2,958,913 to the Plan, all of which was used for current premiums. The implicit rate subsidies accounted for an additional \$774,050 of contributions.

#### **Annual OPEB Cost and Net OPEB Obligation**

The District's annual OPEB cost is calculated based on the Annual Required Contribution (ARC), an amount actuarially determined in accordance with the parameters of GASB Statement 45. The ARC represents a level of funding that, if paid on an ongoing basis, is projected to cover normal cost each year and amortize any unfunded actuarial liabilities (or funding excess) over a period not to exceed thirty years.

#### **Funded Status and Funding Progress - OPEB Plans**

As of July 1, 2015, the most recent actuarial valuation date, the District did not have a funded plan. The actuarial accrued liability (AAL) for benefits was \$52.8 million and the unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) was \$52.8 million.

Actuarial valuations of an ongoing plan involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality, and the healthcare cost trend. Actuarially determined amounts are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The schedules of funding progress present multiyear trend information about whether the actuarial values of plan assets are increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liabilities for benefits.

#### **Actuarial Methods and Assumptions**

Projections of benefits for financial reporting purposes are based on the substantive plan (the plan as understood by the employer and plan members) and include the types of benefits provided at the time of each valuation and the historical pattern of sharing of benefit costs between the employer and plan members to that point. The actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designated to reduce the effects of short-term volatility in actuarial accrued liabilities and the actuarial value of assets, consistent with the long-term perspective of the calculations.

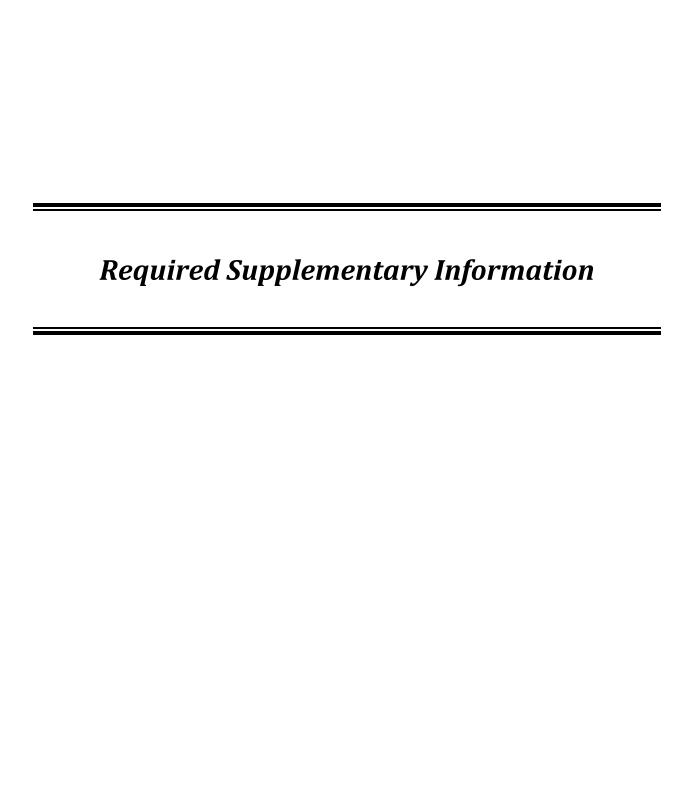

The District operates 33 elementary schools, 10 middle schools, 2 grades K-8 schools, 6 comprehensive high schools, 5 charter schools, and 8 alternative schools/programs. The General Fund balance has increased by \$43.5 million over the past two years. The fiscal year 2017-18 adopted budget projects a decrease of \$15.9 million. For a district of this size, the state recommends available reserves of at least 2% of total general fund expenditures, transfers out, and other uses (total outgo).

The District has incurred an operating deficit in only one of the past three years, but anticipates incurring an operating deficit during the 2017-18 fiscal year. Long-term debt has increased by \$140.2 million over the past two years.

Average daily attendance has decreased by 1,556 over the past two years. An additional decrease of 712 ADA is anticipated during fiscal year 2017-18.

#### Finding 2017-001: Accrued Vacation (60000)

**Criteria:** CSEA unit members may accrue and carry a maximum of 20 days of vacation at a time. Employees covered by the CSEA agreement who have reached the maximum accrual may request permission for excess accrual. Such request shall be in writing to the immediate supervisor. The immediate supervisor shall make a recommendation and forward such request to the District Office. Final decision shall be made by the Superintendent or designee. If for any reason an employee is not permitted to take all or any part of his/her annual vacation, the amount not taken shall be paid for.

**Condition:** There are numerous CSEA bargaining unit members carrying vacation balances at June 30, 2017, well in excess of the maximum carryover allowed per the agreement. As a result, the District's liability for accrued vacation continues to grow unchecked.

**Cause:** The requirement to request written permission for excess vacation balances has not been followed or enforced.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the District start implementing the requirement to request written permission for excess vacation balances.

**Views of Responsible Officials:** The District will discuss the implications of this finding with the bargaining unit and implement measures to follow the current agreement.

#### Finding 2017-002: CALPADS Unduplicated Pupil Count (40000)

**Criteria:** Supplemental and concentration grant amounts are calculated based on the percentage of "unduplicated pupils" enrolled in the LEA on Census Day (first Wednesday in October). The percentage equals:

- Unduplicated count of pupils who (1) are English learners, (2) meet income or categorical eligibility requirements for free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch Program, or (3) are foster youth. "Unduplicated count" means that each pupil is counted only once even if the pupil meets more than one of these criteria (*EC* sections 2574(b)(2) and 42238.02(b)(1)).
- Divided by total enrollment in the LEA (*EC* sections 2574(b)(1) and 42238.02(b)(5)). All pupil counts are based on Fall 1 certified enrollment reported in the CALPADS as of Census Day.

**Condition:** During our testing of the English Learners (EL) students reported in the CALPADS 1.17 and 1.18 reports, we noted one student who was classified as EL but did not have evidence to support the designation.

**Context:** We noted one EL exception in our sample of 10 schools. This appears to be an isolated incident.

**Cause:** We recognize that the District makes every attempt to comply with regulations; however, this error appears to be an isolated instance of human oversight.

**Questioned Cost:** \$255. This amount was calculated using the CDE audit penalty calculator.

**Effect:** The unduplicated pupil counts in the CALPADS 1.17 and 1.18 reports should be adjusted for the following changes:

Total enrollment of 48,256 was not adjusted based on the results of our procedures.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the District implement a procedure to review the CALPADS information prior to the reports submission to the California Department of Education.

**Views of Responsible Officials:** The District diligently checks all CALPADS data but will be extra vigilant about classification of unduplicated students. As noted, this was an isolated incident and was an oversight.

#### Finding 2017-003: School Accountability Report Card (72000)

**Criteria:** In accordance with Education Code §33126, the school is to provide an accountability report card to include safety, cleanliness, and adequacy of school facilities, to include any needed maintenance to ensure good repair. The condition reported should be supported by the school's Facilities Inspection Tool (FIT), School Facilities Condition Evaluation as required by Ed Code §17002. In addition, according to Education Code §35256, the governing board must publish the School Accountability Report Card (SARC) for each school by February 1st of each year.

**Condition:** It was noted that the School Facility Repair Status on the SARC for Serra High School did not match the corresponding FIT Form. It was also noted that the District was not able to provide a corresponding FIT Form for California Preparatory Academy.

**Questioned Cost:** None

**Context:** The error was noted on two of 13 schools tested.

**Cause:** The SARC reported the Repair Status for the structural system as "Fair" while the FIT noted a "Good" Repair Status. The District was not able to provide a corresponding FIT Form for California Preparatory Academy.

**Effect:** Without proper compliance, the public will be misinformed on the status of the school's facilities.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that an employee verify the information presented in the SARC. This information is essential to present the image of the school fairly to the public. In addition, the SARCs should be published on an annual basis by February 1st.

**Views of Responsible Officials:** The District has implemented measures to verify the consistency of data between the SARC and the FIT report and to ensure no sites are missed in the FIT inspection.

In planning and performing our audit of the basic financial statements of Capistrano Unified School District for the year ending June 30, 2017, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the basic financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

However, during our audit we noted matters that are an opportunity for strengthening internal controls and operating efficiency. The following items represent conditions noted by our audit that we consider important enough to bring to your attention. This letter does not affect our report dated December 7, 2017 on the financial statements of Capistrano Unified School District.

#### ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY (ASB) FUNDS

**Observation:** During our review of the ASB financial statements at **Aliso Niguel High**, we noted that the ASB currently has trust accounts established for graduating classes that are no longer active.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the ASB adopt a policy to close out the trust accounts and transfer any remaining balances to the general ASB trust account.

**Observation:** During our testing at **Aliso Niguel High, San Juan Hills High**, and **Bernice Ayer Middle**, we noted that bank reconciliations are not being prepared timely. Reconciliations were completed as late as two months after statements were received. Timely and accurate bank reconciliations are prudent and necessary to ensure that the accounting records match the amounts held on deposit.

**Recommendation:** We recommend the bookkeeper perform monthly bank reconciliations within two weeks after the statement arrives.

**Observation:** In our testing of cash receipts, we found deposits that lacked sufficient supporting documentation. This occurred at the following sites:

**Observation (continued):** Without supporting documentation, we could not verify whether all cash collected had been deposited intact and into the correct ASB account. Sound internal controls for handling cash discourage theft of ASB funds and protect those who handle the cash. It is important to tie all proceeds to the specific fundraiser from which they were generated and to ensure that all proceeds from an event are turned in and properly accounted for.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that before any events are held, control procedures should be established that will allow for the reconciliation between money collected and fundraiser sales.

**Observation:** During our testing of cash disbursements at most of the school sites, we noted that disbursements lacked evidence of receipt of goods or services.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the site document a physical receipt of the goods or services on the corresponding invoice, packing slip, or other documentation, such as writing "ok to pay" or "received" and initialing the document prior to issuing the check for payment. This ensures that payment is not being made for items received incorrectly or not received at all.

**Observation:** During our testing of cash disbursements, our samples included expenditures that appear to be an unallowable or questionable disbursement, such as gift card purchases and staff lunches. This occurred at the following sites:

Such items are usually not allowable because they are either considered a gift of public funds, a District expense, or personal expenses of employees. ASB funds are considered public funds because they are raised through the District's tax identification number and receive the benefit of nontaxable status. Anything that is purchased must be for goods and services that promote the students' general welfare, morale, and educational experiences.

## ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY (ASB) FUNDS (continued)

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the sites discontinue issuing such payments from ASB funds.

**Observation:** During our testing of cash disbursements, we noted instances in which purchased items were shipped directly to the purchaser's home address rather to the school site. This occurred at the following sites:

- Ladera Ranch Middle
- Las Flores Middle
- Newhart Middle
- San Clemente High
- San Juan Hills High
- Tesoro High
- Vista Del Mar Middle

Allowing items to be shipped directly to the purchaser allows the possibility for fraudulent transactions to occur and go undetected. All goods or services purchased with ASB funds should be received by an individual other than the original purchaser and signed off.

**Recommendation:** We recommend that the sites require purchased items to be shipped directly to the sites to be signed off by someone other than the original purchaser.

#### **CAFETERIA FUNDS**

**Observation:** At June 30, 2017, fund balance in the Cafeteria Fund was \$4,701,035, which exceeds the average of three months expenditures by \$1,349,315. The District had an excessive yearly fund balance in the food service account because of increasing revenues and transfers over expenditures. The District has created a multi-year spending plan to get into compliance. The school food authority should limit its net cash resources to an amount that does not exceed three months average expenditures in accordance with 7 CFR Section 210.14(b).

**Recommendation:** We recommend the District continue following the spending plan submitted to the CDE.

We will review the status of the current year comments during our next audit engagement.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

#### **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Capistrano Unified School District (the District), Capital Project Fund for Blended Component Units Specific to the Community Facilities Districts (CFDs) No. 87-1, 90-2, 92-1, 98-1A, 98-2, 2004-1, and 2005-1, the related fiduciary funds, and the related notes to the financial statements, as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017, as listed in the table of contents.

#### **Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements**

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### **Auditors' Responsibility**

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### **Opinion**

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Capital Projects Fund for Blended Component Units and the related fiduciary funds of the Capistrano Unified School District, as of June 30, 2017, and the respective changes in financial position for the fiscal year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

#### **Emphasis of Matter**

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements present only the Capital Projects Fund for Blended Component Units and the related fiduciary funds and do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of the Capistrano Unified School District, as of June 30, 2017, or the changes in its financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

#### **Other Matters**

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Capistrano Unified School District's Capital Project Fund for Blended Component Units and the related fiduciary funds. The combining statements and other supplementary information listed on the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The supplementary information is the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the Capital Project Fund for Blended Component Units and the related fiduciary funds, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the accompanying supplementary information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

#### Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated January 9, 2018 on our consideration of the District's Capital Projects Fund for Blended Component Units and the related fiduciary funds internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's Capital Projects Fund for Blended Component Units and the related fiduciary funds internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

### **NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

### A. Reporting Entity

The financial statements include the Capital Project Fund for Blended Component Units and the related Fiduciary Funds specific to the Community Facilities Districts No. 87-1, 90-2, 92-1, 98-1A, 98-2, 2004-1 and 2005-1 of the Capistrano Unified School District used to account for capital projects financed by Mello-Roos Community Facilities Districts and the receipt of special taxes for payment of debt required for the CFDs. These financial statements are not intended to present fairly the financial position and results of operations of the Capistrano Unified School District in compliance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

### **B.** Accounting Policies

The financial statements of the Community Facilities Districts No. 87-1, 90-2, 92-1, 98-1A, 98-2, 2004-1, and 2005-1 (CFDs) of Capistrano Unified School District (the District) have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles applicable to governmental units which are generally accepted in the United States of America. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles.

### C. Basis of Accounting

The CFDs capital projects activity is accounted for using a flow of current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. With this measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities generally are included on the balance sheet. The statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balance reports on the sources (revenues and other financing sources) and uses (expenditures and other financing uses) of current financial resources.

Fiduciary funds accounted for the CFD's receipt of special taxes for payment of debt using the flow of economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting.

### D. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

### E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting is used in all budgeted funds to reserve portions of applicable appropriations for which commitments have been made. Encumbrances are recorded for purchase orders, contracts, and other commitments when they are written. Encumbrances are liquidated when the commitments are paid. All encumbrances are liquidated as of June 30.

### **NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)**

### F. Fund Balances

The fund balance for governmental funds is reported in classifications based on the extent to which the government is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent.

**Nonspendable:** Fund balance is reported as nonspendable when the resources cannot be spent because they are either in a nonspendable form or legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. Resources in nonspendable form include inventories and prepaid assets.

**Restricted:** Fund balance is reported as restricted when the constraints placed on the use of resources are either externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or imposed by law through constitutional provision or by enabling legislation.

**Committed:** The District's highest decision-making level of authority rests with the District's Board. Fund balance is reported as committed when the Board passes a resolution that places specified constraints on how resources may be used. The Board can modify or rescind a commitment of resources through passage of a new resolution.

**Assigned:** Resources that are constrained by the District's intent to use them for a specific purpose, but are neither restricted nor committed, are reported as assigned fund balance. Intent may be expressed by either the Board, committees (such as budget or finance), or officials to which the Board has delegated authority.

**Unassigned:** Unassigned fund balance represents fund balance that has not been restricted, committed, or assigned and may be utilized by the District for any purpose. When expenditures are incurred, and both restricted and unrestricted resources are available, it is the District's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources in the order of committed, assigned, and then unassigned, as they are needed.

### **G.** Spending Order Policy

When an expenditure is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available, the District considers restricted funds to have been spent first. When an expenditure is incurred for which committed, assigned, or unassigned fund balances are available, the District considers amounts to have been spent first out of committed funds, then assigned funds, and finally unassigned funds, as needed, unless the governing board has provided otherwise in its commitment or assignment actions.

### **H.** New GASB Pronouncements

During the 2016-17 fiscal year, the following GASB Pronouncements became effective:

### 1. Statement No. 73, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets That Are Not Within the Scope of GASB Statement 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68 (Issued 06/15)

The requirements of this Statement extend the approach to accounting and financial reporting established in Statement 68 to all pensions, with modifications as necessary to reflect that for accounting and financial reporting purposes, any assets accumulated for pensions that are provided through pension plans that are not administered through trusts that meet the criteria specified in Statement 68 should not be considered pension plan assets. It also requires that information similar to that required by Statement 68 be included in notes to financial statements and required supplementary information by all similarly situated employers and nonemployer contributing entities.

### 2. Statement No. 74, Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans (Issued 06/15)

This Statement replaces Statements No. 43, Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans, as amended, and No. 57, OPEB Measurements by Agent Employers and Agent Multiple-Employer Plans. Statement No. 75, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions, establishes new accounting and financial reporting requirements for governments whose employees are provided with OPEB, as well as for certain nonemployer governments that have a legal obligation to provide financial support for OPEB provided to the employees of other entities. The scope of this Statement includes OPEB plans – defined benefit and defined contribution – administered through trusts that meet the following criteria:

- Contributions from employers and nonemployer contributing entities to the OPEB plan and earnings on those contributions are irrevocable.
- OPEB plan assets are dedicated to providing OPEB to plan members in accordance with the benefit terms.
- OPEB plan assets are legally protected from the creditors of employers, nonemployer contributing entities, and the OPEB plan administrator. If the plan is a defined benefit OPEB plan, plan assets also are legally protected from creditors of the plan members.

### 3. Statement No. 77, Tax Abatement Disclosures (Issued 08/15)

For financial reporting purposes, this Statement defines a tax abatement as resulting from an agreement between a government and an individual or entity in which the government promises to forgo tax revenues and the individual or entity promises to subsequently take a specific action that contributes to economic development or otherwise benefits the government or its citizens. This Statement requires disclosure of tax abatement information about (1) a reporting government's own tax abatement agreements, and (2) those that are entered into by other governments and that reduce the reporting government's tax revenues.

### 4. Statement No. 78, Pensions Provided Through Certain Multiple-Employer Defined Benefit Pension Plans (Issued 12/15)

This Statement amends the scope and applicability of Statement 68 to exclude pensions provided to employees of state or local governmental employers through a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that (1) is not a state or local governmental pension plan, (2) is used to provide defined benefit pensions both to employees of state or local governmental employers and to employees of employers that are not state or local governmental employers, and (3) has no predominant state or local governmental employer (either individually or collectively with other state or local governmental employers that provide pensions through the pension plan).

### 5. Statement No. 80, Blending Requirements for Certain Component Units – An Amendment of GASB Statement No. 14 (Issued 01/16)

This Statement amends the blending requirements for the financial statement presentation of component units of all state and local governments. The additional criterion requires blending of a component unit incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation in which the primary government is the sole corporate member.

### 6. Statement No. 82, Pension Issues – An Amendment of GASB Statements No. 67, No. 68, and No. 73 (Issued 03/16)

The objective of this Statement is to address certain issues that have been raised with respect to Statements No. 67, Financial Reporting for Pension Plans, No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, and No. 73, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets That Are Not within the Scope of GASB Statement 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68. Specifically, this Statement addresses issues regarding (1) the presentation of payroll-related measures in required supplementary information, (2) the selection of assumptions and the treatment of deviations from the guidance in an Actuarial Standard of Practice for financial reporting purposes, and (3) the classification of payments made by employers to satisfy employee (plan member) contribution requirements.

### **Investments - Interest Rate Risk**

The District's investment policy limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. The District's investment policy limits investment purchases to investments with a term not to exceed three years. Investments purchased with maturity terms greater than three years require approval by the Board of Trustees. Investments purchased with maturities greater than one year require written approval by the Superintendent prior to commitment. Maturities of investments held at June 30, 2017, consist of the following:

### **Investments - Credit Risk**

The District's investment policy limits investment choices to obligations of local, state and federal agencies, commercial paper, certificates of deposit, repurchase agreements, corporate notes, banker acceptances, and other securities allowed by State Government Code Section 53600. At June 30, 2017, all investments represented governmental securities which were issued, registered and held by the District's agent in the District's name.

### **Investments - Concentration of Credit Risk**

The District does not place limits on the amount it may invest in any one issuer. At June 30, 2017, the District had the following investments that represents more than five percent of the District's net investments.

### **Fair Value Measurements**

The District categorizes the fair value measurements of its investments based on the hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The fair value hierarchy, which has three levels, is based on the valuation inputs used to measure an asset's fair value. The following provides a summary of the hierarchy used to measure fair value:

Level 1 – Quoted prices in active markets for identical assets that the District has the ability to access at the measurement date. Level 1 assets may include debt and equity securities that are traded in an active exchange market and that are highly liquid and are actively traded in over-the-counter markets.

Level 2 – Observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable, such as interest rates and curves observable at commonly quoted intervals, implied volatilities, and credit spreads. For financial reporting purposes, if an asset has a specified term, a Level 2 input is required to be observable for substantially the full term of the asset.

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs should be developed using the best information available under the circumstances, which might include the District's own data. The District should adjust that date if reasonably available information indicates that other market participants would use different data or certain circumstances specific to the District are not available to other market participants.

### **NOTE 4 - NON-OBLIGATORY DEBT**

Non-obligatory debt relates to debt issuances by the Community Facilities Districts as authorized by the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 as amended, and the Marks-Roos Local Bond Pooling Act of 1985, and are payable from special taxes levied on property within the Community Facilities Districts according to a methodology approved by the voters within the District. Neither the faith and credit nor taxing power of the District is pledged to the payment of the bonds. Reserves have been established from the bond proceeds to meet delinquencies should they occur. If delinquencies occur beyond the amounts held in those reserves, the District has no duty to pay the delinquency out of any available funds of the District.

### **NOTE 4 - NON-OBLIGATORY DEBT (continued)**

The District acts solely as an agent for those paying taxes levied and the bondholders, and may initiate foreclosure proceedings. Special assessment debt of \$217,818,863 as of June 30, 2017, does not represent debt of the District and, as such, does not appear in the accompanying basic financial statements.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

Governing Board Capistrano Unified School District San Juan Capistrano, California

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the Capistrano Unified School District (the District) Capital Projects Fund for Blended Component Units and the related fiduciary funds as of and for the year ending June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated January 9, 2018.

### **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Capistrano Unified School District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Capistrano Unified School District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Capistrano Unified School District's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the District's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

### **Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Capistrano Unified School District's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

### **Purpose of this Report**

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

We were engaged to conduct a performance audit of the Community Facilities Districts (CFDs) No. 87-1, 90-2, 92-1, 98-1A, 98-2, 2004-1, and 2005-1 of Capistrano Unified School District for the year ended June 30, 2017.

We conducted this performance audit in accordance with the standards applicable to performance audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our conclusion based on our audit objectives. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our conclusions based on our audit objectives.

Our audit was limited to the objectives listed within the report which includes determining the District's compliance with the permitted uses as authorized by CFD voters. Management is responsible for the District's compliance with those requirements.

In planning and performing our performance audit, we obtained an understanding of the District's internal control in order to determine if the internal controls were adequate to help ensure the District's compliance with the permitted uses as authorized by CFD voters. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.

The results of our tests indicated that the District expended Community Facilities Districts No. 87-1, 90-2, 92-1, 98-1A, 98-2, 2004-1, and 2005-1 funds only on authorized projects as approved by the voters of the community facilities districts.

### **AUTHORITY FOR ISSUANCE**

The bonds are issued pursuant to the Melo-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, Section 53311 et seq. of the California Government Code. The laws were enacted by the State Legislature to provide an alternative method of financing certain public capital facilities and services. Only established by the legislative board of a local agency, a community facilities district is a legally constituted governmental entity with defined boundaries, with the governing board or legislative body of the local agency acting on its behalf. Subject to approval by a two thirds vote of qualified electors and compliance with the provisions of the laws, a legislative body of a local agency may issue bonds for a community facilities district and may levy and collect a special tax within such district to repay such indebtedness.

### **PURPOSE OF ISSUANCE**

The CFDs may use its special taxes proportionally on the school facilities, including modernization and rehabilitation that serve the project students, including the facilities and central support and administrative facilities, interim housing, transportation and lease payments for financings.

### **OBJECTIVES OF THE AUDIT**

1. Determine whether expenditures charged to the CFDs have been made only on authorized projects as approved by the voters of the Community Facilities Districts.

### **SCOPE OF THE AUDIT**

The scope of our performance audit covered the period of July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017. The population of expenditures tested included all object and project codes associated with the CFD projects. The propriety of expenditures for capital projects and maintenance projects funded through other State or local funding sources, other than CFD bond proceeds, were not included within the scope of the audit. Expenditures incurred subsequent to June 30, 2017, were not reviewed or included within the scope of our audit or in this report.

For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2017 Performance Audit

### PROCEDURES PERFORMED

We obtained the general ledger and the project expenditure reports prepared by the District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017, for the Community Facilities Districts No. 87-1, 90-2, 92-1, 98-1A, 98-2, 2004-1, and 2005-1 of Capistrano Unified School District. Within the fiscal year audited, we obtained the actual invoices and other supporting documentation for a sample of expenditures to ensure compliance with the permitted uses as authorized by CFD voters. We performed the following procedures:

- 1. We selected from each CFD a sample of expenditures for the period starting July 1, 2016, and ending June 30, 2017, and reviewed supporting documentation to ensure that such funds were properly expended on the authorized projects.
- 2. Our sample included 34 transactions totaling \$11,260,963. This represents 79.7 percent of the total expenditures of \$14,120,622 (not including funds expended for debt service activities from Agency Funds).
- 3. Based on our testing, we verified that funds from the Community Facilities Districts No. 87-1, 90-2, 92-1, 98-1A, 98-2, 2004-1, and 2005-1 of Capistrano Unified School District were expended on the school facilities, including modernization and rehabilitation that serve the project students, including the facilities and central support and administrative facilities, interim housing, transportation and lease payments for financings.

### CONCLUSION

The results of our tests indicated that, in all significant respects, the Capistrano Unified School District has properly accounted for the expenditures held in the Community Facilities Districts No. 87-1, 90-2, 92-1, 98-1A, 98-2, 2004-1, and 2005-1 and that such expenditures were made for authorized voter approved projects.

### **HISTORY**

Following the implementation of energy efficiency projects, District staff began consideration of solar energy generation projects. ARC Alternatives, an independent energy advisor, prepared a feasibility study considering solar installation at the six comprehensive high schools plus the District office.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

On July 26, 2017, the Board of Trustees received an information presentation from ARC Alternatives on the results of the solar feasibility study. On October 11, 2017, the Board of Trustees received an information presentation from Government Financial Strategies, the District's financial advisor, on Clean Renewable Energy Bonds and the process to provide financing for the projects. On November 9, 2017, the Board of Trustees received an information presentation from ARC Alternatives on the status of the Request for Proposals (RFP) to solar vendors and preliminary results. On December 6, 2017, the Board of Trustees received an information presentation from ARC Alternatives on final RFP results, and the Board approved a resolution awarding an energy service contract to REC Solar.

### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Government Financial Strategies will present information on the results of the Clean Renewable Energy Bonds to finance the solar energy projects, along with an updated savings analysis.

### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

It is estimated the District will achieve savings in the general fund from the reduction in energy cost.

### **DATA**

The District was awarded an allocation of Clean Renewable Energy Bonds by the US Department of the Treasury on August 15, 2017 in the amount of \$23.87 million for the seven project sites.

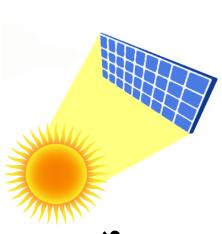

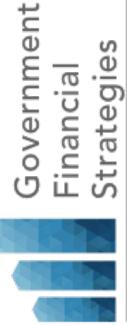

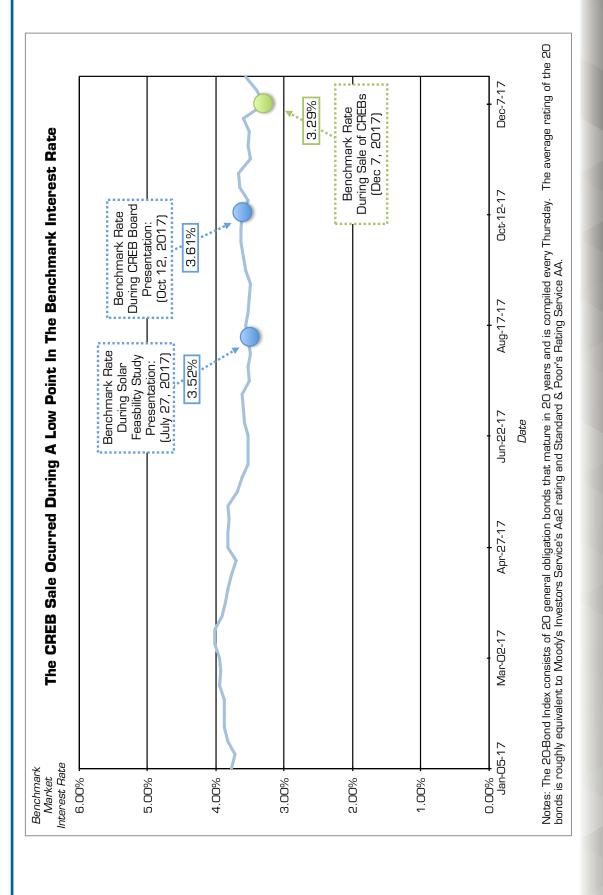

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# Market Benchmark Interest Rate



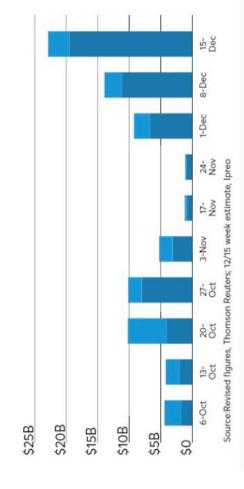
## Market Flooded with Bonds

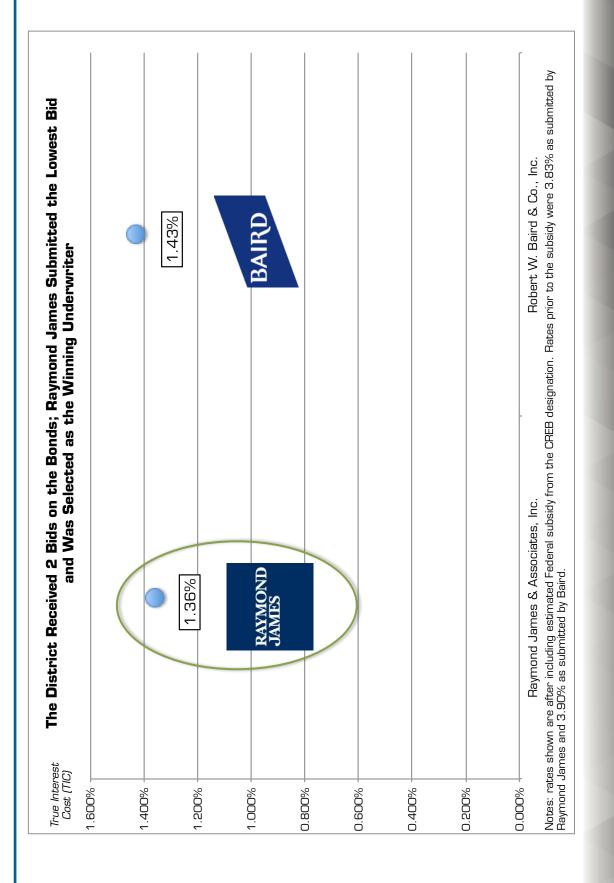

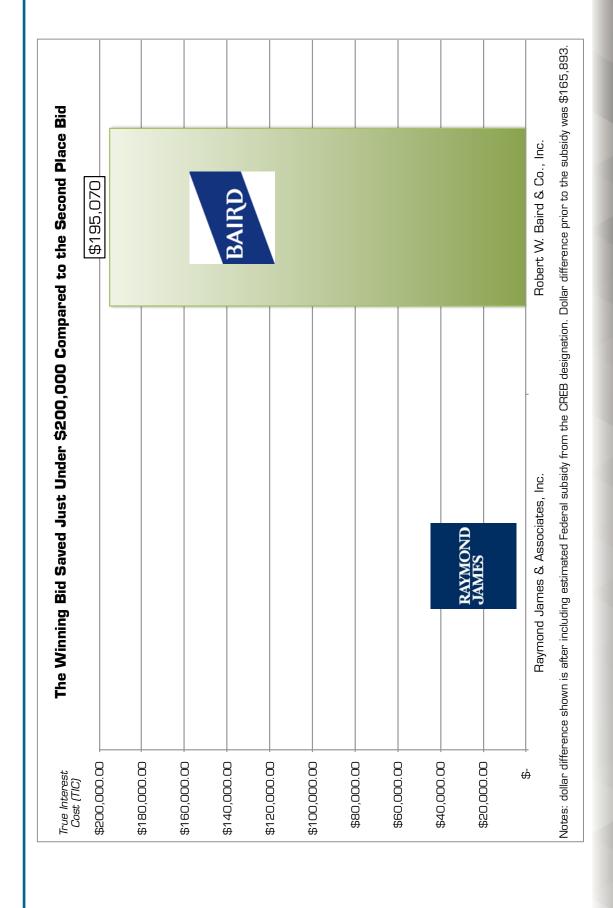

Sparked by a student initiative, the Capistrano Unified School District has agreed to convert six high schools and the district's education center to solar power.

A coalition of high school students broke into applause at a Dec. 6 school board meeting when trustees voted unanimously to award an \$18 million contract to REC Solar Commercial Corporation to do the work.

The project, funded with help from a subsidized Clean Renewable Energy Bonds program, figures to save the school district some \$849,000 in energy costs annually over the 26-year bond repayment period – or more than \$21 million after anticipated expenses, frustees were

The financial benefits could be significantly higher, district spokesman Ryan Burris said, because the bonds to finance the work were sold at lower interest than anticipated.

## **HISTORY**

The District recently identified a discrepancy in recorded public records relative to certain real property owned by the District adjacent to Tesoro High School, identified as Orange County Assessor Parcel No. 125-096-82 (Parcel 82). Specifically, the District identified that:

- 1. On or about March 31, 1997, San Juan Partnership No. I transferred Parcel 82 to the District, evidenced by grant deed recorded as Orange County Recorder Instrument No. 19970143928 (CUSD Deed); and
- 2. On or about October 29, 2004, DMB San Juan Investment North, LLC (a successor-in-interest to San Juan Partnership No. I) transferred and assigned to RMV Middle Chiquita, LLC, certain real property, including Parcel 82, in a grant deed recorded as Orange County Recorder Instrument No. 2004000978175 (RMV Deed). Specifically, the RMV Deed included all that real property described in Certificate of Compliance No. CC-2001-01, recorded July 26, 2001, as Orange County Recorder Instrument No. 20010508635 (Certificate of Compliance), which included Parcel 82 within an area described as Parcel 4 therein.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Based on the review, the District concluded it owned Parcel 82, as it acquired the property in 1997, before DMB San Juan Investment North, LLC attempted to transfer the same to RMV Middle Chiquita LLC. As DMB San Juan Investment North, LLC could not transfer property it did not own, Parcel 82 was not transferred to RMV Middle Chiquita, LLC. The District met with Rancho Mission Viejo (RMV), which concurred with the District's assessment, and identified an error made in the 2001 Certificate of Compliance (one that had already been rectified in future certificates of compliance).

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

RMV and the District have prepared a Quitclaim deed, which would transfer any and all interest and claim RMV had in Parcel 82, if any, to the District. While the District has always owned

Parcel 82, this Quitclaim Deed would formerly correct the title record, as the Orange County Recorder's Office reflects title to Parcel 82 to be in the name of RMV Middle Chiquita, LLC.

## **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

There are no financial implications.

WHEREAS, on or about October 29, 2004, DMB San Juan Investment North, LLC (a successor-in-interest to San Juan Partnership No. I) transferred and assigned to RMV Middle Chiquita, LLC (RMV), certain real property, inadvertently and erroneously including Parcel -82, as set forth in Orange County Recorder Instrument No. 2004000978175 (RMV Transfer), based on Certificate of Compliance No. CC-2001-01, recorded July 26, 2001, as Orange County Recorder Instrument No. 20010508635 (Certificate of Compliance); and

WHEREAS, the District owned Parcel -82 at the time of the RMV Transfer, such that ownership of Parcel -82 could not, and was not, legally transferred to RMV;

WHEREAS, as a result of the RMV Transfer, and the mistaken inclusion of Parcel -82, record title reflects RMV as the owner of the parcel, rather than the District;

WHEREAS, the District and RMV have agreed that the RMV Transfer, as it related to Parcel -82, was in error, and that the District is the true and correct owner of Parcel -82;

WHEREAS, RMV has agreed to execute a quitclaim deed to the District for Parcel -82, which would have the effect of transferring any legal right and claim RMV might have in Parcel -82, if any, to the District, and otherwise clarify and clear up title as to Parcel -82 to reflect the District as the true and correct owner of the property. A copy of the proposed quitclaim deed is attached hereto as Exhibit B (Quitclaim Deed).

Board Item: Governor's January Budget Proposal for Fiscal Year 2018-2019

## **HISTORY**

Each year on January 10, the Governor provides a proposed budget for the following fiscal year. This budget proposal provides a starting point for negotiations in the Legislature. The next step in the budget process is the May revise followed by the final budget adoption in June.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

On January 17, 2018, staff attended a School Services of California presentation on the proposed budget. These budget assumptions will be incorporated into the District's second interim report and subsequently updated after the May revise and upon adoption of the final State budget.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

This is Governor Brown's final year in office and with the extra \$4.7 billion in higher revenue available to him he has chosen to complete the process he began five years ago with implementation of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). The original intention was for the LCFF to be fully implemented in 2020-2021, but State revenues have been sufficient to fully implement two years earlier.

Along with full implementation of the LCFF, increases to the cost of living adjustment (COLA) will increase revenues in future years when compared to prior estimates and this will provide increased ongoing revenues. As in prior budgets, the Governor has also proposed to give schools additional one-time revenues which will be approximately \$295 per average daily attendance (ADA).

## **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

A comprehensive analysis of the financial implications of the Governor's budget will be presented to the Board at the March 14, 2018 Board meeting in the second interim report.

## **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended the Board President recognize Clark Hampton, Deputy Superintendent, Business and Support Services, to give a brief presentation of the Governor's 2018-2019 proposed budget.

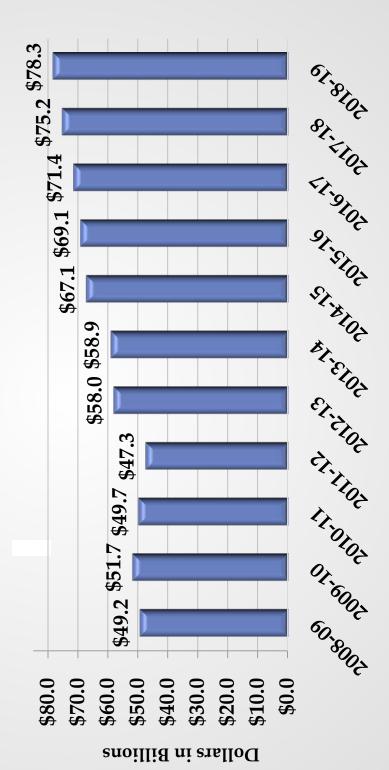

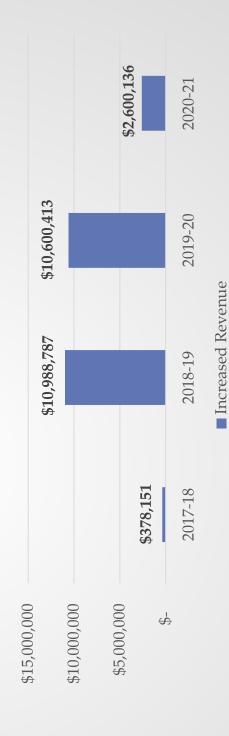
## CUSD Projection

**CALIFORNIA:** 

This item was placed on the agenda at the request of Trustee McNicholas and Trustee Jones for the Board's review and consideration.

## **HISTORY**

The Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) was enacted in 2013-14 and replaced the previous kindergarten through grade 12 (K-12) finance system. For school districts and charter schools, the LCFF establishes base, supplemental, and concentration grants in place of the myriad of previously existing K-12 funding streams, including revenue limits, general purpose block grants, and most of the 50-plus state categorical programs that existed at the time.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The modest revenue increases since the implementation of Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) have been eroded by rapidly increasing costs associated with unfunded mandates, employee health insurance, pensions, transportation, and utilities.

California has consistently underfunded public education while widening its scope, adding new requirements and raising standards without providing appropriate resources to prepare all students for college, career and civic life.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

The proposed Resolution urges the State Legislature to pass legislation requiring the State to:

- Provide funds for every new K-12 compliance measure that becomes law;
- Provide funds to ease the unfair financial burden brought about by CalPERS and CalSTRS;
- Fund California public schools at the national average or higher by the year 2020, and at a level equal to or above the average of the top 10 states nationally by 2025, and maintain, at a minimum, this level of funding otherwise decreed.

It is recommended the Board recognize President McNicholas and Trustee Jones to present this item.

WHEREAS, Despite California's leadership in the global economy, the state falls in the nation's bottom quintile on nearly every measure of public K-12 school funding and school staffing; and

WHEREAS, K-12 public school funding has not substantially increased, on an inflation-adjusted basis, for more than a decade; and

WHEREAS, K-12 districts and employees are now bearing the entire financial burden of poor pension financing decisions, decisions in which our districts and employees were never involved and which take funds away from the classroom; and

WHEREAS, Unfunded public K-12 mandates increase every year, and compliance expenses increasingly take funds away from the classroom; and

WHEREAS, The modest revenue increases since the implementation of Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) have been eroded by rapidly increasing costs associated with unfunded mandates, employee health insurance, pensions, transportation, and utilities; and

WHEREAS, California trails the average of the top 10 states by almost \$7,000 in per-pupil funding, while our compliance and pension burdens are significantly greater than those of many other states; and

WHEREAS, Despite its vast wealth and need for a well-educated workforce, California has consistently underfunded public education while widening its scope, adding new requirements and raising standards without providing appropriate resources to prepare all students for college, career and civic life; and

WHEREAS, If California is to close opportunity and achievement gaps and create a public school system that offers consistently high levels of education, the State must cease making expensive demands on its schools and provide school districts with the resources to meet the needs of their specific populations.

*NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED*, that the governing board of the 8<sup>th</sup> largest school district in California, the Capistrano Unified School District, urges the State Legislature to pass legislation requiring that the State provide funds for every new K-12 compliance measure that becomes law.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the governing board of the Capistrano Unified School District urges the State Legislature to provide funds to ease the unfair financial burden brought about by

CalPERS and CalSTRS underfunding by the State itself.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the governing board of the Capistrano Unified School District urges the State Legislature to fund California public schools at the national average or higher by the year 2020, and at a level that is equal to or above the average of the top 10 states nationally by 2025 and to maintain, at a minimum, this level of funding until otherwise decreed; be it further

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this Resolution be forwarded to Assembly Member Bill Brough and State Senator Patricia Bates.

**GRANT PROGRAM** 

This item was placed on the agenda at the request of Trustee McNicholas and Trustee Jones for the Board's review and consideration.

## **HISTORY**

The District's CTE program has grown tremendously over the last several years, enhancing the opportunities for our students in Career and Technical Education. Our District relies on these State funds to support our students and grow the program.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

AB-1743 is co-authored by Assembly Members Arambula, Berman, Grayson, Mayes, and Waldron. If enacted, AB-1743 would extend the provisions of the K-12 CTE Incentive Grant (CTEIG) program for three more years and provide \$500 million annually for that purpose.

## **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

An act to amend Sections 53070, 53071, 53073, 53075, and 53076 of the Education Code, relating to career technical education.

## LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1743, as introduced, O'Donnell. California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program.

Existing law establishes the California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program, administered by the State Department of Education, with the purpose of encouraging and maintaining the delivery of career technical education programs during implementation of the school district and charter school local control funding formula. Existing law appropriates specified amounts for the program from the General Fund for the 2015-16, 2016-17, and 2017–18 fiscal years and provides minimum eligibility standards for grant applicants.

This bill would instead specify that the purpose of the program is to encourage and maintain the delivery of high quality career technical education programs during implementation of the school district and charter school local control funding formula and the development of career readiness metrics within the California School Dashboard. The bill would specify that, upon appropriation by the Legislature, \$500,000,000 shall be made available for the program to the department each year for the 2018-19, 2019-20, and 2020-21 fiscal years, and would require a grant applicant to demonstrate a proportional dollar-for-dollar match for a grant award for those fiscal years. The bill would add to the minimum eligibility standards that a grant applicant demonstrate that it provides opportunities for pupils to participate in leadership development opportunities, career and technical education student organizations, and opportunities for pupils who are individuals with exceptional needs to participate in all of the grant applicant's programs. The bill would revise reporting requirements for program participants, and would require the Superintendent of Public Instruction to evaluate and deem successful a grant recipient's program as a condition of receiving a renewal grant.

Existing law requires the department and the State Board of Education to give positive consideration for specified characteristics when determining grant recipients, including that the applicant did not operate a career technical

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education program during the 2014–15 fiscal year.

This bill would instead require the department and state board to give positive consideration to an applicant that has not received a grant award in an unspecified fiscal year. The bill would also authorize the Superintendent to determine, in collaboration with the executive director of the state board, the purposes for which grant funds may be used.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1.** Section 53070 of the Education Code is amended to read:

- **53070.** (a) The California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program is hereby established as a state education, economic, and workforce development initiative with the goal of providing pupils in kindergarten and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, with the knowledge and skills necessary to transition to employment and postsecondary education. The purpose of this program is to encourage and maintain the delivery of *high quality* career technical education programs during implementation of the school district and charter school local control funding formula pursuant to Section-42238.02. There 42238.02 and the development of career readiness metrics within the California School Dashboard.
- (b) There is hereby appropriated to the department from the General Fund for the program established pursuant to this chapter the following amounts:
- (1) For the 2015–16 fiscal year, four hundred million dollars (\$400,000,000).
- (2) For the 2016-17 fiscal year, three hundred million dollars (\$300,000,000).
- (3) For the 2017–18 fiscal year, two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000).
- (c) The following funds shall be made available to the department upon appropriation by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act or another statute for the program established pursuant to this chapter:
- (1) For the 2018–19 fiscal year, five hundred million dollars (\$500,000,000).
- (2) For the 2019–20 fiscal year, five hundred million dollars (\$500,000,000).
- (3) For the 2020-21 fiscal year, five hundred million dollars (\$500,000,000).

- (d) Of the amounts appropriated in-paragraphs (1) through (3), inclusive, of subdivision (a), subdivisions (b) and (c), 4 percent is designated for applicants with average daily attendance of less than or equal to 140, 8 percent is designated for applicants with average daily attendance of more than 140 and less than or equal to 550, and 88 percent is designated for applicants with average daily attendance of more than 550, unless otherwise determined by the Superintendent in collaboration with the executive director of the state board. For purposes of this section, average daily attendance shall be those figures that are reported at the time of the second principal apportionment for the previous fiscal year for pupils in grades 7 to 12, inclusive. For any applicant consisting of more than one school district, county office of education, charter school, or regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority, or of any combination of those entities, the sum of the average daily attendance for each of the constituent entities shall be used for purposes of this subdivision.
- **SEC. 2.** Section 53071 of the Education Code is amended to read:
- **53071.** The department shall administer this program as a competitive grant program. An applicant shall demonstrate all of the following to be considered for a grant award:
- (a) (1) A proportional dollar-for-dollar match as follows for any funding received from this program:
- (A) For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2015, one dollar (\$1) for every one dollar (\$1) received from this program.
- (B) For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2016, one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) for every one dollar (\$1) received from this program.

- (C) For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2017, two dollars (\$2) for every one dollar (\$1) received from this program.
- (D) For fiscal years 2018–19, 2019–20, and 2020–21, one dollar (\$1) for every one dollar (\$1) received from this program.
- (2) That local match may include funding from school district and charter school local control funding formula apportionments pursuant to Section 42238.02, the federal Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Improvement Act of 2006, the California Partnership Academies, the Agricultural Career Technical Education Incentive Grant, or any other source except as provided in paragraph (3).
- (3) That local match shall not include funding from the California Career Pathways Trust established pursuant to Section 53010.
- (b) At least a-A three-year plan for continued support of career technical education programs after grant funding expires. The plan, at a minimum, shall include the identification of available funding within an applicant's current or projected budget to continue to support career technical education programs and a written commitment to do so. If an applicant consisting of more than one school district, county office of education, charter school, or regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority, or any combination of these entities, is applying for grant funding from this program, identification of available funding and a written commitment must be demonstrated by each participating constituent entity.
- (c) The applicant, or the applicant's career technical education program, as applicable, meets all of the following minimum eligibility standards:
- (1) Offers high quality curriculum and instruction aligned with the California Career Technical Education Model Curriculum Standards, including, but not limited to, providing a coherent sequence of career technical education courses that enable pupils to transition to postsecondary education programs that lead to a career pathway or attain employment upon graduation from high school.
- (2) Provides pupils with quality career exploration and guidance.
- (3) Provides pupil support services, including counseling and leadership development.
- (4) Provides for system alignment, coherence, and articulation, including ongoing and structural regional or local partnerships with postsecondary educational institutions, documented through formal written agreements.
- (5) Forms ongoing and structural industry and labor partnerships, documented through formal written agreements and through participation on advisory committees.
- (6) Provides opportunities for pupils to participate in after school, extended day, and out-of-school internships, competitions, *leadership development opportunities*, *career and technical education student organizations*, and other work-based learning opportunities.
- (7) Reflects regional or local labor market demands and focuses on current or emerging high-skill, high-wage, or high-demand occupations.
- (8) Leads to an industry-recognized credential or certificate, or appropriate postsecondary training or employment.
- (9) Is staffed by skilled teachers or faculty and provides professional development opportunities for those teachers or faculty members.
- (10) Provides opportunities for pupils who are individuals with exceptional needs to participate in all programs.

- (11) (A) Reports—data, data to the Superintendent, as a program participation requirement, to allow for an evaluation of the program.
- (B) Data reported pursuant to this paragraph shall include, but not be limited to, metrics aligned with the core metrics required by the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act and the quality indicators described in the California State Plan for Career Technical Education required by the federal Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Improvement Act of 2006, and the following metrics:
- (i) The number of pupils completing high school.

- (ii) The number of pupils completing career technical education coursework.
- (iii) The number of pupils obtaining an industry-recognized credential, certificate, license, or other measure of technical skill attainment.
- (iv) The number of former pupils employed and the types of businesses in which they are employed.
- (v) The number of former pupils enrolled in a postsecondary educational institution, a state apprenticeship program, or another form of job training.
- **SEC. 3.** Section 53073 of the Education Code is amended to read:
- **53073.** (a) An applicant receiving a grant from this program in the 2015–16 a prior fiscal year shall be eligible to receive a renewal grant in the 2016–17 fiscal year and in the 2017–18 fiscal year. An applicant that does not receive a grant in the 2015–16 fiscal year, but receives a grant in the 2016–17 fiscal year, shall be eligible to receive a renewal grant in the 2017–18 fiscal year. If the applicant's program has been evaluated and deemed successful by the Superintendent based on the metrics specified in paragraph (1) of subdivision (b). No applicant shall be eligible for a renewal grant in the 2018–19 2021–22 fiscal year.
- (b) (1) The department, in collaboration with the state board, shall determine *reporting requirements and* renewal grant eligibility using metrics identified pursuant to paragraph—(10) (11) of subdivision (c) of Section 53071.
- (2) If an applicant for a renewal grant is subject to the requirements of Sections 52060 and 52061, Sections 52066 and 52067, or Section 47606.5, the inclusion of career technical education programs in the applicant's local control and accountability plan shall be required to be eligible for a renewal grant.
- **SEC. 4.** Section 53075 of the Education Code is amended to read:
- 53075. (a) When determining grant recipients, the department and the state board shall do both of the following:
- (1) Give positive consideration to each of the following characteristics in an applicant:
- (A)Did not operate a career technical education program during the 2014–15 fiscal year.
- (A) Has not received a grant award pursuant to this chapter in the \_\_\_\_\_ fiscal year.
- (B) Serving unduplicated pupils as defined in Section 42238.02.
- (C) Serving pupil subgroups that have higher than average dropout rates as identified by the Superintendent.
- (D) Located in an area of the state with a high unemployment rate.
- (2) Give positive consideration to programs to the extent they do any of the following:
- (A) Successfully leverage one or both of the following:
- (i) Existing structures, requirements, and resources of the federal Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Improvement Act of 2006, California Partnership Academies, or Agricultural Career Technical Education Incentive Grants.
- (ii) Contributions from industry, labor, and philanthropic sources.
- (B) Engage in regional collaboration with postsecondary education or other local educational agencies.
- (C) Make significant investment in career technical education infrastructure and equipment. infrastructure, equipment, and facilities.
- (D) Operate within rural school districts.
- (b) When determining grant recipients, the department and the state board shall give greatest weight to the applicant characteristics included in paragraph (1) of subdivision (a).
- **SEC. 5.** Section 53076 of the Education Code is amended to read:

- **53076.** For purposes of administering the program established by this chapter, the Superintendent may do any of the following:
- (a) Determine, in collaboration with the executive director of the state board, specific funding amounts, the purposes for which grant funds may be used, and the number of grants to be awarded.
- (b) Distribute funding on a multiyear schedule, establish a process for monitoring the use of the funding, and, if necessary, cease distribution of funding and recover previously distributed funding in the case of a recipient's failure to comply with a grant prerequisite or minimum standard.
- (c) Annually review grant recipients' expenditures on career technical education programs for purposes of determining if the grant recipients have met the dollar-for-dollar match requirement specified in subdivision (a) of Section 53071. If after review, the Superintendent determines that a grant recipient failed to meet the matching funds requirement, the Superintendent shall reduce the following year's grant allocation in an amount equal to the unmet portion of the match requirement. The reduction shall not reduce the grant recipient's match requirement for the year in which the Superintendent reduces the allocation.
- (d) Require grant recipients to submit program—reports. reports pursuant to paragraph (11) of subdivision (c) of Section 53071.
- (e) Set aside up to \_\_\_\_ percent of the total amount provided for the program for one or both of the following purposes:
- (1) To provide planning grants.
- (2) To contract with a local educational agency for the provision of technical assistance to applicants and grant recipients.

Board Item: Consideration to Request Amendment of the Forster Canyon Community

Development Plan from the City of San Juan Capistrano

#### **HISTORY**

The Forster Canyon Comprehensive Development Plan was first adopted in March 1981 and changed the Existing General Plan Designation from high density to planned community. In September 2003 a rezone was approved relocating the residential development and park and moving the potential school use to the property, changing the designation to Public Institutional. Under the Mitigation Agreement entered into in November 2005 for the Pacifica San Juan development, the District has an option to purchase the property. In March 2016, the District entered into a Purchase and Sale Agreement with the owner, Pacific Point Development Partners, LLC, to formalize the purchase process.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

On January 18, 2017, the Board of Trustees held a Board workshop to explore various options for properties with the intent of generating funding for District capital facilities' needs. On September 19, 2017, the San Juan Capistrano City Council considered a request to initiate an amendment to permit an overlay with a high density residential designation with was denied. As a result, community outreach meetings were held at the District office on October 26, 2017 and November 28, 2017 where the District committed to a 64 percent reduction in the density to a maximum of 47 homes. This reduced density is the basis of the revised request for the initiation of an amendment.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

The Board of Trustees is asked to consider requesting from the City of San Juan Capistrano an amendment to the Forster Canyon Planned Community District Comprehensive Development Plan which will allow City staff to study the residential land use option to determine an acceptable level of development to the environment and the community.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The rezoning of the property would result in an enhanced value of the property and if the option is sold at a higher value than the purchase price option, the net proceeds may be invested in the schools that serve the Pacifica San Juan development.

# **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended the Board of Trustees approve the request to amend the Forster Canyon Community Development Plan from the City of San Juan Capistrano.

Board Item: Consideration of Ordinance Authorizing Levy of Special Taxes in CFD 98-1B

#### **HISTORY**

On February 24, 2016, the Board of Trustees received an information presentation from Government Financial Strategies, the District's financial advisor, on plans for Community Facilities District (CFD) 98-1 (Pacifica San Juan), which included a proposal to amend the CFD into two groups: CFD 98-1A and CFD 98-1B. In response to a petition from the landowner of the proposed CFD 98-1B, on May 11, 2016, the Board of Trustees adopted a resolution forming CFD 98-1B, and on the same day, the landowner approved the formation of the CFD via an election.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Each year (most recently August 23, 2017) the Board considers the adoption of resolutions that set the special tax levy in each CFD for the upcoming fiscal year. In the recently formed CFD 98-1B, no tax has yet been levied since no bonds have been issued by the CFD. It is expected that bonds will first be issued, and special taxes levied, in CFD 98-1B for fiscal year 2018-2019.

#### **CURRENT CONSIDERATIONS**

Approval of the ordinance will provide authorization for the Board to consider adoption of a resolution later this year that sets the special tax levy in CFD 98-1B for fiscal year 2018-2019.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Authorization to set the special tax levy in CFD 98-1B will allow the District to consider issuing bonds later this year, which will provide mitigation funds for the schools that serve the CFD.

## **DATA**

The resolution establishing the CFD authorized the issuance of up to \$14 million of bonds with a special tax of up to 40 years. It is planned that total mitigation funds from both CFD 98-1A and CFD 98-1B will be \$13.8 million to the District and \$13.8 million to the City of San Juan Capistrano.

#### **STAFF RECOMMENDATION**

District staff recommends the Board of Trustees approve the ordinance.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 98-1B-1

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT LEVYING SPECIAL TAXES WITHIN COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 98-1B OF THE CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT (PACIFICA SAN JUAN)

# Community Facilities District No. 98-1B of the Capistrano Unified School District (Pacifica San Juan)

WHEREAS, on May 11, 2016, the Board of Trustees (the Board of Trustees) of the Capistrano Unified School District (CUSD) adopted a resolution entitled "A Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the Capistrano Unified School District of Formation of Community Facilities District No. 98-1B of the Capistrano Unified School District (Pacifica San Juan), Authorizing the Levy of a Special Tax within the District and Establishing an Appropriations Limit for the District" (the Resolution of Formation), establishing Community Facilities District No. 98-1B of the Capistrano Unified School District (the Community Facilities District), authorizing the levy of a special tax within the Community Facilities District and establishing an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District;

WHEREAS, on May 11, 2016, the Board of Trustees held a noticed public hearing on the establishment of the Community Facilities District as required by the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982 (Act);

WHEREAS, subsequent to the close of said hearing, the Board of Trustees adopted resolutions establishing the Community Facilities District, authorizing the levy of a special tax within the Community Facilities District and calling an election within the Community Facilities District on the proposition of incurring indebtedness, levying a special tax within the Community Facilities District and establishing an appropriations limit for the Community Facilities District; and;

WHEREAS, on May 11, 2016, an election was held in which the qualified electors of the Community Facilities District approved said proposition by more than the two-thirds vote required by the Act;

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** The Board of Trustees hereby authorizes and levies special taxes within the Community Facilities District pursuant to Sections 53328 and 53340 of the Act, at the rates and in accordance with the method of apportionment set forth in Exhibit A attached to this Ordinance (the Rate and Method of Apportionment). The special taxes are hereby levied commencing in fiscal year 2018-2019 and in each fiscal year thereafter until the last fiscal year in which such

special taxes are authorized to be levied pursuant to the Rate and Method of Apportionment, subject to the limitations contained in Section D of the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees may, in accordance with subdivision (b) of Section 53340 of the Act, provide, by resolution, for the levy of the special tax in future tax years at the same rate or at a lower rate than the rate provided by this Ordinance, subject, in all cases, to the provisions of the Rate and Method of Apportionment, the Amended and Restated Impact Mitigation Agreement Related to Community Facilities District No. 98-1A and Community Facilities District No. 98-1B, dated as of March 1, 2016, by and among Pacific Point Development Partners LLC (PPDP), CUSD, and the Community Facilities District (the Amended and Restated Mitigation Agreement), and any other document relating to the levy of special taxes in the Community Facilities District. In no event shall the special tax be levied on any parcel within the Community Facilities District in excess of the maximum tax specified therefor in the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

**Section 3.** The special tax shall be levied on all of the parcels in the Community Facilities District, unless exempted by law or by the Rate and Method of Apportionment.

**Section 4.** The proceeds of the special tax shall only be used to pay, in whole or in part, the costs of, and/or the financing costs of, the acquisition and construction of certain public capital facilities, as more particularly described in the Resolution of Formation, the Rate and Method of Apportionment, the Amended and Restated Mitigation Agreement, and the Second Amended and Restated Joint Community Facilities Agreement, dated as of March 1, 2016, by and among the City of San Juan Capistrano, PPDP, CUSD, and the Community Facilities District.

**Section 5.** The special tax shall be collected in the same manner as ordinary *ad valorem* property taxes are collected and shall be subject to the same penalties and the same procedure, sale and lien priority in the case of delinquency as is provided for *ad valorem* taxes, unless another procedure is adopted by the Board of Trustees. In addition, the provisions of Section 53356.1 of the Act shall apply to delinquent special tax payments. The staff and officers of CUSD are each hereby authorized and directed to provide all necessary information to the Treasurer and Tax Collector of Orange County and to otherwise take all actions necessary in order to effect proper billing and collection of the special tax, so that the special tax shall be levied and collected in sufficient amounts and at the times necessary to satisfy the financial obligations of the Community Facilities District in each fiscal year.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the staff and officers of CUSD may collect one or more installments of the special taxes by means of direct billing by the Community Facilities District of the property owners within the Community Facilities District if, in the judgment of the staff and officers of CUSD, such means of collection will reduce the burden of administering the Community Facilities District or is otherwise appropriate in the circumstances. In such event, the special taxes shall become delinquent if not paid when due as set forth in any such respective billing to the property owners.

**Section 6.** If for any reason any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid, or if the special tax is found inapplicable to any particular parcel within the Community Facilities

District, by a court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this Ordinance and the application of the special tax to the remaining parcels within the Community Facilities District shall not be affected.

**Section 7.** This Ordinance shall take effect and shall be in force 30 days after the date of its adoption and prior to the expiration of 15 days from the passage thereof shall be published at least once in *The Orange County Register*, a newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in the area of the Community Facilities District, together with the names of the Board of Trustees members voting for and against the same.

# RATE AND METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT FOR CFD NO. 98-1B

# RATE AND METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT FOR CAPISTRANO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT NO. 98-1B (PACIFICA SAN JUAN)

A Special Tax as hereinafter defined shall be levied on all Assessor's Parcels in Capistrano Unified School District Community Facilities District No. 98-1B ("CFD No. 98-1B") and collected each Fiscal Year commencing in Fiscal Year 2016-2017, in an amount determined by the Board through the application of the appropriate Special Tax for "Developed Property," "Taxable Property Owner Association Property," "Taxable Public Property," "Taxable Religious Property" and "Undeveloped Property" as described below. All of the real property in CFD No. 98-1B, unless exempted by law or by the provisions hereof, shall be taxed for the purposes, to the extent and in the manner herein provided.

#### A. **DEFINITIONS**

The terms hereinafter set forth have the following meanings:

"Acre" or "Acreage" means the land area of an Assessor's Parcel as shown on an Assessor's Parcel Map, or if the land area is not shown on an Assessor's Parcel Map, the land area shown on the applicable final map, parcel map, condominium plan, or other recorded County parcel map.

"Act" means the Mello-Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, as amended, being Chapter 2.5, Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code of the State of California.

"Administrative Expenses" means the following actual or reasonably estimated costs directly related to the administration of CFD No. 98-1B: the costs of computing the Special Taxes and preparing the annual Special Tax collection schedules (whether by the School District or designee thereof or both); the costs of collecting the Special Taxes (whether by the County or otherwise); the costs of remitting the Special Taxes to the Trustee; the costs of the Trustee (including its legal counsel) in the discharge of the duties required of it under the Indenture; the costs to the School District, CFD No. 98-1B or any designee thereof of complying with arbitrage rebate requirements; the costs to the School District, CFD No. 98-1B or any designee thereof of complying with School District, CFD No. 98-1B or obligated persons disclosure requirements associated with applicable federal and state securities laws and of the Act; the costs associated with preparing Special Tax disclosure statements and responding to public inquiries regarding the Special Taxes; the costs of the School District, CFD No. 98-1B or any designee thereof related to an appeal of the Special Tax; the costs associated with the release of funds from an escrow account; and the School District's annual administration fees, including, without limitation, expenses incurred in pursuit of State funding with respect to CFD No. 98-1B public facilities, and third party expenses. Administrative Expenses shall also include amounts estimated or advanced by the School District or CFD No. 98-1B for any other administrative purposes of CFD No. 98-1B, including attorney's fees and other costs related to commencing and pursuing to completion any foreclosure of delinquent Special Taxes.

- "Assessor's Parcel" means a lot or parcel shown in an Assessor's Parcel Map with an assigned Assessor's parcel number.
- "Assessor's Parcel Map" means an official map of the Assessor of the County designating parcels by Assessor's parcel number.
- "Assigned Special Tax" means the Special Tax for Residential Property and Non-Residential Property, as determined in accordance with Section C below.
- **"Backup Special Tax"** means the Special Tax applicable to each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property, as determined in accordance with Section C below.
- **"Board"** means the Board of Trustees of the Capistrano Unified School District, acting as the legislative body of CFD No. 98-1B.
- "Bonds" means any bonds or other debt (as defined in Section 53317(d) of the Act), whether in one or more series, issued by CFD No. 98-1B under the Act.
- "CFD Administrator" means an official of the School District, or designee thereof, responsible for determining the Special Tax Requirement and providing for the levy and collection of the Special Taxes.
- "CFD No. 98-1B" means Capistrano Unified School District Community Facilities District No. 98-1B (Pacifica San Juan).
- "County" means the County of Orange.
- "Developed Property" means, for each Fiscal Year, all Taxable Property, exclusive of Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property, or Taxable Religious Property, for which a building permit for new construction was issued prior to January 1 of the prior Fiscal Year.
- "Fiscal Year" means the period starting July 1 and ending on the following June 30.
- "Indenture" means the indenture, fiscal agent agreement, resolution or other instrument pursuant to which Bonds are issued, as modified, amended and/or supplemented from time to time, and any instrument replacing or supplementing the same.
- "Maximum Special Tax" means the maximum Special Tax, determined in accordance with Section C below, that can be levied in any Fiscal Year on any Assessor's Parcel.
- "Non-Residential Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property for which a building permit(s) was issued for a non-residential use.
- "Outstanding Bonds" means all Bonds which remain outstanding.

- "Property Owner Association Property" means any property within the boundaries of CFD No. 98-1B that is owned in fee or by easement, or dedicated to, a property owner association, including any master or sub-association.
- "Proportionately" means for Developed Property that the ratio of the actual Special Tax levy to the Assigned Special Tax is equal for all Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property within CFD No. 98-1B. For Undeveloped Property, "Proportionately" means that the ratio of the actual Special Tax levy per Acre to the Maximum Special Tax per Acre is equal for all Assessor's Parcels of Undeveloped Property in CFD No. 98-1B. For Taxable Public Property, Taxable Property Owner Association Property and Taxable Religious Property, "Proportionately" means that the ratio of the actual Special Tax levy per Acre to the Maximum Special Tax per Acre is equal for all Assessor's Parcels of Taxable Public Property, Taxable Property Owner Association Property or Taxable Religious Property, as applicable.
- "Public Property" means any property within the boundaries of CFD No. 98-1B that is used for rights-of-way or any other purpose and is owned by or dedicated to the federal government, the State of California, the County, the City of San Juan Capistrano, or any other public agency, provided however that any property leased by a public agency to a private entity and subject to taxation under Section 53340.1 of the Act shall be taxed and classified in accordance with its use.
- "Religious Property" means all property within the boundaries of CFD No. 98-1B which is used primarily as a place of worship and is exempt from *ad valorem* property taxes because it is owned by a religious organization. Religious Property, without limitation, does not include any Assessor's Parcels used primarily for religious schools, day care centers, or congregate care facilities.
- "Residential Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property for which a building permit has been issued for purposes of constructing one or more residential dwelling units.
- "School District" means the Capistrano Unified School District.
- "Special Tax" means the special tax to be levied in each Fiscal Year on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property, Undeveloped Property, Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property, and Taxable Religious Property to fund the Special Tax Requirement.
- "Special Tax Requirement" means that amount required in any Fiscal Year for CFD No. 98-1B to: (i) pay debt service on all Outstanding Bonds; (ii) pay periodic costs on the Bonds, including but not limited to, credit enhancement and rebate payments on the Bonds; (iii) pay reasonable Administrative Expenses; (iv) pay any amounts required to establish or replenish any reserve funds established by the Indenture for all Outstanding Bonds; (v) pay directly for construction of facilities eligible under the Act to the extent that the inclusion of such amount does not result in a Special Tax levy on Undeveloped Property; and (vi) pay for reasonably anticipated delinquent Special Taxes based on the delinquency rate for Special

Taxes levied in the previous Fiscal Year; (vii) less a credit for funds available to reduce the annual Special Tax levy, as determined by the CFD Administrator pursuant to the Indenture.

"State" means the State of California.

"Taxable Property" means all of the Assessor's Parcels within the boundaries of CFD No. 98-1B which are not exempt from the Special Tax pursuant to law or Section E below.

"Taxable Property Owner Association Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Property Owner Association Property that are not exempt pursuant to Section E below.

"Taxable Public Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Public Property that are not exempt pursuant to Section E below.

"Taxable Religious Property" means all Assessor's Parcels of Religious Property that are not exempt pursuant to Section E below.

"Trustee" means the trustee or fiscal agent under the Indenture.

"Undeveloped Property" means, for each Fiscal Year, all Taxable Property not classified as Developed Property, Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property or Taxable Religious Property.

"Zone" means any one of the separate geographic areas within CFD No. 98-1B designated on the boundary map and on Exhibit A herein as: Zone 1, Zone 2, Zone 3, Zone 4, Zone 5, or Zone 6.

#### B. ASSIGNMENT TO LAND USE CATEGORIES

Each Fiscal Year, all Taxable Property within CFD No. 98-1B shall be classified as Developed Property, Taxable Public Property, Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Religious Property or Undeveloped Property, and shall be subject to Special Taxes in accordance with the rate and method of apportionment determined pursuant to Sections C and D below.

The Assigned Special Tax for Residential Property shall be based on the Zone in which the Assessor's Parcel is located. The Assigned Special Tax for Non-Residential Property shall be based on the Zone in which the Assessor's Parcel is located and the Acreage of the Assessor's Parcel.

#### C. MAXIMUM SPECIAL TAX RATE

## 1. Developed Property

#### a. Maximum Special Tax

The Maximum Special Tax for each Assessor's Parcel classified as Developed Property within a particular Zone shall be the greater of (i) the

amount derived by application of the Assigned Special Tax for such Zone or (ii) the amount derived by application of the Backup Special Tax for such Zone.

# b. <u>Assigned Special Tax</u>

The Assigned Special Tax for Residential Property and Non-Residential Property within each Zone for Fiscal Year 2016-2017 is shown below in Tables 1 and 2.

## c. Multiple Land Use Categories

In some instances an Assessor's Parcel may contain both Undeveloped Property and Developed Property or both Residential Property and Non-

#### Residential Property.

In such cases, the Acreage of the Assessor's Parcel shall be allocated between Developed Property and Undeveloped Property based on the portion of the Assessor's Parcel for which building permits had been issued prior to January 1 of the prior Fiscal Year and the portion of the Assessor's Parcel for which building permits had not been issued prior to January 1 of the prior Fiscal Year. The Acreage that is considered Developed Property shall be allocated between Residential Property and Non-Residential Property based on the site plan. The Maximum Special Tax that can be levied on such Assessor's Parcel shall be the sum of the Maximum Special Tax that can be levied on each type of property located on that Assessor's Parcel.

#### d. <u>Backup Special Tax</u>

The Backup Special Tax in CFD No. 98-1B shall equal an amount per Acre for each Zone as shown below in Table 3.

#### e. <u>Increase in the Assigned Special Tax and the Backup Special Tax</u>

On each July 1, commencing on July 1, 2017, the Assigned Special and the Backup Special Tax shall be increased by an amount equal to two percent (2%) of the amount in effect for the previous Fiscal Year.

# 2. Undeveloped Property, Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property and Taxable Religious Property

#### a. Maximum Special Tax

The Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property, Taxable Property

Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property and Taxable Religious Property within each Zone is shown below in Table 4.

## b. <u>Increase in the Maximum Special Tax</u>

On each July 1, commencing on July 1, 2017, the Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property, Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property, and Taxable Religious Property shall be increased by an amount equal to two percent (2%) of the amount in effect for the previous Fiscal Year.

#### D. METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT OF THE SPECIAL TAX

Commencing with Fiscal Year 2016-2017 and for each following Fiscal Year, the Board shall levy the Special Tax until the amount of Special Taxes equals the Special Tax Requirement. The Special Tax shall be levied each Fiscal Year as follows:

<u>First:</u> The Special Tax shall be levied Proportionately on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property at up to 100% of the applicable Assigned Special Tax.

<u>Second</u>: If additional monies are needed to satisfy the Special Tax Requirement after the first step has been completed, the Special Tax shall be levied Proportionately on each Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property at up to 100% of the Maximum Special Tax for Undeveloped Property.

<u>Third</u>: If additional monies are needed to satisfy the Special Tax Requirement after the first two steps have been completed, then the levy of the Special Tax on each Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property whose Maximum Special Tax is determined through the application of

the Backup Special Tax shall be increased in equal percentages from the Assigned Special Tax up to the Maximum Special Tax for each such Assessor's Parcel.

<u>Fourth</u>: If additional monies are needed to satisfy the Special Tax Requirement after the first three steps have been completed, then the Special Tax shall be levied Proportionately on each Assessor's Parcel of Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property and Taxable Religious Property at up to the Maximum Special Tax for Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property and Taxable Religious Property.

Notwithstanding the above, under no circumstances will the Special Tax levied in a Fiscal Year against any Assessor's Parcel of Residential Property for which an occupancy permit for private residential use has been issued be increased by more than ten percent (10%) above the amount that would have been levied in that Fiscal Year as a consequence of delinquency or default by the owner of any other Assessor's Parcel within CFD No. 98-1B. To the extent that the levy of the Special Tax on Residential Property is limited by the provision in the previous sentence, the levy of the Special Tax on all other Assessor's Parcels shall continue in equal percentages at up to 100% of the Maximum Special Tax.

#### E. EXEMPTIONS

There shall be no exemptions for property in Zone 1, Zone 2, Zone 3, and Zone 4.

No Special Tax shall be levied on Property Owner Association Property, Public Property, and/or Religious Property in Zone 5 and Zone 6 at up to the Acreage amounts shown in Table 5 below:

Tax-exempt status will be assigned by the CFD Administrator in the chronological order in which property within Zone 5 and Zone 6 become Property Owner Association Property, Public Property or Religious Property. However, should an Assessor's Parcel no longer be classified as Property Owner Association Property, Public Property or Religious Property, its tax-exempt status will be revoked.

Property Owner Association Property, Public Property or Religious Property that is not exempt from Special Taxes under this section shall be subject to the levy of the Special Tax and shall be taxed Proportionately as part of the fourth step in Section D above, at up to 100% of the applicable Maximum Special Tax for Taxable Property Owner Association Property, Taxable Public Property or Taxable Religious Property.

#### F. REVIEW/APPEAL COMMITTEE

Any taxpayer may file a written appeal of the Special Tax levied on his/her property with the CFD Administrator, provided that the appellant is current in his/her payments of Special Taxes. During the pendency of an appeal, all Special Taxes previously levied must be paid on or before the payment date established when the levy was made. The appeal must specify the reasons why the appellant claims the calculation of the Special Tax is in error. The CFD Administrator shall review the appeal, meet with the appellant if the CFD Administrator deems necessary, and advise the appellant of its determination. If the CFD Administrator agrees with the appellant, the CFD Administrator shall eliminate or reduce the Special Tax on the appellant's property and/or provide a refund to the appellant. If the CFD Administrator disagrees with the appellant and the appellant is dissatisfied with the determination, the appellant then has 30 days in which to appeal to the Board by filing a written notice of appeal with the clerk of the Board, provided that the appellant is current in his/her payments of Special Taxes. The second appeal must specify the reasons for its disagreement with the CFD Administrator's determination.

Interpretations may be made by the Board by ordinance or resolution for purposes of clarifying any vagueness or ambiguity in this Rate and Method of Apportionment.

#### **G.** MANNER OF COLLECTION

The Special Tax shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as ordinary *ad valorem* property taxes; provided, however, that CFD No. 98-1B may directly bill the Special Tax, may collect Special Taxes at a different time or in a different manner if necessary to meet its financial obligations, and may covenant to foreclose and may actually foreclose on delinquent Assessor's Parcels as permitted by the Act.

#### H. PREPAYMENT OF SPECIAL TAX

The following definitions apply to this Section H:

"CFD Public Facilities" means either \$11.5 million in 2016 dollars, which shall increase by the Construction Inflation Index on July 1, 2017, and on each July 1 thereafter, or such lower number as (i) shall be determined by the CFD Administrator as sufficient to provide the public facilities to be provided by CFD No. 98-1B under the authorized financing program for CFD No. 98-1B, or (ii) shall be determined by the Board concurrently with a covenant that it will not issue any more Bonds to be supported by Special Taxes levied under this Rate and Method of Apportionment as described in Section D.

"Construction Fund" means an account specifically identified in the Indenture to hold funds which are currently available for expenditure to acquire or construct public facilities eligible under the Act.

"Construction Inflation Index" means the annual percentage change in the <u>Engineering News-Record</u> Building Cost Index for the City of Los Angeles, measured as of the calendar year which ends in the previous Fiscal Year. In the event this index ceases to be published,

the Construction Inflation Index shall be another index as determined by the CFD Administrator that is reasonably comparable to the <u>Engineering News-Record</u> Building Cost Index for the City of Los Angeles.

"Future Facilities Costs" means the CFD Public Facilities minus (i) public facility costs previously paid from the Construction Fund; (ii) moneys currently on deposit in the Construction Fund; and (iii) moneys currently on deposit in an escrow fund, if any, that are expected to be available to finance public facilities costs.

"Outstanding Bonds" means all Previously Issued Bonds which are deemed to be outstanding under the Indenture after the first interest and/or principal payment date following the current Fiscal Year.

"Previously Issued Bonds" means all Bonds that have been issued by CFD No. 98-1B prior to the date of prepayment.

#### 1. Prepayment in Full

All Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property and Assessor's Parcels of Undeveloped Property for which a building permit has been issued may be prepaid. The Special Tax obligation applicable to such Assessor's Parcel in CFD No. 98-1B may be fully prepaid and the obligation of the Assessor's Parcel to pay the Special Tax permanently satisfied as described herein; provided that a prepayment may be made only if there are no delinquent Special Taxes with respect to such Assessor's Parcel or any other Assessor's Parcel owned by such owner at the time of prepayment. An owner of an Assessor's Parcel intending to prepay the Special Tax obligation shall provide the CFD Administrator with written notice of intent to prepay. Within 30 days of receipt of such written notice, the CFD Administrator shall notify such owner of the prepayment amount of such Assessor's Parcel. The CFD Administrator will charge a fee to the owner requesting prepayment for providing this figure. Prepayment must be made not less than 45 days prior to the next occurring date that notice of redemption of Bonds from the proceeds of such prepayment may be given to the Trustee pursuant to the Indenture.

The Prepayment Amount (defined below) shall be calculated as summarized below (capitalized terms as defined below):

As of the proposed date of prepayment, the Prepayment Amount (defined below) shall be calculated as follows:

#### Paragraph No.:

- 1. Confirm that no Special Tax delinquencies apply to such Assessor's Parcel.
- 2. For Assessor's Parcels of Developed Property compute the Assigned Special Tax and Backup Special Tax applicable for the Assessor's Parcel to be prepaid. For Assessor's Parcels of Undeveloped Property (for which a building permit has been issued), compute the Assigned Special Tax and Backup Special Tax for that Assessor's Parcel as though it was already designated as Developed Property, based upon the building permit which has already been issued for that Assessor's Parcel.
- 3. (a) Divide the Assigned Special Tax computed pursuant to paragraph 2 by the total estimated Assigned Special Taxes for the entire CFD No. 98-1B based on the Developed Property Special Taxes which could be charged in the current Fiscal Year on all expected development through buildout of CFD No. 98-1B, excluding any Assessor's Parcels which have been prepaid, and
  - (b) Divide the Backup Special Tax computed pursuant to paragraph 2 by the estimated Backup Special Taxes at buildout of CFD No. 98-1B using the Backup Special Tax amount for the current Fiscal Year, excluding any Assessor's Parcels which have been prepaid.
- 4. Multiply the larger quotient computed pursuant to paragraph 3(a) or 3(b) by the Outstanding Bonds to compute the amount of Outstanding Bonds to be retired and prepaid (the "Bond Redemption Amount").
- 5. Multiply the Bond Redemption Amount computed pursuant to paragraph 4 by the applicable redemption premium, if any, on the Outstanding Bonds to be redeemed (the "Redemption Premium").
- 6. Compute the current Future Facilities Costs.
- 7. Multiply the larger quotient computed pursuant to paragraph 3(a) or 3(b) by the amount determined pursuant to paragraph 6 to compute the amount of Future Facilities Costs to be prepaid (the "Future Facilities Amount").
- 8. Compute the amount needed to pay interest on the Bond Redemption Amount from the first bond interest and/or principal payment date following the current Fiscal Year until the earliest redemption date for the Outstanding Bonds.
- 9. Determine the Special Taxes levied on the Assessor's Parcel in the current Fiscal Year which have not yet been paid.
- 10. Compute the minimum amount the CFD Administrator reasonably expects to derive from the reinvestment of the Prepayment Amount less the Future Facilities Amount

- and the Administrative Fees and Expenses from the date of prepayment until the redemption date for the Outstanding Bonds to be redeemed with the prepayment.
- 11. Add the amounts computed pursuant to paragraphs 8 and 9 and subtract the amount computed pursuant to paragraph 10 (the "Defeasance Amount").
- 12. Verify the administrative fees and expenses of No. 98-1B, including the costs of computation of the prepayment, the costs to invest the prepayment proceeds, the costs of redeeming Bonds, and the costs of recording any notices to evidence the prepayment and the redemption (the "Administrative Fees and Expenses").
- 13. The reserve fund credit (the "Reserve Fund Credit") shall equal the lesser of: (a) the expected reduction in the reserve requirement (as defined in the Indenture), if any, associated with the redemption of Outstanding Bonds as a result of the prepayment, or (b) the amount derived by subtracting the new reserve requirement (as defined in the Indenture) in effect after the redemption of Outstanding Bonds as a result of the prepayment from the balance in the reserve fund on the prepayment date, but in no event shall such amount be less than zero.
- 14. If any capitalized interest for the Outstanding Bonds will not have been expended at the time of the first interest and/or principal payment following the current Fiscal Year, a capitalized interest credit shall be calculated by multiplying the larger quotient computed pursuant to paragraph 3(a) or 3(b) by the expected balance in the capitalized interest fund after such first interest and/or principal payment (the "Capitalized Interest Credit").
- 15. The Special Tax prepayment is equal to the sum of the amounts computed pursuant to paragraphs 4, 5, 7, 11 and 12, less the amounts computed pursuant to paragraphs 13 and 14 (the "Prepayment Amount").
- 16. From the Prepayment Amount, the amounts computed pursuant to paragraphs 4, 5, 11, 13 and 14 shall be deposited into the appropriate fund as established under the Indenture and be used to retire Outstanding Bonds or make debt service payments. The amount computed pursuant to paragraph 7 shall be deposited into the Construction Fund. The amount computed pursuant to paragraph 12 shall be retained by CFD No. 98-1B.

The Prepayment Amount may be sufficient to redeem other than a \$5,000 increment of Bonds. In such cases, the increment above \$5,000 or integral multiple thereof will be retained in the appropriate fund established under the Indenture to be used with the next prepayment of Bonds or to make debt service payments.

As a result of the payment of the current Fiscal Year's Special Tax levy as determined under paragraph 9 (above), the CFD Administrator shall remove the current Fiscal Year's Special Tax levy for such Assessor's Parcel from the County tax rolls. With respect to any Assessor's Parcel that is prepaid, the Board shall cause a suitable notice to be recorded in compliance with the Act, to indicate the prepayment of Special Taxes and

the release of the Special Tax lien on such Assessor's Parcel, and the obligation of such Assessor's Parcel to pay the Special Tax shall cease.

#### 2. Prepayment in Part

The Maximum Special Tax on an Assessor's Parcel of Developed Property or an Assessor's Parcel of Undeveloped Property for which a building permit has been issued may be partially prepaid. The amount of the prepayment shall be calculated as in Section H.1; except that a partial prepayment shall be calculated according to the following formula:

$$PP = (P_E - A) \times F + A$$

These terms have the following meaning:

PP = the partial prepayment

 $P_E$  = the Prepayment Amount calculated according to Section H.1

F = the percent by which the owner of the Assessor's Parcel(s) is partially prepaying the Maximum Annual Special Tax.

A = the Administration Fees and Expenses from Section H.1

The owner of an Assessor's Parcel who desires to partially prepay the Maximum Special Tax shall notify the CFD Administrator of such owner's intent to partially prepay the Maximum Special Tax and the percentage by which the Maximum Special Tax shall be prepaid. The CFD Administrator shall provide the owner with a statement of the amount required for the partial prepayment of the Maximum Special Tax for an Assessor's Parcel within 30 days of the request and will charge a fee to the owner requesting prepayment for providing this figure.

With respect to any Assessor's Parcel that is partially prepaid, the School District shall (i) distribute the funds remitted to it according to Paragraph 16 of Section H.1. and (ii) indicate in the records of CFD No. 98-1B that there has been a partial prepayment of the Maximum Special Tax and that a portion of the Maximum Special Tax equal to the outstanding percentage (1.00 - F) of the remaining Maximum Special Tax shall continue to be authorized to be levied on such Assessor's Parcel pursuant to Section D.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, no full or partial Special Tax prepayment shall be allowed unless the amount of Assigned Special Taxes that may be levied on Taxable Property within CFD No. 98-1B both prior to and after the proposed prepayment, less expected Administrative Expenses, is at least 1.1 times the maximum annual debt service on all Outstanding Bonds.

#### I. TERM OF SPECIAL TAX

The Special Tax shall be levied each year to fully satisfy the Special Tax Requirement, but in no event shall it be levied after Fiscal Year 2055-56.
